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Message from the M.G.A. President

While the 1985 golf season saw the introduction of several changes in the activities of the Association, 1986 will be marked by continued change — an expansion of the services available to member clubs and a concerted effort to promote the game at the grass roots level throughout Manitoba.

The three-year agreement with Pacific Western Airlines, Budget Rent A Car and ICG Liquid Gas Co. Ltd. as sponsors and Southwood Golf and Country Club has insured a firm financial base for The Manitoba Open. Blackwoods Beverages will continue their support of the tournament and we welcome Labatt's and Hudson Bay Wine and Spirit as new associates. The participation of 20 additional Corporate Patrons will ensure the tournament's financial viability.

The prize purse in 1986 will be \$50,000, an increase of more than 250 per cent from the 1984 level, with commitments from sponsors to further increases over the term of the agreement. The consistent involvement of the Southwood Golf and Country Club will enable the parties to the agreement to assess the problems related to the increased magnitude of the event.

The changes introduced in 1985 expanding the Championship flights to the low 60 and ties in both the Manitoba Amateur and Manitoba Junior will be continued. The successful golf camp for rural juniors at Carmen will also be repeated as well as the camp for elite players in Winnipeg for both city and rural juniors.

Manitoba's Male Athlete of the Year in 1985, Todd Fanning, will cap an illustrious junior career by attempting to become the second player to win three consecutive Manitoba Junior Cham-

pionships. Todd will also defend his Canadian Junior Championship in Edmonton in hopes of becoming Manitoba's only two-time winner of the national event.

The major area of new direction and service comes with the addition to our full-time staff of a Technical Director. Todd Teplitski, in addition to being a former Junior Champion and Willingdon Cup team member, has an academic background closely related to the work he is undertaking. The role of the Technical Director will evolve over the year as needs are identified. The initial areas of concentration will be at the elite junior

level and the grass roots level. Our ultimate goal is to expand interest in the game by developing programs for use in high schools and by other groups and to make expertise available to all rural areas of Manitoba.

The establishment of the Technical Director's position is not in conflict with the efforts and activities of the Manitoba Professional Golfers Association. Our programs contemplate their continued involvement at the level of previous years and hopefully our efforts will be of direct benefit in expanding their activity in all areas of the Province. The establishment of this position has been made possible by a grant from the Manitoba Sports Federation.

The Association has assembled a collection of video instructional and informational tapes for all levels which are available to member clubs through the golf office on a reservation basis. In 1986, the M.G.A. will continue its program of (re)rating and (re)measuring member courses and will provide distance plaques upon completion and request.

This seventh successful edition of the Golf Annual is our only opportunity for direct contact with the more than 10,000 members of the M.G.A. I trust you will enjoy the contents of your annual. We would also welcome enquiries from members and clubs concerning our existing services and the requirements of member clubs. This participation by the membership will enable us to better serve your needs.

Best wishes for an enjoyable golf season.

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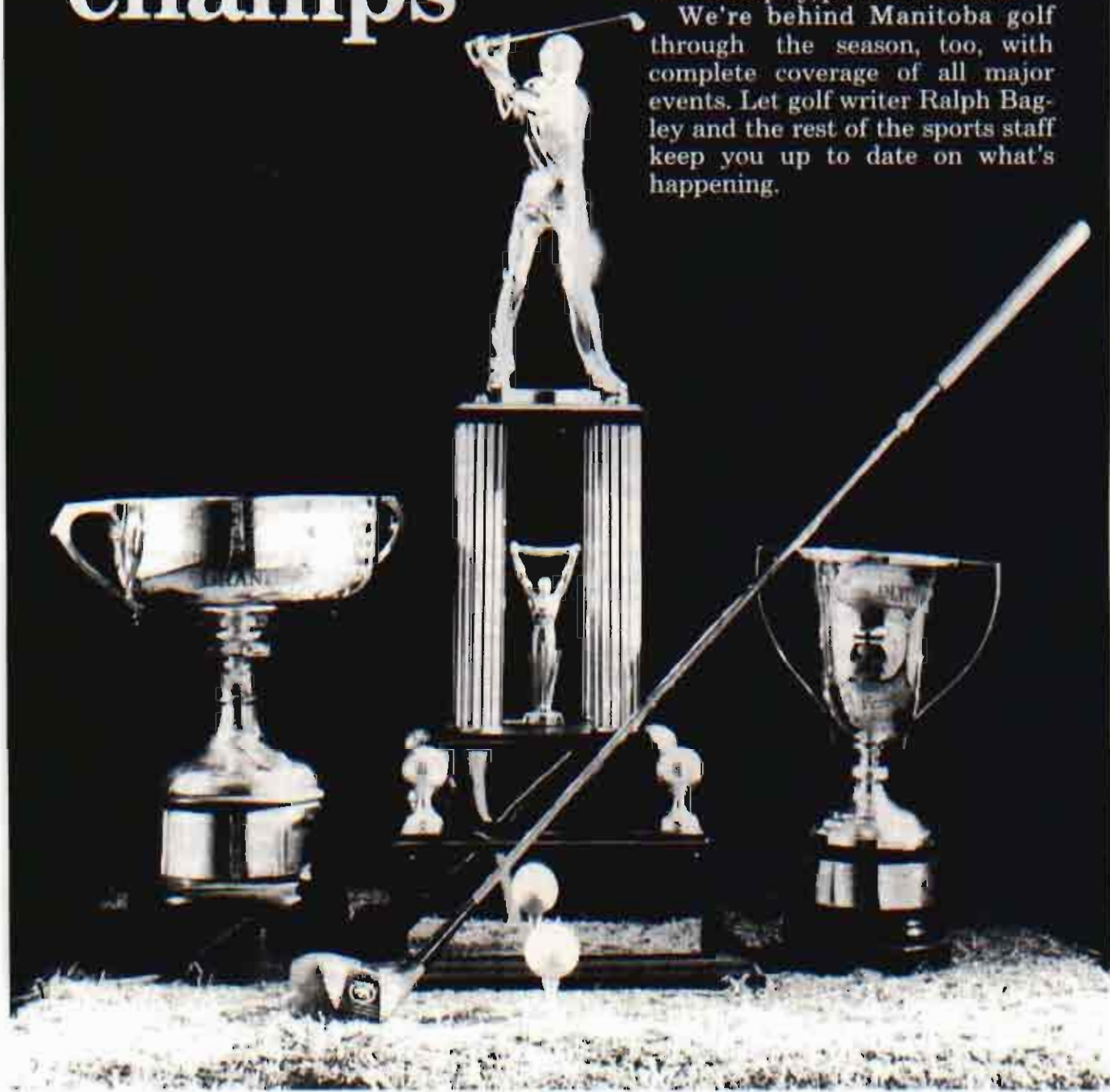

JOSEPH WATSON KACHOR

A hardworking member of the Carman Golf Club who also served nearly 10 years on the Manitoba Golf Association Council, Joe Kachor died September 15, 1985, at his Carman residence. He was 62.

Joe Kachor was an enthusiastic booster of rural golf activities and played an active role in the staging of the MGA's rural amateur and senior championship tournament at Hecla Island in recent years.

He was a member of the Carman Golf Club since 1957 and on the MGA Council since 1977, enjoying the fellowship and always a willing worker.

He is survived by his wife Marie, daughters Debbie Cresse and Cindy Takvam of Winnipeg, four grandchildren, his father Hnat Kachor of Vancouver, brothers Bill of Hilbre, Man., and Pete of Kenora, Ont., and sisters Mary Crombie and Ruth Bittner of Vancouver, Jean Forcyce of Kenton, Man., and Emily Kemp of Melville, Sask.

Joe will be missed around the Carman Golf Club and at the Rural tournaments.



MICHAEL PIDLASKI

One of Manitoba's best known golfers and a former provincial Amateur champion, Mike Pidlaski died April 30 at the age of 69.

He was active for many years at St. Boniface Golf Club, before moving to Elmhurst Golf and Country Club, where in recent years he spent many hours on the practice fairway.

Mike Pidlaski won the Manitoba Amateur championship in 1949 and 1950, defeating St. Boniface clubmate Bill Budd the first year, then topping brother and clubmate Bill Pidlaski in 1950. Both later won the Amateur crown, Budd in 1951 and Bill Pidlaski in 1960 and 1963.

Mike was also runner-up to Southwood's Allan Boes in the 1948 Amateur final and he was twice runner-up in the Manitoba Open, behind Bob Reith in 1950 and behind Hal Eidsvig in 1952.

He was also a great competitor in the MGA Inter-Club events, playing on the winning team 11 times — seven for St. Boniface in 1947-48-50-51-52-54-57 and four for Elmhurst in 1958-61-65-68.

He was predeceased by his wife Elsie and is survived by two brothers, Bill and John, both in Winnipeg, and a sister, Anne Pylatuk, in British Columbia.



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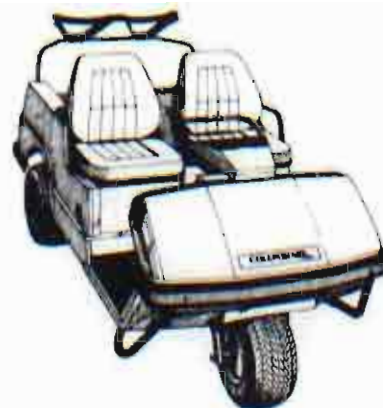
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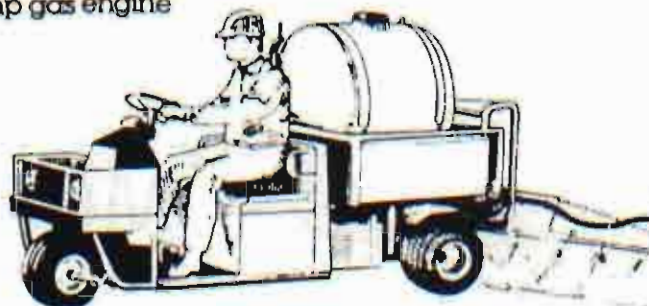
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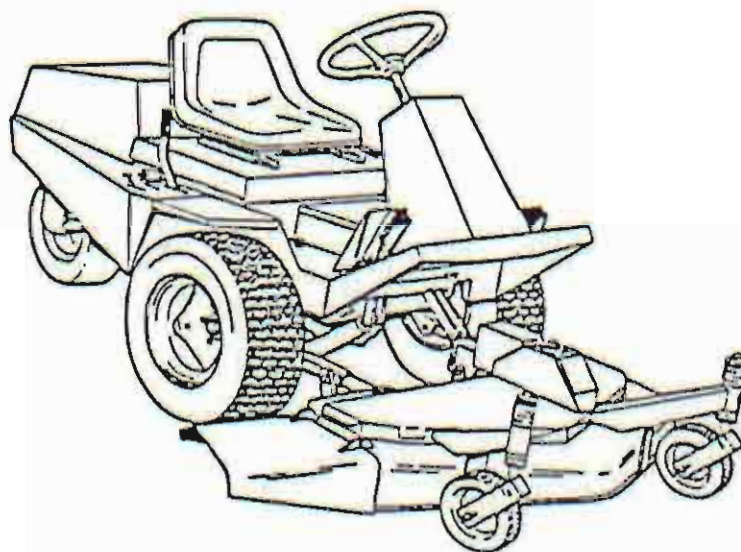


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Manitoba Golf Association's programs, objectives outlined

The Manitoba Golf Association is an incorporated sports association whose purposes are, generally speaking, the encouragement and development of golf in Manitoba. It is recognized as the governing body of golf in this Province by the Royal Canadian Golf Association.

Eligibility for membership in the Association is extended to all private golf clubs and municipally-owned or individually-owned courses in Manitoba.

The Association functions under the direction of an elected Council whose method of election and responsibilities are outlined in the bylaws.

The more detailed work is under the supervision of the President and Executive Committee, while day-to-day management is under the Executive Director.

The objects of the Association are:

- a) to develop, encourage and control the game of golf in the Province of Manitoba and area of jurisdiction.

- b) to arrange, schedule and supervise such tournaments in the Province as may be considered desirable in relation to object (a). To receive entries and set entry fees.

- c) to protect the interests of the game of golf and to uphold the Rules of Golf as approved for use in Canada by the Royal Canadian Golf Association.

GENERAL

1. All member clubs of the Manitoba Golf Association are also members of

the Royal Canadian Golf Association. Each club member (adult male 19 years of age and over) is issued a Manitoba Golf Association — Royal Canadian Golf Association membership card with a space for the club name, the reverse side of which has space for the individual's name and updating space for his official handicap. This card is invaluable when visiting other clubs, and also must be presented to the starter at each official Manitoba Golf Association tournament with updated handicap.

2. Only holders of official cards are entitled to enter a Manitoba Golf Association sanctioned and operated tournament.

3. The Manitoba Golf Association conducts Provincial Championships, the Crown Life, North American Life Family event and the Manitoba Open.

4. Inter-Provincial Team events in Junior Men's, Men's Amateur and Senior Men's. The composition of the various Provincial Teams are determined and qualified by the Association.

5. The Manitoba Golf Association provides all tournament prizes and trophies where required. All permanent trophies are insured by the Manitoba Golf Association and retained for safe keeping and engraving when required.

6. For rural members only, the Manitoba Golf Association conducts the Rural Amateur, Rural Senior and the Meagher Beefeater zone team event. The Higher Handicap was tried in 1984 with a small entry and was abandoned in 1985 because of lack of entries. Full information regarding each event is forwarded to each club at the start of the golf season.

7. A Junior Development Program by the Manitoba Golf Association has proved to be a very active and rewarding experience for any Junior golfer who has attended a golf camp, participated in Sunday Junior Inter-Clubs or the Junior Championship. Three golf camps were held in 1985, the Carman Rural Golf Camp, the Elite Camp and the Urban Golf Camp, and proved to be beneficial to all Juniors rural and urban.

Todd Teplitski named MGA Technical Director

Todd Teplitski, a 25-year-old graduate of the recreational studies, assumed duties in February as the first Technical Director for the Manitoba Golf Association.

While the job is new, Teplitski is no stranger to the Manitoba golf scene. He was provincial junior champion in 1979 and a member of the provincial team that year and also was a member of Manitoba's Willingdon Cup team in 1984.

Last year, he finished fourth in the Manitoba Amateur championship at Pine Ridge, his home club, but didn't take part in the Willingdon Team trials because he left on a honeymoon, having been married just two days before the Amateur started.

He graduated from the University of Winnipeg with a Bachelor of Recreational Studies degree and last year worked on golf course maintenance at John Blumberg municipal course for the summer, then became program director at Maples Community Club until his MGA appointment in February.

In this new position, Teplitski will be involved in all aspects of the develop-

ment of golf programs for the Manitoba Golf Association. He expects much of his early work will be involved with junior golf development, particularly in the rural areas of the province.

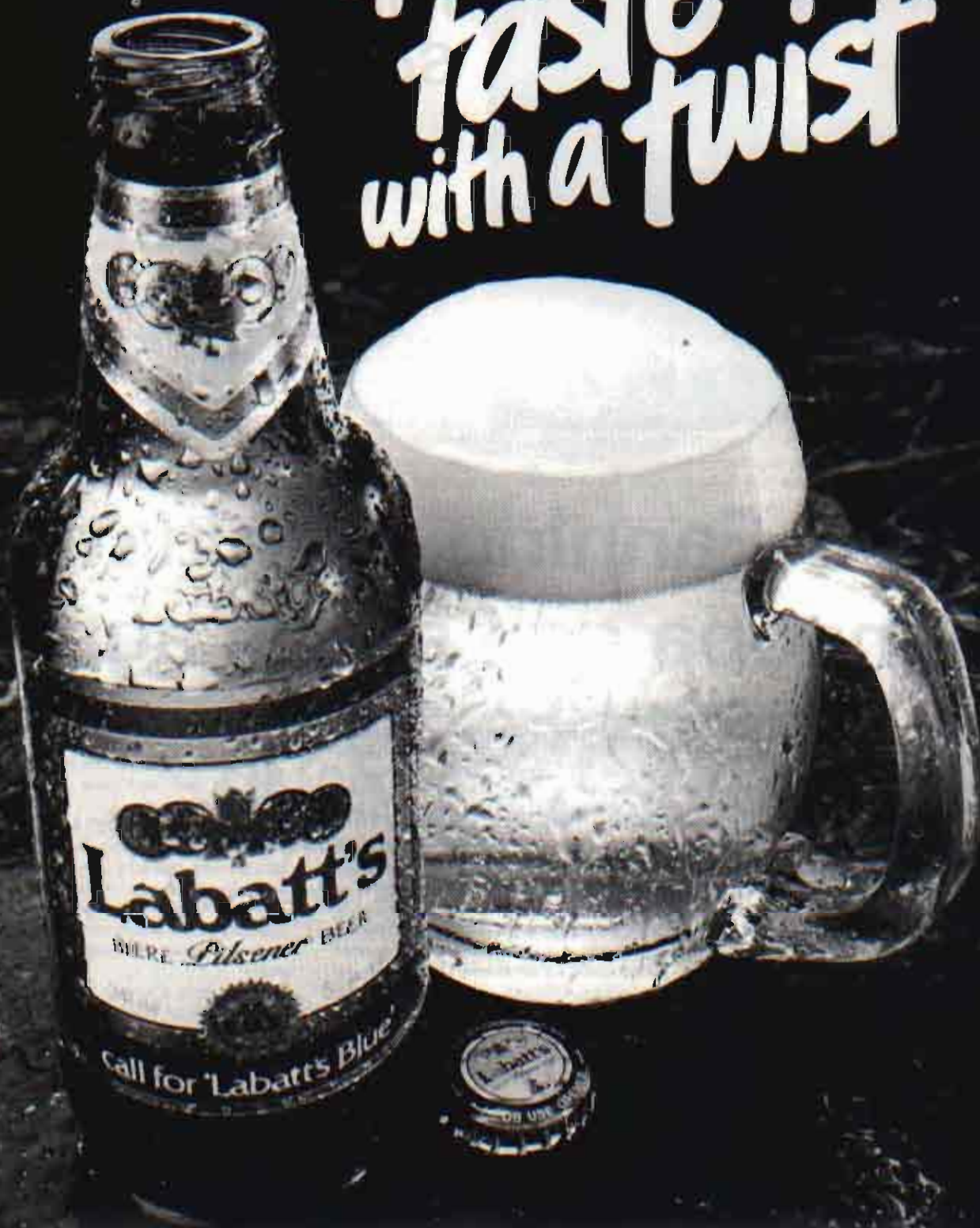
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Golfer of Year, Athlete of Year honors won by Southwood youth

Todd Fanning dominates Manitoba golf scene again.

For the second straight year, a young golfer from Southwood Golf and Country Club dominated the Manitoba golf scene in 1985.

For 17-year-old Todd Fanning, the accolades just kept pouring in long after the golf season had ended and into the current year as he surpassed his incredible feats of the previous year.

Fanning's 1985 golf accomplishments included: his second straight Manitoba Junior championship, a good showing in the Canadian Amateur championship at Saskatoon, the Canadian Junior championship and member of the winning interprovincial team, member of the winning team in the Manitoba junior inter-club competition, member of the winning team in the Manitoba/Minnesota matches.

In the previous year, Fanning had won both the Manitoba Junior and Amateur titles and played on both provincial teams, for which he was named Manito-

ba Golfer of the Year for 1984.

Fanning was again chosen as Golfer of the Year for 1985, but the honors didn't stop there.

He was also elected by the Manitoba Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association as Manitoba's male Athlete of the Year for 1985, the first golfer to win that honor since pro Dan Halldorson in 1980 and the first amateur golf winner since 1968 when Jimmy Doyle won the Canadian Amateur title.

Other golfers to win the honor were Ted Homenuik in 1961 and George Knudson in 1959 and 1960. Halldorson was also a double winner, first being honored in 1978.

Fanning was also named Manitoba Junior Athlete of the Year.

In both seasons, Fanning was the Manitoba winner of the Royal Canadian Golf Association's Junior Achievement Award, for which he earned a return trip to the Canadian Open cham-

pionship to observe the top tour players in action and have a chance to mingle with them.

Fanning won the 1985 Manitoba Golfer of the Year honors over two other players who played a very dominant role in the past season — Terry Hashimoto and Gail Anderson, both of St. Charles Country Club and both to be missing from the local competitive scene this year.

Hashimoto, a former two-time winner of the Golfer of Year honors (in 1976 and 1980), was a runaway winner of the Manitoba Amateur and anchor man on the Willingdon Cup team.

He turned professional last fall, made one attempt for his played card on the U.S. tour and plans to try again later this year. He's operating the pro shop at Bel Acres Golf Club this summer, as well as his Caddy Shed stores.

Anderson, also a former Golfer of the Year winner (1983), was also a runaway

winner in the women's amateur championship and anchored the Manitoba women's team in the national play.

She has been attending university in the south for the past three years and her family has now moved to Kelowna, B.C., so she won't be living in Manitoba this summer, but can be expected to be heard from out of British Columbia.

It marked the 11th year the Manitoba Golfer of the Year has been selected and honored with the Labatt trophy and large picture, which were presented by Labatt general Manager Vern Penner. In Todd's absence, the presentation was made to his mother.

Fanning was on hand to receive his Manitoba Athlete of the Year award at the annual presentation dinner held by the sportswriters association at the Hollow Mug at the International Inn in January.

Matt Poleschuk, then of Pine Ridge, was the first winner of the Manitoba Golfer of the Year award for the 1975 season. Hashimoto won in 1976 and 1980 and another double winner was Bill Parker, who won in 1979 out of Elmhurst and 1982 out of Breezy Bend.

The other former winners were Jimmy King of Elmhurst in 1977, Terry More of Elmhurst in 1978 and Shauna Gechel of Breezy Bend, who became the first female winner in 1981.

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THREE NEW MAJOR SPONSORS

Manitoba Open pot grows to \$50,000

Three new major corporate sponsors will provide the backing as the Manitoba Open Golf Championship moves into an era of bigger and better this year.

Pacific Western Airlines, Budget Rent A Car and ICG Liquid Gas are the new major sponsors.

Their contributions will go toward a record \$50,000 in prize money offered for the 1986 Manitoba Open, which will be played Aug. 22-24 at the Southwood Golf and Country Club.

The Manitoba Golf Association, along with the sponsors and Southwood have also announced this is the start of a three-year program which will see the Open played at the Southwood course with the purse to be increased each year.

Southwood was also the host club for the \$34,000 Manitoba Open in 1985, but the weather disrupted what was shaping up as a most successful event. MGA officials felt the Southwood volunteer workers deserved another opportunity to stage the competition.

The sponsors sought a three-year program to provide continuity over a time when it is hoped the Manitoba Open will grow.

The accessibility of the Southwood course to the public, with ample parking space provided through an agreement with the neighboring University of Manitoba, was a factor in the decision.

If the tournament is to be a success and draw large crowds, the feeling was that Southwood was equipped to handle the traffic.

A steering committee has been established to handle all financial aspects of the Open, with the Manitoba Golf Association to continue to be in charge of the actual tournament play.

The steering committee includes past president Keith Armstrong and treasurer Bob Forcand from the MGA, Council, Southwood open committee chairman Brian MacPherson and director of golf Barrie McWha from the golf club, and sponsor representatives Walt McAloney for PWA, Don Mitchell for Budget and Carl Best for ICG.

A major announcement was made in February to introduce PWA and Budget as major sponsors, with ICG Liquid Gas joining as a third corporate sponsor in April.



Southwood Golf and Country Club will be the host for the 1986 Manitoba Open championship and also for 1987 and 1988 following agreement with new sponsors and Manitoba Golf Association.

In addition to the major sponsors, the 1986 Manitoba Open will also have concessions support from Blackwood Beverages, Labatt's (Manitoba) Brewery, Hudson's Bay Wine and Spirits and possibly others as well as a group of Open patrons involved with the promotion of the event.

One of the major changes in the format for the 1986 Manitoba Open will be the elimination of the Kinsman Pro-Am tournament on the day before the 54-hole open starts. It will be replaced by an invitational event involving a top group of pros, with a bonus event for the others.

Dan Halldorson, a four-time winner of the Manitoba Open title and a regular on the U.S. pro tour, has made a firm commitment to return this year and has also convinced Dave Barr, his partner on the Canadian team which won the World Cup championship last year, to come along. Halldorson also hopes to convince some other tour players to pay a visit.

"I may be able to convince some of my friends that owe me something to take break from the tour, too," he said,

adding: "I don't know about Lori Finkel, though. He would probably drive over some of the greens at Southwood."

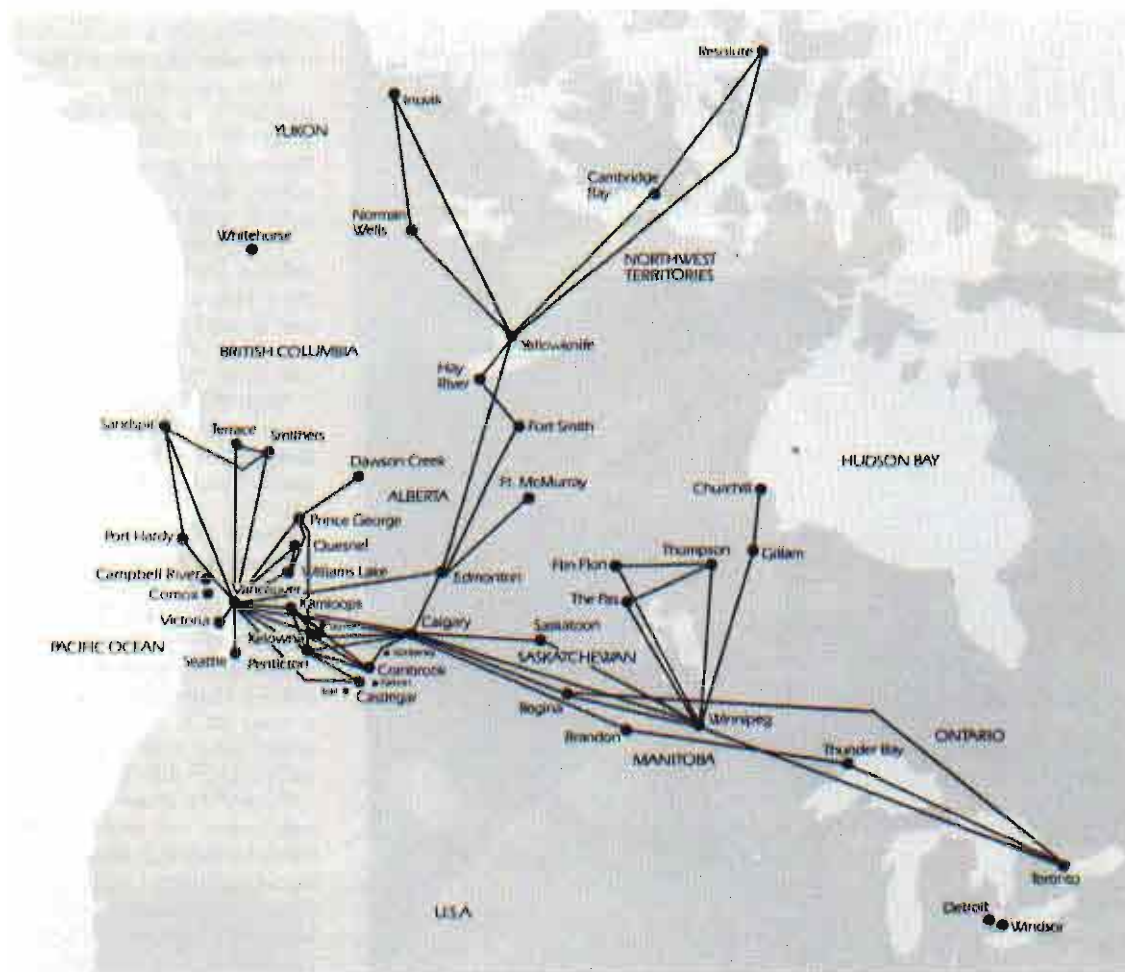
Bob Beauchemin of Sydney, B.C., president of the Tournament Players Division of the Canadian Professional Golfers Association, also assured Manitoba Open officials the tournament would get full support from the Canadian pros.

"The support from your corporate sponsors will have a dramatic effect on the calibre of players appearing," he told a February press conference called to announce the Open plans. "The TPD's goals are to promote a Canadian tour and elevate the image of the division players."

He also said the Manitoba Open dates would fit with B.C. Open the following week and there was an effort being made for another major tournament in the preceding week to tie in with the Manitoba event.

He was also sure most of the top Canadian professionals would take part since the Manitoba Open is included in the Labatt Order of Merit, which offers a \$25,000 bonus for the top five players in the tour of events.

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FIRST MAJOR TOURNAMENT VICTORY

Robbie Phillips wins abbreviated Manitoba Open '85

The story of the 1985 Manitoba Open golf championship should be written on a roller coaster or an elevator — there were so many ups-and-downs associated with it.

First there was the "up" feeling of the fact it was to be the biggest Manitoba Open in terms of money, offering \$34,000 in prize money and \$6,000 to the winner.

There was also an optimistic feeling about the enthusiasm showed by the volunteers from Southwood Golf and Country Club, a determination to make it the best Manitoba Open ever held.

With a good field assured, the event got off to a great start when no less than 17 professionals broke par at Southwood during the Kinsman Pro-Am event, stirring up plenty of interest among golf fans.

There were 13 par-busters as the 143 players completed their first round on the Friday, with a surprisingly large number of spectators on hand. This gave promise of record crowds for the weekend.

Then the torrential rains came and the down part of the coaster ride began. By Saturday morning it was apparent the second round would have to be called off.

There was so much water on the Southwood fairways, the ducks which usually dwell on the man made pond between the 11th and 18th holes were settling in on the first fairway instead.

As the day wore on and the rain continued, there was a feeling of despair among MGA officials and the Southwood gang which had been so enthusiastic just two days earlier.

During the afternoon, a big decision was made by tournament chairman Keith Armstrong, along with the Southwood committee and player representatives. Since Southwood was unplayable (as were most other courses in the city), the field would move out to Elmhurst, where a sandy base prevents heavy rainfall from sitting on the fairways. They would play there Sunday and the tournament would be reduced to 36 holes.

Again, the tournament outlook was on the upward swing. Southwood Open chairman Brian MacPherson and his excellent group of volunteers agreed to carry on their duties at Elmhurst and Elmhurst officials also pitched in to make it a successful day.

Despite cool, windy weather, mixed with a little more moisture, the second round was played at Elmhurst and again a surprisingly large number of spectators braved the elements to see it all happen. Many had to walk a fair distance to get to the course after parking along Garven Road, too.

The golfers had nothing but praise for all concerned, the Manitoba Golf Association, the Southwood gang who car-

ried on despite the disappointment of not completing the job that was started, the Elmhurst officials for their co-operation, and the fans who braved the cool weather to follow the players.

The 1985 Manitoba Open finished on a high note and when it was all over, 27-year-old Robbie Phillips of Jackson's Point, Ont., emerged as the champion.

He carded a one-under-par 70 at Elmhurst, a course he had never seen before, to go with a three-under-par 67 in the opening round at Southwood for a 36-hole score of 137 and a one-stroke victory — good for the \$6,000 first prize.

It was the first major tournament victory for Phillips, who was in his fifth year as a golf professional.

Only one behind was Bill Israelson of Bemidji, Minn., who also was playing for the first time at Elmhurst, where he shot 70 to go with his 68 in the first round at Southwood.

Two more strokes back there a four-way tie for third place with four-time champ and tournament favorite Dan Halldorson of Brandon and Winnipeg joined by Norm Jarvis of Richmond, B.C., Kelly Murray of Vancouver and Howard Atkinson of London, Ont., all at 140.

Michael Hutcheon, a young player from Thunder Bay, won the Hal Eidsvig trophy as low amateur in the field with a 36-hole score of 146, one better than Manitoba Amateur champ Terry Hashimoto of St. Charles and Jimmy Doyle and Chuck Arnason, both of Sandy Hook, who all used 147 strokes for the two rounds.

The best local pros in the tournament were Jim Steep of Glendale and Sandy Paterson of Breezy Bend, who both finished at 147.

In all, 40 pros got into the prize money with scores of 150 or better and there were 12 amateur prize winners at 153 or better.

Atkinson, a lefthander, had taken the lead in the first round at Southwood with a five-under-par 65, but he needed 75 strokes at Elmhurst.

Jarvis, Murray and Brian Vance of Ottawa shared runner-up honors in the first round with 66s, with Phillips grouped at 67 with Falcon Lake's Bud Edwards and Frank Edmonds of Thunder Bay.

Israelson was at 68, along with Daniel Talbot, Jean-Louis LaMarre and Dan Mijovic, while Halldorson and Paterson completed the par-breaking brigade with 69s.

The case for the top prize was an interesting one at Elmhurst on the Sunday. After 27 holes, there were only four strokes separating the top seven players.

Atkinson was still clinging to a narrow lead with 101, Phillips was at 102, Israelson, Murray and Vance all had 103, Jarvis was at 104 and Halldorson at 105 with nine holes to play.

In the Pro-Am event which kicked off the festivities at Southwood, Jim Rutledge of Victoria led the assault on Southwood's par with a nines of 32-33 for a five-under 65.

Grouped at 67 were Israelson, Talbot and two more U.S. players — Mike Bender of Iowa and Keith Parker of Florida.

Shooting 68 were Manitobans Ben Smirnov of John Blumberg and Stan Homenuik, of Dauphin, along with Brian Shaw and Terry Miskolczi of Toronto, Greg Olson of Ottawa and Dan Koesters of New Mexico.

The group at 69 included Pat O'Donnell of Pine Ridge along with Murray, Vance, Ray Stewart of Vancouver, Larry Sawchuk of Victoria and Kevin Dickey of Kingston.

Halldorson matched par with 70, along with Ian Doig of Seaforth, Ont., and B.C. swingers Terry Harper and Steven Anderson-Chapman.

Doig led his amateur mates Dave Ellis of Breezy Bend, Alf Sobkowich of Rossmore and Ray Brunel of Southwood to the pro-am team honours.

The 1985 Manitoba Open championship was certainly a tournament to remember and MGA and Southwood officials are hoping for a repeat on the enthusiasm of the workers and the fans, but not of the weather for this year's competition — again scheduled at Southwood in August.

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Dan Halldorson tells his story

Dan Halldorson, Manitoba's gift to the U.S. pro golf circuit, returned to Winnipeg in the cold of February to make an appearance at a press conference called by the Manitoba Golf Association and Southwood Golf and Country Club to announce plans for the enlarged Manitoba Open championship.

The fact he was in Winnipeg at that time of the year and the fact that he had convinced his golfing pal Dave Barr to also make a commitment to come here for the 1986 Open was enough to convince everyone in attendance that Halldorson still had deep feelings for Manitoba and will continue to do what he can to help golf in this province.

Halldorson, who teamed with Barr to give Canada the World Cup title last season, will return in August for the Open, an event he has won four times, and he will also continue to work to bring top calibre golfers to this event.

Back in February, Halldorson's golf game wasn't at its best. In fact, in his own words, he said his game had been "pretty lousy" at the time, but he hoped to have his "A game" going long before he returns here in August.

The 34-year-old Manitoban also took a little time for interviews with press, radio and television reporters and provided the following interview exclusively for the Manitoba Golf Annual:

Q: Give us a couple of thoughts about your season right now, the way times have started?

Halldorson:

Well, I'm working real hard, trying to find something, to get something going, and I'm hitting a lot of balls but I'm not progressing. All parts of my game are real bad right now. It's pretty hard to hit on one thing. My game mainly revolves around ball striking and I'm not hitting the ball very well and I don't know where it's going. I can't hit the shots I want to hit so that puts the pressure on the putting game and chipping game. That isn't very good because I know I'm not going to be making many birdies, 'cause I'm not hitting the ball right. It goes back and forth with each part of the game. It's a matter of getting back to hitting the ball better and then everything will fall into place, I think.

Q: You had a good first round in Hawaii?

Halldorson:

Yeah, but I did not hit the ball very well. I wasn't happy with it. I got away with murder sort of thing. That course isn't that hard, you know there were 87 guys under par so you can't say I played great or anything. It's just not very consistent. One day I'll come out hooking the ball and the next day I'll be doing something else.

Q: Do you think having this week off and getting away from it all will help?

Halldorson:

Well I played so much in the fall, which I wasn't going to do. I played until the 15th of December, then we started play in the Spalding tournament at the first of January, so I only had virtually about nine days off. I was just about golfed out by now. You know, we won the world title and we just kept on playing, which maybe I shouldn't have done.

Q: Can we go back to how everything started for Dan Halldorson here in Manitoba?

Halldorson:

I was born in Winnipeg and raised in Sandy Hook. I just played across the street at Jim Doyle's club and I just hung around there and played and played in a lot of junior tournaments and stuff and gradually just got playing and playing. I eventually moved to Brandon and worked for Richard Bull in the golf shop for a couple of months and he said: 'Why don't you try to play on the Canadian tour.' At that time there was the Peter Jackson tour and I thought well, I'll give it a shot. I got a little bit of money together and played. I didn't play very well, but I knew I wasn't going to play that well. But you know I had to go out and give it a try. I just kept on playing. I wintered in San Diego, hit balls all winter, came back and wound up playing on the Canadian tour and gradually got better. It's a long process you know. It took a couple of years to get anything going.

Q: You won the Manitoba Junior in 1970, did you ever compete in any of the Manitoba Amateurs?

Halldorson:

One. I was in just one Manitoba Amateur and I lost to Ted Homenuik in the quarter finals or something, I think. That was when it was match play and that was the only one I played in.

Q: Then you started coming back to the Manitoba Opens after you were on the tour?

Halldorson:

Yes, I played in a few opens and finally won in Manitoba in 1977. That was the first tournament I won. I was on the tour in 1975 and played in 1976, then I lost my playing privileges and came back and played in Canada. I won Manitoba, then won Saskatchewan the next week, so that got me going as far as the profession of golf is concerned.

Q: You lost your playing card that one time, were you ever in trouble again?

Halldorson:

The only time I was in trouble was two years ago when I was injured most of the year so I had to make some money at the end of the year. That was the only time I was in trouble.

Q: When was your first win on the tour?

Halldorson:

At Pensacola, it was the last tournament of 1980.

Q: And, that established you on the tour?

Halldorson:

Yes, I played well in 1980. I finished second at Tuscon at the beginning of the year. Then there was the win at Pensacola and Jim Nelford and I won the World Cup in the fall of 1980. Then the first tournament of the next year was Tuscon again and I finished third. I was leading going into the final round. So I played really well for those three weeks and I just kept on playing. I played very well in '80, '81 and '82, but '83 and '84 weren't very good. I had a lot of injuries and so I lost a couple of years there to injuries.

Q: Was last year your best year on the tour money-wise?

Halldorson:

Yes, by a couple of thousand dollars in official money, but I didn't play that well. I played well in spurts. I went through

a little bit of problems, a stretch where I started missing cuts in the summer. I missed about four cuts in a row. But, I ended up playing a lot. I like to play and I don't like to miss many weeks, but I gotta realize that I can't play every week. You have to be able to take some time off, then go back. I've been quite stubborn the last few years, trying to play too much. I'm playing like 42 weeks of the year, when I count in the Manitoba Open and other tournaments in Canada. It doesn't give me much time off.

Q: What tournaments will you come to Canada for this year?

Halldorson:

I'll be playing in Quebec, the Labatt Lite tournament, the Ontario and Quebec Opens, the Canadian Open, Manitoba and B.C. Opens and the CPGA. That will give me about six weeks in Canada.

Q: Can you describe a typical day on the tour?

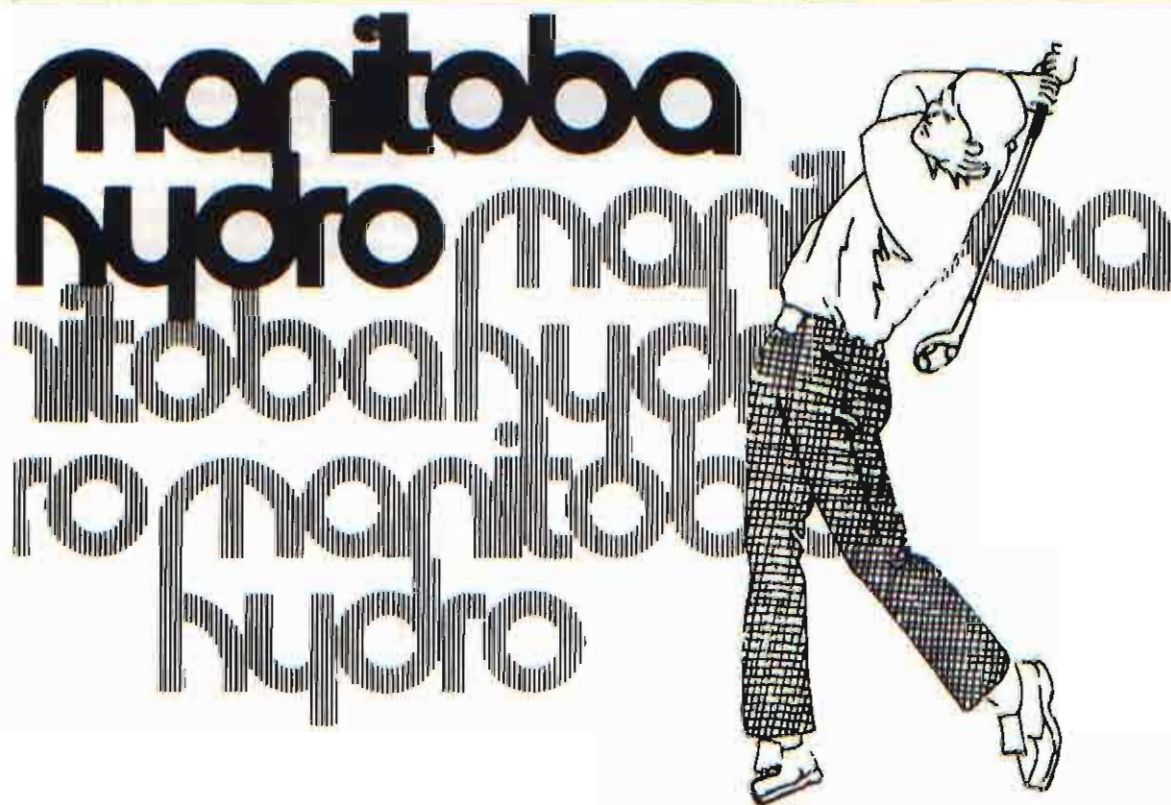
Halldorson:

Usually, if the previous tournament ends Sunday, you fly out Sunday night and go to the next site, get in there Sunday night. Or, you go to a pro-am and play the pro-am event Monday somewhere else. Then you go to the tournament, practice on Tuesday and if you're in a pro-am on Wednesday, you play the pro-am and practice again. Then you start the tournament Thursday. You play Thursday and Friday and if you make the cut, you play Saturday and Sunday. Then, you're back in the airplane again Sunday night or else you go to another town for another pro-am Monday and it's just a never-ending thing.

Q: Do you do most of your travelling by plane?

Halldorson:

Yes, but we did a little bit of driving last summer when we had the family out and drove to the U.S. Open and around Toronto. We just had the car for a while. But, it's not possible to travel by car on the tour any more. If you've got a car, your caddy may drive so you can have the car there for convenience of something.



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Q: You and Dave Barr won the World Cup last year and you're the best known, of course, but how about the other Canadians on the tour?

Halldorson:

Dick Sokol played very well last year. At the end of the year he played well, Jim Nelford had his unfortunate accident and is lost for at least a year or so. But, he's coming along. Mentally, he's not very well. He was fooling around hitting some golf balls recently, but there's not a golf swing there. He's busy with his therapy and if he can get mentally a little better he might come around a little quicker. He's working hard on his therapy and hopefully he'll come back. But, he's mentally very depressed and I guess that's understandable. But hopefully he can get that turned around and start to put on some weight. He lost a lot of weight.

Q: Do you have some favorite people you like to play with on the tour?

Halldorson:

I like Hubie Green, I play with him quite a bit and he's fun to play with. He's a very tough competitor and he works very hard at his game. Craig Stadler's fun to play with. He's very comical, loses his temper there once in a while. But, we're so busy with our own games that it's hard to pick favorites. You're out there just to play, you're not out there to watch the other guys. There are some good pairings and some good friends.

Q: There must be some people you don't like to play with as well?

Halldorson:

Well, yes there are. Right now the tour's getting so bad with slow play that they're starting to crack down with slow play.

It's the young guys coming up who are slowing the game down. They haven't had any real discipline in college when they played. That's the only thing that bothers you really, the slow play when you're waiting and waiting. You're supposed to play in four hours and 13 minutes and barring any bad weather conditions you should be able to do that easily.

Q: What would be your main advice you would give to a young Manitoba golfer who has aspirations of being tour pro?

Halldorson:

Well, you have to find a teacher you can trust, someone to work with, develop your game. You have to work real hard, obviously. It's a game that you cannot master. You have too many moving parts to control and your mind can't control all that.

It's a slow game. You've got too much time between shots, a lot of negative thinking can become involved. You've got so much time to waste before you hit your next shot.

It's not like tennis or ice hockey where it's an instinct and a reaction — an immediate reaction — and there is no real thinking involved.

It's done by experience and quick reaction, just instincts. That's what makes golf so hard. You have to work very hard at your golf swing all the time because it changes constantly. From day to day we don't know if we've got the same swing. We've got to work at it all the time.

Right now, for the young guys, I'd say learn how to putt because that's what they all do, putt very well. The older guys can concentrate on hitting the ball, not everybody putts so well. They young guys putt so well they don't care where they hit the ball because they know they can get it in the hole.

Really, the short game and putting, that's where the young guys make such big ground.

Fanning paces Manitoba sweep in Canadian Junior Championship

Never before has a province dominated the Canadian junior golf championship like Manitoba's representatives did in the 1985 championship event played last August at the Rossmere Golf and Country Club in Winnipeg.

Not only did the official Manitoba team win the interprovincial team competition, but two members of that team and two others from the host province also claimed the top four places in the individual competition.

Todd Fanning of Southwood was the pace-setter for this unprecedented Manitoba sweep, leading the way to the

come-from-behind team championship, then capping his performance by winning the Canadian junior championship.

Glenn Collins of St. Charles and Ken Tresoor and Dave McMillan, both of Rossmere, were Fanning's mates on the winning team over the 36-hole route.

Southwood clubmate David White finished in the runner-up spot behind Fanning in the 72-hole individual championship event, followed by Tresoor in third spot and Kevin Baker of St. Charles in fourth.

Royal Canadian Golf Association officials were unable to recall any province

in the past dominating the national junior competition in such a manner.

Fanning, two-time provincial junior champion, opened his successful bid for the Canadian title with a first-round 69, one under par and deadlocked with White, two strokes ahead of the nearest competitor. A double-bogey on the 18th hole cost Fanning the outright lead.

But, while Fanning and White were leading the individual battle, the other members of the Manitoba team all carded nine-over-par 79s and first-day team totals (best three scores used each day) had Manitoba at 227, tied in second

place with British Columbia but a full seven shots behind a surprising New Brunswick team, which was led by James English with 71 for a 220 total.

On the second day, Fanning and White again had matching scores, both shooting one-over-par 71s for two-day totals of 140, four ahead of Michael Carr of Ontario, who had the day's best effort, a 69.

Tresoor also chipped in with a 71, while Collins shot another 79 and McMillan carded 81. The three-man team score for the day was 221, making the 36-hole total 448 and moving Manitoba four shots ahead of New Brunswick, which slipped from its first-day 220 to a total of 232 in the second round to finish with 452, tied with Ontario and only one shot ahead of Alberta.

Round three saw Fanning take over sole possession of the lead as he matched par with a 70 for a three-round total of 210, three ahead of White, who slipped to 73, and eight ahead of Carr, who had a 74.

Baker also started to make his move as he carded 70 to go with earlier rounds of 75 and 76 to move into a three-way tie in fourth place. Garney Ve-zina of Quebec had the day's best round, a 69, and Brad Geer, the Min-

nesota State junior champion, shot 73 to join Baker at 221.

It was Tresoor's turn to turn in the day's best score in the final round, turning in a tidy 69 to finish with a 72-hole total of 293, good for third place, only one shot behind White, who slipped to a final-round 79 but held on to second place with a 292 total.

Fanning shot 75 in the final round to coast to the title, his total of 285 seven ahead of White.

Baker closed with a 74 for a 295 total to complete the Manitoba sweep of the top four places. Geer shot 75 for 196 in a fifth-place tie with Stephen Watson of B.C., who had a closing 71.

The juvenile championship was won by 16-year-old Christopher Barbour of Los Angeles with a 301 total, three ahead of Brennan Little of Ontario, with Jeff Helper of Glendale giving Manitoba a third-place finish at 307.

For 17-year-old Todd Fanning, winning the Canadian junior men's championship was the fulfilment of his season's goals. At the start of the season, he had listed three main goals: To win the Manitoba junior again, to play well in the Canadian amateur (which he did) and to win the Canadian junior.

It was a perfect season for the Southwood swinger, who then went south to attend university in Ohio. But, he will be back on the Manitoba scene this summer and it will be his final year as a junior.

He fully expects to be on hand to defend his Canadian junior title when the national event is played Aug. 26-29 at Edmonton, Alta.

A total of 19 Manitoba golfers participated in the 1986 Canadian Junior championship and 13 of them survived the 36-hole cut at 158, including four of the nine juvenile players, many of whom will likely be back in the chase this year.

Back-to-back Junior titles for Southwood's Todd Fanning

Like most of the 1985 golf scene in Manitoba, the junior story is mainly a story of one individual.

Todd Fanning of Southwood continued to dominate the local junior golf scene as he captured his second straight provincial title and, as detailed elsewhere in this issue, went on to the Canadian title and leading the Manitoba team to the national team honors.

Fanning had an eight-stroke edge as he captured the 1985 provincial junior title over a 72-hole route at Glendale Country Club, shooting rounds of 71-72-74-69 for a 286 total.

His one-under-par 69 on the final day was the only sub-par score recorded in the four-day test at the Glendale course.

Runner-up honors went to Rossmere's Ken Tresoor, who had rounds of 76-70-74-74 for 294, two ahead of Glenn Collins of St. Charles, who shot 75-72-73-76 for 296. Southwood's David White, the 1983 Manitoba junior champ, was fourth at 298 after rounds of 72-79-74-73; Dave McMillan of Rossmere finished with 299 on rounds of 73-73-76-77; and Kevin Baker of St. Charles was sixth with 75-74-73-78 for an even 300.

Fanning's 286 total was tops in the 17-18 age group, with Tresoor again the runner-up and McMillan topped the 16-and-under juvenile division with his 299, ahead of fellow Rossmere golfer Scott Parker, who had 306.

Parker also won the 13-14 age division over a 36-hole route with 80 and 78 for

158, ahead of Scott Roland of Florida, who had 80-86-166. The 12-and-under honors went to James Sichewski of Assiniboine, who shot 91-86 for 177 to edge Elmhurst's Jeff Lailey, who had 178 on rounds of 88-90.

Junior team trials

The scene switched to Rossmere as the low 16 from the junior championship played two more rounds in provincial junior team trials.

Fanning added scores of 76-71 to make his six-round total 433 to lead the team test. Tresoor shot 77-75 for a 446 total in second spot and McMillan found his home course to his liking as he shot 73-79 to grab third place with 451.

The big battle shaped up for the fourth spot on the final day with Collins making a comeback on the back nine to edge White for the team berth. Collins had 81-76 for a six-round total of 453 and White shot 79-77 for 454.

The four teams members were joined by White, Rob Anderson and Kevin Baker, both of St. Charles, and Mark Solomon of Elmhurst to make up the Manitoba's eight-man team for the annual Manitoba/Minnesota team matches.

The story of Manitoba's success at the national junior championships at Rossmere are documented in a separate article.

Junior Inter-Club

The provincial junior inter-club championship was the next event on the junior calendar and Southwood coasted to

a 10-stroke victory over Rossmere in the competition held at Bel Acres Golf and Country Club, Aug. 2.

Dave White paced the winners with a one-under-par 71, while Todd Fanning contributed a 72. Tim Stone shot 75 and Todd Brunel had 81 for a team total of 299.

Rossmere was led by Ken Tresoor's 74, while Scott Parker had 76, Bruce McGarry 77 and Dave McMillan 82 for a total of 309.

Elmhurst finished third at 315, led by Mark Solomon's par-72 round in which he was five under par through 12 holes, then slipped on the final six. Jim West had 79, Derrick Smythe 81 and Jeff Lailey 83 to round out the Elmhurst team.

Next in line among the city clubs were St. Charles with 317, Glendale with 330 and Breezy Bend with 331.

Among the rural teams, Selkirk captured the honors with 328, four ahead of Dauphin. The Selkirk team was led by Myles Zybloski's 80, with Darin Dunlop shooting 81, Mark Szewczyk 83 and Terry Homenuik 84.

Dauphin was paced by Greg McIver with 78, while Bruce Lockhart had 81, Rob Darnsgaard 86 and Scott Snitka 87.

Third place went to Thompson with 337, followed by Portage la Prairie with 349, Wheat City (Brandon) with 350 and Oakview (Gretna) with 357.

Western Canada Junior

The Windemere Golf and Country Club at Edmonton was the scene for the 1985 Western Canada Junior Men's

team matches, won by Alberta with a three-round total (best three scores each round) of 686, with British Columbia second with 692, Manitoba third with 695 and Saskatchewan last with 703.

Tom Relf of Brandon led the Manitobans with rounds of 79-75-74 for a total of 228. Glendale's Jeff Helper shot 76-75-82 for 233, Colin Drewe of Southwood had 81-83-76 for 240 and Scott Parker of Rossmore had 77-84-80 for 241.

Relf finished in a tie for second place in the individual competition, one shot out of the lead. Helper, who was also in contention through the first two rounds, faded to eighth place.

Manitoba/Minnesota Matches

A great comeback in the individual matches on the second day led Manitoba to its third victory against only one loss as the fifth annual Manitoba/Minnesota international junior matches were held Aug. 8-9 at the Moorhead Country Club in Minnesota.

The Manitobans had fallen behind 5-3 in the first day team matches but they struggled through a steady rain to win six of the eight individual matches for an overall 9-7 victory.

Todd Fanning and Mark Solomon scored a 4-and-3 victory over Minnesota's Brad Geer and Mike O'Toole for two points and Ken Tresoor and Rob Anderson teamed up to tie Minnesota's Jeff Stadheim and Curt Sandness for a single point in the team event.

David White and Glen Collins were defeated 4-and-2 by Chris Daniels and John Greneagle of Minnesota, while Dave McMillan and Kevin Baker fell 5-and-3 to Minnesota's John Young and Rick Passolts.

In the singles matches, Collins defeated Passolts 1 up, White topped Young 5-and-4, Baker downed Greneagle 3-and-2, Solomon edged Sandness 1 up, Anderson got by O'Toole 1 up and Fanning defeated Stadheim 2-and-1 for Manitoba victories, while Geer, the Minnesota state champ, defeated Tresoor 2-and-1 and Daniels got by McMillan, also 2-and-1, for the Minnesota wins.

A total of 31 teams took part in the event and it has been decided to follow the same format for 1986.

Rossmore emerged as the top team for the series, winning twice and finishing second once and, tying Elmhurst for top spot on the final outing. Glendale and Elmhurst tied for second over the four weeks. Selkirk led the rural contingent, ahead of Dauphin and Steinbach.

Mundie Putter

The MGA junior team finished a creditable fifth place in the A division of the Mundie Putter League in the 1985 season. The team was edged by Pine Ridge, 6 1/2 - 5 1/2, in the quarterfinal round.

While participation in the A division had provided important experience for the leading junior golfers last season, it has been decided the younger players available this season will likely benefit more from playing in the B division, aiming to try to qualify for A division in 1987.

Junior Camps

Three separate junior golf camps were

championship finished in the top 16 and
11 of the 13 who participated in the
Canadian junior championships qualified
for all four rounds.

billeted in private homes with all meals
at the Carman Golf Club.

The 20 golfers involved in the 1985

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Rules officials may face unusual circumstances

Manitoba Golf Association rules officials are often seen riding around in golf carts during official tournaments, but not too many golfers actually see the rulings that have to be made.

While most rule decisions are fairly routine and require no more than a good understanding of the official rules of the game, there are sometimes some unusual circumstances to consider and a conference is sometimes required before a decision is handed down.

To illustrate this point, MGA Rules Chairman E.K. (Bud) Foster has selected five out-of-the-ordinary rules decisions which have been given at golf tournaments in Manitoba in recent years:

**By E.K. (BUD) FOSTER
MGA Rules Chairman**

1. At a junior tournament at Rossmere, a bush had grown up beside the tree in the eighth fairway and the player's ball came to rest in the bush, about one foot off the ground.

A brisk wind was blowing and swaying the bush and the player requested a ruling from Dr. Dwight Parkinson because he didn't want to hit a moving ball (Rule 14-5, two-stroke penalty).

Dr. Parkinson got on the two-way radio to discuss the question and it was decided it was covered by a decision by the Royal and Ancient and the United States Golf Association which deemed that the ball was not moving in relation to the bush and no penalty is incurred if the ball is played.

2. Players A and B were engaged in a match play tournament. On the fifth hole at Elmhurst, player A hit a nine-iron short to the fringe of the green. Player B hit his shot and it was seen to land directly in front of A's ball.

When they arrived at the green, it was discovered B's ball had created a big divot on the fringe of the green in A's line of putt. They called for a ruling and, while Rule 13-2 states that A is not allowed to improve his lie by pressing down divots, two rules supercede it — Rule (1-4) Equity and Rule (20-3b), which state that a player is entitled to the lie the stroke gave him.

He is allowed to place his ball in a similar lie to that he had before player B's ball arrived, not nearer the hole, without penalty.

There are two things to note: (a) this holds true in match and stroke play, and (b) if B's divot had been there before A's ball arrived, A could not get relief.

3. In the Jack Blair match play event at Elmhurst, a 12 inch fir tree was planted behind the 13th green and it was assumed by the greens superintendent that balls would be moved away. However, player A's ball came up against it and player B didn't agree that A had a lift.

Player A nudged the ball with a putter and then (in error) declared his intention of playing a second ball. When the referee arrived and the situation was explained, he had to award the hole to player B because as soon as A hit a second ball in match play he lost the hole (Rule 3-3).

8. The Manitoba Golf Association provides and does all of the arranging for our Provincial Teams participating. We determine the method of selection for all Provincial Teams in Junior Men, Men's Amateur and Senior Men's. We dress them, we help feed them, the Royal Canadian Golf Association provides transportation and helps to feed them and they get excellent accommodations. No member of a Manitoba Golf Team needs to put his hand in his pocket except for alcoholic beverages and long distance telephone calls.

INFORMATION

Through the office of the Executive Director, the Manitoba Golf Association can provide information on most questions to arise concerning golf in Manitoba and Canada, or has access to the information.

Inquiries come from the public as well as the Manitoba Golf Association members.

Examples of questions asked include: Rules of Golf and Rule Books, Organization of Tournaments, Clinics and Instruction, Tournament Scheduling, Golf

Resorts — Provincial and International, Golf Consultant Enquiries, Green Chairman Information, Course Rating and the list goes on and on.

The Manitoba Golf Association is the source in Manitoba for all Membership Cards, Official Handicap System Cards and Posters, Rule Books and Decisions Book on the Rules of Golf.

The Manitoba Golf Annual, published by the Association, is sent to all member clubs for distribution to their membership. This publication has become very highly regarded throughout the whole of Canada. We ask member clubs of the Manitoba Golf Association to support the Annual by placing ads telling others what your course has to offer the people of Manitoba.

HOW ARE WE FUNDED?

- Bear in mind that 50 percent of our

yearly membership dues go to support the Royal Canadian Golf Association programs and 50 per cent is retained by the Manitoba Golf Association. You are a member of both Associations and helping to promote and develop golf in Manitoba. Annual dues are \$6 per adult male over 18 years. Instruction camp fees are kept to a minimum to cover food costs, usually around \$25. Instruction Clinics done at the club or area are conducted by the Association staff at no charge.

Members may sometimes ask "What do I get out of my Manitoba Golf Association membership". The answer is, of course, that you may get nothing out of it if you don't participate with body or mind.

By paying your membership fee you and your club are supporting the organization of golf in the Province and in Canada, and helping along the Junior Programs and the Adult Programs. It is only by maintaining a strong structure at these levels, as well as at the club level, that the sport you love will continue to grow from the grass roots up.



Official distance markers to show point of measurement on the tees are to be given to each member club of the Manitoba Golf Association after it has been officially rated. The sets of nine or 18 are to be presented at no cost to the clubs, made available because the MGA made a profit on bingo operations in 1985 and felt this money should be shared with the member clubs.

What player A should have done was take his free lift and play out the hole, appeal to the referee and, in this case, he would have been given a favorable answer.

4. At the Manitoba Open at Niakwa, one professional tried to con Dr. Parkinson (such stupidity) on the 18th hole. The player hit his ball up against a large tree stump. About 4 1/2 feet away was a path (obstruction).

He stretched to the full limit of his stance and claimed relief. Dr. Parkinson pointed out the "exception" in Rule 24-2 which indicates no relief will be given if interference by an immovable obstruction would only occur through the use of an unnecessarily abnormal stance, swing or direction of play. Tough luck.

5. At Rossmore, in the Canadian Junior Championship, I was called to the 16th hole, which borders on the practice fairway. I noticed the ball recovery machine at the end of the practice fairway, so he was asked to return.

A group of people started the task of checking the hundreds of balls. The player had marked his ball with a square on the numbers and it was found after several minutes. The next question was, where was the player to drop the ball.

I asked the other players the line of flight, which was over a bunker, and it must have reached the practice area to have been picked up by the machine. With these facts known, a place was determined where the player was instructed to drop the ball.

Under rule 18-1, a ball at rest moved by an outside agency shall be replaced before playing another stroke.

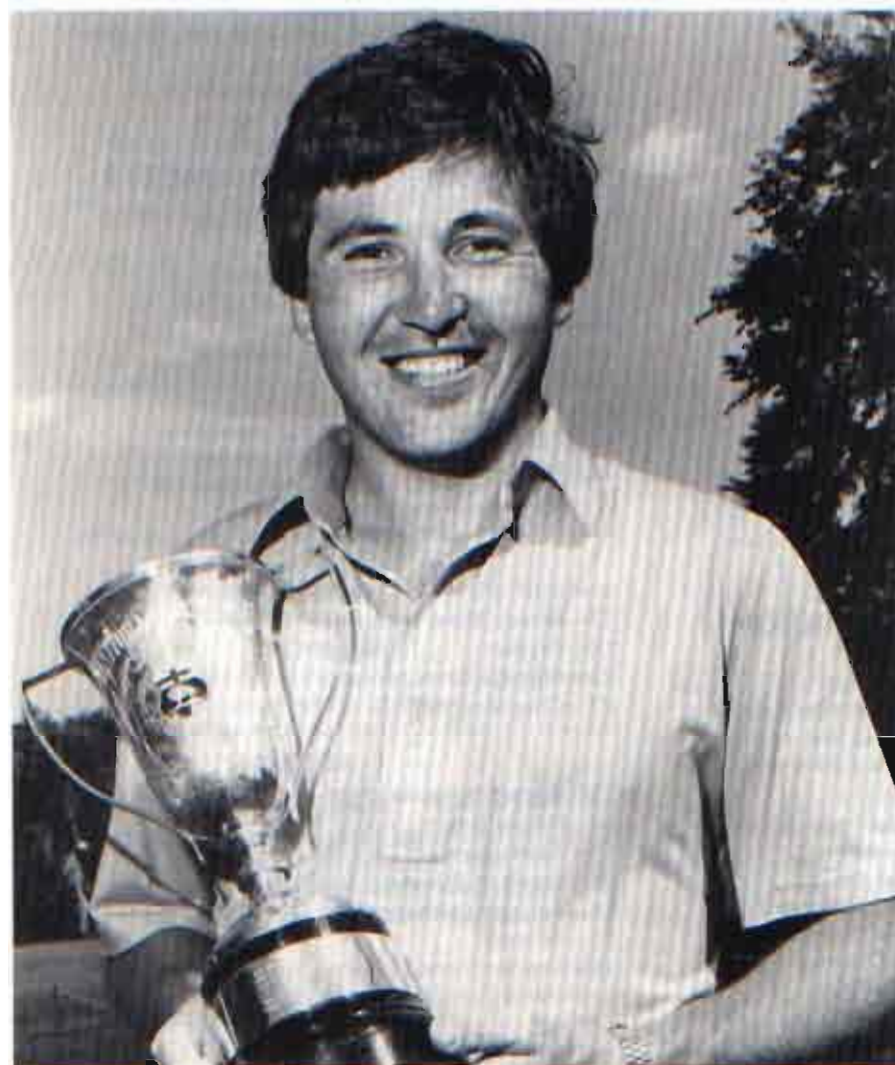

Terry Hashimoto runs away with Manitoba Amateur title

Firing four consecutive sub-par rounds, Terry Hashimoto of St. Charles completely dominated the Manitoba Amateur golf championship for 1985.

His 72-hole score of 281 (one round at Elmhurst, three at Pine Ridge) was six under par and he finished a full 14 strokes ahead of his nearest competitor, Michael Hutcheon of Thunder Bay.

Hashimoto also coasted through the Willingdon Cup team trials and wound up the leader on the Manitoba team, which included Glen Hnatiuk of Selkirk, Jim Doyle of Sandy Hook and Darcy Furber of Pine Ridge.

A hole-in-one on the 217-yard fourth hole at Elmhurst got 27-year-old Hashimoto off to a fine start and he completed that opening round with a two-under-par 69.

Moving across the road to Pine Ridge for the remaining games, Hashimoto toured the par-72 layout in 70-71-71 to complete his sensational four-day assault on two of the better Manitoba golf courses.

His 271 total was the lowest score for the Manitoba Amateur since the conversion to stroke play. It was also Hashimoto's first Manitoba title, after being in the runner-up position in 1980 and 1981.

His 14-stroke margin over second-place Hutcheon was also a record margin of victory.

Hutcheon, just graduated from junior ranks, was able to show his heels to the rest of the Manitoba golfers, but was no match for Hashimoto in this event. The Thunder Bay golfer shot 73-74-71-77 for a 295 total.

Senior golfer Gord Lenton of Pine Ridge and Winnipeg Jets hockey Ron Wilson of Breezy Bend were next in line

with 297, followed by Furber at 298, Hnatiuk, Carl Lechman and Dave Komora of Rossmere and Ken Warwick of Windsor Park, all at 299, Doyle and Duke Asmundsen of Pine Ridge at 301, Junior champ (and defending Amateur champ) Todd Fanning and Chris Nelson, both of Southwood, Todd Teplitski of Pine Ridge and former champ Gary Kullman of Rossmere, all at 302, and junior Ken Tresoor of Rossmere and Dave Lavallee of Falcon Beach at 303.

The 1985 Amateur championship had another claim to fame as two holes-in-one were registered. On the heels of

Hashimoto's ace on the Elmhurst 4th hole in the opening round, Ken Tresoor sank his tee shot on the 180-yard 14th hole at Pine Ridge on the second day.

It took a score of 156 or better to qualify for the final two rounds of medal play in the championship flight under a new format which allowed for the low 60 and ties to qualify, with four other flights of match play. It took 36 hole scores between 157 and 163 to remain in the match-play portion.

In the matches, Jim Scollan of Elmhurst won the first flight with a 5 and 4 victory over clubmate Barry Chipka in

the final; the second flight was won by Gene Hodgson of Brandon, who edged Pine Ridge's Bill Baluk on the 20th hole; Bill Zeweniuk of St. Boniface defeated Glendale's Michael Averbach of Glendale 3-and-2 to win the third flight; and Kerry Trotman of Tuxedo won the fourth flight with a 4-and-3 victory over Larry Johnston of Dauphin.

Twenty-five players scored 306 or lower to qualify for two additional rounds in the Willingdon Cup team trials, but two of them withdrew, leaving 23 to play at St. Charles.

Though he was in a favorable position to try for a team spot, Gord Lenton opted to drop out because the Canadian Amateur championship was to be played at Saskatoon at the same time as the Manitoba Senior championship. Lenton opted to go the senior route. (As it turned out, he failed to make the Manitoba senior team).

Todd Teplitski also dropped out of the Willingdon trials to leave on his honeymoon, which had been delayed to play in the amateur. He subsequently has become the Manitoba Golf Association's new technical director, taking over those duties in February, as detailed elsewhere in this issue.

Hnatiuk and Doyle made the big moves and Furber played steady golf to join Hashimoto on the Manitoba Willingdon Cup team.

Hnatiuk toured St. Charles in rounds of 72 and 70 for two-under-par 142 in the team trials to grab the second berth on the team with 441. Hashimoto shot 75 and 77 and cruised to a 433 total for the top spot.

Doyle shot 71 and 73 for 144 at St. Charles to earn the third berth with 445 and Furber had a pair of 75s for 150 and a six-round total of 446 for the final team spot.

Ron Wilson of Breezy Bend and Chris Nelson of Southwood were next in line, both finishing with 449, followed by a trio of Rossmere players, Gary Kullman, Dave Komora and Carl Lechman, all with 450. Duke Asmundsen of Pine Ridge was next with 451, junior Kevin Baker of St. Charles had 453 and junior champ Todd Fanning of Southwood and Windsor Park's Ken Warwick had 454.

At the Canadian Amateur and Willingdon Cup team matches at Saskatoon, the Manitobans had a one-over-par total of 217 (best three scores) on opening day, but it was only good for fourth place, five behind the leaders. Problems on the back nine in the second round proved to be the team's undoing and the

325 total gave Manitoba a total of 442, back in eighth place and 17 strokes behind the winning team from Alberta.

Hashimoto gave a fine performance in the individual Amateur chase, shooting rounds of 71-72-71-73 for a one-under par 287 total, only four behind the winning Brent Fanklin of Calgary, who won after a playoff over Stu Hamilton of Brampton after they tied for the honors at 283. Hashimoto was tied in eighth place.

Six other Manitoba golfers competed in the Canadian Amateur in addition to the four team members. Five of the 10 Manitobans survived the 36-hole cut and played the final two rounds.

Fanning and Lavallee finished in a tie for 39th place with 297 totals. Fanning shot 77-71-75-74 while Lavallee had 73-77-72-75. Tresoor was tied for 62nd place with rounds of 73-77-81-75 for 306 and Furber was 71st with 73-76-81-82 for 312.

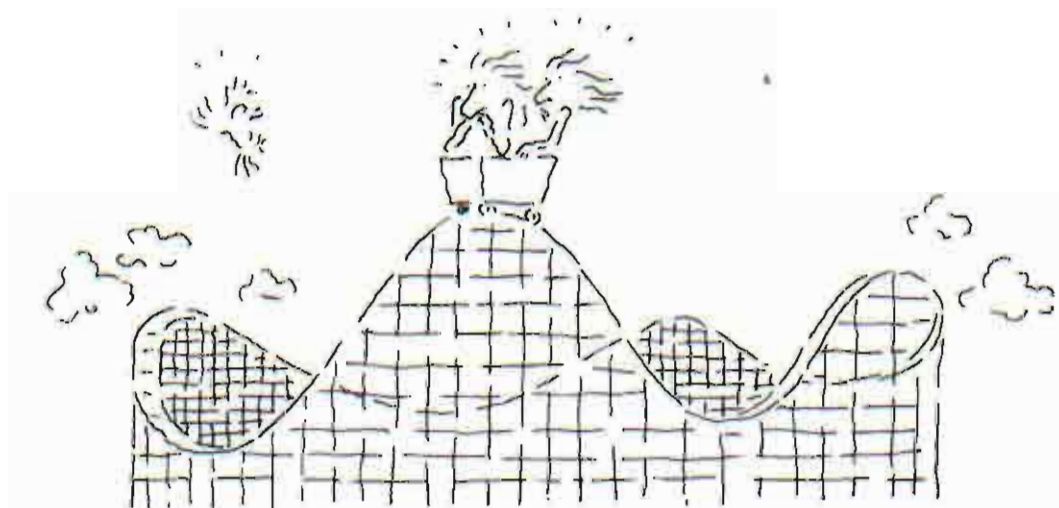

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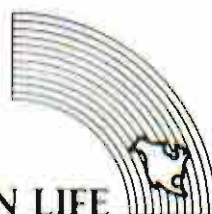

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Phil Hall prevails in Rural Amateur test

If it proved nothing else, the 1985 edition of the Manitoba rural amateur and senior golf championship proved the province's rural golfers were either very hardy, or very foolish, or both.

High winds and plenty of rain marred the second day of the 36-hole competition held Aug. 11-12 at the Hecla Island, making the course almost unplayable by the end of the day.

But, only 25 of the 160 golfers failed to complete their second round, despite the soggy conditions, and it even took an extra five holes before a champion could be determined.

Phil Hall of Brandon prevailed with a birdie on the fifth hole to claim the title over Bob Genoway of Morden after both had posted 151 totals over the two rounds.

Hall kidded as he teed off in the rain for his second round that he enjoyed playing in adverse weather, but even he admitted he got more than he bargained for this time.

The 44-year-old Brandon golfer, who won the Clear Lake Tamarack tournament in 1984, shot a respectable three-

over-par 75 in the wind and rain to go with an opening 76 for his 151.

Genoway, who shared the halfway lead with a 73 in the good weather of opening day, slipped to 78 in the bad weather for his 151. Paul Murray of Brandon, who shared the lead at 73, skied to 90 in the second round to finish well back at 163.

Four-time champion Bruce North of Carman finished in third place with 75-78-153, followed by Gary Poole of Brandon, 77-79-156; Darren Hargreaves of Neepawa, 74-82-156; and Bill North of Carman, 77-82-159.

There was also a playoff needed to settle the rural senior title, but it went only one hole and was completed before the really bad weather settled in.

Carman's Barrie Sanders claimed his fourth straight rural senior crown as he won the playoff over John Martens, also of Carman, with a par on the first extra hole.

Sanders had the first-round lead with an 80, three ahead of Martens, but the champ needed 81 for his second round while Martens caught up with a 78.

Wally Goshalak of Dauphin was third with 85-83-168.

The Championship flight and seven other flights were determined after the first round, rather than by handicaps, which provided close competition in most of the flights.

The Championship flight had 16 players with scores of 73 to 77, there were 23 in the first flight with scores of 78-81, 20 in the second flight, with scores of 82-83, 15 in the third, all with 84; 17 in the fourth with 85-86, 19 in the fifth with 87-89, 20 in the sixth with 90-93 and 15 in the final flight with 94-100. The senior division had 15 players with scores ranging from 80 to 99.

Brian Clark of Brandon won the first flight with 78-81-159, followed by Brian Johnston, Dauphin, 80-80-160; and Grant Miller, Brandon, 79-81-160.

The second flight had Earl Timmons of Thompson, Keith Fawcett of Neepawa and Herb Dick of Winkler all with 82-83-165.

In the third flight, Sheldon Bouchard of Morden led the way with 84-82-166, followed by Bill Bolvin, Pinawa, 84-85-169; and Bruce Nerbas, Pinawa, 84-87-171.

The fourth flight was won by Greg McIvor of Dauphin with 85-82-167, followed by Eldon Patzer of Swan River and Jim Renwick of Brandon, both with 85-83-168.

Zone play will be held during the season again this year, with the zone winners again to travel to Shilo for the Meagher Beefeater finale Sept. 7.



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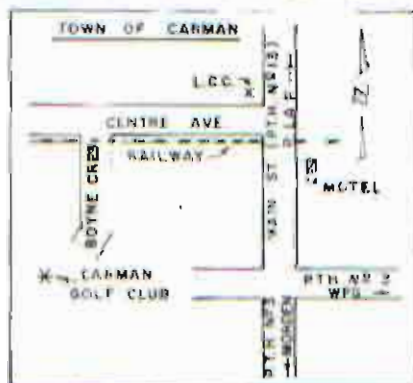
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Professionals provide variety of services

The golf professional is a key figure at most golf clubs, yet many members are unaware of the variety of services the professional provides.

The professional works closely with the club manager and golf course superintendent to ensure the entire club operation is running smoothly. Along with many other duties, the professional is directly responsible for preparing a budget, hiring and scheduling staff, golf course starting times, merchandising, inventory control, accounting, conducting junior programs and club events, teaching, club repairs, power carts, club storage and the driving range operation.

A question frequently asked is "How do you become a golf professional?" The answers to that question are varied but pre-requisites for the job include an ability to play the game proficiently, a love for the sport, and a strange desire to work long hours in the summer.

Actually, the club professional is very well qualified to provide the services the members are entitled to expect. To become a Class A Head Professional member of the Canadian Professional Golfers' Association a professional has to have completed an extensive training program and upon achieving this status must continue to recertify to maintain his status.

All new applicants must attend an interview before they are eligible to apply for membership. After the interview, they must successfully complete a 36-hole playing ability test before they are accepted.

A successful applicant then must enroll in the CPGA Professional Development Program, complete yearly educational material and reports, complete home study and on-the-job training programs and attend zone or national educational seminars.

These seminars are held on a variety of topics and include: golf shop operations, club design and repair, teaching, the organization and conduct of a complete golf program, basic course maintenance, basic club management and organization, employee and contract negotiations and small business management.

Before completing this five-year apprentice program, the applicant must also pass a final playing ability test and a six-hour written Class A Examination.

The Canadian Professional Golfers' Association is committed to maintaining the high standards of the profession and to the continued development of educational programs for its members.

The increasing number of qualified professionals completing the program each year will benefit the club member in the future through the many services which the professionals will be able to provide.

In Manitoba alone there are at least a dozen qualified Class A Associate Professionals currently working as assistants at clubs. Clubs without professionals or those in rural areas who have never had a golf professional on staff should seriously consider the talents these young professionals have to offer.

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History of Superintendents' organization dates back to 1950

The Manitoba Greenskeepers Association, the forerunner of our president organization, was formed on October 25, 1950, at Glendale Golf and Country Club when the following officers were elected:

President — A.C. (Cy) Creed
Vice-President — John B. Steel Sr.
Treasurer — Frank MacDonald
Secretary — Stan Walker

Five months later, on March 14, 1961, with 11 members in attendance, a constitution was approved and Sam Hutchings, Arthur Baker and George Beattie were elected as directors.

These seven gentlemen formed the first executive committee of the small organization. Today, the organization has a membership of more than 130.

The name of the group was changed to the Golf Course Superintendents' Association of Manitoba on March 28,

1955, to better reflect the duties of the members.

After a meeting with Dean Weir of the University of Manitoba, turf plots were established at the University for research on April 21, 1958, with the G.C.S.A.M. providing support, starting with \$750 in 1958 to the \$1,500 which was turned over in 1985.

At the association's 25th anniversary reception held October 23, 1975, a bursary fund was established to aid students in obtaining their diplomas in turf-grass management. The fund was set at \$250 per student. Since then, the association has aided at least one student each year and some years as many as three.

Two new events were started in 1984:
1. The Turf Research Golf Tournament, held August 9 at Bel Acres, with the proceeds shared by the University of Manitoba turf plot and the Canadian Turf Research Foundation.

Last year, this event was a huge success, raising more than \$4,000. This

year's Turf Research Tournament will again be held at Bel Acres on August 15.

2. The Superintendent of the Year Award was initiated, not necessarily dependent on the superintendent's performance that "one" particular year, but rather a combination of the following:

- a) recipient must be a Class A member in good standing with the G.C.S.A.M.
- b) contribute to the association
- c) contribute to committees and/or programs for the better education of our turf industry.
- d) overall ability as a superintendent in terms of care and grooming of turf.
- e) awarded by standard vote of executive at the last meeting held before the annual general meeting.

The first recipient of the award was Jack Davies of Southwood in 1984 and the 1985 award went to Helmut Kopp of St. Charles.

At one time, it was thought that a Greenskeeper (we are now classified as Superintendents) had the art for growing good turf, but it is not only an art, it is also a science.

Members of this association attend turf seminars and conferences throughout the off-season, keeping abreast of new ideas in turf management.

We meet monthly throughout the golf season at various golf courses, to converse and view other course maintenance practices and to provide assistance if members are experiencing a problem.

We call them monthly management meetings. These are some of the ways we learn about improving the turf on which you play golf.

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Steel gets Distinguished Service Award

John Burns Steel, former Golf course superintendent at St. Charles Country Club, now retired, was honored with the Distinguished Service Award (DSA) from the Golf Course Superintendent's Association of America at the 57th Annual Conference in San Francisco Jan. 31 to Feb. 4.

Steel is only the second Canadian to win the DSA and the only recipient from Western Canada. The DSA is the highest and most distinguished award bestowed for outstanding achievement by the GCSAA.

Steel started employment at St. Charles Country Club in 1932 and became superintendent in 1945, retiring from that position in 1977.

He was literally overwhelmed when notified he would receive the award last October, and looked forward to attending the conference. Unfortunately, he suffered a stroke on Dec. 29 which affected his communication skills, but after considerable concern, is regaining his former skills — thanks to the qualified therapists at Deer Lodge Centre, where he now resides.

His son, John Donald Steel, attended



the conference to receive the Award on his behalf.

Steel was nominated for the DSA by his peers for these contributions:

- founding member and past-president (three times) of the Golf Course Superintendent's Association of Manitoba
- Founding member and first president of the Canadian Golf Course Superintendents Association

- Founding member of the Canadian Turfgrass Research Foundation
- Founding committee to establish test plots for research in Manitoba
- Citizen member of the St. James Assiniboine Parks Board from 1970-1974.

At the present time, Steel is an Honorary Life Member of the Canadian Golf Course Superintendents Association; Honorary Life Member of the Golf Course Superintendents Association of Manitoba; Quarter Century Member (has been a member for 41 years and the first member from Manitoba) of the Golf Course Superintendent's Association of America; AA Life Member of the G.C.S.A.A.; Certified Golf Course Superintendent; Honorary Life Member of St. Charles Country Club.

Steel is a past president of the Assiniboine Memorial Curling Club.

He has attended 20 Turfgrass Conferences and shows in Canada and 27 G.C.S.A.A. conferences. He has been a speaker on the program of numerous conferences and seminars.

On Feb. 5, Steel was presented with the DSA at the Deer Lodge Centre.

Barrie Sanders first rural golfer to win Senior championship

Barrie Sanders of Carman became the first golfer from rural Manitoba to win the Manitoba senior men's championship as he came from behind to capture the 1985 honors at St. Boniface Golf Club in August.

As former champions fell by the wayside, Sanders was joined on the Manitoba senior team by Jim Isaac of St. Charles and Max Desaulniers and Bill MacCallum of Elmhurst.

Defending champion Smiley Meronek of St. Charles and former winners Nick Mickoski of Elmhurst, Gord Lenton of Selkirk and Pine Ridge and Bill Pidlaski of Elmhurst all faded out of the picture along the route, though Meronek emerged as the winner in the 65-69 age group.

Isaac was the early leader in the 54-hole tournament, carding a two-over-par 72 in the opening round for a two-stroke lead over Sanders and Ken MacCharles of St. Boniface, both with 74-s. Mickoski had 75 and Desaulniers and Pidlaski carded 77s.

The lead remained with Isaac through the second round as he shot 78 for a 150 total, only one better than Sanders, who had 77 for 151. MacCharles shot 79 to stay in contention with 153, while Desaulniers had his second straight 77 to sit at 154 and Mickoski had 80 for 155. Meronek came through with a 76 after his opening 80 for 156. Pidlaski shot 81 and MacCallum had his second straight 79 to sit at 158.

Sanders posted the best score of the

final round, a 74, to overtake Isaac for the title with a 54-hole total of 225. The St. Charles swinger had to settle for runner-up honors, slipping to 80 for a 230 total.

Desaulniers was consistent, shooting a third straight 77 for 231, good for third place, and MacCallum charged in with a 75 for 233 to grab the final team berth.

MacCharles slipped to 83 in his final round to finish at 236, Murray Brown of St. Boniface moved up with a 77 for 237, Mickoski closed with an 83 for 238 and Meronek also had 83 to finish at 239.

MacCallum's 233 was best in the 55-59 age division, ahead of MacCharles, Brown and Mickoski. Jerry Jerrett of Bel Acres took net honors with 215.

Sanders led the 60-64 division, ahead of Isaac, Desaulniers and Bill Browne of Assiniboine, who had a 243 total. George Burns of Charleswood took the net honors with 211.

Meronek's 239 led the 65-69 group, with runner-up honors shared by Pidlaski and W.E. Miller of Carman, both with 241. Bert Campbell of Harbour View was fourth with 242. The net honors also went to Campbell with 200.

In the 70-and-over category, Cass Tobin of Elmhurst was a runaway winner with 83 and 84 for 167, seven better than M. Barnesky of Florida, who had 88 and 86 for 174. D. Cleland of Wheat City was third with 178 and Clyde Allan of Southwood was fourth with 179. Net honors went to Dooley Freeman with 149.

When the provincial senior team went to the national event at Victoria in September, the Manitobans found the courses a little too tough. They finished in eighth place as their best three scores on the first day totalled 252 and they knocked 12 strokes off for 240 the second day for a 492 total, far behind Ontario's winning total of 454.

All four members of the team qualified for the final two rounds with scores under 170. Desaulnier finished with a 76

for 244, MacCallum closed with an 83 for 247, Sanders had a final 79 for 248 and Isaac finished with 251.

Meronek was the only Manitoba golfer from a large contingent to make it into the top 40 in the national competition as he posted rounds of 79, 76 and 80 for 235, finishing in 22nd place.

The 1986 provincial senior men's championship will be played July 29-31 at Breezy Bend.

The national senior championship will come to Manitoba this year, to be played Sept. 2-6 at the Elmhurst and Pine Ridge clubs, with Bud Foster of Elmhurst, a Manitoba representative to the Royal Canadian Golf Association, serving as tournament chairman.

Closing out the 1985 senior competition was the annual senior inter-club

competition, held at Falcon Beach golf course Sept. 5. The event is scheduled for Sept. 11 at Carman this season.

St. Boniface topped a field of 30 teams to capture the 1985 senior inter-club honors with a 229 total, two better than St. Charles.

Murray Brown set the pace for St. Boniface with a one-over-par 73, with Russ Jones contributing with a 76 and Mike Linton providing an 80.

St. Charles also had a 73 leading the way, turned in by Ken MacCharles, with Jim Isaac shooting 77 and G. Kristjansson turning in an 81.

Low net honors went to Transcona's team of J. Everton, J. McDonald and T. Knofy with 212, followed by Winnipeg Canoe Club's team of R. Hotel, B. Naven and C. Cairns with 214.

Sixth place went to the St. Charles team as Collins was joined by amateurs Ray Cadieux, Don Dever and Al Coldicott for 138 points.

The Manitoba champions finished fourth in the national Crown Life pro-am championship played Sept. 12-13 in Alberta.

The 36-hole competition was scheduled at Calgary's Willow Park Golf and Country Club but heavy rainfall forced RCGA officials to move to the Kananaskis Country course, 55 miles west of the city, for the first day, with only nine holes played. In the bad weather, Saskatchewan took the early lead with 69 points, seven ahead of Manitoba and Prince Edward Island and nine better than Ontario.

Fine weather greeted the golfers for the second day at Willow Park, where Ontario amassed 144 points to capture the title with a total of 204, only one

better than Prince Edward Island, which had 141 for a total of 203.

Defending champion Newfoundland/Labrador had the best second-day total of 149 to climb into third place with 196, while Manitoba could gain only 128 points and had to settle for fourth place with 190. Saskatchewan dropped to fifth, picking up only 119 points for a total of 188.

The 1986 Manitoba Crown Life pro-am team competition will be held Aug. 6 at the Rossmere, with the national championship to be played Aug. 28-29 at the Bally Haly Golf and Country Club at St. John's, Newfoundland.



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Hashimoto tops Blair matches for second time

For the second time in three years, Terry Hashimoto of St. Charles Country Club claimed the honors in the 1985 Jack Blair Memorial Match Play championship, the leadoff event each season on the Manitoba Golf Association's competition calendar.

Hashimoto had the third-best score in the 36-hole qualifying test, then won four straight matches to reclaim the honors he had also won in 1983.

Carl Lechman of Rossmere paced the qualifying rounds, matching par with a 72 at Breezy Bend, then shooting two-over-par 74 at Wildewood for a 36-hole score of 146.

That was four strokes better than Bob Dunbar of St. Charles, who shot 76-74 for 150. Hashimoto was next with 75-76 for 151. Chris Helson of Southwood was fourth with 75-77 for 152.

Defending champion Ron Wilson of Breezy Bend made the greatest second-round comeback, carding a one-under-par 71 at Wildewood after skying to 82 on his home course. Junior David White of Southwood also roared back from an opening 81 with 72 at Wildewood. Both had 153 totals to share fifth place.

It took a score of 161 or better to qualify to the 16-man match play portion of the competition at St. Charles Country Club and there were eight golfers tied at 161 who had to go into a play off for the final three berths.

There were actually 15 golfers with scores better than 161, but two qualifiers had to withdraw due to other commitments — junior champion Todd Fanning shot 158, but had to go to a tournament in Texas, while Selkirk's Craig Kindrat shot 156,

but had a tournament date in Rhode Island. Dunbar also withdrew before the matches began, allowing a fourth 161-shooter to play.

Rounding out those who shot under 161 were: Dave Komora, Rossmere, 82-74—156; Don McNeill, Niakwa, 78-78—156; Glen Hantiuk, Selkirk, 80-77—157; junior Dave McMillan, Rossmere, 76-81—157; Gerry Dubanski, Southwood, 84-75—159; Bill Parker, Breezy Bend, 81-78—159; and Ed Lerner, Windsor Park, 79-80—159.

Mark Allen and Mike Gottfred of Southwood and Glenn Collins of St. Charles claimed the first three spots in the eight-

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man playoff, with Darcy Furber of Pine Ridge getting the fourth place and moving into match play. Losing out in the playoff were Terry More of Elmhurst, Rob Loewen and Rob Oliphant of Rossmere and Doug Armstrong of Niakwa.

Results of first-round matches were: Lechman defeated Furber 3-and-2, White defeated Lerner 2-and-1, Nelson defeated Collins 1 up, Komora defeated Parker 3-and-2, Hashimoto defeated Gottfred 3-and-1, McNeill defeated Dubanski on the 20th hole, Wilson defeated Allen 2 up and Hnatiuk defeated McMillan 4-and-3.

In the second round, Lechman topped White 4-and-3, Nelson defeated Komora 3-and-2, Hashimoto edged McNeill 2-and-1 and Wilson got by Hnatiuk 2-and-1.

Hashimoto knocked out defending champion Wilson 6-and-5 while Nelson sidelined medallist Lechman 3-and-2 in the semifinal matches.

In the final, Hashimoto claimed a 3-and-2 victory over Nelson in a well-played match, winning the second and fourth holes on the St. Charles west nine to get the early lead. Nelson won the fifth with a birdie to cut the lead to one and they halved the next seven holes.

Hashimoto got back to two-up by winning the 13th (fourth on the south nine), both birdied the 14th, then Hashimoto moved three up with a 10-foot birdie putt on the 15th. A half on the 16th hole was all he needed to claim his second Jack Blair championship.

The Jack Blair competition, which honors a former president of both the MGA and the RCGA, will again be the first event on the 1986 MGA calendar, with the qualifying rounds May 31 at St. Charles and June 1 at Wildewood and the matches to be played on Tuesdays and Thursdays, June 10, 12, 17 and 19 at Pine Ridge. This will be the 13th year.

Hashimoto is the third player to win the event twice. Gary Kullman won back-to-back titles in 1978 and 1979, playing out Rossmere the first year, then Elmhurst in '79. Bill Parker of Breezy Bend also won two in a row in 1981 and 1982.

The line of golf course accessories was developed because Colonello and his fellow workers felt such equipment should be available locally.

The Bayco line includes a wide variety of items, such as rakes for sand traps, cups for the holes, flag poles and flags, tee markers, distance markers, golf ball washers, spike cleaners, plaques and signs for courses.

One of the special items available this year is the official distance markers to be placed at each tee on courses which have been rated by the Manitoba Golf Association. Complete sets of the markers have been made up and will be distributed by the MGA.

Sand rakes are available in aluminum or urethane materials, both light in weight and built to last. The urethane model will return to its original shape if it is bent through use.

Flag poles offered by Bayco are of fibreglas construction and are available in yellow, white or red/white.

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Bayco is also marketing in-ground markers for 150 yards (or 137 metres) from the green which will be appearing at several local clubs.

Colonello and Bayco's machining division manager Mel Balske are proud of the fact the Bayco golf accessories are all made in Manitoba, with any part not manufactured at the Logan Avenue plant supplied by other Manitoba firms.

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Gail Anderson dominates women's golf scene in '85

Just as Todd Fanning and Terry Hashimoto dominated Manitoba's male golf scene in 1985, 21-year-old Gail Anderson of St. Charles was the prominent figure for the female golfers of the province.

Anderson, who earned No. 6 ranking among from the Canadian Ladies' Golf Association, won the Manitoba women's amateur championship and also the city and district championship.

She had a 15-stroke lead over runner-up Tracy Kibsey of Harbour View in the provincial championship, shooting a course-record three-under-par 70 at Rossmore on the first day en route to a 54-hole score 225. She followed up with a four-over-par 77 at Breezy Bend and a four-over 78 at Elmhurst.

Kibsey also set a course record by matching par with 74 at Breezy Bend in the second round.

Defending champion Cathy Burton of Selkirk finished third with a total of 246,

followed by Lynda Palahnuk of Elmhurst with 251 and Brenda Smail of St. Charles with 259.

Anderson went on to lead the trials for the provincial amateur team, shooting a six-round total of 377. Kibsey was next with 400, Burton had 408 and Smail earned the final team berth with 419. Nancy Bagley of Southwood and Alison McKinna of St. Charles were chosen as alternates, finishing fifth and sixth in the team trials with 429 and 438 respectively.

In the city and district championship, Anderson had a 54-hole total of 237 over the Southwood, Glendale and St. Charles for a two-stroke edge over 1983 champion Jo-Ann Lindsay of Falcon Beach. Defending champion Cathy Burton of Selkirk finished third with 248 and Lynda Palahnuk of Elmhurst was fourth 250. Tracy Kibsey of Harbour View was fifth with 251 and Nancy Bagley of Southwood sixth with 253.

In senior women's competition, Marlene Netterfield of Pine Ridge won her second provincial title with a 54-hole score of 261, five better than runner-up June Bagley of Southwood and Ann Tachan of Elmhurst.

Netterfield went on to lead the team trials with a six-round total of 427, followed by Bagley at 436, Tachan at 438 and Isny Gallimore at 443 to form the Manitoba team.

Barb Maslanko won the provincial junior championship with a 54-hole score of 252, one better than defending champion Janet Cochrane of St. Charles, with third place taken by Aileen Robertson of St. Charles with 255.

Maslanko also finished in the lead in the junior team trials with a six-round total of 412, with Cochrane second with 421 and Robertson third with 426.

On the national scene, Anderson finished in a four-way tie for fifth place in the Canadian women's amateur championship with a 72-hole score of 310 at the New Ashburn course at Halifax. Kibsey shot 315, Burton 325 and Robertson 337, the only other Manitobans to play all four rounds.

The Manitoba team placed fifth in the inter-provincial competition, shooting 483, 15 shots behind the winning British Columbia team's 468. In net scoring, Manitoba was fourth.

Robertson led the Manitobans at the national junior championship the Ken-Wo Country Club at New Minas, N.S., shooting a 54-hole score of 243, good for 13th place. Maslanko was two back of that at 245, while Cochrane had 248.

The Manitoba team placed third in both gross and net scoring in the inter-provincial competition, shooting a two-day score of 320, 22 behind the winning Ontario team's 298, but only one behind second-place Quebec.

Bagley was best of the Manitobans at the national senior women's championships at Ile Bizard, Que., with a 54-hole score of 259, tied in 27th place, well behind the winning Marlene Streit of Ontario, who had 227. Tachan finished with 262, Netterfield had 270 and Gallimore 274.

In the inter-provincial team competition, Manitoba was sixth in gross score with 529, far behind winning Saskatchewan's 486, but the Manitoba team won the net honors with a two-day total of 458, which was three behind Saskatchewan (ineligible for the net prize) and one ahead of British Columbia.

Aihlin Walker heads national association

For the second time in four years, the Canadian Ladies' Golf Association has a Manitoban serving as its national president.

Aihlin Walker of St. Charles Country Club moved into the president's chair last fall to begin a two-year term as the national president. Jeanne Murphy of Ontario has been president the past two years.

Walker has an impressive record of golf administrative service at the club, provincial and national level behind her.

As a member of the Breezy Bend Country Club for 19 years, she served as junior chairman, sports captain and vice-president before being elected president of the women's section in 1970. She joined St. Charles Country Club in 1979 and has been active in activities since that time.

At the provincial level, Walker served as teams chairman in 1971-72, tournament chairman in 1973-74, course rating chairman in 1975-76, vice-president in 1977-78 and president of the Manitoba Ladies' Golf Association in 1979-80. At the national level, she was on the CLGA rules committee for the Canadian women's amateur championship in 1972 and was tournament chairman for the 1977 Canadian senior women's championship. She was elected vice-president of the CLGA for the 1984-85 term and moved up to president for the 1986-87 term.

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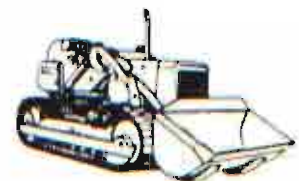
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
