The Manitoba Sports Federation and the Department of Fitness, Recreation and Sport have continued their fine support toward the game of golf. Obviously, we are very pleased with their contributions and look forward to working with them.

We wish all the golfers in Manitoba a good season. Remember, the Manitoba Golf Association is only as strong as its member clubs and, in turn, their membership.

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In Memoriam



William J. (Bill) Doyle

The Manitoba Golf Association and the Manitoba Ladies' Golf Association both were saddened through the loss of past presidents during the past year.

William J. (Bill) Doyle, who served as president of the MGA in 1975, died March 25, 1985, at Whitby, Ont., at the age of 61.

Though he was born in Montreal, after service in the Royal Canadian Air Force during the Second World War his business career took him to many parts of the country, including British Columbia, Alberta and Nova Scotia.

But, it was in Manitoba he became deeply involved with the administration of golf. He came to this province in 1962, left again for a few years, then returned in 1971 to rejoin the Manitoba Golf Association council.

Prior to his term as president, Doyle served as public relations chairman in 1972, junior chairman in 1973 and vice-president and tournament chairman in 1974, when he was also the non-playing captain for Manitoba's only winning Willingdon Cup team.

He is survived by his wife Jane, daughter Barbara

in Vancouver and sons Michael in Toronto and John in Winnipeg.

Colleen Hutchison, who was president of the MLGA for the 1981-82 term, died Aug. 10, 1984, at the age of 48.

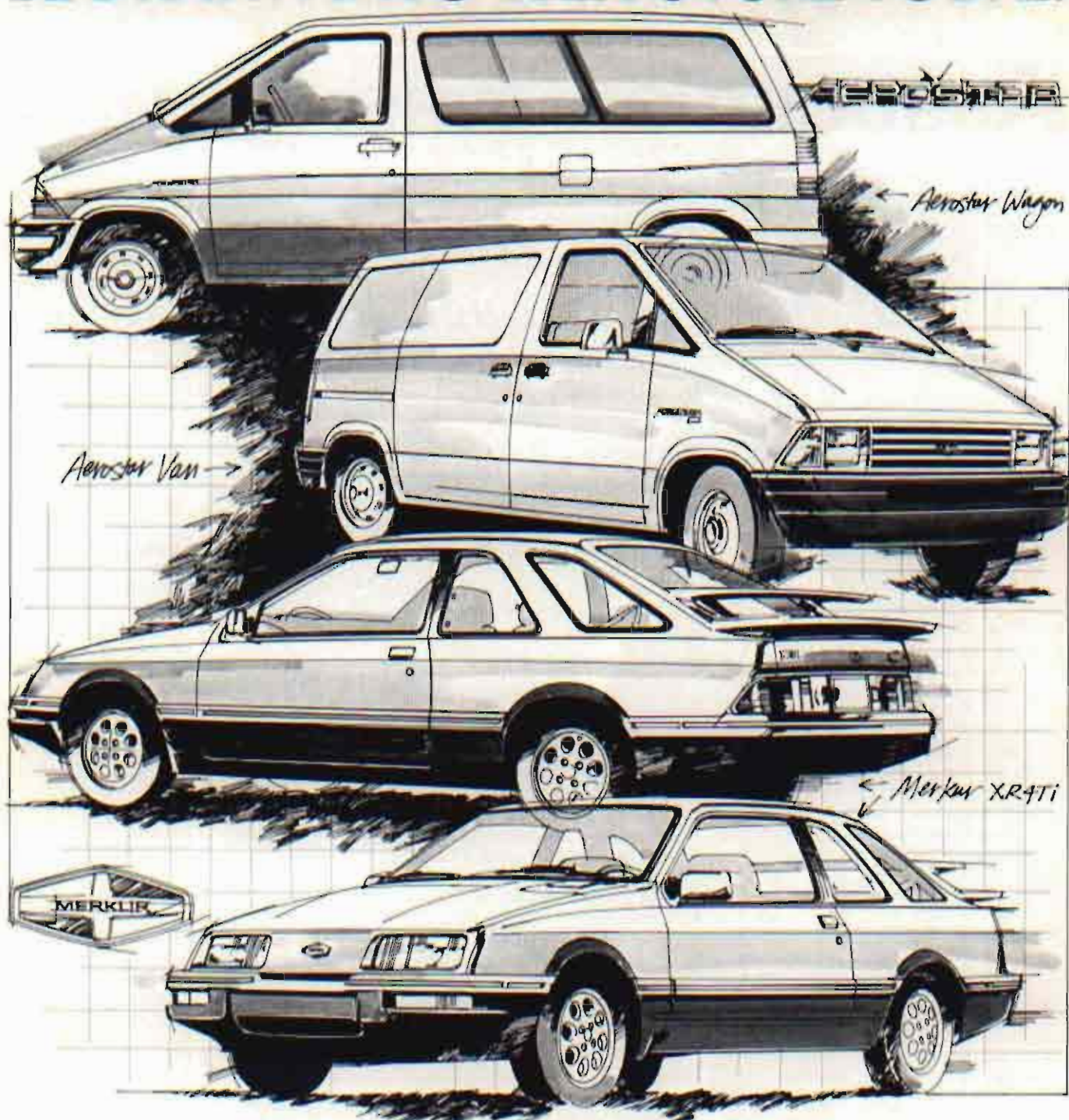
Her death occurred on the day of the final of the Tribune Handicap golf tournament, an event she had won in the past, and MLGA officials decided to continue her association with the event by renaming it in her honor beginning this season.

The tournament, which is a handicap match play event, will now be known as the Colleen Hutchison Memorial tournament, with a new trophy donated by her husband.

Hutchison was a popular golf official and also a competitive player, having taken part in Inflight League action for the Rossmore club.

Prior to her term as president, she served two-year terms as tournament chairman and vice-president of the MLGA. She was instrumental in reinstating the Manitoba Saskatchewan women's golf matches during her term as president.

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How Manitoba Golf Association was formed

*It all started with meeting
of five clubs back in 1915*

This is a reproduction of a handwritten report provided to the Manitoba Golf Association in 1919 by RCS Bruce, one of the original directors of the association.

It traces the formation of the MGA in 1915 and lists the original member clubs and original executive.

It is reproduced here to inform all present Manitoba golfers how it all began 70 years ago.

A meeting of those interested in forming a Manitoba Golf Association was held in the Winnipeg Industrial Bureau, Winnipeg, on Tuesday, 6th July, 1915 at 12 o'clock noon.

30 golfers attended this meeting which was presided over by Mr. W.O. Nares, amongst those present were Messrs A. Macaw, G.M. Black, A.S. Bond, H.G. Patterson, W. Bain, A. Sullivan, J.A.O. Gemmill, T.K. Middlemas, C.W. Jackson, H.M. Tucker, T.F. Hubie, R.L. Denison, J.H. Blackwood, R.C.S. Bruce, Dr. R.R. Swan, C.S. Gunn and Harold Keene.

Mr. Macaw outlined the purpose of the meeting, after which it was decided to form a Golf Association for Manitoba to look after the Manitoba Championship and such other matters in connection with the game which may be found advisable.

It was moved and seconded that the meeting elect a special committee of 2 members of each club with instructions — 1st To have their club appoint 2

delegates to attend a subsequent meeting with the power to vote for or against the formation of the Association; 2nd To prepare a draft Constitution and By-laws:

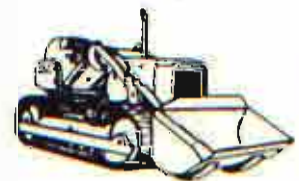

The delegates appointed held a meeting immediately after when Mr. C.S. Gunn was called to the chair.

A subcommittee was formed to draw up the draft constitution to be submitted to the delegates at a meeting to be called on Tuesday, 12th July, 1915.

This meeting met as arranged: delegates came with instructions to go ahead with the organization and on this date, viz: Tuesday, 13th July, 1915, the Manitoba Golf Association was founded and the draft constitution and bye-laws adopted. Those present were:

C.S. Gunn, representing The St. Charles Country Club.

G.W. Markle and A. Macaw, representing The Winnipeg Golf Club Ltd.

R.D. Stratton, representing The Pine Ridge Golf Club.

J.W. Kelly and F.R. Sproule, representing The Elmhurst Golf Club.

R.C.S. Bruce, representing The Norwood Golf Club.

There were thus originally 5 clubs and continued so till 27th March, 1918, when the newly organized Assiniboine Golf Club joined.

Mr. F.L. Patton, St. Charles, was appointed President.

Mr. R.D. Stratton, Pine Ridge, was appointed Vice-President.

Mr. Harold Keene, Norwood and Wpg. Club, was appointed Sec'y-Treasurer.

Mr. H.M. Tucker, Elmhurst, was appointed Director.

Mr. R.C.S. Bruce, Norwood, was appointed Director.

The meeting unanimously of opinion, that owing to the Great War, there should be no championship held, but in its place a Tournament be held in aid of Patriotic or Red Cross Funds. This policy was confirmed during the war until after Peace was declared.

The First Championship to be held under the auspices of the Association was in 1919. This attracted an entry of 198 players and was won by Mr. J.T. Cuthbert of The Norwood Golf Club.

The inter club championship for Trophy presented by Messrs Henry Buks and Sons was inaugurated in 1916.

There is no record of any other Championship result in the Minute Book beyond the first one held in 1919.

Todd Fanning named Golfer of the Year

**16-year-old
Southwood
swinger
dominates
1984 golf

The 1984 golf season in Manitoba could be summed up as the Year of Todd Fanning, so it was really no surprise when Todd Fanning was named Manitoba's Golfer of the Year for 1984.

At 16 years of age, Fanning dominated the MGA competitive season by winning both the amateur and junior provincial crowns and earning berths on both the amateur Willingdon Cup team and the provincial junior team.

The young Southwood whiz became the youngest player ever to win the Manitoba amateur title and also the first to win both titles in the same year.

Fanning was presented with the Golfer of the Year honors in February at the annual meeting of the Manitoba Golf Association, at which time it was also announced he was the winner of the RCGA's 1984 Junior Achievement Award for Manitoba, an award based on scholastic achievements, general atti-

tude toward the game and contributions to the game as well as playing ability.

His Golfer of the Year award was won strictly on performance and he won it over two others who had impressive credentials which might have won the award in another year.

In fact, Cathy Burton of Selkirk completed the 1984 season with similar accomplishments to those which won the Golfer of the Year award the year before for Gail Anderson of St. Charles, having won the City and District championship and both the Manitoba and Saskatchewan women's amateur titles. It just wasn't enough in the Year of Fanning.

The other runnerup for the 1984 award was Craig Kindrat, another Selkirk golfer, who had been in the runnerup position before (1982). His 1984 accomplishments included low amateur in the Manitoba Open, low scorer in the provincial Willingdon Cup

Team trials and winner of the Western Manitoba Open at Brandon with a course-record 64 along the way.

In addition to winning both the Amateur and Junior provincial championships and playing on both the Willingdon and junior teams, Fanning's 1984 accomplishments included his second straight runner-up finish in the Canadian juvenile championship, which is played in conjunction with the Canadian junior. He also placed seventh in the Doug Sanders Invitational Junior tournament in Texas early in the season, an event he attended along with Glenn Collins of St. Charles. Fanning has been invited to play in the Sanders event again this year.

Fanning became the 10th winner of the Labatt Golfer of the Year Award, which was presented at the annual meeting by Vern Penner, Labatt general manager.

Matt Poleschuk of Pine Ridge was the initial winner of the award for the 1975 season. Terry Hashimoto of St. Charles won twice, in 1976 and 1980 and Bill Parker was also a double winner, taking the honors in 1979 out of Elmhurst and 1982 out of Breezy Bend.

The other winners were Jimmy King of Elmhurst in 1977, Terry More of Elmhurst in 1978, Shauna Gechel of Breezy Bend in 1981 and Gail Anderson of St. Charles in 1983.

Halldorson Wins Fourth Manitoba Open Title

There was plenty of drama packed into the final day of play as Dan Halldorson of Brandon captured his fourth Manitoba Open golf championship at Niakwa Country Club.

It took a 15-foot birdie putt on the first playoff hole for Halldorson to claim the title after finishing the 54-hole tournament at 208, tied with Sandy Harper of Nanaimo, B.C.

Halldorson had started the final round two strokes behind Harper, the 36-hole leader, and he moved into a three-stroke lead at the halfway point of the final round, only to see Harper rebound to gain the tie and force the extra hole.

In fact, Halldorson was two ahead

playing the 18th hole in the final round, but had to settle for a bogey five while Harper was claiming an excellent birdie three to draw even.

It was ironic that his putter played a big role in Halldorson's fourth Manitoba Open victory, since he isn't particularly known for his putting prowess on the U.S. pro tour.

In addition to his pressure 15-footer on the playoff hole, Halldorson sank a few long ones during the final round to pull ahead of Harper.

"I was really lucky," he said after the win. "I don't win many tournaments sinking 40-foot putts."

Halldorson was below par in all three trips around the revamped Niakwa course, shooting 68-70-70 over the par-72 layout. Harper topped Niakwa in 67-69-72.

The victory was worth \$4,100 to

Halldorson, while Harper won \$2,100 from the total pro prize money of \$18,500. Halldorson also won the Bay Bronze championship plaque.

Third money, \$1,850, went to another west coast swinger, Steve Anderson-Chapman of Victoria, who shot 69-69-72 for 210. He had taken a two-stroke penalty on his first hole of play in the opening round for starting out with too many clubs in his bag, then matched the leaders the rest of the way.

Frank Edmonds of Thunder Bay played steady through the final two rounds to claim fourth money of \$1,300 with scores of 73-69-69 for 211.

Craig Kindrat of Selkirk took the top amateur honors and claimed the Hal Eidsvig Trophy for the second time, shooting rounds of 68-69-75 for 212, one stroke ahead of Terry Hashimoto of

St. Charles, who carded 67-71-75 for his 213.

Jim Rutledge, another Victoria golfer, posted the best individual round of the tournament on the final day, shooting a seven-under-par 65, a record for the altered course, to finish at 213, good for fifth pro money of \$1,200.

Rutledge's fine round included seven birdies and an eagle, along with a double-bogey seven on the 16th hole, considered one of the easiest birdie holes on the course.

Pat O'Donnell was the low shooter among the Manitoba club professionals with rounds of 70-73-72 for 215 which left him tied with Scott Knapp of Brampton, Ont., at 215. Each received \$950.

The 1984 Manitoba Open attracted a record field of 159 players — 67 professionals and 92 amateurs and the pro money featured an increase of \$3,500 over the \$15,000 prize pot of the previous year.

There's a major increase in the prize money situation for the 1985 event to be held at Southwood, where the committee obtained sponsors for each hole to build up the pot. It is hoped the increased money might attract some top players to the event.

Full details of the Southwood layout for the 1985 Open are covered in a special insert in the centre of his edition.

Halldorson became the fourth golfer to win the Manitoba Open four times. He had previously topped the field in 1977, 1978 and 1983. Bobby Reith,

now living in Minneapolis and a visitor to Niakwa during the Open in 1984, won the title in 1932, 1934, 1935 and 1950; amateur Allan Boes of Southwood did it in 1941, 1943, 1944 and 1948; and the late Hal Eidsvig won in 1947, 1949, 1952 and 1955.

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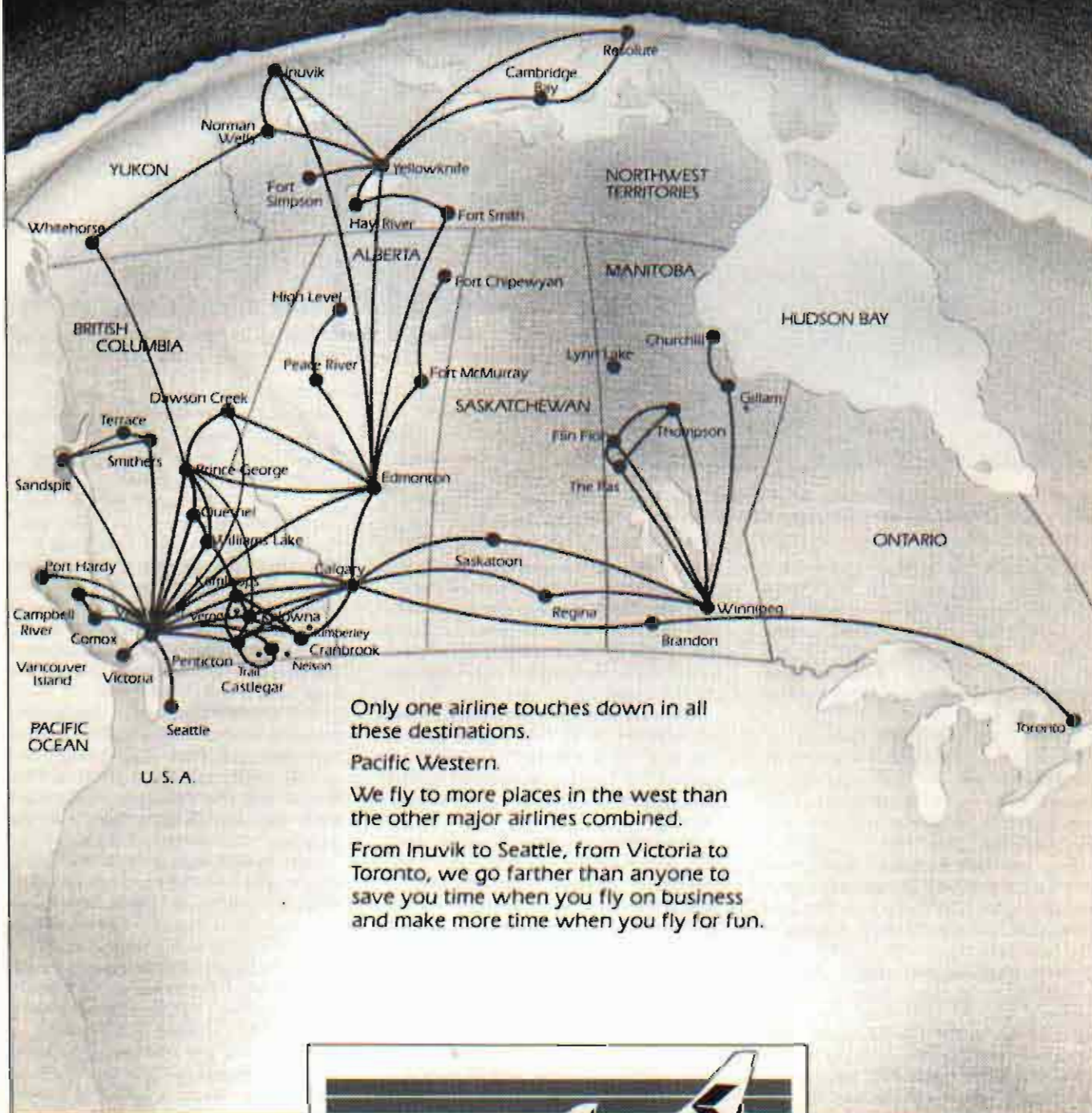

Fanning Surprises Amateur Field

Manitoba's top competitive golfers will likely look back on the 1984 Manitoba Amateur championship as one of the tightest contests in the event's history — so tight, it brought about a restructuring of the Amateur and Willingdon Cup team trials to go into effect this year.

Sixteen-year-old Todd Fanning of Southwood was the surprise winner of the Amateur title, becoming the youngest ever to do so and starting him on his way to a record double as he later added the provincial junior title.

But, the Todd Fanning victory was only part of the 1984 Manitoba Amateur and Willingdon Cup trials story. The tight competition was particularly notable in the first two days and it led to the revision of the championship format which will be in effect this year.

Where the championship flight previously took in the low 32 scores and ties after the 36-hole qualifying test, it will now include the low 60 and ties, or all players within 10 strokes of the leader.

With this increase in the number remaining in the chase for the championship, there will be only four other flights of 16 players going into match

play instead of the previous six flights.

How close were things last year? Well, the leading qualifying score was 145 and there were 34 players making the cutoff at 151, believed the lowest qualifying score ever and only six shots off the pace.

There were seven more players at 152 and another 14 at 153, plus several at 154 and 155, still within 10 shots of the leaders, but with no opportunity to play the other 36 holes in the championship flight.

Worse than that, these golfers were also automatically eliminated from the Willingdon Cup team trials after playing in only two of a possible six rounds. A golfer 10 shots off the pace in the first two rounds might easily make up that difference in four more rounds of play.

Among those who missed the cut were David White of Southwood, the 1983 provincial junior champ, at 152; former Canadian amateur champ Jim Doyle of Sandy Hook and Rossmere's Carl Lechman, a member of the 1983 Willingdon team, at 153; and defending Manitoba Amateur champion Pat Doyle of Sandy Hook at 154.

Under the new format, these golfers and others with similar scores would still be in the running for the provincial amateur crown and the Willingdon Cup team.

After the 72-hole amateur championship is completed, the Willingdon team

trials will take place a week later featuring the top 15 players and ties, plus any players within eight shots of fourth place. A further cut to the low 12 and ties and players within six shots of fourth place will be made before the final round.

This year's Manitoba Amateur Championship will be played July 8-11 at Elmhurst and Pine Ridge (final two rounds in championship flight at Pine Ridge) and the Willingdon Cup team trials are set for July 20-21 at St. Charles.

Getting back to the 1984 championship, it was a spurt of sub-par shooting that put Fanning into the winning position. He birdied three the last four holes at Breezy Bend in his second round to salvage a three-over-par 75 and a two-round total of 151 to just make the cut.

He remained hot through the third round to card a three-under-par 69 — best score of the tournament — and shot into the lead with a 54-hole total of 220, two shots ahead of a pair of Rossmere golfers, Gary Kullman and Rob Loewen, both at 222.

Fanning's 69 included seven birdies, two bogies and one double-bogey for going out of bounds over the green on the 13th hole.

He matched Kullman's 76 in the final round to win with a two-stroke margin, shooting 296 to Kullman's 298 over the 72-hole route. Craig Kindrat of Selkirk,

with a closing 77, and Don Glinz of Breezy Bend, with a 74, tied in third place with 300 and Loewen was in a three-way tie for fifth with Garth Collings of Breezy Bend and Darcy Furber of Pine Ridge, all at 301.

Winnipeg Jets superstar Dale Hawerchuk was in the limelight in the first two days of the 1984 Amateur, sharing the lead through the qualifying rounds before slipping to an 82 in his third round.

Hawerchuk, playing out of Niakwa, carded a one-under-par 71 at Breezy Bend and shared the first round lead with Craig Kindrat of Selkirk, Denis Burns of Winnipeg Canoe Club and Gerry Dubanski of Southwood, all with par-71 efforts at St. Boniface.

They switched courses for the second rounds and Hawerchuk shot three-over-par 74 at St. Boniface and retained a share of the lead with a new set of challengers. Gary Kullman of Rossmere and Mike Gottfred of Southwood both

matched par with 72 at Breezy Bend to join Hawerchuk with 145 and the qualifying lead.

Kindrat carded 75 and settled at 146 along with Rob Loewen of Rossmere and Bill North of Carman. Dubanski slipped to 77 to settle at 148 and Burns skidded to 82 for a 153 total to miss the cut.

Fanning made the big move in the third round with his 69 after opening with 76-75 and his 220 was two ahead of Kullman and Loewen. Kindrat was next at 223, followed by Dubanski, Breezy Bend's Garth Collings and Pine Ridge's Todd Teplitski at 224.

Nineteen golfers with scores of 309 or better qualified for the final two rounds of the Willingdon Cup team trials at Glendale, where Kindrat took over the No. 1 spot with rounds of 70 and 72 to go with his 300 for a six-round total of 442.

That was one shot better than Fanning, who carded 72 and 75 at Glendale

to finish at 443 in the second spot on the provincial team. Kullman had 75-77 for 450 and Teplitski rounded out the team with 73-74 for 451.

At the Canadian Amateur championship and Willingdon Cup matches at London, Ont., in August, Kullman was the leader for Manitoba with two 74's and a 36-hole total of 148. Fanning had 74 and 82 for 156 and Kindrat and Teplitski both totalled 157. Kindrat was 75-82, Teplitski 76-81. The Manitoba team placed a disappointing ninth and Kullman was the only team member to make the cut for the final 36 holes of the Canadian amateur. Four other Manitobans took part in the national championship, with Terry Hashimoto of St. Charles the only one to survive the cut.

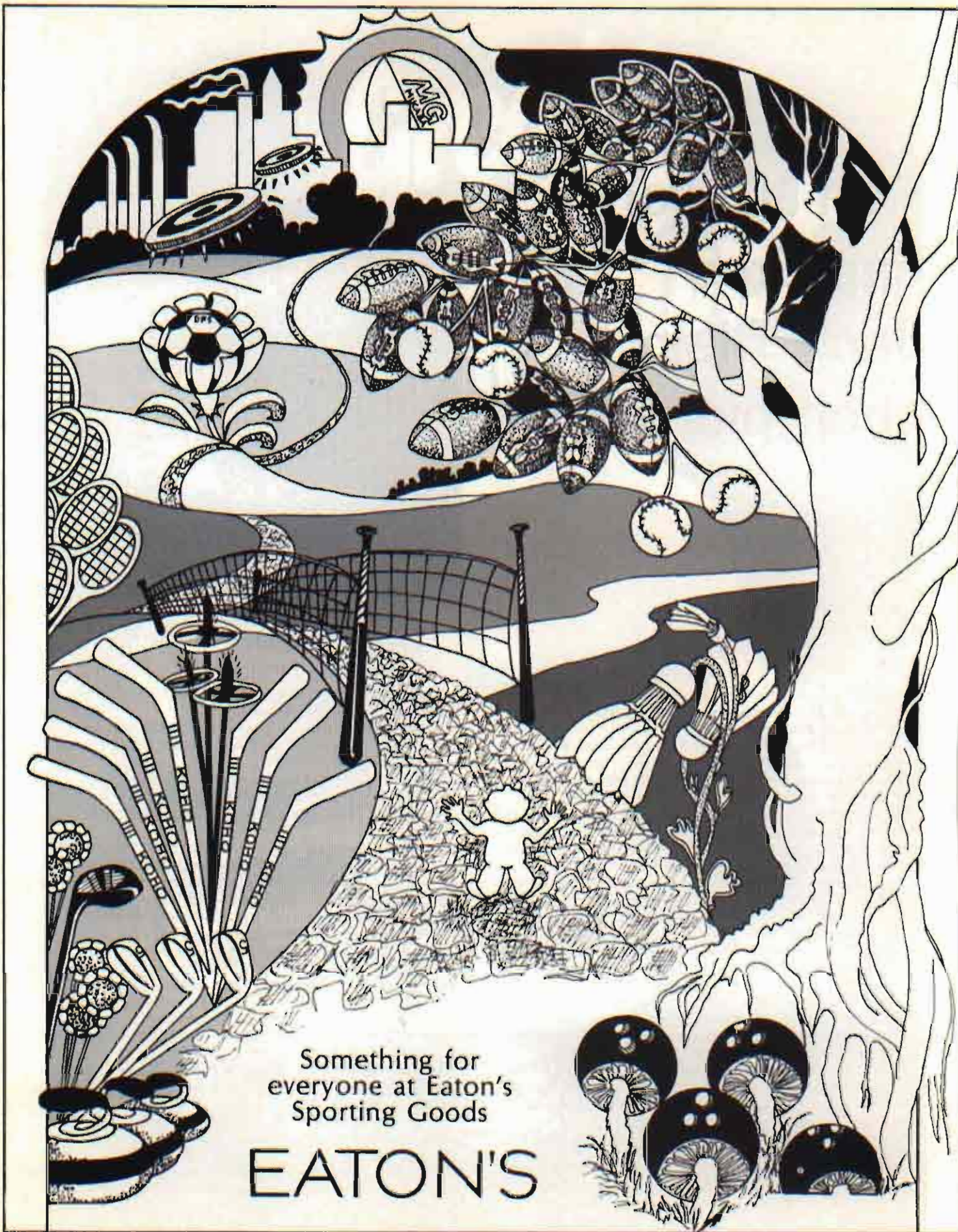

*RON WILSON, Breezy Bend
Moves from rinks to win on links*

Up until June of 1984, Ron Wilson's claim to fame around Manitoba was as a member of the Winnipeg Jets hockey team in the National Hockey League.

He extended his fame to the golf courses, however, when he captured the Jack Blair Memorial Match Play Championship, the first major event of the year on the provincial amateur golf calendar.

Playing out of Breezy Bend in his first full summer as a Winnipeg resident, the Ontario product scored a 2-and-1 victory over junior David White of Southwood in the final of the Blair event, played at the John Blumberg course.

The 1984 Blair competition opened with qualifying rounds at Wildewood and Pine Ridge June 2 and 3, then continued with 16 players moving into match play at Blumberg June 13-14 and 20-21.

Carl Lechman of Rossmere and Gerry Dubanski of Southwood shared the medal honors with 36-hole scores of 148, Lechman carding 78-70 and Dubanski shooting 75-73. Right on their heels came Craig Kindrat of Selkirk, Terry More of Elmhurst and Doug Howell of Rossmere, all with 149. Defending champion Terry Hashimoto of St. Charles qualified comfortably with 150.

It took a score of 157 to move into match play, White winning the final berth after a two-hole playoff when he tied with Glen Hnathiuk of Selkirk and fellow Southwood golfers Mike Gottfred and Mark Allen at that figure.

Before the match play began, Kindrat and Ken Warwick

withdrew, allowing Gottfred and Allen to move into the 16-player field for the matches.

Southwood was in the spotlight after the first round of match play, golfers from that club winning five of the eight matches played.

In that first round, Dubanski defeated Southwood clubmate Don Nelson 4-and-2 while co-medallist Lechman bowed to Southwood's Chris Nelson one-up in a battle that went to the final putt.

White, the youngest player in the field at 17, got another win for Southwood as he edged veteran Don McNeill, a former winner, one up. Allen was a 2-and-1 winner over Rossmere's Rob Oliphant and Gottfred won 4-and-3 over Darcy Furer of Pine Ridge to round out the Southwood victories.

In the other matches, Wilson topped Elmhurst's Terry More 4-and-3, Rossmere's Rob Loewen went to an extra hole to oust clubmate Doug Howell and Hashimoto scored a 2-and-1 victory over John Racciatti of Pine Ridge.

In the quarterfinal round, four of the five Southwood golfers went down to defeat. Hashimoto topped Nelson 2 up, White defeated Dubanski 2-and-1, Wilson blasted Allen 5-and-4 and Loewen took care of Gottfred 4-and-3.

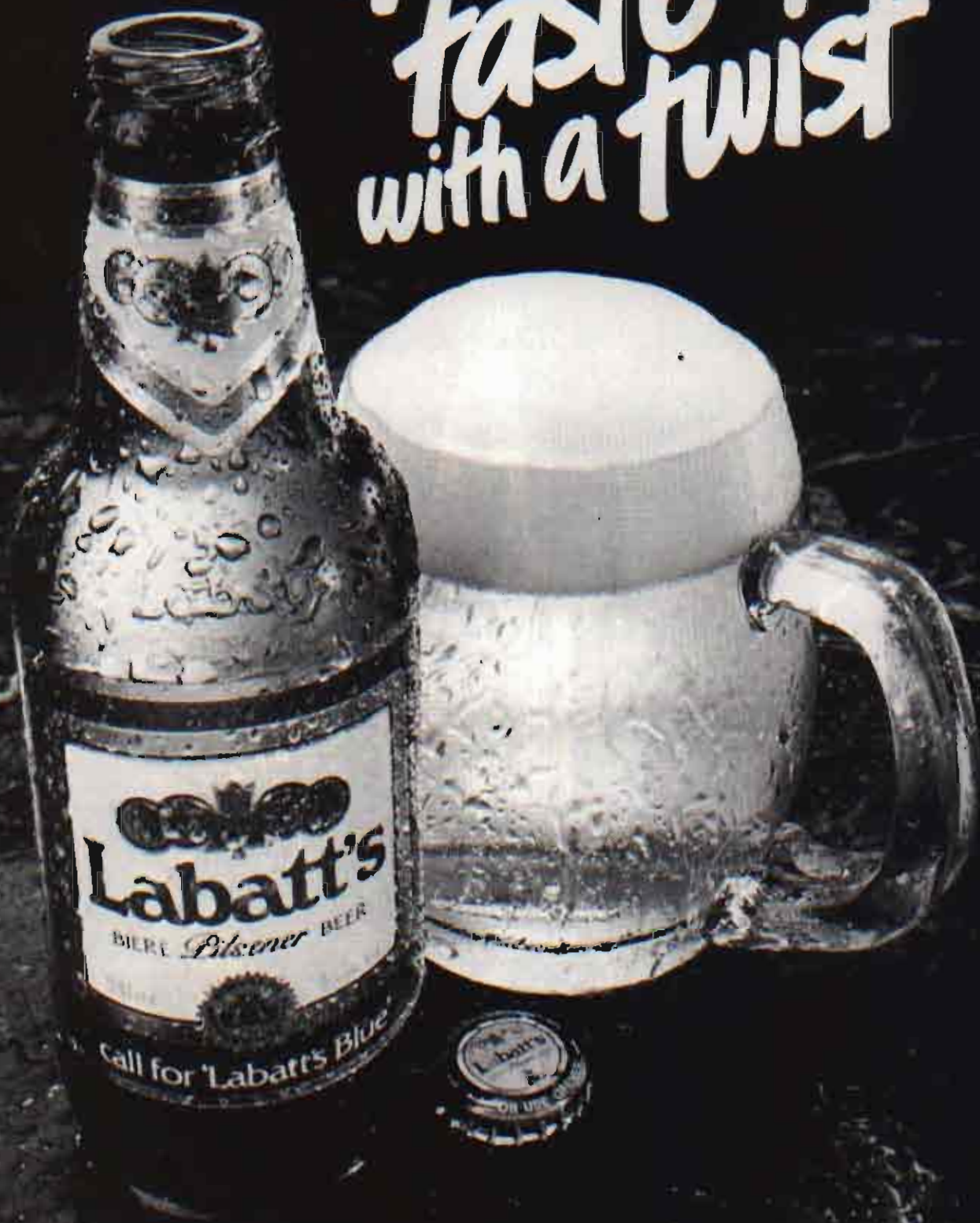
Wilson defeated defending champion Hashimoto 2-and-1 and White went to the 20th hole to sideline Loewen in the semifinals.

In the final, played in a brisk 2-1/2 hours and finishing just before a downpour, Wilson was a 2-and-1 winner over White in a well-played match.

The 1985 Jack Blair Memorial event was scheduled to open with qualifying rounds at Breezy Bend and Wildewood June 1-2 and the matches to be played June 12-13 and 19-20 at St. Charles Country Club.

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Todd Fanning Tops Juniors

Full of confidence after winning the provincial amateur championship two weeks earlier, Todd Fanning had little trouble adding the 1984 Manitoba junior golf title to his trophy case.

The 16-year-old Southwood swinger fired a three-under-par 69 to claim a three-stroke lead in the opening round and never looked back as he finished with a four-shot advantage in the 72-hole competition.

Fanning had scores of 69 at Bel Acres and 75-73-75 at Selkirk to finish with 292, four shots ahead of runners-up Glenn Collins of St. Charles and Ken Tresoor of Rossmere, who tied with 296. Collins shot 75-74-75-72 while Tresoor had 75-74-74-73.

Next in line came Dave McMillan of Rossmere with 78-72-75-74 for 299, defending junior champion David White of Southwood with 77-73-79-74 for 303 and Elmhurst's Jason Groshak with 79-76-76-74 for 305.

Fanning's 69 was the only sub-par round of the event and it provided his winning margin early. Three young golfers from rural Manitoba provided the closest competition on the first day as

the 16-year-old Torn Relf from the Brandon Wheat City club claimed the runner-up spot with a par 72 at Bel Acres, Greg McIver of Dauphin, another 16-year-old, shot 74 at Bel Acres and Dan Racicot of Selkirk settled in with 74 at the par-71 Selkirk course.

As the players switched courses for the second round, Fanning slipped to a four-over-par 75, but still managed to stretch his lead to four strokes as his closest chasers fell by the wayside.

Another Brandon golfer, Ian Lorimer, climbed into the runner-up position with a one-over-par 72 to go with an opening 76 for 148, four behind Fanning's 36-hole total of 144. Relf slipped to 80 after his opening 72 to drop into 11th place.

Collins and Tresoor both shot 74 after opening with 75 and settled into third place at 149, followed by White, whose 73 gave him a 150 total to tie with McMillan and Selkirk's Dean Iwanoczko, who both had 78-72.

Fanning's two-over-par 73 was the best score of the third round at Selkirk and it allowed him to stretch his lead to six strokes going into the final round.

Tresoor shot 74 to take over the runner-up position alone, Collins shot 75 to settle into third place and McMillan had the same score to move into fourth place.

Collins made the best move on the final day with a one-over-par 72, but it wasn't enough to catch Fanning, who settled for a 75 and his winning total of 292. Collins did catch Tresoor, who shot 73, to share the runner-up spot with 296, then Collins went on to win a playoff to win the 17-18 age group, with Tresoor the runner-up.

Fanning was easily the winner in the 15-16 age group, followed by McMillan, who finished with 74 for 299.

In the younger age groups, played over 36 holes, a pair of Southwood golfers took the honors. Colin Drewe of Southwood shot 156 to win the 13-14 group, two shots ahead of Darrell Roland of Ocala, Florida. Andy Nemiroff of Southwood shot 171 to take the 12-and-under group, six shots better than Jeffery Lailey of Elmhurst.

JUNIOR TEAMS

For the first time, two additional rounds were played at St. Charles following the junior championship to determine the makeup of the provincial junior team over a six-round route.

White made the big move at St. Charles as he shot four-under-par 68 and one-under-par 71 for a 139 total to gain a berth on the team, taking over third spot.

As expected, Fanning led the way with a six-round total of 436 after shooting 70-74 — 144 at St. Charles. Collins shot 73-72 over his home course to retain second spot with 441, only one ahead of White. Tresoor needed 78-76 but had no trouble holding down the fourth spot on the provincial team with a total of 448.

The next four players earned the right to join the four leaders for the Manitoba-Minnesota matches and those four positions went to Jeff Zyloway of St. Boniface with 454, Jason Groshak of Elmhurst with 455 and Rob Anderson and Kevin Baker, both of St. Charles and both with 456.

Dave McMillan of Rossmere, who shot a pair of 79s at St. Charles, just missed out in the team play with a total of 457, but he was chosen as one of the 15-year-old players for the Western Canada junior men's team matches played in August at Richmond, B.C.

Also named to the Manitoba team for that event were 14-year-old Colin Drewe of Southwood, 15-year-old Brian Burns of Dryden, Ont., and 16-year-old Blair Neal of Kildonan Park.

The Manitoba team finished third in competition at Richmond, 16 strokes behind British Columbia and Alberta. The B.C. team won after a playoff.

Burns led the Manitobans with 77-83-78 — 238, McMillan shot 84-80-79 — 243, Drewe had 88-80-76 — 244 and Neal shot 85-85-87 — 257.

In the Manitoba-Minnesota matches, played in August at Breezy Bend, there was a tie for the first time in the four-year history of the event, which was won twice by Manitoba and once by the Minnesotans in the past.

The Manitoba squad jumped into a lead, winning six of the eight matches on the opening day, but the U.S. players bounced back to win six of the eight

singles matches and leave both teams with eight wins.

This year's Manitoba-Minnesota matches will be played Aug. 7-9 at Moorhead, Minnesota.

At the Canadian Junior and Juvenile championships and interprovincial team matches at Moncton, N.B. at the end of August, the Manitoba team had the third best score of the second day, but couldn't recover from a bad first round and finished sixth. British Columbia won by 10 strokes over Ontario.

Brent Franklin of B.C. was also a runaway winner of the junior championship and Manitoba champion Todd Fanning was the best of the Manitoba players, finishing strong with two 71s for a 297 total. It left him seventh overall and in the runner-up spot in the Juvenile

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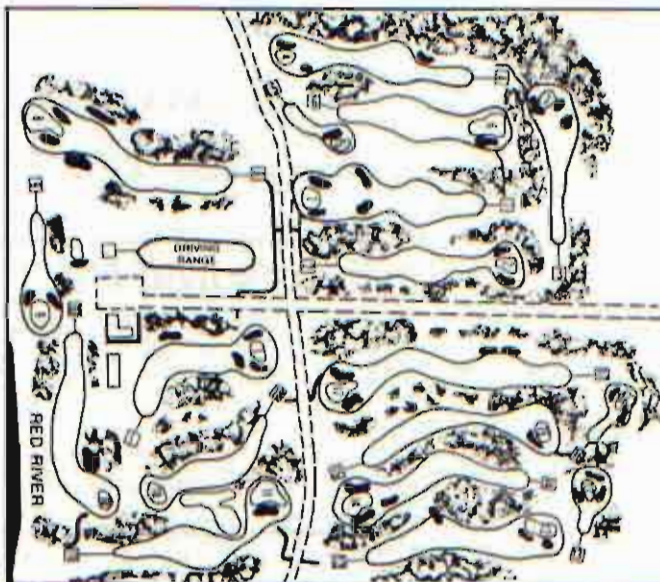

The par 5s will provide good birdie and eagle opportunities but the winner will be the player who does not give those shots back on the par 3s. Let me take you on a tour of the 1985 Manitoba Open site.

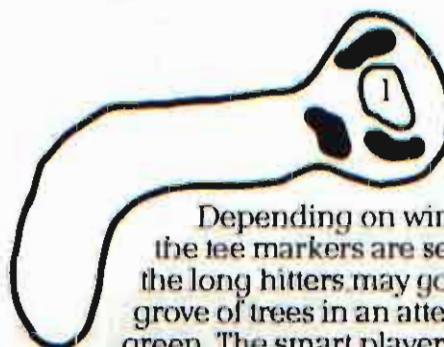
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HOLE **1st** 320 Yard Par 4

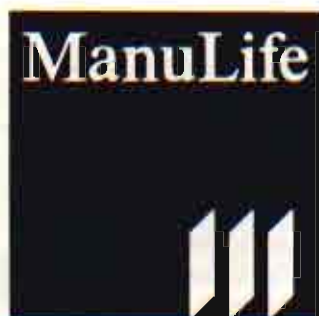
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Depending on wind and where the tee markers are set some of the long hitters may go over the grove of trees in an attempt to drive the green. The smart player though will hit a tee shot straight out to the corner, leaving a wedge or 9 iron to the green. It is not a difficult starting hole but many a bogey will be made by making an error in judgement on the tee shot.

HOLE 2nd 455 Yard Par 4

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The longest par 4 on the course, this hole tests the player by combining length with accuracy. Hitting the tee shot on the fairway is a must in order to have a chance at getting on in regulation. Missing the green to either side will require a very delicate pitch to the narrow portion of the green, a green which is very fast.

HOLE 3rd 205 Yard Par 3



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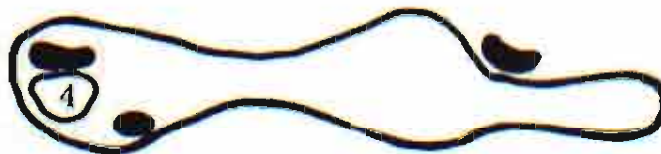
The first of Southwood's par 3s the third hole gets interesting around the green. There is a ridge running down the middle of the green lengthwise and this can present some difficulty, moreso when playing a pitch or chip shot. The one area the player wants to avoid most is going over this green. The rear bank is quite steep and the trees are very close.



HOLE 4th 532 Yard Par 5



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A legitimate 3 shot hole for all but the longest hitters. It is important to drive the ball in the fairway because an easy second shot will leave a short pitch for a possible birdie. However, if the tee shot finds trees, right or left, the recovery shot will mean a middle or long iron third. The green is not large so this sets up the possible bogey.

HOLE 5th 180 Yard Par 3



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An excellent par three, the players will be hitting mid to long irons. The large bunker guarding the front left forces

the golfer who can't hit the high long iron to hit a tee shot right to left and it's difficult to hold the green with that kind of shot. There is a ridge that runs across the green and the first third of the putting surface slopes to the front significantly. A long putt can prove to be quite a challenge.



HOLE 6th 428 Yard Par 4



BEAVER
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An excellent driving hole as the landing area for the tee shot is quite tight. The green is tiered at the

right rear and it is important to hit the approach shot to the same tier as the hole. Otherwise it can be an interesting putting contest.



HOLE 7th 478 Yard Par 5

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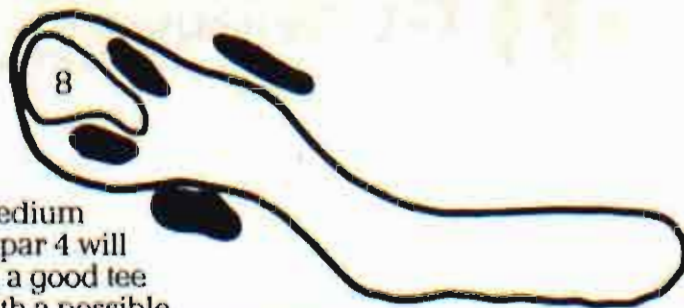
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A relatively short par 5 this hole should give up some eagles. If it is playing into the wind the two fairway bunkers short of the green will force players to make a decision: lay up on the second shot or go for it. There is out of bounds right behind the green so if the hole plays down wind that becomes a consideration.

HOLE 8th 383 Yard Par 4

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This medium length par 4 will reward a good tee shot with a possible birdie but anything to the right off the tee is trouble. The ideal tee shot is right of centre so the player can look at the entire green. Coming in from the left forces the golfer to carry the large bunker guarding the left front corner. The green is deceiving in length so a great many approach shots will come up short.

HOLE 9th 152 Yard Par 3



This final hole on the front nine has one of the larger greens on the course so club selection is important. The golfer must guard against leaving the tee shot out to the right as the bank drops down to the river. If the club selection on the tee shot is uncertain it is best to be long. That leaves a relatively simple chip shot and a good chance at making par.



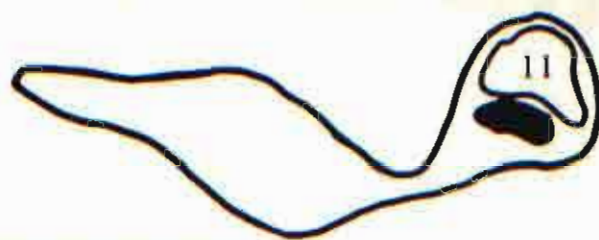
HOLE 10th 253 Yard Par 4

This short par 4 should surrender many birdies but there will be lots of bogies as well. For those who attempt to drive the green the margin of error is small. Those who choose to lay up with an iron off the tee must position the tee shot carefully. A large elm tree guards the front of the green so the tee shot must be placed far enough to the right to permit a pitch shot to the pin. A tee shot that is long will be blocked by the trees on the right side of the green.



HOLE **11th** 320 Yard Par 4



An excellent positional hole this par 4 requires a tee shot to be positioned slightly left of centre on the fairway just short of the water. Most of the golfers will hit fairway woods or long irons off the tee. The kidney shaped green is quite undulating and has a number of subtle breaks. It is important to get the ball up high on the approach shot in order to carry the bunker and mound guarding the front of the green.

HOLE **12th** 350 Yard Par 4



The landing area for the tee shot is quite narrow so care must be taken. Given a tee shot in the fairway this is an excellent birdie hole although the green is quite flat, making judgement of distance on the approach shot somewhat tricky.

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HOLE **13th** 136 Yard Par 3

This is the shortest of the par 3s on Southwood but it doesn't yield as many birdies as one might expect. The green is quite large and rolling making club selection the key. There will be a surprising number of bogies on this hole, primarily made by those who were thinking too much about birdies.



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HOLE 14th 395 Yard Par 4

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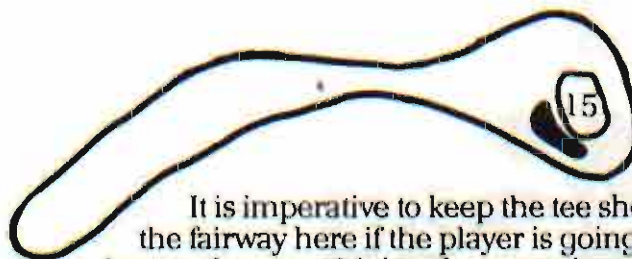
HOLE 15th 437 Yard Par 4

The 14th hole will reward the well placed tee shot with a short iron for a possible birdie. There is no trouble in front of the green and the green itself is not too tricky. The tee shot is the key, though. The rough along the left is very tough so a "good" miss should favour the right side.



It is imperative to keep the tee shot in the fairway here if the player is going to have a chance at hitting the green in regulation. The long hitters will be able to carry an iron in over the bunker guarding this small flat green. The shorter hitters will be forced to play a wood shot to the left corner of the putting surface or play to get up and down from near the green. There won't be a lot of 3s on this hole.

HOLE 16th 213 Yard Par 3



This hole requires a tee shot (usually a long iron) that comes in from left to right. The long bunker on the right side catches a lot of tee shots that don't draw. Those that do move right to left can end up in the left hand bunker.



HOLE 17th 503 Yard Par 5

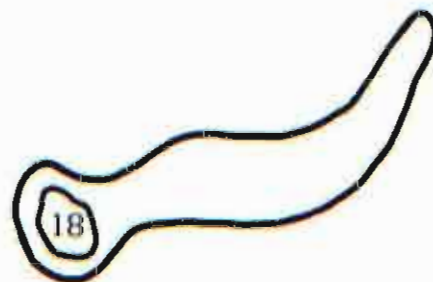


This hole should see some exciting moments. With two good shots it is reachable, so the potential for an eagle exists. The long green slopes significantly to the front so it is important on an approach shot to get all the way up to the flag. The green is protected by a pair of large bunkers and rough on the greenside slopes.

HOLE 18th 320 Yard Par 4



The finishing hole is another that tempts those willing to take the risk. It is



possible to drive the green but a hook off the tee will end up in the pond to the left. The percentage shot is an iron across the corner of the trees leaving a short iron to the green.



With the finest players in Canada competing there will be some exciting golf played in this year's event. Given reasonable weather I would predict a score of 200 for 54 holes (10 under par) will win. By the evening of August 18 we will know.

Club Professionals at private clubs have always offered a variety of junior programs, including swing lessons, clinics and rules seminars. These programs have produced some fine players and many life-long club members.

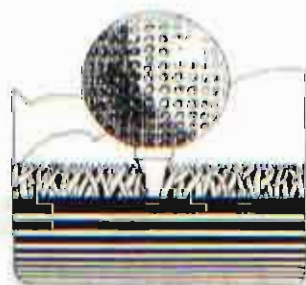
Professionals have always been eager to participate in junior golf camps, rural clinics and pro-junior events.

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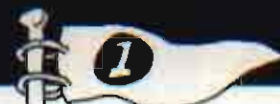

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MOLSON

Superintendent has variety of duties

As soon as the snow begins to melt and the frost starts coming out of the ground, the golfers want to be out on the golf course. Generally, golf course superintendents don't allow this because at this time the ground becomes very soft from snow melting and the ground thawing out.

Walking on the turf at this time can result in foot-printing, compaction and permanent damage to the turf, which has already had to survive our severe winter.

Once play has resumed, many superintendents may leave a few greens out of play for the first while. This may be because the green is still soft due to its location or because it sustained severe winter damage. Leaving it out of play will speed up the recovery of that green.

A winter-damaged green, if played on, could easily take twice as long to recuperate than a green which is kept out of play for a short period.

AERATION

In late spring, a project which may be hard to understand from the golfer's point of view is aerating. A superintendent will aerate greens and tees for any or all of the following reasons:

- 1) to deepen the root system, thus making it hardier.
 - 2) to thicken growth of turf, such as a green which has had winter damage.
 - 3) to make the soil surface softer, thus holding the ball better on approach shots.
 - 4) to open up the soil surface and allow for better water penetration.
 - 5) to reduce thatch and graininess of the putting surface.
- Most superintendents dislike aerating more than any other maintenance practices, just as golfers don't like putting on freshly aerated greens. However, it's a job which must be done to maintain good turf quality.

In early autumn, many superintendents aerate again, for many of the same reasons mentioned. For golf courses which have been on a sand program of top dressing for several years, it isn't as critical to aerate as often.

FERTILIZING

During the season, tiny light-colored pellets are occasionally seen on greens and tees. These are fertilizer or fungicide granules.

Years ago, fertilizer was applied in a quick-release form, which had to be watered in immediately in order to avoid burning the turf.

Due to technological improvements in fertilizers in the past few years, a slow-release form is now widely used which doesn't burn when applied properly. It may be visible for a day or two, so its disruption is short-lived.

SYRINGE GREENS

With the advent of modern irrigation systems, many superintendents syringe greens and tees in the day during hot, dry weather — that is, putting on a light watering of two or three minutes during mid-afternoon.

For shortly-mowed turf, such as on greens and tees, the sun actually heats the soil and turf to a point where plants begin to wilt. By applying a light coat of cool water, the plant has the opportunity to recuperate and survive another hot day.

SPRAYING

Occasionally, golfers will notice a person from the grounds staff operating a mechanical sprayer. On fairways and in the rough, it would likely be for weeds, but on greens and tees it would be for a totally different reason — to apply fungicides.

The shortly-mowed turf, high fertility and frequent irrigation on greens and tees unfortunately creates an ideal environment for fungus disease. To prevent the turf from being damaged by these diseases, they must be treated with a fungicide.

Without spraying, an outbreak of the disease could easily destroy a whole green in a matter of days. This could occur anytime during the season — spring, summer or fall.

Recently, some superintendents have been spraying greens with liquid fertilizer as an alternative to granular applications.

CUTTING HEIGHTS

The height at which the turf is cut is often a great debate at many golf clubs. Understandably, a golfer would like a "closely mowed" golf course, which would provide an ideal lie for the ball and the smoothest, fastest putting surfaces.

Unfortunately, that falls short of the needs of the turf itself. Simply put, the shorter turf is cut, the weaker it becomes and thus it is more susceptible to injury.

It should also be understood that certain turfgrass species can withstand lower cutting heights than others. The conditions at various clubs can also determine cutting heights, namely the capability of the irrigation system, size



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of budget for a more demanding turf quality and the available equipment and manpower.

Cutting heights are variable and should be discussed with your superintendent to better understand the conditions at your golf course.

COURSE SHUTDOWN

As the cool days of autumn arrive and our first snowfall is just around the corner, certain maintenance practices are often carried out.

Depending on the needs of various courses, any of the following could be done on the greens and tees: Aerate with a thick layer of topdressing, topdressing alone, straw cover, mat cover, snow fence and a fungicide treatment.

Golf courses in heavily sheltered areas often need only an application of fungicide, an ally to improve the turf's ability to overwinter.

LATE FALL AND WINTER

This is the critical period which determines the quality of golf course a superintendent will have when spring comes. Any irregularity in weather patterns can have an effect on turf survival.

Late fall rainfall (ice buildup), lack of snow, cold temperatures can all contribute to poor quality turf in the spring.

THE SUMMARY

A golf course superintendent has a wide variety of duties to develop and maintain top quality turf. Then, Mother Nature has to lend a hand.

In spring, we hope for a quick melt of snow to prevent ice buildup. Then, warm weather is needed for seed germination to get the turf growing. Summer rains are needed to keep everything green and healthy. And, lastly, in late fall we hope for a permanent heavy snowfall to protect the turf through the harsh winter.

Smiley Meronek rules senior golfers in 1984

After two successive years of "rookie" winners, William (Smiley) Meronek of St. Charles showed that some of "older folks" could still do a few things on the golf course.

Meronek led a field of 177 entries to capture the 1984 Manitoba senior men's golf championship over a 54-hole route at Elmhurst Golf and Country Club.

Competing in the 65-69 age group, Meronek had a three-round score of 226 to regain the title he had also won in 1981. The crown went in 1982 to Gord Lenton of Selkirk and in 1983 to Nick Mickoski of Elmhurst, both making their first appearances in the senior event at the age of 85.

Mickoski finished in the runnerup position last year with 228, two shots behind the winner. Elmhurst's Bill Pidlaski, who was the senior champ in 1977 and 1978, finished in third spot with 229 and Lenton placed fourth with 230.

These four made up the provincial senior team which travelled to Charlotte-

town, P.E.I., in September for the Canadian senior championship and inter-provincial team matches.

Meronek put together rounds of 72-75-79 for his winning 226 total, while Mickoski carded 72-78-78 for 228, Pidlaski shot 77-73-79 for 229 and Lenton was 73-78-79 for 230.

Mickoski captured the honors for the 55-59 age group, followed by Lenton, with Elmhurst's Max Desaulnier right behind with 79-71-81 — 231 and Bill McCallum, also of Elmhurst, next with 74-79-82 — 235.

The 60-64 age group saw Russ Jones of St. Boniface and Jim Isaac of St. Charles tied at 240, with Jones winning on a countback. He had rounds of 79-78-83, while Isaac went 81-76-83. Barrie Sanders of Carman was third with 79-82-83 — 224, and Ed Klein of Rossmore fourth with 80-84-81 — 245.

Meronek led the 65-69 group with Pidlaski in the runnerup spot. Third place went to former six-time senior champ Harry Critchley of Southwood with 80-77-81 — 238 and fourth was Don McNabb of Assiniboine with 81-80-84 — 245.

In the 70-and-over division, Elmhurst's Cass Tobin was a runaway leader with

85-82 — 167 over the 36-hole route. Don Brereton of Breezy Bend was next with 90-89 — 179 and Rube Ludwick of Glendale was third with 91-90 — 181.

At the national championship at Charlottetown, Pidlaski was the best of the Manitoba contingent, sitting only two shots behind the leader after the second round of play and finishing only eight strokes back as scores went up on the final day.

Pidlaski shot 75-77 for 152 in the first two rounds, with Mickoski next in line for Manitoba with 81-78 — 159, Lenton with 80-81 — 161 and Meronek with 80-84 — 164. The team placed fifth.

Pidlaski added an 85 in his final round for a 54-hole score of 235, eight off the pace. Mickoski's final round of 79 gave him a 54-hole score of 238.

Many of the same players were back in the spotlight in September when the senior interclub championship was played at St. Charles, with 34 teams representing 22 clubs.

The No. 1 team from St. Charles edged the Elmhurst No. 1 team for the gross honors, 232 to 233.

John Blumberg team wins Crown Life honors

One of the most popular golf events in Manitoba each season is the Crown Life Pro-Am competition, which is unique in a number of ways.

First, it's an opportunity for the golfers of the province to help a couple of worthy causes because the \$5 entry fee goes directly to the Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Manitoba (60 per cent) and the Manitoba Golf Association's junior development program (40 per cent). All tournament expenses and prizes are provided by the sponsoring Crown Life Insurance Company.

Second, it's a competition that has a place for all levels of golf. Whether you're a scratch player or one with a handicap of 30 or more, you can take part.

Third, it provides an opportunity for some match-play competition at the individual clubs, though rules were changed last year to allow clubs to decide their teams on stroke play if desired.

Fourth, it gives the club pro a chance to team up with three of his members in three distinct handicap categories and play against similar teams from the other clubs.

The format for this year's Crown Life event is much the same as in previous years. The handicap groups are 0-12, 13-18 and 19-30, the entry fee remains at \$5, players can attempt to qualify as often as they wish and the qualifying period was set for May 18 to June 10.

Match play (or stroke play) to determine the three division winners takes place from June 11 to Aug. 1. The provincial championship is set for Aug. 9 at Inakwa Country Club. The provincial winner will represent Manitoba at the national Crown Life Pro-Am team championship over a 36-hole route Sept. 12-13 at the Willow Park Golf and Country Club in Calgary.

Last year, there were 1,800 participants in the Crown Life event in Mani-

toba, raising a total of \$9,000, which provided \$5,400 for the Society and \$3,600 for junior golf development.

Across the country, there were 21,000 golfers in the Crown Life event last year. Since the inception of the competition in 1973, there have been 105,000 participants and they have raised a total of \$525,000 for charity.

It all started in Manitoba in 1973 and it was strictly a provincial competition at the time. It spread to the other western provinces and the first western championship was played in 1979 at Niaakwa, where pro Stan Homenuik led his Dauphin team to the first championship. Ontario joined the next year and it has now spread across Canada.

Last year's national championship was won by a team from Newfoundland, the first time that province has won a national golf title. Ontario has won twice, in 1980 and 1983, Saskatchewan won in 1982 and British Columbia in 1981.

Manitoba's Crown Life championship last year went to pro Ben Smirnov and his team from the John Blumberg municipal course by a wide margin.

Playing at Elmhurst, Smirnov and his team of Tony Dyck, John Lovelace and Winston Johnson compiled a total of 145 Stableford points, seven more than runnerup Pat O'Donnell and his Pine Ridge squad of Helmut Dahl, Jim Darracott and Al Cooper, with 138.

Next in line came Flin Flon's team of pro John Gaudet and amateurs Alister Walker, Gary Lyons and Terry Plischke with 131. Three teams tied at 130 — The Pas led by St. Charles assistant pro Richard Philpot, with amateurs Keith Elvers, John Rigby and Jack Ashley; Breezy Bend, led by pro Sandy Paterson with Tom Sykes, Phil Rhuebottom and Doug Soetaet; and Deloraine, led by Tuxedo assistant pro Garth Goodbrandson with amateurs Dennis Olishetski, Larry Shewchuk and Doug Hicks.

In individual scoring for the pros, O'Donnell was low man with a neat 70, while Stan Homenuik and Brad Keats were next with 74s and Smirnov, Dan Hunter and Al Scott each had 75.



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Ted Chop captures Rural Amateur Championship

Ted Chop of the Northernaire Golf Club established a competitive course record at Hecla Island on the way to winning the 1984 Manitoba rural golf championship.

Chop, who is also a member of the MGA executive, shot a blistering three-under-par 69 on the second day of the 36-hole competition to pull ahead of three-time winner Bruce North of Carman and win by two shots.

The record-setting round featured six birdies and three bogies as Chop carded a one-under-par 35 on the front nine and two-under-par 34 on the back nine. There were eight 3s on his card and the round also included two three-putt greens.

Chop had opened the two-day tournament with a one-over-par 73 in his opening round, which left him tied with defending champion Pat Doyle of

Sandy Hook in third place, three shots behind Carman's Bill North and one behind Bruce North.

Bruce North added a second straight par-72 round on the second day to finish at 144, but it wasn't good enough to earn him a fourth rural title because Chop's 69 gave him a 36-hole total of 142.

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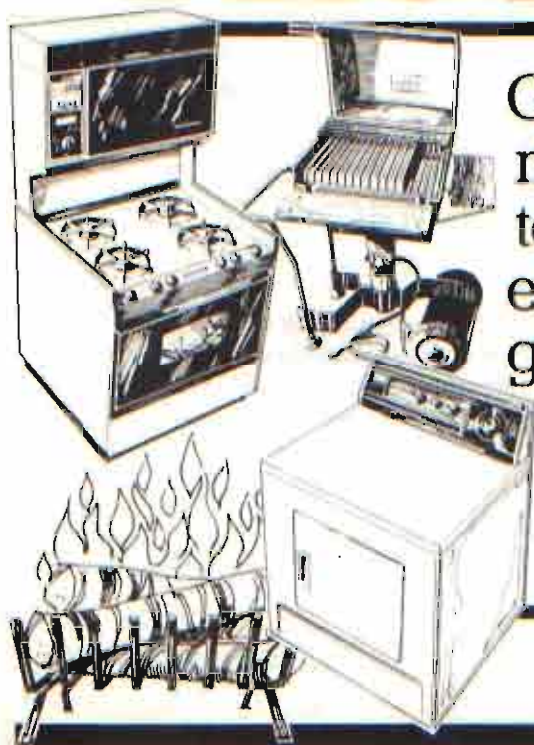
