

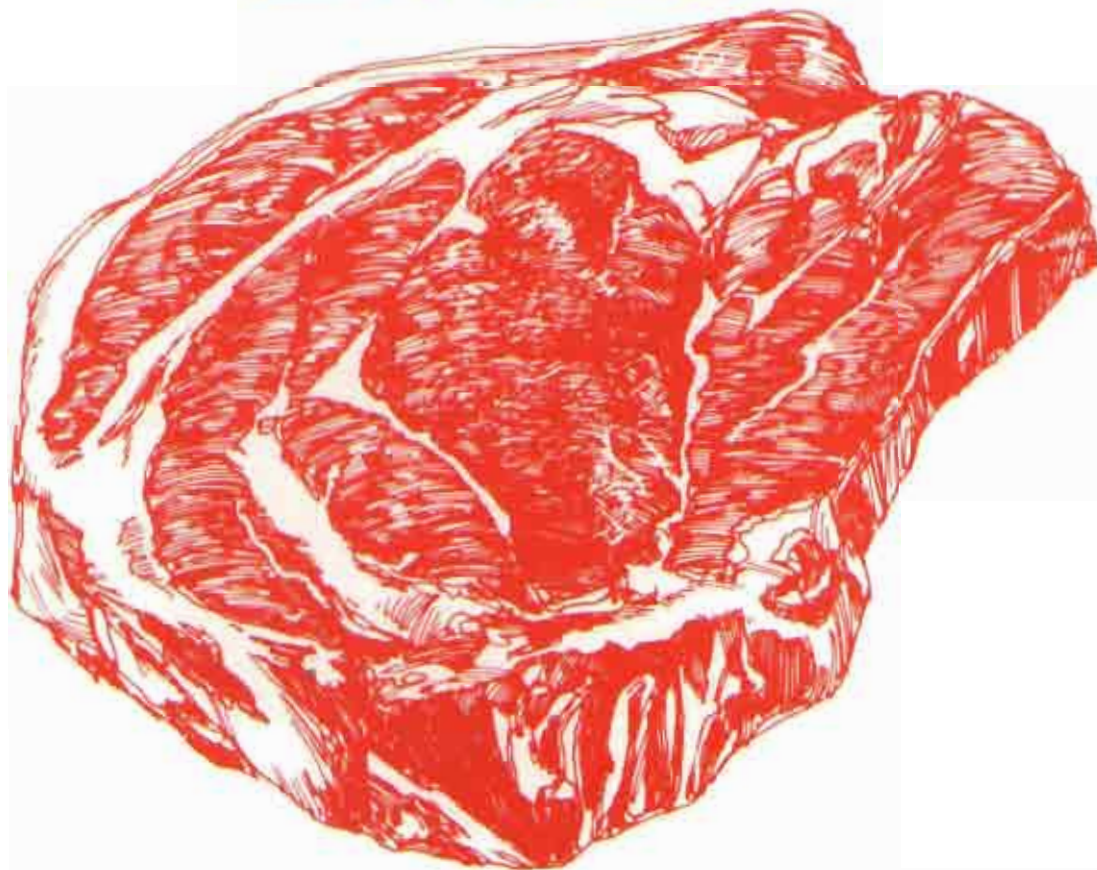

A message from the MGA President

We at the Manitoba Golf Association consider that we are given one major mandate. That is to promote the enjoyment and development of golf in the Province of Manitoba.

The Third Annual provides you with a great deal of Provincial golf information relating to events gone by and outlining events in the future. We are proud of the efforts of the members of council in preparing this magazine and greatly appreciative of all the advertisers who found funds in their budgets to help us this year.

I would now like to highlight for you some changes and additions to watch for in 1982.

I am certain that we all agree that the future of our clubs and of golf in general rests with the continued development of Junior Golf. As a result, we are continually examining the Junior program and seeking improvements to it. This year, the Western Junior "B" event will be expanded to five competitors from the four participants in the past. This event involves boys 17 and under from the four Western Provinces. The 1982 competition will be in Saskatchewan.

Manitoba will host the Minnesota-Manitoba Junior event which was inaugurated last year. The event features the low eight finishers from our Manitoba junior against their peers from the State of Minnesota. It will be played again on a Walker Cup format combining 4-ball and singles matches.

The 1982 season will see the North American Life Tournament continue its evolution. It was started in 1980 as a father-son event, and expanded in 1981 to include a mother-daughter section. This year it will feature a parent-child section. It is hoped that this event will ultimately mature to a national competition of Provincial champions.

I am pleased to say with some certainty that the Manitoba Open will be a fixture through 1984. As many of you know, the Open came dangerously close to being cancelled a few years ago due to lack of sponsorship. However, because of the diligent efforts of the committee it is back on track. To date, four sponsors have indicated their interest to be associated with this tournament for

1982, 1983, and 1984. We hope to attract some additional sponsors so that we may increase the prize money and consequently the prestige of this event. The Open attracts a great deal of interest from the general populace and thus helps us in our promotion of golf. In addition, it provides an opportunity for our better amateurs to compete against professionals from Manitoba and outside of this Province, thus developing their skills.

The Manitoba Senior Inter-Club Competition will be a new event in 1982. It is scheduled for later in the season and will be conducted along the same lines as the Free Press Manitoba Inter-Club championship. The 1982 Free Press Inter-Club championship will return to the rural area this year at Falcon Lake. Plans are being formulated to follow the day's play with a meal and prize presentations.

The Peter Jackson Senior competition outlined in an article found in this publication, although not an MGA event, should provide great enjoyment for Manitoba golfers.

The fixture card grows and so does the budget. We have found it necessary to raise certain entrance fees, but with the support of the Government of Manitoba, the Manitoba Sports Federation, and some corporate donations, the increases have been minimized. Yet, as we look forward to 1983 and recognize the escalation of current costs of operations, we expect membership dues to be increased for the first time since 1977. We have already been informed that RCGA dues will increase 50c in 1983 and our association expects to increase by a like amount.

The MGA is operated entirely by volunteers who are a hard working and dedicated group. They give so much of their time to ensure events are conducted in a professional manner. We can always use more help, so, if your time permits let your representative know or contact the MGA office. Every contribution helps.

I wish you all a good golfing year and may all your drives be straight and all your putts short.

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IN MEMORIAM



HERBERT A. FOSTER

Manitoba's golfing fraternity was saddened to hear of the death of Herbert A. Foster on July 26, 1981, at Burnaby, B.C.

Foster became very active in Manitoba golf in the years following the Second World War, in which he saw extensive service overseas with the Canadian Army.

He was president of Pine Ridge Golf Club in 1935 and served for many years on the council of the Manitoba Golf Association, including a term as president in 1964-65. He later served on the board of governors of the Royal Canadian Golf Association.

Foster was active in the organization of the Mundie Putter League in Winnipeg and personally started the "Police and Pal" organization, designed to help bring young people and police officers into closer association with one another.

His work with the Manitoba Golf Association was also rewarded by the Manitoba Sports-writers and Sportscasters Association in 1971 when he was chosen for that group's "Good Guy" award.

Survived by his wife Winnie, a daughter Kathy and brother Ted, Herb Foster will also be greatly missed by his many friends in Manitoba golf circles.

A rare opportunity to see the best in action

Golfers in Manitoba will have a rare opportunity to see some of the legends of the game in action this summer when the Peter Jackson Champions tournament comes to St. Charles Country Club, during the week of June 22 to 27.

Details of the event are well documented elsewhere in this third edition of the Manitoba Golf annual, but it also rates top billing in this corner because it figures to be the best golf show local fans have had a chance to see in many years.

It has been more than 20 years since top-ranked professionals have displayed their talents in a major event in Winnipeg and, while many of those coming here for the Champions event can no longer compete successfully on the big PGA tour, they still have all the shots to put on a great show.

Some of the younger Manitoba golf fans have never had a chance to see the "names" of the game in person. They've watched them on television, but this will be their first chance to see some of them in person.

Of course, there will be no Jack Nicklaus, Tom Watson, Hale Irwin, Jerry Pate or any of the other current stars, but names like Sam Snead, Miller Barber, Don January, Julius Boros, Roberto de Vincenzo, Dow Finsterwald, Art Wall, Gene Littler, Billy Casper and Arnold Palmer, to name just a few, still carry enough magic to attract the true golf fan.

They might not all make it to Winnipeg, but most of those mentioned here, along with some of the leading over-50 Canadian pros, like Stan Leonard, Al Balding, Pat Fletcher and Moe Norman and Canada's best-known senior amateur, Nick Weslock, will be touring the lush St. Charles fairways.

Even those too young to remember golfers like Snead in their prime on the big tour have probably heard enough about them or have had a chance to see them in some of the senior events shown on television to know they can still thrill a golf gallery.

Snead, who recently celebrated his 70th birthday, will be sure to command a large following, whether he's playing at his best or not. And, don't be surprised if he scores lower than his age at St. Charles.

At this writing, it wasn't known for sure whether Arnold Palmer would make the trip to Winnipeg, but if he puts in an appearance, you can bet there will be a local branch of "Arnie's Army" following him around the course.

The main hope now will be for the weatherman to co-operate. We don't want a repeat of the last time the top pros were in Winnipeg. That was in 1961 when the Canadian Open was played at Niakwa and the event was dubbed the "Umbrella Open" because it rained steady through the full four days.

Prior to that week, Winnipeg had come through a drought of some two months with no rain at all.

It was exactly 30 years ago when the Canadian Open was played at St. Charles and Johnny Palmer turned in three rounds of 66 and a 65 for a fabulous 25-under-par 263. Palmer will be back for another look at St. Charles.

While the Peter Jackson Champions tournament will be the major showpiece for this year, local golf fans should keep in mind there's some interesting golf watching here every summer in the annual Manitoba Open tournament. It won't attract the really big names, but most of the leading Canadian pros and a handful of

golfers from short distances south of the line can be expected. Manitoba's own Dan Halldorson, playing well on the big tour this year, is expected to return home for the event and also to play in a pro-am event at his "home" course at Shilo.

And, the professionals aren't the only ones to watch. The Manitoba Amateur championship and the annual provincial junior event also can provide some interesting golf for spectators each year and the golfers certainly appreciate the support from the fans.

Don't forget the female side of the picture. Last year saw both the Canadian women's amateur championship and the national junior women's event played in Winnipeg, at St. Charles and Rossmere respectively. Both had fair crowds, particularly the amateur event at St. Charles, which attracted some leading U.S. and Australian performers.

The women don't have any national events this year, but their own provincial championship tournament and some of the other events during the season are worth a look if you like to watch good golf competition.

This is the third annual edition of this Manitoba Golf Association yearbook and we hope it contains the type of information and articles that capture the interests of the Manitoba Golfers. The magazine is distributed through the golf clubs to all affiliated members of the association.

The Manitoba Golf Annual is produced to keep the province's golfers informed on what has happened in the past and what is coming up. Of course, there's also a financial side and for the past three years, proceeds from this magazine have helped to keep the Manitoba Open alive, along with the support from the sponsors.

Such a publication can only succeed with the support of the advertisers and that is the reason Yearbook Committee Chairman Rudy Boivin, Executive Director D. I. Macdonald, MGA President Michael Averbach, the members of the MGA council and committee workers join with me in asking that you support those advertisers.

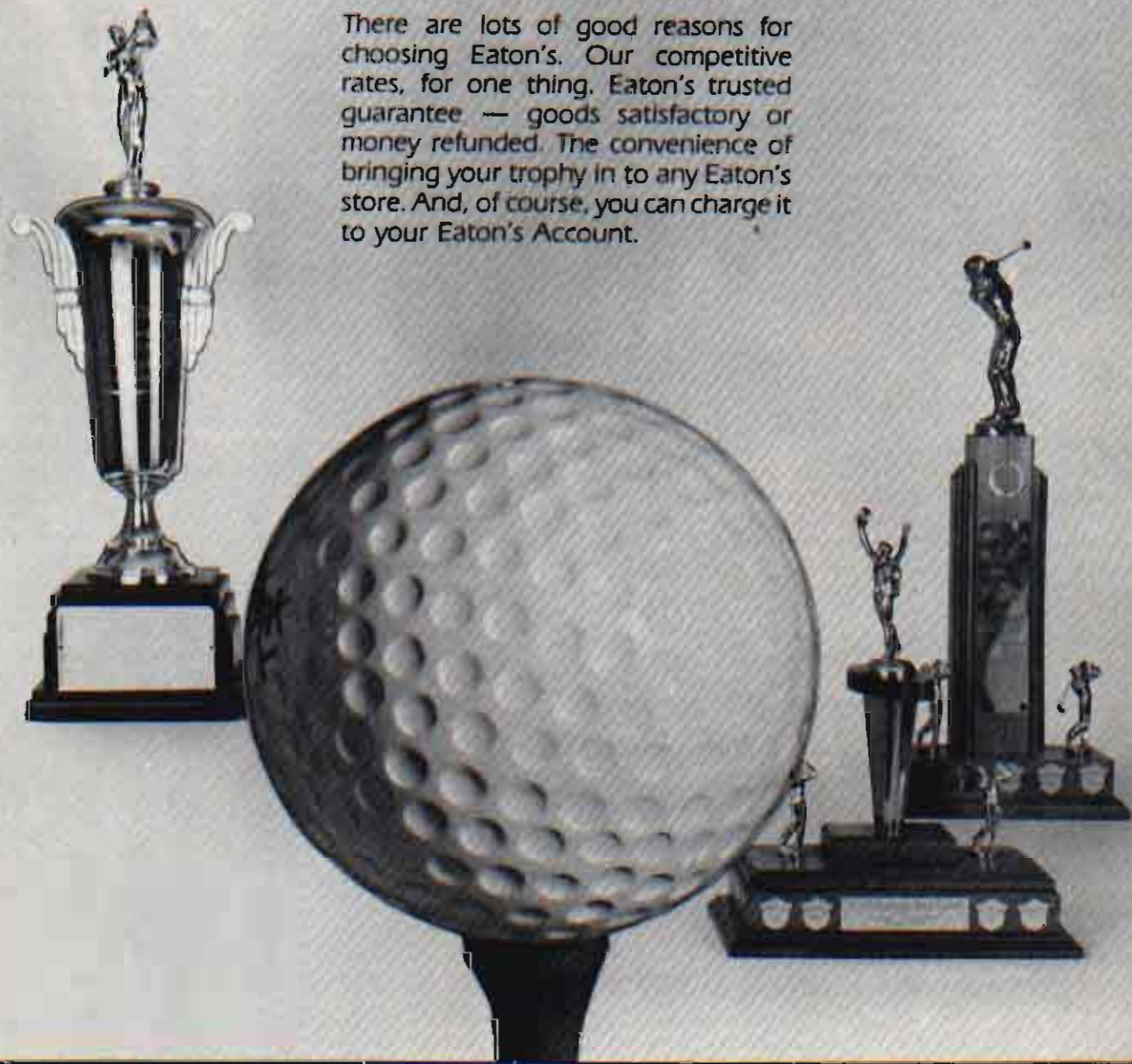

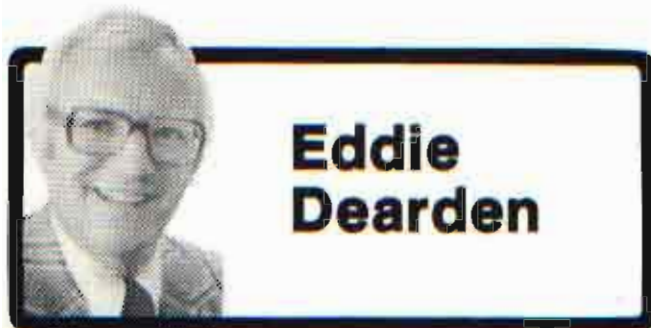

Not a vintage year

It wasn't a vintage competitive year for Manitoba golfers in 1981 . . . not that many of them are when it comes to national involvement.

The Willingdon Cup men's squad and the women's team finished well up the track again in their national competitions (both seventh) but I would say help is on the way.

The bright lights were the juniors, with emphasis at the moment on the young ladies, in this case the team, for it pulled up in a tie for first in the national event at Rossmore before bowing out to Ontario.

Shauna Gechel of Breezy Bend, one of those team players, set a precedent when she was voted golfer of the year and winner of the Labatt's Award and she did it by beating another girl, Gail Anderson of St. Charles, also a team player.

Gechel closed out her junior career by earning a spot on both the junior and amateur interprovincial teams and although Anderson is rated five notches higher (fifth) in the Canadian Ladies Golf Association national rankings, Shauna commanded the Manitoba voters respect for the fact she shaded Gail in a playoff for the junior title.

Anderson should be the class of the juniors this summer, for she has one year to go. After all, she made her mark last year by winding up in a five-way tie for second place, settling for fifth place when she was first out in a sudden-death playoff.

Also among the final three in the balloting was the only two-time winner of the award, Terry Hashimoto of St. Charles, the perennial Willingdon Cupper and king of the commercial circuit when he won both the Grey Owl and Golden Falcon. But he didn't try for the brewery sponsor's triple crown by playing in the International tournament that straddles the United States-Canadian border.

That was won by Bruce North, the tall, bearded slugger from Carman, who also put himself in the running for the golfer-of-the-year award by adding another Rural Amateur crown at Hecla Island to his trophy case, not to mention a passel of other titles on the country circuit.

Taking a bow, too, was Craig Kindrat of Selkirk, a solid, young swinger who has started wintering with a college education in Florida. Craig won the Manitoba Golf Association's junior achievement award and he'll be one to watch this season, now that he's got a semester of U.S. tutelage under his belt.

There's also Marc Chamberland, who's bound to settle at one club or another now that he's graduating from high school and walking around with a fistful of U.S. college offers.

I have a hunch the demon photographer, Hugh Allan, who produces those striking color awards for Labatt's will be touching up one of Chamberland before long.

He finally remained on his home turf last summer and won the provincial junior crown. It could just be the start.

Let's pause to remember:

The ranks of Manitoba golf lost two fine men in the last six months, one named Earl and the other named Earle . . . Earl Storey's death at age 60 was a shock and left a big gap in both golf and 10-pin bowling ranks. Earle Campbell was 10 years older and had been a cornerstone at the Wildewood Club for more than 30 years . . . The illness that laid Manitoba Golf Association president Don Nutley low before his term was up, was still another depressing note on the 1981-82 calendar . . . Golfers are reminded that the Storey name is being perpetuated by a fund struck by his family, members at Assiniboine where he was an ardent member, and the MGA and any members of these three groups will be happy to explain it in detail. Junior golfers will benefit . . . I hate to link Nutley in this particular section, because he's fighting the good fight and if he ever makes it, you can be certain he'll be back on the firing line in some capacity with either his club, Bel Acres, or the MGA . . . Finally, to get this season launched in a lighter vein, give a tip of the old golf cap to Assiniboine pro Dale Esopenko, who as president of the Manitoba branch of the Canadian Professional Golfers Association, is one of the special guests of the Grey Owl committee to attend the annual tournament at Clear Lake . . . Eso established an all-time record last year for catching fish with a nine-iron. This year, he'll try a niblick . . . The Owl committee appreciates the fact that he cuts down on his expense by bringing his own dinner.



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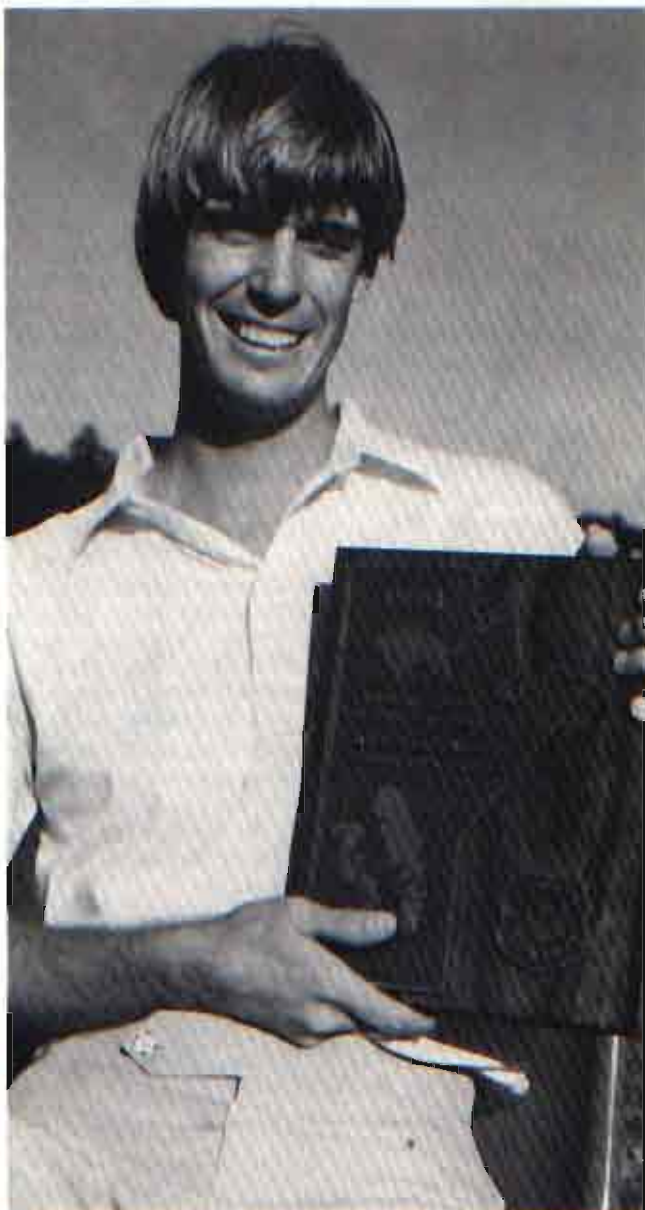

Minnesota golfer wins Manitoba Open honors

Dating back to the days of Ev Stuart, George Shortridge, or more recently, the unheralded Richard Ehrmentraut on his honeymoon in 1976, Minnesota golfers have been a force in the annual Manitoba Open golf championships.

So it should have come as no surprise that 24-year-old Dan Croonquist from St. Paul, Minn., led the field last August at the Breezy Bend Country Club.

Consistency was the key for the slim, blond, 165 pound swinger of Swedish ancestry as he carded three successive rounds of 69 for a nine-under-par 207 total in the 54-hole, \$16,000 tournament.

In earning the first-money cheque of \$4,000, the Arizona State graduate, who has tried, but failed to gain his Tournament Players Association card in the United States, explained his success simply:

"I drove the ball well and putted consistently to compensate for a few ugly shots."

One of those 'uglies' was a near-disastrous hook off the first tee on his final round, but when he recovered from the trees and escaped with a par-four everything settled back into place.

His playing partners—four regular and twice Manitoba Open champion Dan Halldorson from Shilo, and Jim Rutledge of Victoria, B.C.—never could overhaul Croonquist, with Halldorson, the first-round leader after a 67, shooting himself out of contention with bogeys on the 16th and 17th holes of the final round.

Halldorson, the big attraction for some of the best galleries in the Open's history, could do no better than par rounds of 72 on the final two days and he found himself tied for second place, not with a hot-starting Rutledge, but with Windsor, Ont., veteran Bob Panasiuk.

"Panny" was the story of the final round, played in ideal, hot August weather over the excellently-conditioned Breezy Bend course. He sizzled out in 31 and got home in 33 for a record-shattering eight-under-par 64. Oddly enough, one of the marshalls controlling the closing-day crowd was the big-hitting amateur and greens superintendent from Charleswood, Ray Savard. he had established the previous Bend competitive record, a 66.

Also causing a stir in the gallery that followed the three leaders in the final round was Rutledge when he

started with three successive birdies, then threw in an eagle-three on the 475-yard fourth. But he, too, eventually bowed to Croonquist's strong suit of that weekend—consistency. Like Halldorson, Rutledge needed 72 strokes and enjoyed a \$1,000 payday with a 213 total.

It is expected Croonquist, an All-American while attending Arizona State, will lead another strong Minnesota contingent into this year's Open. He was talked into coming up last year by Ehrmentraut and Bill Israelson, another Minnesota pro.

Winner of the Harold Eidsvig Memorial Trophy last year as low amateur was Terry More of Elmhurst, who dashed off the following day to a Willingdon Cup assignment in Calgary, along with 1981 amateur champ Dan Scanlon, and 1980 Eidsvig winner, Terry Hashimoto of St. Charles, who also tuned up in the Open.

More turned in two cards of 71 after an opening-round 74 to finish with a 216 total, one shot ahead of the host club's Bill Parker, who finished in the runner-up slot for the third time. "Hash" was third at 220.

This year's Open is booked for Elmhurst Aug. 13-14-15, with the Kinsmen-sponsored Pro-Am again slated to tee things off the day before.

The Open purse will again be in the \$15,000-\$16,000 range, thanks to the continued financial support from Carling-O'Keefe and Shannon Ford, plus the return of two other old friends of golf, Blackwood Beverages and Imperial Roadways.

There may be even more assistance forthcoming if tourney chairman Peter Kremer has his way as the Manitoba Golf Association strives to keep the event an important step on what remains of the Canadian professional trail.

Host pro says crisp iron play key to Elmhurst

Elmhurst is basically set up, by degree of difficulty, in two sections — the front nine being the most difficult and longer nine, where a score around par will be your aim.

The back nine starts out with "the horn" (10, 11 and 12) and these could be the crucial holes on the course. Maintaining par through these holes will put you in a good position for the stretch drive over the last six holes.

Although these holes are shorter, the deceptive, undulating greens can bring on disaster. But, this area still is the best place for some good birdie chances.

The key to good scores at Elmhurst will be crisp iron play and sharp putting on greens that can be treacherous when they are cut down.

Wind will also play a larger factor and, if it blows from the north, it will add a couple of strokes to the difficulty of the course, resulting in few sub-par scores.

Here's how the course will play:

1. (348 yards, par 4) — A drive around the dog-leg right will leave you a wedge to the green. Don't miss your drive to the right. Good starting hole, giving you a chance to settle into your game.

2. (393 yards, par 4) — A good drive will leave most players with a mid-iron to the green, don't miss the green long or to the right, in the hedges.

3. (428 yards, par 4) — A good drive here is imperative in getting in position to hit a narrow green, well guarded by bunkers. Trees left and out-of-bounds on right from teeing area, and out-of-bounds very close to the back of the green.

4. (217 yards, par 3) — Difficult par three under any conditions. Club selection is most important in hitting this shallow green.

5. (525 yards, par 5) — A drive to the left side of this narrow fairway will give you a chance to cross the corner, hitting the green in two. If any doubt exists, play to the corner and wedge in. Hole can be crucial to a good start. Disaster lurks for the careless.

6. (370 yards, par 4) — Possibly the best driving hole on the course. Few drivers will be hit on this narrow hole. An iron or fairway wood off the tee will leave you a short iron to a severely undulating green. Avoid long putts here.

7. (430 yards, par 4) — This dog-leg right is one of the most difficult holes on the course. A good drive down the middle will leave you with a long to mid-iron to a green completely covered in front by large bunkers that must be carried. They can be very difficult to recover from.

8. (152 yards, par 3) — Deceptively easy looking par three. However, bunkers protect the front and right sides of the green and there are trees behind. Wind could be a large factor when playing from this elevated tee.

9. (453 yards, par 4) — Probably the most difficult hole on the course. A good drive leaves a long iron to a narrow, well-bunkered green. There's out-of-bounds on the left and trouble all around the green.

10. (391 yards, par 4) — Start of the horn and crucial to a good start on the back nine. A narrow driving area over the hill. From here, a short iron off a downhill lie. Distance is deceptive here. Hedge behind green should discourage being long.

11. (225 yards, par 3) — Difficult par three, all uphill. Probable best shot is a driving long iron landing between two front bunkers and rolling up on green. Trees on the left and out-of-bounds on the right are closer than they look.

12. (389 yards, par 4) — Good driving hole. Trees on both sides. Drive must be to left of centre to avoid a huge pine guarding the right approach to the green. Only a short iron to green, but traps in front make it difficult to judge distances.

13. (525 yards, par 5) — Easiest hole on the course — straightaway and green is easily reached in two. Be careful of out-of-bounds on the right. We'll see a lot of birdies and some eagles on this hole.

14. (164 yards, par 3) — Mid-iron to green that has very few straight putts. Being above the hole could result in many three-putts.

15. (355 yards, par 4) — A drive to the left centre avoids a fairway bunker on the right side, leaving a wedge to the green. Trees on left of fairway. This flat-looking green is very difficult to read and has some subtle breaks.

16. (340 yards, par 4) — Good driving hole down a narrow fairway over a hill. This leaves a wedge to the green. Birdie possibilities but, again, some pin placements can make putting tricky. A fairly easy hole that, if taken lightly, can be very punishing.

17. (424 yards, par 4) — Very difficult hole. Drive is straightaway, but second shot, of a long or mid-iron, is to a green that falls away from you. If pin is near slope, putting is extremely difficult. Birdies will be few on this hole.

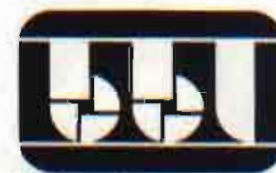
18. (323 yards, par 4) — Drive down left side is ideal to approach green between two bunkers with a wedge. Hedge and out-of-bounds on right will catch many careless drives. A good birdie possibility but, again, a difficult green to read and putt.

Scanlon charges to '81 Manitoba Amateur title

Controversy and long-hitting 20-year-old Dan Scanlon of Breezy Bend were front and centre at the 1981 edition of the Manitoba Amateur golf championships and Willingdon Cup Trials.

In short, a bad news, good news week for the Manitoba Golf Association and Scanlon.

Qualifying rounds the first day at Niakwa and Southwood had the huge 273-man field in a snit. Especially at Niakwa, where it took most of the field six hours to play. The heat was one thing but seven holes had marked areas for improving lies, which, as one competitor noted: "That really holds up the flow."

It didn't bother hockey star Rick Blight, veteran Dave Wolch or youthful Darcy Furber, however, as they emerged co-leaders with 71s.

Day Two was reserved for Southwood's Don Medcalf, who was medallist with rounds of 72-69, for a 141 total, one better than veteran Jumbo Jimmy Doyle. Medcalf, a 31-year-old IBM executive, calculated his home course in one-under-par figures. A two-handicapper from Ontario, Medcalf had only arrived in Winnipeg a couple of years ago.

Best round of the second day belonged to Terry Hashimoto who finished 33-34—67, at Southwood, three-under, which was 10 shots better than his first-day outing at Niakwa.

Blight, another big hitter, moved to the front of the pack after Day Three with a 217 total following rounds of 71-73-73. Hashimoto was at 218 and Scanlon at 219, a shot up on Wolch and Doyle. Medallist Medcalf soared to 81 big ones over his home course in the wind.

"The wheels just came off and I couldn't negotiate that wind," groaned Medcalf.

Scanlon, the six-foot, 165-pound Prince Edward Island-born belter, left everybody up the track the final 18 holes at Southwood to win the Amateur championship and the Free Press Trophy by three shots in somewhat controversial, but dramatic, fashion!

Dan closed with par 70, thanks to an eagle-deuce on the 18th, after earlier scores of 75, 70 and 74 for a 289 total.

Hashimoto and Blight both finished at 292, Wolch 295, and Doyle 296, but out of the prizes.

Defending champion Craig Dearden of Glendale was never a factor at 308.

Scanlon unleashed a big tee shot on the dog-leg, 310-yard 18th hole that saw him roll a two-wood 14 feet from the cup. Dan drained the putt and the championship was secure. In contrast, both Blight and Hashimoto needed three shots to get close to the flagstick.

Blight saw his championship hopes fade on the 17th when he drilled his tee ball out of bounds. Hashimoto also suffered on the par-five 17th with an unplayable lie.

Controversy occurred on the 15th green when Hashimoto stabbed at a tap-in putt but didn't make contact with the ball. The matter lay dormant, however, until all three players—Scanlon, Blight and Hashimoto—reached the 18th tee.

It obviously upset Hashimoto, who pushed his final drive way off line and had to pitch over the first tee and neighboring trees before he could chip onto the final green. Blight, meanwhile, pitched heavy and had to chip back to get down in par-four. Hashimoto missed a short putt and settled for a bogey-five.

It was all academic, however, when Scanlon, for four years a junior at Assiniboine, ran in his eagle putt. In two previous Amateur appearances, Scanlon had failed to make the cut.

A couple of surprises joined Scanlon and Hashimoto on the '81 Willingdon Cup team as the scene shifted to Pine Ridge.

Scanlon refused to wilt as some expected and fired rounds of 75-73 at The Ridge for a six-day total of 437. He easily earned the Jack Swanson Memorial medal for his efforts.

Hashimoto coasted to a 75-76 finish and a 443 total.

Terry More of Elmhurst used his experience to finish at 445. A final round 72 sent More to Calgary.

A relative unknown, 23-year-old Brent Armstrong of Niakwa, nipped veteran Freeman (Duke) Asmundson of The Ridge in a three-hole playoff for the fourth and final spot. Both were deadlocked at 446, Asmundson's closing 71 the day's best alongside Bob Dunbar.

Armstrong, who was 70 in Round Five of the trials, birdied the third overtime hole after Asmundson had made a miraculous par four from the woods.

At Calgary, Manitoba finished seventh, 26 shots behind winning Ontario. Hashimoto was the only Manitoba team player to survive the 36-hole cut and he finished the tournament at 292. Bill Parker, of Breezy Bend, a non-team player in '81, was Manitoba's best at 290.

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Shauna Gechel named Manitoba Golfer of Year

It was a year for the female golfers — particularly the junior variety — in voting for the Manitoba Golfer of Year award in 1981.

Shauna Gechel of Breezy Bend and Gail Anderson of St. Charles, both members of Manitoba's junior women's golf team last year, finished one-two in the voting, with former two-time winner Terry Hashimoto of St. Charles in third spot.

Gechel became the first female winner of the award and joins such Manitoba golf notables as Matt Poleschuk, the first winner in 1975, Hashimoto (1976 and 1980), Jimmy King (1977), Terry More (1978) and Bill Parker (1979).

The Gechel record for 1981 included membership on both the junior and provincial amateur teams and the junior provincial championship (in which she beat Anderson in a playoff).

Gechel and Anderson teamed with Cheryl Netterfield to form the Manitoba junior team, which lost a playoff to Ontario in the national event played at Winnipeg's Rossmere Golf and Country Club.

Anderson made the best showing in the national junior women's tournament, finishing in a four-way tie for second place at Rossmere, but being first out of the

playoff. Gechel however, was only one stroke back of that group.

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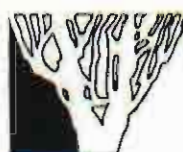

Competition close in first Manitoba-Minnesota junior team event

A new competition appeared on the Manitoba golf calendar in 1981 as the first annual Manitoba-Minnesota Junior Team Matches were played Aug. 19 and 20 at the Mesaba Country Club in Hibbing, Minn.

It will be Manitoba's turn to be host for the event this year and it is scheduled for Aug. 18 and 19 at Breezy Bend Country Club.

The eight top finishers from the 1981 Manitoba junior championships were chosen to represent the province. The team consisted of Marc Chamberland, Craig Kindrat, Gerry Dubanski, Garth Reimer, Pat Kamball, Rob Sapinski, Andy Taylor and John Wyndels. MGA president Don Nutley and Al Gray accompanied the team.

The Minnesota team consisted of Steve Schiffler, 1980 Minnesota junior champion; Gordy Skaar, 1981 Minnesota champ; Steve Barber and Tim Odegard, 1981 Minnesota high school champions; and Pete Rathmanner, Ross Rosenthal, Bill Banton and Bruce Hegland, second through fifth in the 1981 Minnesota junior championship. Warren Rebholz, executive-director of the Minnesota Golf Association, and his assistant, Tom Magne, were with the team.

The event was played in Walker Cup style with four better-ball matches on the first day and eight singles matches on the second day.

Competition was so close that of the 12 matches, one was tied, five were won by Manitoba and six by Minnesota with the championship going south on the final putt when Schiffler sank a six-footer to tie Kamball for the hole and match and prevent the series ending in a tie.

Each team won two matches in the better-ball portion. Kamball and Taylor topped Schiffler and Odegard, 2-and-1; and Kindrat and Dubanski downed Skaar and Banton, 3-and-2, for Manitoba's wins; while Hegland and Rosenthal were 2-and-1 winners over Wyndels and Sapinski and Barber and Rathmanner topped Chamberland and Reimer, 3-and-2.

In the singles matches, Manitoba's wins were by Reimer, 5-and-4 over Rathmanner; Chamberland, 1 up over Banton; and Wyndels, 6-and-5 over Odegard.

Minnesota's wins were by: Barber, 3-and-2 over Kindrat; Hegland, 3-and-2 over Taylor; Skaar, 2-and-1 over Dubanski; and Rosenthal, 2-up over Sapinski.

One unfortunate incident marred the outing. The Manitoba van was broken into on the Tuesday night and four sets of golf clubs were stolen. They belonged to competitors Wyndels and Reimer and officials Nutley and Gray.

Minnesota officials managed to round up clubs for the two competitors and both Wyndels and Reimer won with their borrowed clubs. Hibbing police recovered the clubs belonging to Nutley and Gray and both lost sets of clubs were covered by insurance.

Despite this one negative aspect, officials on both sides of the border are confident it was the start of an event which should remain on the golf calendar for years to come.

Chamberland finally wins junior crown

The 1981 Manitoba junior golf championship was an important event for Marc Chamberland.

Playing out of Breezy Bend, Chamberland felt he had something to prove. He had missed the previous two provincial junior championship events because he was competing in international tournaments in San Diego, so he was anxious to prove his ability to the rest of the province.

Chamberland turned on the heat in the final two rounds at Transcona to come from behind and realize his ambition. He was crowned Manitoba Junior Champion for 1981 with a five-stroke margin over the 72-hole route.

Marc had opened with a four-over-par 74 at Elmhurst, then followed with 72, 68 and 71 over the par-70 Transcona layout for a total of 285.

Garth Reimer of St. Boniface, who was the leader at the halfway point with 74-69, followed with 73-72 in the final two rounds for a 72-hole total of 290 and the runner-up position.

Third spot went to Southwood's Gerry Dubanski who was consistent with rounds of 72-73-72-74—291. Craig Kindrat of Selkirk claimed the fourth spot, bouncing back from an indifferent 79 in the opening round to post two sub-par scores (67 and 69) before slipping again to 77 in the final round for a 292 total.

A total of 180 golfers played in the 1981 provincial junior event with Elmhurst and Transcona courses used for the first two days, then only the low scores continuing for the final two rounds at Transcona.

The four leaders—Chamberland, Reimer, Dubanski and Kindrat—formed the Manitoba team for the inter-provincial junior championships, played Sept. 1 to 4 at St. George's Golf and Country Club in Toronto.

There were other winners at the provincial junior championships, too. In the 15-and-16 age group, also over 72-holes, Rick Wilson of Swan River was the winner with a total of 299, with runner-up honors going to Darcy Furber of Elmhurst with 304.

The younger groups were decided on 36 holes. In the 13-14 group, the winner was Ken Tresoor of Rossmere, with 151, followed by Kelly Boes of St. Boniface, with 153. In the 12-and-under group, Jeff Helper of Glendale led the way with 173, while clubmate Johnathon Buchwald claimed the runner-up spot with 187.

At the Canadian junior championships, the Manitoba team finished in a fourth-place tie with British Columbia and New Brunswick, each with 463 totals for their best three scores each day over two rounds, well behind winning Ontario's 447 total.

Kindrat was the Manitoba leader with 77 and 73 for 150, followed by Dubanski with 78-77—155, Chamberland with 79-81—160 and Reimer with 81-79—160.

Only Kindrat and Dubanski made the 36-hole cut and only Kindrat survived another cut at 54 holes due to rain conditions and he experienced putter problems in the final two rounds to finish well back of Canadian junior champ Kevin Dugas of Nova Scotia.

Meanwhile, another team of Manitoba junior golfers took part in the 1981 Western Canada Junior B matches at the Willow Park Golf Course in Calgary.

Manitoba placed third in this event with a total of 707 for three rounds. British Columbia led the way with 672 and Saskatchewan was second with 705.

John Wyndels led the Manitoba team with 231, including a fine 73 (second low score of the day) on the final day. Duncan Ridley checked in with 239, Darcy Furber had 243 and Rick Wilson had 246 to round out the Manitoba team.

There was team play at home, too, and a total of 24 teams took part in the Manitoba junior inter-club championship event Aug. 14 at Selkirk Golf and Country Club.

Playing on his home course, Craig Kindrat was the only golfer able to match par 71 at Selkirk and he paced his team to the rural title and the Matt Thompson trophy.

But, the big winners came from Rossmere as Rob Oliphant scored 73, Curt Bauer had 76 and Andrew Taylor and Gary McCaskill each had 79 for a total of 307. It earned the Rossmere team the Pepsi-Cola trophy as overall winners of the event.

Selkirk's total of 311 was made up of Kindrat's 71,75 by Dean Goodbrandson, 77 by Glen Hnatiuk and 88 by Trent Hendrickson.

The runner-up city honors went to Charleswood with a 315 total, as Larry Waralls had 77, David Gessner and Jim Hays each had 78 and Geoff Hayhurst had 82.

Runner-up rural team was the Wheat City entry of Ron

Most of the other first-round matches were also close. Al Hilton of Niakwa was a 1-up winner over Gavin Speirs of St. Charles; Dan Scanlon of Breezy Bend went to the 20th hole to sideline Zibresky; Mike Gottfred of Southwood edged clubmate Daryl Currie 2-and-1; McNeill was a 4-and-3 winner over Tim Coughlin of St. Charles; Bob Dunbar of St. Charles edged Gerry Dubanski of Southwood 1-up; Ken Chomyn of Elmhurst, the defending champion, went to the 19th hole to sideline clubmate Al Brownridge; and Terry More of Elmhurst got by Wyndels 2-and-1.

The second round of match play saw Parker sideline Hilton, 5-and-4; Scanlon was an 8-and-7 winner over Gottfred; Dunbar topped McNeill, 3-and-2; and Chomyn went to the 21st hole to defeat More.

Parker and Dunbar advanced to the final, both scoring 3-and-2 wins in the semi-final round over Scanlon and Chomyn respectively. In the final, Parker scored a 4-and-3 victory over Dunbar to claim the honors.

The 1982 Jack Blair Memorial Match Play championship will feature qualifying rounds June 5 and 6 at Bel Acres and Wildewood, with the matches to be played June 9 and 10 and June 16 and 17 (Wednesdays and Thursdays) at Niakwa.

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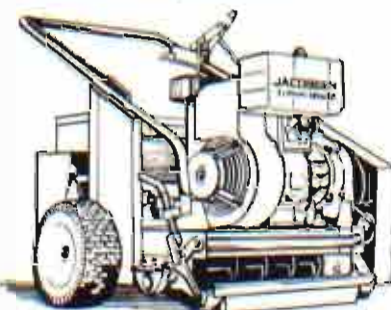
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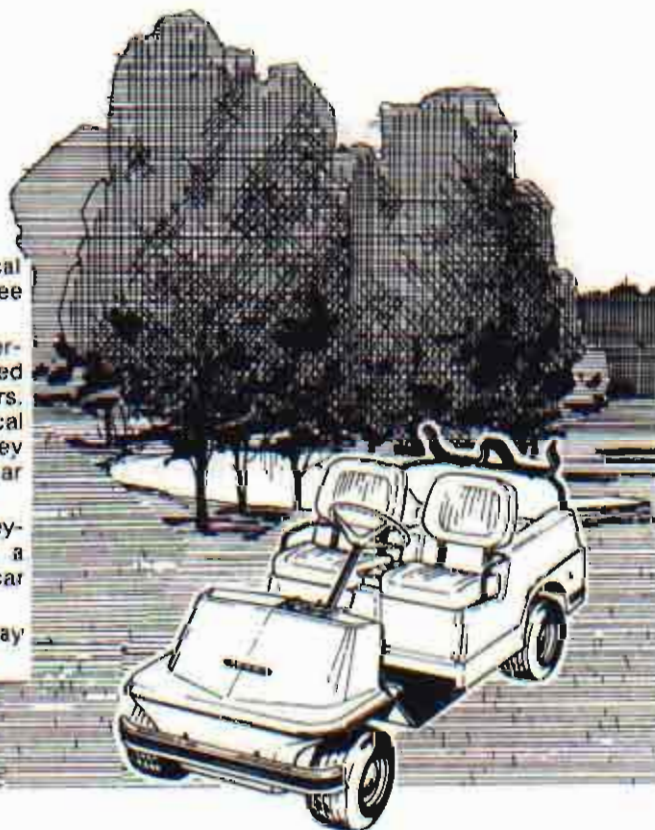
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Carman's Bruce North retains title in rural amateur test

It took a playoff to break a three-way tie, but Bruce North of Carman successfully defended his Manitoba Rural Amateur golf championship when the 1981 event was played in ideal weather conditions Aug. 9 and 10 at the Hecla Island Golf Course.

North was consistent as he made two tours of the beautiful provincial government layout in three-over-par 75s for a 36-hole total of 150 — a score that was matched by Dwight Kearns of the Wheat City club in Brandon and Mike Pernarowski of Dauphin, both carding 76-74 — 150.

The playoff lasted only one hole, with North emerging the winner and Kearns and Pernarowski splitting the second and third prizes.

North had also captured the rural amateur title in 1980 with rounds of 78 and 73 for a 151 total.

Also sharing part of the spotlight in the '81 rural amateur was Bob Thompson of Thompson, who set a competitive course record at Hecla with a two-under-par 70 in the opening round. He skied to an 86 in his second round, however, to finish at 156 (still a nice total for a 13-handicapper).

Craig Kindrat of Selkirk, a leading provincial junior, finished fourth in the championship flight with 73-79 — 152.

A total of 125 players teed off in the amateur competition and another 10 golfers played in the rural senior championship play at the same time.

Barrie Sanders of Carman claimed his second straight

rural senior title with a pair of 80s for a 36-hole total of 160.

Due to the small entry in the senior event, the only other prize awarded was for low net honors and that went to another Carman golfer, Joe Kachor, who had 86-88 — 174, less a handicap of 18 for a net total of 156.

Rural committee workers are hoping to build up the senior portion of this tournament to an entry of about 40 golfers and to attract about 140 for the amateur competition. The 1982 event will again be held at Hecla Island on Aug. 8 and 9.

Carl Wiebe with 86 and Ken Zeler with 92 for a gross total of 341 less a team handicap of 41.

Deloraine and Northernair tied in third place with team net totals of

302, followed in order by Minnedosa, 303; Steinbach, 305; Selkirk, 307; Thompson, 309; Wasagaming, 312; Glenboro, 322; Neepawa, 322; Dryden, Ont., 325; and Swan River, 329.

Inter-club honors to Neepawa

A playoff was needed to determine the winner in the 1981 Manitoba Rural Inter-Club Team Championships for the Dr. Alexander Trophy, with Neepawa emerging as the championship club.

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Fast, Fast Relief

Bunkers, trees, deep rough, bad lies, and so on, all offer the average golfer all he needs in the way of trouble. However there is another variety lurking around that can prove costly, and that is the opportunity for trouble which the Rules of Golf hold in store for the ignorant or unwary golfer.

Let us just take one commonly invoked rule which most golfers feel familiar with because it covers a situation in which they frequently find themselves, and let us just look at one aspect of this rule.

RULE 32 — CASUAL WATER GROUND UNDER REPAIR HOLE MADE BY A BURROWING ANIMAL

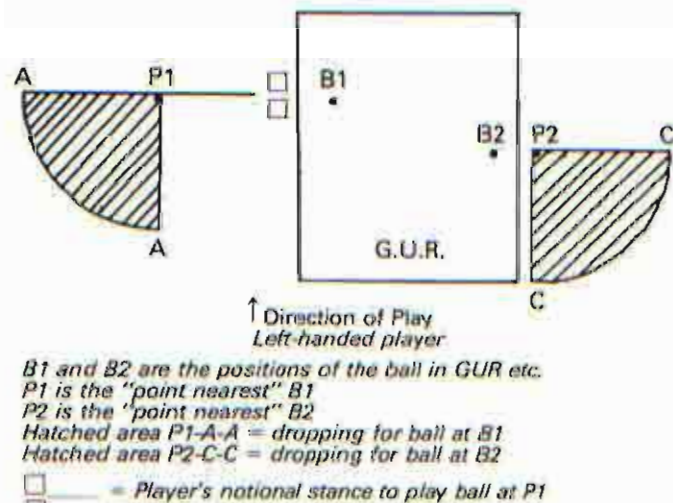
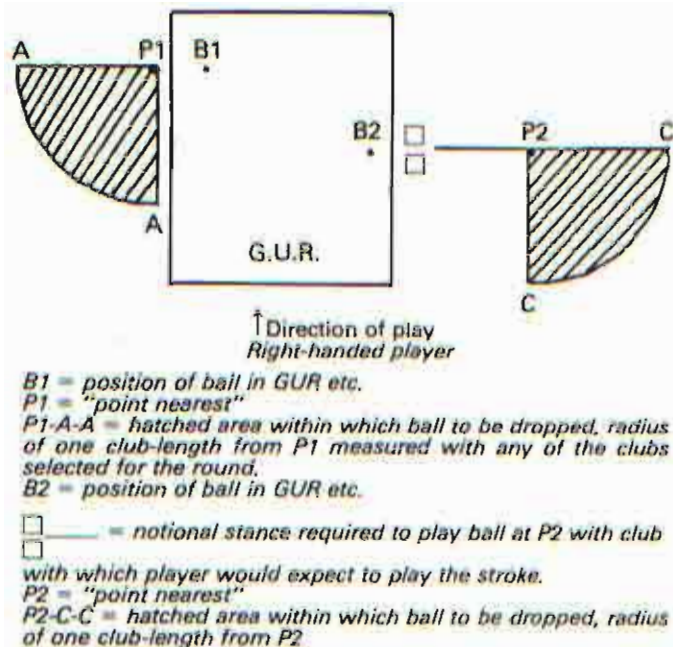
This is a lengthy rule which we will not reproduce in total here, but the aspect we wish especially to deal with is that of "relief".

The rule provides that there is interference by casual water, ground under repair, or a cast or runway made by a burrowing animal when a ball lies in or touches any of these conditions or where the condition interferes with the player's stance or the area of his intended swing.

Now, the important thing is the first choice which the rule provides which is that the player may either play the ball as it lies or he may take relief under the specific provisions of the rule. No problem of interpretation arises if the player chooses to play the ball as it lies, but let us assume the greater likelihood, which is that he will seek relief, and further that the ball is "through the green"—i.e. not on the green or in a hazard.

Here the rule regarding relief reads as follows: "through the green, the point nearest to where the ball lies shall be determined which (a) is not nearer the hole (b) avoids interference by the condition, and (c) is not in a hazard or on a putting green. The player shall lift the ball and drop it without penalty within one club length of the point thus determined on ground which fulfills (a), (b) and (c) above".

In order to assist in the interpretation of this aspect of Rule 32 and in particular the critical words "point nearest", the Rules of Golf Committee, developed the following sketches to show where the ball may be dropped from areas of G. U. R. or casual water through the green in the case of both the right-handed and the left-handed player.



In considering the above sketches it is necessary to bear in mind that the "point nearest" must be the point nearest to where the ball lies which is (a) not nearer the hole, (b) avoids interference by the G. U. R. or casual water for the player's stance or the area of his intended swing, and (c) is not in a hazard or on a putting green.

The "point nearest" must be strictly interpreted and a player is not permitted to choose on which side of the G. U. R. or Casual Water he will drop the ball, unless there are two "points nearest". Even if one side of the G. U. R. is 'fairway' and the other side is bushes, if the "point nearest" is in the bushes then the player, if taking relief, must drop the ball within one club-length of that point, even though he may have to drop the ball in a virtually unplayable lie.

Always bear in mind though that the player reserves the right to play the ball as it lies.

If you are still with us, there are other provisions of Rule 32 covering situations where a ball is in a hazard, on a green, or lost either in or outside a hazard under interference by conditions covered by the rule. Better brush up on these also, but today's lesson will be confined to the description of relief permitted by Rule 32 through the green.

Penalty for breach of this Rule is:

Match Play — Loss of hole.

Stroke Play — two strokes.

Selkirk golfers mark 50th year along with town's Centennial

This year, 1982, is a big year for the Town of Selkirk and also for the Selkirk Golf and Country Club.

For the town, it's Centennial Year as Selkirk citizens will be celebrating the 100th anniversary of the town's incorporation.

For the golf club, it's the 50th birthday, an occasion to be marked with a special Selkirk Centennial golf tournament at the club—an event the tournament officials are hoping to turn into the largest 18-hole golf competition in the country.

The Centennial tournament will be the highlight of this season for the Selkirk golfers and will be the club's major contribution to the town's birthday celebrations.

The three-day event will be held July 16, 17 and 18, with six shotgun starts and an expected participation of more than 800 golfers. Officials are hoping to use one of the shotgun starts for a women's tournament. Complete details on the event will be known as the date approaches.

This tournament will be the showpiece, but it will be only one of many events on the Selkirk golf calendar for 1982, because this 50-year-old club enjoys a history of being an active and growing organization.

While the Centennial event will be an enlarged version of the Selkirk club's usual July tournament, the club will also present its annual Last Chance men's tournament on the weekend of Sept. 11-12—always a popular event at the Selkirk course.

The Selkirk Golf Club has been a favorite spot for members and visitors alike almost since its beginning. It was known as one of the better nine-hole rural layouts for many years.

About five years ago, a second nine was opened and Selkirk now boasts one of the finest 18-hole courses in the province—a point which has been recognized not only by those playing in the Selkirk club-sponsored events, but also by the provincial golf organizations.

Both the Manitoba Golf Association and the Manitoba Branch of the Canadian Ladies' Golf Association have scheduled tournaments at Selkirk in recent years and the course is now included for some of the major events.

For instance, this year's MGA calendar includes the final round of the 54-hole trial for the senior men's provincial team on June 4; two rounds of the provincial junior championship on July 13 and 14; and the provincial rural team event (Sugar Bowl) on Sept. 19.

For the CLGA, the Selkirk course this year will be the scene of the final round of one of the major events of the year—the City and District Championship. The 54-hole test is scheduled for June 22 at Glendale, June 23 at Southwood and June 24 at Selkirk.

If there's any question of the popularity of the Selkirk club with outsiders, consider this: the 1981 summer tournament attracted 515 golfers and there were again more than 500 on hand for the annual Last Chance event.

Last year also saw the club boast a membership of more than 600, including 125 from Winnipeg, including a total adult membership of more than 400 golfers.

The club has a very active junior program with 188 juniors and 24 students registered last season. Golfers like Craig Kindrat, Glen Hnatiuk and Dean Goodbrandson carried the Selkirk name proudly in provincial competitions.

Among the men, the 1981 club champion was Gord Lenton, a winner over Rob Erickson, with Brian Gilhuly the consolation winner.

The best-known among Selkirk's female golfers is Cathy Burton, who won the club championship and also showed well in outside events. She was one of only two Manitobans to make the first cut in the Canadian Ladies Amateur championship last year at St. Charles Country Club and was the low net over-all winner at the Saskatchewan Amateur.

Over the years, the Selkirk club had its problems with the Red River, frequently causing spring flooding which delayed the start of the season. In 1950, the year of the big flood, there was no play at all on the course.

But, about 1967, a two-year project saw the diking of the course to remove the flood problem. The course is now completely diked and river problems are hopefully a thing of the past.

The club completed the irrigation system for the entire golf course just this spring and work is continuing to further improve the layout, with new tees and the planting of trees where needed.

And, while the noted golfers are important to bring publicity to the club, it is the executive members, past and present, who deserve the praise for the continuing growth of the Selkirk Golf Club.

Space wouldn't permit listing ALL the volunteer workers, but the Selkirk story wouldn't be complete with a salute to the Club Presidents who have guided the club through its 50 years.

John Walker was the first president, from 1932 to 1937. He was followed by Joe DeBondy in 1938, Frank Newman in 1938-40, DeBondy again, 1941, Ian Fairfield in 1942, Dr. G. W. Whitaker, 1943-45; Ernie Dennisen, 1946-47; Hugh Smith, 1948; Ian Fairfield again, 1949-51; Bill McDiarmid, 1952-56; Ken Sutherland, 1957-60; Ken Kurbis, 1961-62; John Morrison, 1963-67; Stan Witwicki, 1968-75; Dave Allan, 1976-77; and the current president, Rick Lawrence, who took office in 1979.

Behind all of these men, of course, were hard-working executive members and all of them are silently saluted for their part in the club's progress.

"Champions" coming to St. Charles

When the superstars of men's professional golf descended on the lush rolling fairways of St. Charles Country Club in July of 1952 for the Canadian Open, they were competing for total prize money of \$15,000, the Seagram Gold Cup and the winner's share of the purse — \$3,000.

Johnny Palmer, of Baden, North Carolina, described in the St. Charles archives as "a modest ex-Army sergeant from the Tarheel country," shot a 25-under-par 263 to win by 11 shots over Dick Mayer and Fred Haas.

You know what's happened to the value of the dollar in the last 30 years. But you might think that there's been a corresponding erosion in the skills exhibited by the tour's top players of yesterday. If that's the case, you'll want to return to St. Charles the week of June 21-27 because that's where Palmer, Mayer, Haas, Tommy Bolt, Julius Boros and a host of others will be showing how wrong you are.

It's the second annual Peter Jackson Champions, a PGA Senior Tour event which, 30 years after these men last played St. Charles, will offer them \$200,000 in total prize money, and Johnny Palmer, should be able to repeat, a cheque for \$30,000 and the Peter Jackson Trophy.

Bob Goalby, the 1968 Masters champion, visited St. Charles last October, and in discussing the Senior Tour, said: "It has really given us a new lease on life. I'm out here playing with some of the real legends of the game,

and it's a thrill for me. I know it will be exciting for the fans in Manitoba to come back to St. Charles and see people like Sam Snead, men who can still play the game with great skill."

The Peter Jackson Champions employs a unique format. It's a 72-hole, stroke-play event for the 52 professionals and one amateur (Nick Weslock) in the field, but the first 36 holes are used for a Pro-Am competition, with two-man amateur teams playing with a different professional each day.

Defending champion is Miller Barber, widely known as Mr. X on tour, who defeated Gene Littler at Capilano in West Vancouver last year on the first hole of a sudden-death playoff. The field last year also included veteran Don January, Snead, the Furgol brothers, Dow Finsterwald, and a group of Canadian professionals.

Returning as Canadian veterans this year are Stan Leonard, Al Balding, Moe Norman and Pat Fletcher, the last Canadian to win the Canadian Open, along with Bill Kozak, John Henrick and Weslock, who repeated as Canadian Senior amateur champion in 1981, and whose outstanding play last year at Capilano earned him a tie for eighth place in the competition. Nick The Wedge also shot the low round of the day on Saturday (a four-under-par 66) to earn a special Peter Jackson Daily Low Score Award.

Tournament chairman Alan Maxwell, along with RCGA chairman Manny Bricker and a host of committee chairmen at St. Charles, have been working on organizing this event ever since last summer, when Maxwell, head professional Jim Collins and club manager Don Cutler visited Capilano.

There, they saw some of the top names in the game in action during one of the wettest weeks in British Columbia's history. When the sun finally shone for the last round, more than 8,000 turned up to see the Barber-Littler head-to-head matchup over the final 18 holes, while January, charging magnificently from six strokes back, just missed by one shot, recording a 65.

And Sam Snead, whose swing isn't quite what it was, scraped around Capilano in 71-67-69 to finish fourth, three shots back. Some other former Canadian Open winners in the field were Doug Ford, George Bayer, Kel Nagle, Jim Ferrier and Ted Kroll, in addition to Fletcher, Snead and Littler. And this year, former Open champion Billy Casper joins the field.

If there are many in the gallery this June who will remember Johnny Palmer's incredible week, there may be others who will recall Freddy Haas' performance in

August of 1936. Haas, the southern collegiate champion from New Orleans, knocked off a select field in the Canadian Amateur, which was the first national championship ever held at St. Charles. In winning, Haas defeated local favorite Bobby Reith of Assiniboine, 8 and 7, in the 36-hole final.

Nick Weslock also will remember St. Charles with affection, for it was here in 1957 that Weslock won the first of his four Canadian Amateur titles, defeating Winnipeg's Ted Homenuik of Elmhurst, 9 and 8.

And Tommy Bolt will remember it, too. He arrived at the first tee during the 1952 Open on horseback.

Bolt and his fellow professionals will be riding golf carts this time around. Johnny Palmer will not shoot 66-65-66-66. But the superstars of golf will provide everyone with plenty of memories, and someone will go home with enough prize money to make him think that perhaps the good old days were never quite THIS good.

Several ways to get in on the action

Golfers who put up the \$1,000 entry fee to participate in the pro-am portion of the tournament will have the closest association with the touring senior pros, of course.

For that fee, the golfers get a practice round June 21; complimentary caddy fees for the practice round and two pro-am rounds; contestant's badge and guest badge, good for admission all week to the grounds and clubhouse; ticket to the pro-am stag dinner June 22, to dine with the pros; a preferred parking pass for the week and special pro-am gifts.

The next most expensive way is through the executive ticket package, where the fee of \$475 provides the purchaser with two clubhouse badges for the week; eight weekly badges, which provide admission to the grounds and use of the garden patio refreshment area; and one preferred parking pass.

The weekly badge is available at a cost of \$50 if purchased in advance or \$60 during tournament week. This is good for admission to the grounds all week and also use of the garden patio area.

The anyday voucher is available for \$10 in advance or \$12 during tournament week. It's good for two daily admission tickets on June 22, 23 or 24, or one daily admission on June 25, 26 or 27.

Daily tickets will also be available at a cost of \$6 for the first three days or \$12 for the final three days.

A special tournament feature will be the "Will Call" booth, which will allow for all badges to be left to be picked up by other guests. All badges are transferrable.

Meronek enjoys successful season en route to Manitoba senior title

William (Smiley) Meronek of St. Charles enjoyed a successful season with Manitoba's senior golf crowd in 1981 and he's assured at least one big date this year.

Smiley's big year started early when he was one of three golfers who led a 14-man field in a 54-hole trial for berths on the provincial senior team.

That took place early in June as Meronek, Barrie Sanders of Carman and Cec Durnin of Breezy Bend earned the three team spots to join 1980 Manitoba Senior Champion Harry Critchley of Southwood on the provincial team.

In July, Meronek led a field of 187 golfers through three rounds at Glendale Country Club and emerged as the 1981 Manitoba Senior Champion. That, in turn, assures him a berth on this year's provincial senior team, with three other spots to be filled in the senior trials June 2, 3 and 4 at St. Boniface, Southwood and Selkirk.

And, he'll be on hand to defend his senior title July 21 to 23 at Pine Ridge.

Going back to the senior team trials in June, Meronek was the leader as he posted rounds of 82, 76 and 81 over the Rossmere, Bell Acres and Breezy Bend layouts for a 54-

hole total of 239. Sanders was next with 79-82-79—240, and "rookie" Cec Durnin grabbed the final team spot with 82-85-74—241.

When the team travelled to the Canadian senior inter-provincial team matches July 15 to 17 at the Elm Ridge Country Club and Royal Montreal Golf Club at Ile Bizard, Que., Meronek was the top performer for Manitoba.

He posted two rounds of 79 for a 158 total to lead Manitoba to a fifth-place finish. Sanders came through with 83 and 78 for 161, Critchley carded 81 and 84 for 165 and Durnin had rounds of 84 and 86 for 170.

In the senior championship event at Glendale, July 22 to 24, Meronek posted scores of 78, 75 and 77 for a 54-hole total of 230 and a three-stroke advantage over the defending champion, Harry Critchley, who had rounds of 75, 76 and 82 for 233.

Meronek's efforts weren't quite enough to capture the senior team championship in the event as the St. Charles foursome finished one stroke behind Elmhurst for the team honors.

Former provincial senior champions Bill Pidlaski and Bill Pinniger were joined by Cass Tobin and Alex Colonello to give Elmhurst a 709 total, while Meronek was joined by

Fred Otto, Jim Isaac and Bill McWilliam for St. Charles to finish with 710.

St. Charles' Jim Isaac was the winner in A group, for golfers aged 55 to 59 years, with a 54-hole total of 238, with the net honors going to Wildewood's Earl Eger with 208.

In B group, for golfers aged 60 to 64 years, Elmhurst's Bill Pidlaski led the way with 238, while Mac Scales of Assiniboine was the net winner with 206.

C group, for golfers aged 65 to 69 years, was led by Cass Tobin of Elmhurst with 239, while Roy Batting of Breezy Bend claimed the net prize with 207.

In D group, for golfers aged 70 and over, played over 36 holes, Rube Ludwig of Glendale led the way with 169 and the net prize went to C. A. Sweany of Carman with 135.

As the 1981 champion, Meronek has his place on the 1982 Manitoba senior team and he and the three successful golfers from the early June trials will journey to sixth Canadian senior inter-provincial team matches July 14 to 16 at the Mayfair and Highlands clubs at Edmonton.

The team will then return in time for the provincial senior championships July 21 to 23 at Pine Ridge.

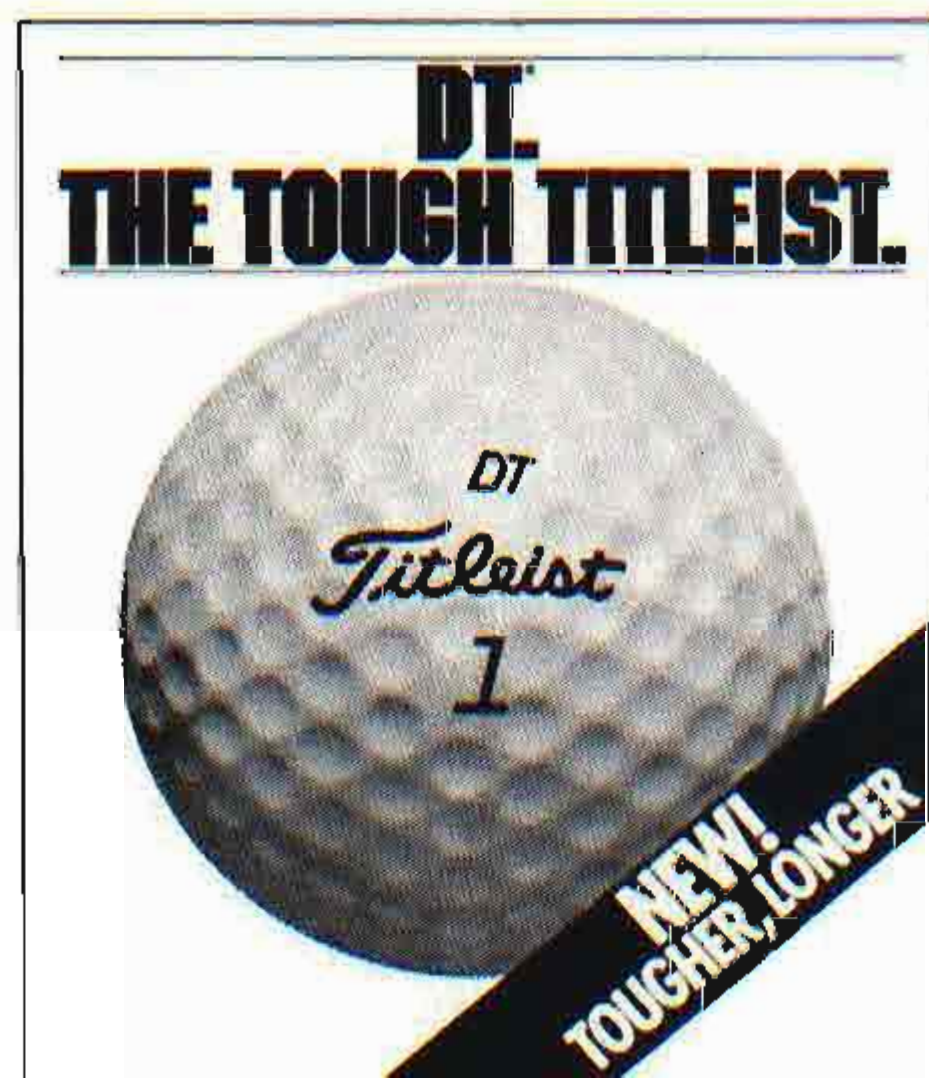


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Senior golf association has a long waiting list

Senior golf is very much alive in Manitoba — so alive there's a perpetual waiting list of men wanting to be part of the Manitoba Senior Golfers Association.

The association has a colorful history, dating all the way back to 1931. During the group's 50th anniversary season, it boasted an active membership of 220, with an additional 136 names on the waiting list.

This popularity was the reason the MSGA made a major change in its qualifications at this year's annual meeting in April. The age of eligibility was raised to 60 years from 55, so some of the names on the waiting list will be removed. The group expects those between 55 and 60 who are already members will be permitted to remain, but no new members will be taken in until they have reached their 60th birthday.

The other qualification to join the association is that golfers must be members in good standing of a private golf club in the province. There are membership limits from the individual clubs to attain a representative balance.

The association is also a low-cost operation, with annual dues of only \$10 through the past 50 years and it was only after lengthy debate at this year's annual meeting that the fee was raised to \$20. Some had suggested a jump to \$30, but the \$20 figure was approved.

There will be a special focus on senior golf in Manitoba this summer with the playing of the Peter Jackson Champions tournament for the professional seniors at St. Charles Country Club, but it will be a year like all years for the members of the Manitoba Senior Golfers Association. They'll have a schedule of 17 events at various city and rural golf clubs.

There's friendly competition for some small prizes at each of the outings, but the emphasis is on the social aspects of the game and the seniors enjoy the good fellowship and the opportunity to play a variety of courses.

Winnipeg ranks high in North America for golf courses per capita and the men who belong to the MSGA

have contributed greatly to the establishment of that statistic, with many of their sons and grandsons continuing their work today.

This is probably the reason the association enjoys full co-operation from the golf clubs in Winnipeg and some of the rural Manitoba areas.

Most of the outings consist of a round of play, followed by a dinner at the club. In some cases, the group is split into two or three smaller events on the same day, particularly when the nine-hole courses are used, because the courses couldn't handle the entire MSGA membership.

The association also enjoys international competition with Minnesota senior golfers, with busloads of Manitoba golfers and their wives spending a pleasant weekend south of the line, or being host to an American group here.

While the social aspect is stronger, the competitive element isn't ignored by the MSGA members. There are two major trophies up for grabs each season, both with a long history.

The McKinney trophy for low gross dates back to the birth of the organization in 1931, while the Rowland trophy for low net has been in service since 1942. Both are for competition each year at Elmhurst Golf and Country Club.

Across the road, at Pine Ridge, they play for five age group trophies — The Laird trophy for age 64 and under; the Mackie trophy for low gross 65 to 69; the Mundie trophy for low net 65 to 69; The Percy Hale trophy for low net 70 to 74; and the Past Presidents trophy for low gross 75 and over.

There were also three trophies in use for international competition, but these are no longer in service.

Judge J. G. Gory was the first winner of the McKinney trophy in 1931, then J. L. M. Thomson took over for the next three years, 1932 through 1934, and again in 1936-37-38. Alex Black Sr. was the winner in 1935, in 1939, 1940 and again in 1946.

"Triple Crown" on line each year in brewery-sponsored fun events

Golf is a competitive sport, but there's more to tournament play than winning. The social side of golf often overshadows the competitive side.

Many Manitoba golf tournaments are popular more for the good fellowship than for the prizes offered and golfers can find tournaments in Manitoba just about every weekend of the season if they care to travel to them.

Some are annual events sponsored by the various golf clubs, some are commercially sponsored. They all have one thing in common—the participants keep coming back because they have a good time, whether they're good golfers or not.

Three of the most popular "fun tournaments" on the Manitoba golf calendar each year are partly sponsored by Labatt's Manitoba Brewery—the Grey Owl at Clear Lake, the Golden Falcon at Falcon Lake and the International at Morden and Winkler in Manitoba, Cavalier and Walhalla in North Dakota.

While all three are backed by Labatt's they are operated by separate committees and they are completely different in nature.

In addition to the common sponsor, the three events have only two other things in common—they all feature good fun and fellowship ahead of competition and they all attract more golfers than they can handle and many fail to get in each year.

I have had the pleasure of taking part in all three of these brewery tournaments at different times. Each has its own distinct group of regulars and there are subtle differences in the operation.

The Grey Owl tournament, held early in June each year at the beautiful Wasagaming Golf Course in Riding Mountain National Park, is the "daddy" of the trio. It has been held each year since 1961 and this year's event—June 11, 12 and 13—will be the 22nd annual Grey Owl.

Originally scheduled over two days—Saturday and Sunday—and with an entry limit of 200, the popularity soon forced the organizers to add an extra day.

It remained a 36-hole competition, but competitors could play Friday-Saturday, Friday-Sunday or Saturday-Sunday. The limit was thus increased to 300.

Though it isn't an "official" tournament, the Owl has always been the first of the major competitions of the season and usually attracts a fair number of the "better"

golfers, as well as a full complement of other classes, all the way to duffer.

Ron Fiddler of Elmhurst was the first Grey Owl champ in 1961 and Terry Hashimoto of St. Charles is the defending champion from last year. In between, such well-known names as Wally Keep, Ted Homenuik, Nick Mickoski, Jim Scissons (Saskatoon), Jimmy Doyle and Craig Dearden among others have been engraved on the trophy.

The tournament also has a trophy for a media flight winner each year and since 1974 there has also been a special flight for the "Greyer Owls", those 60 years of age and over.

The Bell Brothers, who operated Idlewyld cabins and motel at Clear Lake, along with some Brandon folks and the Labatt people were the originators of the Grey Owl tournament and the brewery has supported the event from the start.

Four years later, the directors of the Greater Winnipeg Minor Hockey Association got together with representatives of Pelissier's Brewery and organized the Golden Falcon tournament.

Fashioned after the successful pattern of the Grey Owl, this event is played at the Falcon Lake Golf Course in Whiteshell Provincial Park. It's a two-day event, Saturday-Sunday, with 36 holes of medal play.

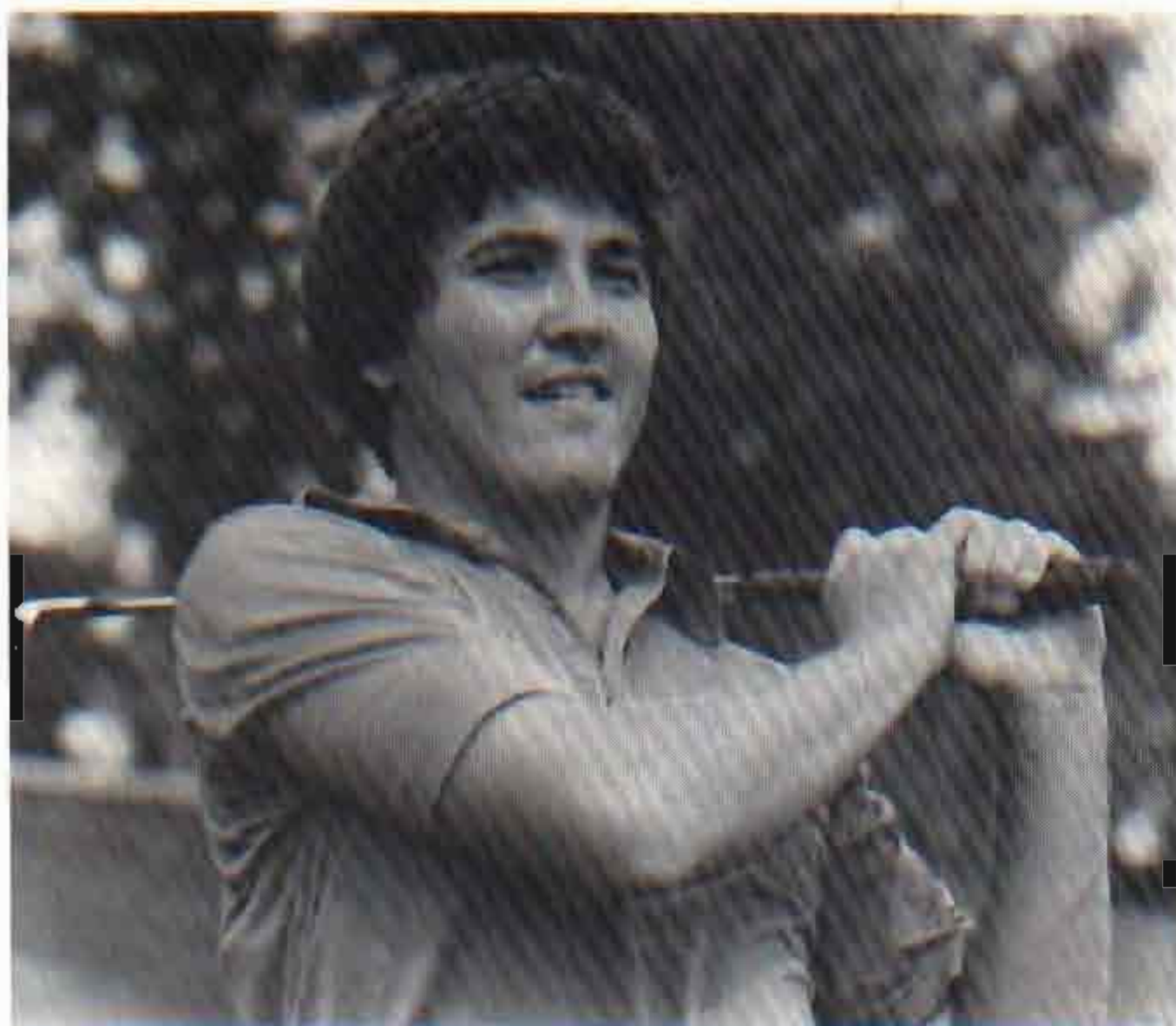
As part of a brewery merger, Labatt's took over the Pelissier operation and continued as a supporter of the Golden Falcon tournament.

Though the hockey association is no longer involved, some of the original organizers are still part of the committee. Clarence Sveinson and Carl Anderson are the present co-chairman.

Like the Grey Owl, the Falcon has a special media flight and it also attracts some of the province's leading golfers seeking the championship title each year.

The 1982 event is scheduled for June 19 and 20 at Falcon Lake. Like the Grey Owl, the defending champion is Terry Hashimoto.

The major difference in the play of the Owl and Falcon tournaments is in the method of draw. At the Grey Owl, foursomes are drawn by the organizing committee and draw times are established. At the Golden Falcon, players can make up their own foursomes if they desire. In the past couple of seasons, the Falcon has also switched to shot-gun starts, with morning and afternoon draws both days and all tees in use.

The third tournament in the so-called "Brewery Triple Crown" of Manitoba golf, is the International tournament, featured in July of each year.

This unique event attracts an entry in excess of 700 golfers and is played over four different golf courses in two countries—Winkler and Morden in Manitoba, Walhalla and Cavalier in North Dakota.

It wasn't always a four-town event, however. The tournament originated in 1972 over the Winkler and Morden courses and it was called the "International" not because of its locale, but because the original plan was to

attract 300 golfers—150 Canadian and 150 from the United States.

That first year, the entry was 192 and it climbed to 240 in the second year. Then, the tournament became truly international in 1974, when the Walhalla course was added and the 300 golfers were drawn to each play nine holes at two courses and 18 at the other—one-third of the field playing their 18 holes at each course.

Two years later, Cavalier joined the fun and, with four courses, the entire field was able to play nine holes over each course for the 36-hole score.

Labatt's was again involved from the beginning and the International has always had a hard-working committee to keep things running smoothly. Herb Dick of Winkler was the first president and tournament chairman and he has held one or both of those positions ever since.

The International was attracting a full complement of 576 golfers up until two years ago when the demand for entries was so great, the committee added extra play on Friday to allow 700 to take part. The Friday evening will again be used this year and 720 entries will be accepted.

Dates for the 1982 International tournament will be July 23-24-25 and the entries will be accepted AFTER June 14. Officials expect close to 1,000 entries.

That's one of the common denominators for these three brewery tournaments—they all attract more entries than they can handle. Obviously, the golfers enjoy them and they want to keep coming back.

Yes, the "Triple Crown" brewery tournaments are among the biggest and most successful, but check the tournament schedule and watch the posters at your golf club and you can find many others throughout the province—all offering good competition, good prizes and—most of all—good fellowship.



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St. Charles, Sandy Hook take '81 honors in Inter-Club test

Golfers from St. Charles Country Club stole the spotlight in the 1981 Free Press Manitoba Inter-Club golf championships, played June 19 at Rossmere Golf and Country Club.

Surprisingly, it was the No. 2 St. Charles team that captured the Free Press trophy in the competition for city clubs, posting a slim one-stroke victory over the St. Charles No. 1 team.

In the rural portion of the event, the other Free Press trophy went to Sandy Hook, with a five-stroke margin over Selkirk.

The 1982 Inter-Club competition is scheduled for June 18 at the Falcon Beach Golf Course at Falcon Lake in the Whiteshell Provincial Park.

Steve Bannatyne paced the No. 2 St. Charles team to victory with a par-70 round, shooting a neat three-under-par 33 on the front nine, then slipping three over with 37 on the back nine. He was supported by Daryl Massey with 40-35-75 and Jim Isaac with 39-49-80 to make up a three-man team total of 225.

The No. 1 St. Charles team finished with 226 as Terry Hashimoto carded 40-34-74, Bob Dunbar had 40-35-75 and Gavin Speirs had 39-38-77.

Southwood's No. 1 team finished in third spot with a total of 232, followed by Glendale, Pine Ridge No. 2, Breezy Bend No. 1 and Bel Acres, all with 237. Niakwa claimed 10th spot with 240.

Jumbo Jimmy Doyle, the former Canadian amateur champ, also matched the Rossmere par to pace Sandy Hook to the rural victory. He followed the card with 36-34-70. Tim Coughlin contributed a 40-42-82 and Jim's son Pat Doyle rounded out the team with 41-42-83 for a total of 235.

The runner-up honors in the rural section went to Selkirk, with a 240 total comprised of Rob Erickson with 40-39-79, Randy Spend with 41-38-79 and Tim Cromarty with 44-38-82.

Kenora checked into third place with 246, followed by Dauphin with 250, Oakview (Gretna) with 255, Northern-aire with 257, Pinawa with 259 and Kitchen Creek (Fort Frances), Carman and Shilo, all with 260.

A total of 39 teams took part in the 1981 Inter-Club event and officials were disappointed that none of the winning teams were available for the trophy presentations at the conclusion. An effort was to be made this year to spread the golfers more in the draw so the players will be on hand at the windup.

More changes coming this year in parent-child golf tournament

It was the second year for the North American Life event in Manitoba, having started as strictly a father-son competition in 1980. Last year's event saw the addition of the mother-daughter category, with four entries, and also a pair of teams in the professional class.

A further change is planned for the 1982 event, scheduled for Aug. 24 at St. Charles Country Club. This year's tournament will feature a parent-child section (which will permit father-daughter, mother-son and mother-daughter combinations) and the larger father-son area will again

be played in two sections.

This will bring the Manitoba event into line with the play in North American Life tournaments in other provinces.

The 1981 father-son A competition saw four teams post two-over-par 74s over the St. Boniface layout, playing on the alternate shot format.

Gordon and Bob Dunbar of St. Charles emerged the winners when Bob sank a 35-foot putt on the first extra hole for a birdie three to break the deadlock. The Dunbars had toured the course in nines of 35-39 for their 74.

The defending champions from the first father-son tournament, Irv and Jay Averach of Glendale, were joined by Graham and Steve Bannatyne of St. Charles and Jim and Pat Doyle of Sandy Hook, all with 74s to force the playoff. The Averbachs had nines of

37-37, while the Bannatynes and Doyles both had 36-38.

Wray and Trevor Taylor of Bel Acres topped the B section of the father-son event with 38-42-80. The mother-daughter section was won by Irene and Laura Duncan of Niakwa with 43-46-89. The pro section went to Gerry and Gerald Morrissey of Rossmere with 87.

In net scoring, the A section winners were Tom and Jeff Kenny of Niakwa with 76-9½-66½, with Shilo's Mel and Myles Martin runners-up with 83-13-70. Ursula and Ilsa Cooper of St. Boniface took the mother-daughter net prize with 103-25-78.

Thompson team captures Crown Life Pro-Am honors

A team from the northern city of Thompson, supported by an associate professional from the host club, captured the 1981 Crown Life Pro-Am Team Championship when 35 teams competed in the provincial final Aug. 7 at St. Charles Country Club.

Ron Janes, the St. Charles associate pro, carded a one-over-par 35 and got excellent support from his three amateur partners from Thompson Golf Club — Bob Thompson, Robin Henderson and Wayne Buckland.

All four players made big contributions as the Thompson squad scored 158 points. Buckland shot an 88 and earned 42 points, Henderson had a 75 and earned 41 points, Thompson carded an 80 and was good for 40 points, Janes picked up 35 points with his 73.

The victory earned diamond rings for the three amateurs and \$1,000 for Janes, plus travelling outfits for the foursome as they represented Manitoba in the Canadian championship in September at Vancouver's Point Grey Golf and Country Club.

The Manitobans finished a close second in the national event, just one point behind the winning team from British Columbia.

The 1981 national event saw the

entry of Ontario along with the four western provinces. This year's national championship will see Quebec join the competition and the Maritimes will be included in 1983 to make it a truly national competition.

The 1982 national competition is scheduled for Sept. 12-18 at the Wascana Golf Club in Regina.

The Thompson team had a two-point edge over runner-up Niakwa in the 1981 Manitoba final. Pro Chick Duncan shot 73 and his amateur mates — Ron Castelane, Ted Barkwell and Ron Miller — came through in fine fashion to give Niakwa a total of 156, good for \$800 for Duncan and \$200 merchandise prizes for his partners.

Elmhurst took third spot with a total of 153 points. Pro Paul Villemaire shot 74 and was backed by Mickey Palahniuk, who shot 69 for the best individual score of the day, along with Bernie Kropp and George Marsh.

Low individual pro honors were shared by two assistant pros, Dave Rhodes of Breezy Bend and Peter Ewart of St. Boniface, both escorting rural teams in the competition. They each carded two-under-par 70's with Rhodes shooting nines of 34-36 and Ewart carding 33-37. It was worth \$175 apiece.

Sharing third spot and earning \$35 each were Ben Smirnov of the Phantom Lake club at Flin Flon, Jim Lazarko, a St. Charles assistant, and Stan Homenuik of Dauphin, each with par 72.

The 35 teams in the final included 17 from city clubs and 18 from rural Manitoba points. Clubs without professionals were linked with Winnipeg assistant pros.

The Crown Life event starts at the club level each season, with qualifying rounds and match play through the summer to determine the teams, with one player in each of three handicap groups.

The event also has a charitable feature, with all money raised through entries going to the Manitoba Society for Crippled Children and Adults and the Manitoba Golf Association's junior development program on a 60-40 split.

A record entry of 1,700 Manitoba golfers entered the Crown Life event in 1981, raising a total of \$8,500. The Society received \$5,100 and the junior program received \$3,400.

Qualifying play is under way for the 1982 competition at all clubs in the province with the provincial final slated for Aug. 6 at Rossmore Golf and Country Club.

Golfworld offers courses for rainy days and winter

The interest in indoor golf is growing.

While winter golf schools have been popular around Winnipeg for many years, much attention has been centred in recent years on a comparatively new development — the chance to play simulated rounds of golf indoors on world-famous golf courses.

Golfworld is the latest addition to this electronic scene in Winnipeg, a facility located at 185 Bannatyne Avenue, just east of Main Street.

The doors were opened for winter recreation by owners Geoff Saxton and Peter Humeny, with Steinhach club pro Larry Robinson providing golf instruction.

Saxton and Humeny plan to operate Golfworld throughout the year and hasten to point out the "courses" will be available for play during the summer months, particularly on those rainy days when golfers can't get out to their favorite local course.

The famous golf courses available at Golfworld include Congressional Country Club, Pebble Beach, Hirono (Japan), Lucyan (Bahamas) and Doral Country Club.

The courses are depicted on huge screens, photographed in 10-yard increments, including some 80 yards beyond each green for those who over-club.

Golfers tee off 15 feet in front of the projection screen, use real golf

balls and their full sets of clubs and play real golf shots, which are registered by the computer to advance the film and show the next shot. Putting is completed on carpet in front of the screen.

For many, it may be the only opportunity to "play" some of the famous golf courses. For many, Golfworld and other similar operations provide golfers with a chance to tune up their games before heading south on winter vacations.

But, Saxton and Humeny are out to prove the facility is also of value during the summer season and they're hoping many local golfers will take advantage of the opportunity to play the game when the weather is inclement or during the evenings, or even on hot days when they'd rather be out of the sun.

The Golfworld facility also features a well-equipped golf shop with equipment and clothing.

Prairie Turfgrass Conference here in November

The Golf Course Superintendents Association of Manitoba has announced it will be organizing the 1982 Prairie Turfgrass Conference, to be held Nov. 25 and 26 at the International Inn in Winnipeg.

This conference will be held in conjunction with the Manitoba Horticultural Days at the annual convention and is sponsored by the Canadian Golf Course Superintendents Association.

Twelve speakers have been invited to take part, covering such subjects as: tree program on a golf course, facts and figures on irrigation pumps, safety on equipment use, preventative maintenance on turf equipment, labor relations, mosquito control, update on turf diseases, golf course design, turf management, budgets and planning.

The conference will be of interest to all golf course superintendents, any others engaged in maintenance of

parks or gardens, and to greens committee members of city and rural golf courses.

Any golf clubs requiring assistance in these areas should make enquiries about the conference through members of the Golf Course Superintendents Association of Manitoba.



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To encourage and promote research and the interchange of scientific and practical knowledge relating to the maintenance of golf courses in order to assist interested members.

Mundie Putter League promotes fellowship

The matches are played on Monday evenings and there are many who believe the competition that features team match play is called the "Monday" Putter League.

The name is really the Mundie Putter League and it is named in honor of the late Jim Mundie, a well-known local golfer and golf official.

The league was started in 1957 with four teams and has grown to encompass a complement of 16 teams for the past three seasons, including a team of juniors entered by the Manitoba Golf Association.

The Mundie Putter league evolved from an idea by a transplanted Scotsman, John McLellan, in conversation with Roy Macdonald and Bill Corner, members of Southwood Golf Club. They invited representatives of three other clubs — Dick Quinton from Niakwa, Herb Foster from Pine Ridge and Harry Critchley of Charleswood — and those four clubs made up the first year of competition.

Pine Ridge emerged as the initial winner of the league.

In 1958, Elmhurst and St. Boniface joined the league, then Glendale and Rossmere were added in 1960 and Assiniboine and Breezy Bend made it 10 teams in 1962. St. Charles became the 11th team in 1963, then Wilde-wood made it 12 in 1965. Transcona and Bel Acres in 1967, the Manitoba Juniors in 1979 and the Winnipeg Canoe Club in 1980 brought the total up to 16.

The junior team was entered with a view to providing an extra level of competition for the rising golf stars and officials have been happy with the experiment so far.

The aims and objectives of the Mundie Putter League have remained constant throughout the 25 years of the league's existence. The principle behind the league is:

1. To foster competitive golf among the competing teams and players before the start of the regular Manitoba Golf Association tournaments.
2. To promote friendly rivalry and good fellowship among competing golf clubs.
3. To maintain the match play game as an integral part of competitive golf in Manitoba.

Elmhurst has been the dominant force in the league's first 25 years, winning 14 times. Niakwa has claimed the title three times, Pine Ridge, Southwood and St. Charles each have won twice and single victories have gone to Rossmere and Breezy Bend.

The league has opened on the last Monday of April each year and has never missed an opening, though golfers have experienced snow and cold weather on more than one occasion. The league schedule and play-offs wind up before July 1 each year.

The first trophy for the Mundie Putter League was Mr. Mundie's prized "Calamity Jane" putter.

When the league had just started in 1957, John McLellan wrote to his friend Percy Huggins, well-known golf columnist of the Glasgow Evening Times, and related how the league had started, based upon the idea and success of the "Brand Putter League" in Scotland.

Through the publicity of the Glasgow Evening Times, Bertie Brand was so flattered, he wrote to the Winnipeg group and promised to send them a prized possession of his own. It was a spoon, 150 years old and used by his great-grandfather.



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Acting as courier was Reid Jack, then British amateur champion, who was coming to Winnipeg to play in the Canadian Amateur championship on his way to Walker Cup matches in Minneapolis.

In 1961, the Bertie Brand spoon and Mr. Mundie's "Calamity Jane" were mounted on a beautiful base to form the official league trophy. The winners engraved on that trophy to date are:

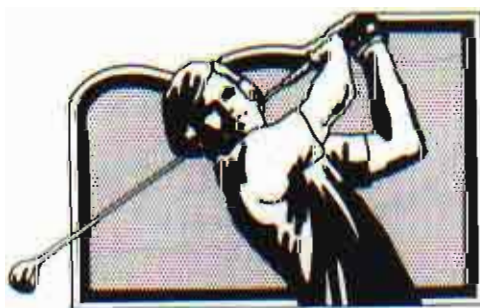

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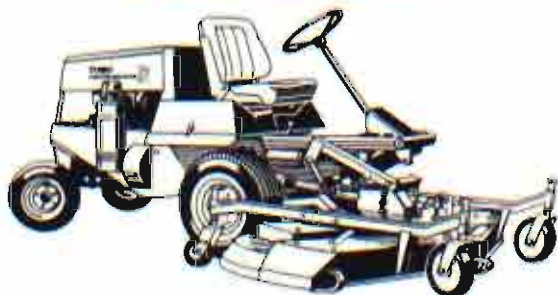

The 1983 annual meeting of the RCGA is scheduled to be held in Winnipeg next February, at which time Bricker is expected to move into the president's chair.
