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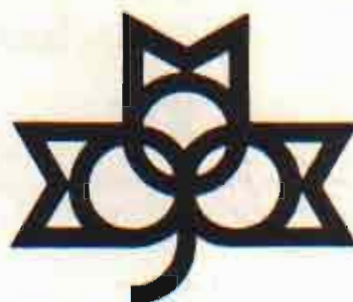

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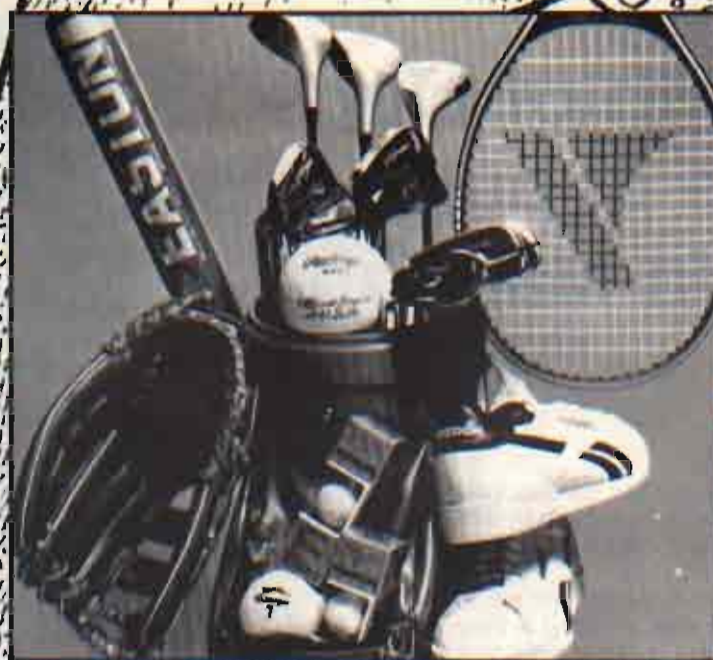
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Growth of clubs indicate popularity of golf in Manitoba

The future of golf at the Provincial and National level looks to be very promising. Participation levels are steadily increasing and the growth of golf clubs throughout the province seem to indicate the popularity of the sport.

Membership in the M.G.A. has increased with the addition of 12 new clubs over the past year. Included in these new clubs are five from Northwest Ontario bringing the total to six the number of member clubs from this area. The record level of entries in the Manitoba Amateur, Manitoba Junior and Manitoba Rural Amateur Championships in 1987 are further indications of the increasing number of players.

The challenge faced by the Manitoba Golf Association will be to maintain and improve upon the programs and services provided to our membership.

The development of golf at both the grassroots and elite

level will continue to be the main objective of the Manitoba Golf Association.

In 1988, the Manitoba Summer Games will be held. We look at the participation of golf in these games as an excellent opportunity to develop and expose the game of golf at the grassroots level both in Winnipeg and the rural areas.

Development of our junior players will continue to be another objective of the M.G.A. Through our Technical Director's program and the co-operation of the Manitoba C.P.G.A., we will continue to provide clinics throughout rural Manitoba as well as the Junior Elite Camp, City Camp and Rural Camp.

In 1988, the M.G.A. will be sponsoring four Juvenile players in addition to our Junior Provincial Team to the Canadian Junior Championship in Kelowna. We believe the experience gained by these young players at a national event will prove to be very valuable for future competition.

This year will also see an effort to increase our course rating service to member clubs. Under Chairman Rick Thain and his committee, we will attempt to rate all courses who require a rating.

Through our liaison with the R.C.G.A. and the Canadian Golf Foundation we are able to acquire a good deal of resource information in a number of areas such as club management, turf management, rules, etc., which we can pass on to those clubs or members requesting it.

The M.G.A. relies on the continued support of its members, council, executive and volunteers to continue working toward achieving its goals.

Adult participation in clinics increases

The summer of '87 turned out to be even busier than expected. More than 60 grassroots clinics were staged in more than 25 rural locations. Although the number of Junior registrants remained the same, adult participation was up by more than 350 individuals.

In total, more than 875 novice golfers in rural Manitoba were exposed to the basic fundamentals of the game through instruction by members of the Manitoba Professional Golfers Association.

First time for golf in Manitoba Summer Games

Golf has been designated as the "family sport" for the 1988 Manitoba Summer Games and officials expect large entries for the various regional competitions leading to the provincial finals in August.

It marks the first time golf has been included in the Games, which are designed to stimulate greater participation in amateur sport across the province.

There are six age categories for male and female players in the golf competitions and those eligible will compete first in regional competition to determine teams for the finals, to be played Aug. 19-21 at Pinawa.

The age groups are 13-and-under, 14-17, 18-34, 35-54, 55-64 and 65-and-over, with Aug. 1 as cut-off date for all ages.

Each of the rural regional teams will consist of six male and six female players, while Winnipeg will have 18 males and females.

Since the Games are designed to promote participation, elite athletes are not included in the program. For golf, the Games are not open to males who have competed since 1984 in the provincial Open, Amateur, Junior, Senior or Rural Amateur or females who have competed in the provincial open and team trials or Winnipeg city and district championship.

An exception allows golfers who played in the first Rural Junior tournament last year and the second such event this year.

An established handicap isn't required to be eligible for 1988, however golfers must submit an average score at the time of registration.

Tournaments have been scheduled in each of the regions (dates are listed with the other tournament schedules on pages 32-33) and information is available in the regions or through the Manitoba Golf Association office.

For the second year in a row, I was involved in teaching two golf classes in the Physical Education Faculty at the University of Manitoba. More than 40 potential Physical Education graduates received 14 classes of combined theory and practical aspects of the game of golf.

A few special programs were also organized through the Technical Directors Program and they took the form of Junior Chairman, Rules and Manitoba Summer Games seminars.

I am also involved in assisting Chairman Rick Thain of the Course Rating Committee in rating member clubs of the association. To date a total of 12 clubs have received this service and requests for rating in '88 are coming in.

The Manitoba Summer Games regional finals were held in '87 and for the most part were a dress rehearsal, enabling the committees to work out any problems that may appear or reappear this year.

This summer the games will be held at both the regional and provincial levels. Low gross finishers in each of the six age categories will proceed onto the Provincial Finals in Beausejour/Pinawa.

In addition, the Winnipeg area will hold a handicap portion in the regional games, however, the winner in this section does not go onto the finals in Beausejour-Pinawa.

The Winnipeg region, due to its size, has been divided into three (3) districts. Each district will hold its tournament on Sunday, June 19, 1988 at Kildonan, Windsor and Blumberg. Participants who enter these games must play in the district in which they reside.



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Golf course rating important service from M.G.A.

The rating of golf courses is an important part of the Manitoba Golf Association's service to the province's golfers.

The MGA's course rating committee entered a new era in the 1987 season with the expansion to eight members from the previous four to expedite the rating procedure.

The Royal Canadian Golf Association Course Rating System has been developed for the purpose of providing a uniform basis on which to compute handicaps for players from different courses across Canada.

The system uses distance as the primary factor, but other factors that affect the playing difficulty of a course are used to adjust the distance rating to insure equitable and uniform ratings between courses throughout the country.

Members of the MGA course rating committee include chairman Rick Thain along with Bud Foster, Don MacDonald, Gord Lenton, Bill Pidlaski and MGA technical director Todd Teplitski from the city and rural representatives Barrie Sanders of Carman and Ted Chop of Northernia.

Nine courses (two city and seven rural) were rated in 1987, as follows: Boissevain, 65.5; Portage la Prairie, 69.5 white tees, 70.5 blue tees; Gladstone, 68.0 white, 70.0 blue; Pleasant Valley, 67.5; Rossmore, 70.0 white, 71.0 blue; Transcona, 67.0; Kenora, 69.0 white, 70.5 blue; Dauphin, 68.5; Minnedosa, 68.

Notification went out to all MGA member clubs early this year to submit requests for rating or re-rating of courses and

the committee will cover as many as possible during this season.

The rating committee felt some courses may have not have records of measurement or rating, or some may have made changes in layout since their last rating and could qualify for re-rating.

Before a rating team is sent out to a course, the onus is on the club to insure each hole is accurately measured. A six-page package explaining how to properly measure a hole is sent to each club requesting rating.

Courses may be measured by wheel or tape, but the RCGA has indicated that laser measurement would be the preferred system due to its degree of accuracy.

In August of last year, Thain represented Manitoba at an RCGA-sponsored meeting of course rating chairmen from the various provinces, as well as representatives from the Australian Golf Association and the Council for Golf Unions in England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales.

It was observed the RCGA method of course rating was the simplest to understand and was consistent with other methods being used in the United States, England and Australia.

The MGA course rating committee stresses that all clubs should keep their rating current so members' handicaps will be fair. Re-ratings are recommended whenever major alterations are made to a golf course.



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New rules, definitions explained

A new rule book is in effect for golfers throughout the world this season and this article provides explanations of the various changes in definitions and rules.

It was prepared by E. K. (Bud) Foster, a past president of the Manitoba Golf Association and Honorary Governor of the Royal Canadian Golf Association, who has been the MGA's head man on rules and officiating for several seasons.

DEFINITIONS

a. Bunker and ground under repair:

Expanded to state that the margin extends vertically downward, but not upward.

b. Casual water, loose impediments and obstructions:

Amended to state that manufactured ice is an obstruction.

c. Stroke:

Expanded to state that, if a player checks his downswing **voluntarily** before the clubhead reaches the ball, he is deemed not to have made a stroke.

RULES

3-3 Stroke play, doubt as to procedure:

Amended to provide that (1) A competitor is not obligated to report to the committee the fact of the situation, if he scores the same with both balls, and (2) if the competitor fails to announce in advance his decision to invoke this rule or his selection, the score with the original ball, rather than the higher score will count.

4-1g Clubs: Damage and playing characteristics changed:

Amended to prohibit further use during round of a club which ceases to conform because of damage sustained other than in the normal course of play.

4-2 Clubs: Playing characteristics changed:

Amended to distinguish between the playing characteristics of a club being changed as a result of damage sustained in the normal course of play and other than normal course of play.

4-4 Maximum of fourteen clubs:

Amended to allow the addition or replacement of a club by borrowing from another person playing on the course.

5-3 Ball unfit for play:

A stricter definition as to what constitutes a ball unfit for play, i.e. a ball flying erratically is not unfit for play.

6-8 Discontinuance of play:

Former rule 6-8b dealing with procedure when play is discontinued has been replaced by a sub-section (Rule 6-8b) on the procedure when play is suspended by the committee and sub-section (Rule 6-8c) on lifting the ball when play is discontinued during play of a hole.

13-2 Improving lie, area of intended swing of line of play:

Expanded to prohibit improving the area in which a ball is to be dropped or placed.

15-1 Playing wrong ball, general:

Amended to provide that a ball substituted under an applicable rule which does not permit substitution is not, as previously was the case, a wrong ball. Corresponding changes have been made in the definition of "Ball in Play" and "Wrong Ball" and rule 20-4.

16-2 Ball overhanging hole:

Amended to provide that if a ball overhanging the hole falls into the hole after the time limit, as provided in Rule 16-2, has expired, the player incurs a penalty stroke and is deemed to have holed out with his last stroke.

18-2b Ball moving after address:

Amended to require replacement of a ball which moves after address. Previously the ball was played as it lay. As a result of this change, a ball which moves or is moved in all circumstance covered by rule 18 must be replaced.

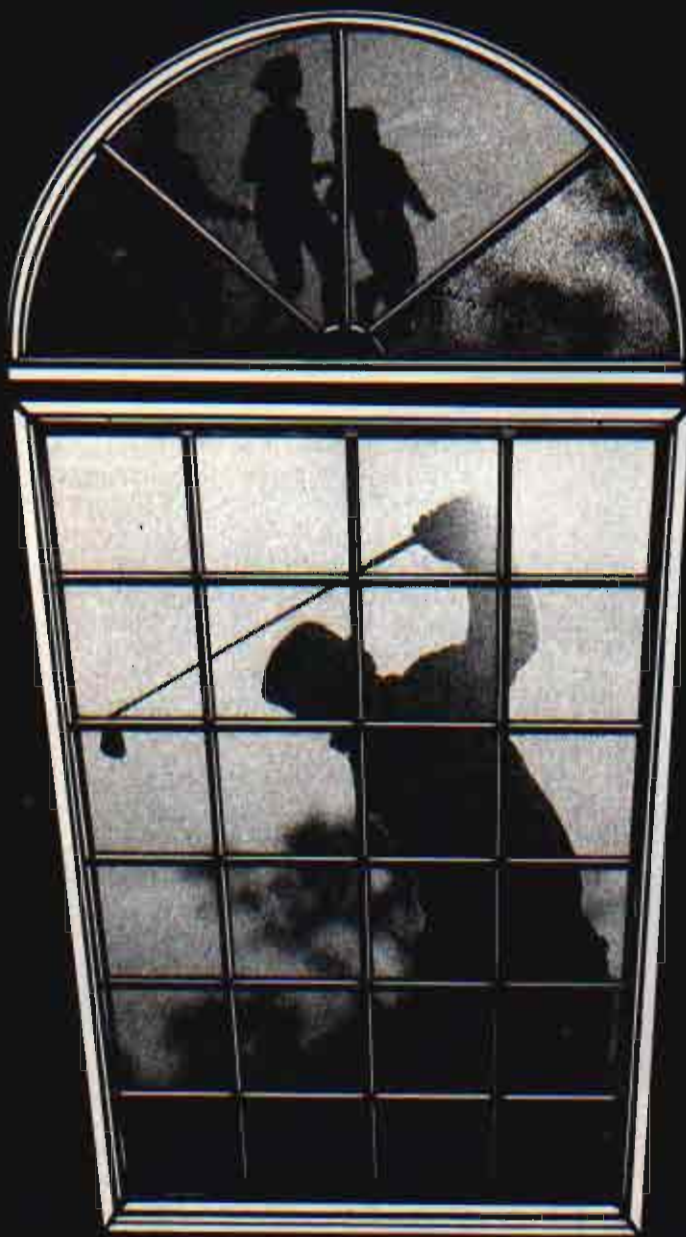
19 Ball in motion deflected or stopped:

Amended to apply solely to accidental deflection of a ball. Purposeful deflection is dealt with under Rule 1-2.

19-5 Ball in motion deflected or stopped by another ball:

Expanded to provide the procedure if two balls collide.

21 Cleaning ball:

Amended to state that a lifted ball may be cleaned except in three specific circumstances (1) to determine if it is unfit for play (Rule 5-3) (2) For identification — cleaned only to extent necessary. (3) Because it is interfering with or assisting play (Rule 22)

25-1b (ii) (b) Dropping behind condition:

25-1c (ii) (b) Amended to state that the ball must be dropped keeping the point where the ball lay (or where it last crossed the margin of the hazard) between the hole and the spot on which the ball is dropped. Previously, it was permissible to stand on the line and drop the ball an arm's length to either side

34-1b Claims and penalties: Stroke Play

Amended to state the two situations in which a penalty of disqualification shall be imposed after a competition is closed.

1. Return a score for any hole lower than actually taken (Rule 6-6d) for reason other than failure to include a penalty which he did not know he had incurred, or
2. Return a scorecard on which he has recorded a handicap which he knows is higher than that to which he is entitled, and this affects the number of strokes received (Rule 6-2b)

EXPANDING ON NEW RULES & NEW DECISIONS

Rule 1-4 Points not covered by rules

Covers points not covered by rules and so decision 1-4/7 covers a ball which is **lost** in either a water hazard or in casual water overflowing the hazard — the decision is that in equity (Rule 1-4) the player must proceed under the water hazard rule. It should be noted however that decision 25-2 covers a ball **found** in the overflow of a water hazard which is outside the margin of the hazard is casual water.

Rule 4-2 Playing characteristics changed:

These cannot be changed purposely. If club damaged in the normal course of play, the player has 2 options (same as rule 4-1g)

under Rule 4-4a(ii) he can replace, with any club, a club which becomes unfit for play in the normal course of play.

Rule 5-3 Ball unfit for play:

This rule is toughened to strictly a visibility test. The player must inform his opponent or fellow competitor of his intentions to allow them to examine the ball. If he does not do this he incurs a one stroke penalty. The ball must be visibly cut, cracked, or out of shape.

Rule 6-2 The Player (handicaps):

Decision 6-2a/1 states that there is no penalty if player fail to determine one another's handicaps before starting a match. If this results in one of them not receiving a handicap stroke at a hole he is entitled to receive one, the hole stands as played.

Rule 8-1 Advice:

This rule is reworded to include the words "in the competition" thus a player playing in another group not in the competition may receive advice from a player playing in the competition.

Rule 15-1 Playing wrong ball:

An example of how this rule applies is to assume a player's ball ends up on a path with a great gob of mud on it, and he has difficulty getting it off. In frustration he drops another ball properly and completes the hole and drives off the next tee — under the old rules he would be disqualified under the new rules he is assessed a two stroke penalty for playing a substituted ball under a rule that does not allow substitution.

Rule 19-5 Ball in motion deflected or stopped by another ball: Second paragraph relating to two balls in motion:

Being deflected or stopped provides that if this occurs the player plays the ball as it lies. The player has no penalty unless he was in breach of Rule 16-1g (Player plays a stroke while another ball is in motion after a stroke on the putting green). Note also one exception to Rule 19-5 — if a ball in motion, after a stroke on the putting green, is deflected or stopped by any moving or animate outside agency, including a ball in motion played by a player at another hole or by a fellow competitor, the provisions of Rule 19-1b apply — (stroke cancelled and replayed).

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1987 was a banner year for R.C.G.A. finances

The 1987 golf season was a banner year financially for the Royal Canadian Golf Association.

The operation fund, which includes the regular operations and the conducting of national programs and tournaments and is financed substantially by membership fees, suffered a loss of \$89,066 during the year.

However, there were excesses in two other funding areas: The championship fund, which includes the conducting of the Canadian Open, saw revenue exceed expenses by \$846,582; and the golf course fund, which included the operation of Glen Abbey Golf Course and its associated facilities, had revenue exceeding expenses by \$462,582.

The capital fund, which includes mortgage interest expenses, resulted in \$157,466 being paid out in 1987.

Total revenue over expenses for the year was \$1,062,654, which is an improvement over the previous year and it is anticipated the RCGA outstanding mortgage will be paid in full by the end of this calendar year.

The RCGA amateur tournament study committee has given approval toward the holding of a provincial team competition for the pre-Seniors (age 40 to 54) in 1989. It will consist of four-man teams competing in stroke play for 36 holes for the team honors and the low 32 to qualify in a match-play format

for the individual championship. This is similar to the format formerly used in the Canadian Amateur.

The association's long-range planning committee is considering a planning procedure to divide the country into three regions, with Manitoba to be included with Ontario and Quebec. This would result in each of the regions being host to six national championships in 10 years.

The rules of golf committee issued a press release to say the Ping Eye II clubs will be allowed in national competitions in 1988 and will be reviewed again for next year's competitions.

It was announced that Pepsi-Cola has discontinued its sponsorship of the Canadian Junior championship and a new sponsor is being pursued. The sponsorship of the Canadian team pro-am championship (Crown Life) was also under review, with this year's event assured at St. Charles Country Club under new sponsorship (Labatt's).

A new rule book has been put into use for the 1988 season, with several changes in rules, which are detailed in a report from Bud Foster in this magazine.

The Canadian Golf Foundation has appointed a new executive director who will endeavor to increase membership. In the past year, the Foundation had a membership of 400 clubs, less than half of the more than 1,100 clubs associated with the RCGA.

Two Manitobans received scholarships from the Canadian Golf Foundation in the past year — Jeff Helper and David White. Twenty-four scholarships were issued.

Labatt takes over team pro-am event

The format will remain the same, but a new sponsor will be behind the popular club team pro-am golf competition this year.

Labatt Breweries of Canada announced May 4 the signing of a three-year agreement with the RCGA to assume sponsorship of the charity golf competition which had been sponsored since 1973 by Crown Life.

The new name for the Canadian championship will be the Labatt's National Team Pro-Am and it will be played Sept. 8-9 at St. Charles Country Club in Winnipeg.

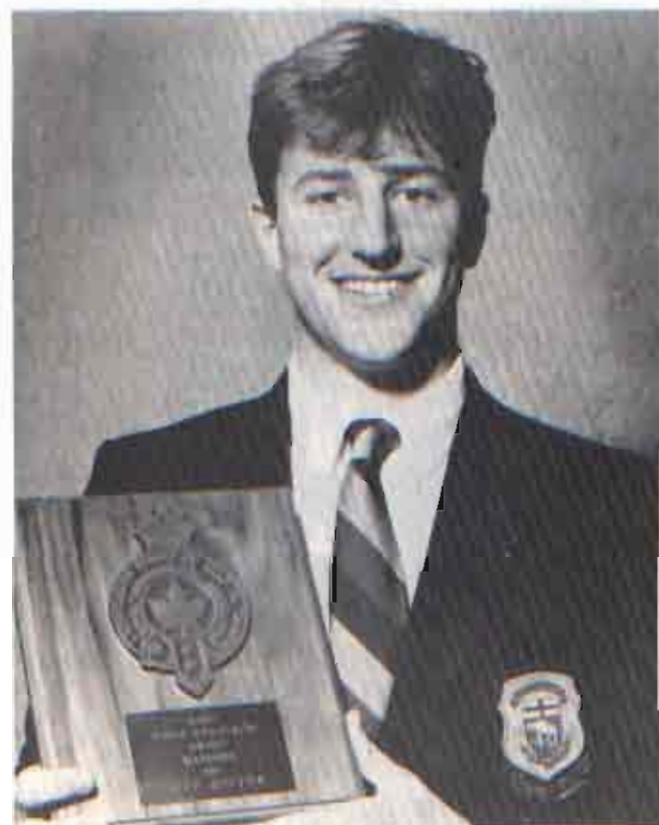
The provincial competition in Manitoba will be known as the Labatt Lite team pro-am championship, to be played Aug. 2 at Niakwa Country Club.

At the club level, the event will be played on the same basis as the Crown Life event in the past. Golfers can play a qualifying round for \$10, with match-play or 36-hole medal competitions to determine winners from each club in three handicap categories — 1-12, 13-18 and 19-30. These players will join up with the club pro or an assigned pro for the provincial test.

As in the past, charity and junior golf development will be the big winners, with the Society for Manitobans with Disabilities Inc. to benefit in this province.

Crown Life remains as an associate sponsor this year and other associate sponsors are Canadian Airlines International and SCORE Magazine.

Since the start of the Crown Life competition in Manitoba in 1973, more than \$900,000 has been raised for provincial charitable organizations and provincial golf associations across the country.

Glen Hnatiuk named 1987 Golfer of the Year

A year after he won the Manitoba Amateur golf championship, Glen Hnatiuk of Pine Ridge became the 13th winner of the Manitoba Golfer of the Year award.

The 1987 winner was announced in November at the annual meeting of the Manitoba Golf Association. Hnatiuk won the honors as he beat out provincial senior women's champion Merlene Netherfield of Elmhurst and provincial junior champion Jeff Helper of Glendale in the final voting.

Formerly announced in February of the following year, the presentation was advanced to the November date to coincide with the earlier date for the MGA annual meeting.

Hnatiuk had been a runner-up for the honors in 1986, the year he won the

provincial Amateur crown, losing out to Todd Fanning of Southwood, who won his second straight Canadian junior men's title that year to get the nod as Manitoba Golfer of the Year for an unprecedented third straight time.

Two others had been double winners of the award — Terry Hashimoto of St. Charles in 1976 and 1980 and Bill Parker, who won out of Elmhurst in 1979 and out of Breezy Bend in 1982.

The award went twice to female golfers — Shauna Gechel of Breezy Bend in 1981 and Gail Anderson of St. Charles in 1983.

The other winners were Matt Poleschuk of Pine Ridge in 1975, Jimmy King of Elmhurst in 1977 and Terry More of Elmhurst in 1978.

The 1988 winner will again be

announced at the annual meeting of the MGA in November.

Hnatiuk failed to defend his provincial Amateur title in 1987, but had many other successes during the year.

He finished third in the Amateur, but came through with two good rounds to finish atop the field in the Willingdon Cup team trials. He went on to be Manitoba's best player at the Canadian Amateur at Edmonton in August, finishing in seventh place.

At the start of the 1987 season, he was a co-medalist in the qualifying rounds of the Jack Blair Memorial Match Play competition, bowing out in the semifinal round of match play. He led a Pine Ridge team to the MGA Free Press Inter-Club championship.

Hnatiuk spent the past winter on his

fourth year of a golf scholarship at University of Southern Mississippi at Hattiesburg, Miss., where he has been an all-conference team member.

The other two finalists for Golfer of the Year voting were both champions in their categories in 1987.

Netterfield won the MLGA City and District championship and successfully defended her provincial senior women's title as she also led the provincial senior team trials. At the national senior competition, she was best of the Manitobans, finishing 26th.

Helper was a runaway winner of the Manitoba junior men's championship played at Niakwa, finishing 18 strokes ahead of his nearest rival. He also led the junior team trials and was Manitoba's best at the national junior championship, finishing in eighth place.

Other players who had been considered in the Golfer of the Year voting for 1987 included men's Amateur champion Garth Collings of Breezy Bend, women's amateur champ Lynda Palahniuk of Elmhurst, women's junior champion Aileen Robertson of St. Charles, men's senior champ Gord Lenton of Pine Ridge and former women's amateur winner Cathy Burton of Harbour View, who was away from the provincial competitions in 1987 but was top Manitoban at the Canadian women's amateur with a 12th-place finish.

Manitoba Open championship moves to earlier date for '88

The fine performance of a great field last year will be a tough act to follow, but everyone associated with the Manitoba Open expects the competition to be even better this year.

The 1988 Manitoba Open will again be played at Southwood Golf and Country Club over a 72-hole route and with a purse of \$75,000, but it will occupy an earlier date on the Manitoba golf calendar.

Because the Canadian Open has been moved back to a September date for 1988, the Canadian pro tour this year will run from west to east instead of east to west. It will open in Victoria and work across the country to have players in the east when the Canadian Open is played.

That means the Manitoba Open will be played July 7-10, three weeks earlier than last year.

Keith Armstrong, Manitoba Open co-ordinator, and Brian MacPherson, chairman of the steering committee, announced the details in March and both expressed optimism that the calibre of golf will be high.

The Tournament Players Division of the Canadian Professional Golfers Association will have several new players as a result of a qualifying test last fall and another to be held in late May.

Three-time Canadian Amateur champion Brent Franklin of Calgary and Jack Kay of Toronto headline a group of amateurs who have obtained their professional cards for the Canadian pro tour and several top-ranking U.S. college stars will be making their pro debuts in Canada as well.

It is also expected a good number of players from Australia and other countries will be part of the Canadian tour.

Dave Barr of Richmond, B.C., and Kananaskis, Alta., attended the March press conference and confirmed he will be on hand to defend the title he won last year. It's also expected Manitoba's own Dan Halidorsen will return and there may be some others from the PGA tour.

In order to guarantee the strongest field possible, the exemption structure for the 1988 Open has been altered from last year.

Exempt players will include Barr, as defending champion; Australian John Wade, the 1987 low amateur; Ron Wilson of Breezy Bend, the only other amateur making the cut last

year; Ben Smirnov of John Blumberg, the only Manitoba Zone CPGA player to make the cut in 1987; 120 players from the TPD tour; 15 players from the Manitoba Zone; five Manitoba Golf Association amateur berths; and four committee exemptions.

Because there are no competitions to be held prior to this year's Open, the MGA announced the five amateur exemptions would go to the four members of last year's Willingdon Cup team — Glen Hnatiuk of Pine Ridge, amateur champ Garth Collings of Breezy Bend, former Canadian junior champ Todd Fanning of Southwood and Glenn Collins of St. Charles — along with the 1987 Manitoba junior champion, Jeff Helper of Glendale.

The Manitoba Zone of the CPGA is expected to base its selection of 15 exempt players on last year's competitions as well.

A minimum of eight berths, plus others not used from the exemption list, will be decided in a qualifying round to be played July 4 at Breezy Bend. Amateurs must have an attested handicap of three or under to take part.

This year's Manitoba Open is the final one of a three-year contract to hold the event at Southwood, but the club has announced it is prepared to continue for another two years if other clubs don't indicate an interest in the event.

In addition to the four rounds of tournament play July 7-10, the week of activity of Southwood will include a special opening luncheon July 4 and the sponsors' Invitational Pro-Am July 6.

The Open has adopted the Manitoba Riding for the Disabled as the official charity of the event and the opening luncheon will raise funds for that organization.

The major sponsors for the 1988 Manitoba Open will again be Canadian Airlines International, ICG Propane and Keystone Ford Sales Limited. The associate sponsors are Blackwoods Beverages Ltd. and Labatt's Manitoba Brewery. The Bay-Downtown will sponsor the invitational pro-am event.

In addition, CJOB, CKY-TV and the Winnipeg Sun are associate media sponsors. McKim Advertising Ltd. is the special promotions advisor and there are several other corporations involved as gold, silver and bronze patrons.

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Large crowds watch as Dave Barr wins Manitoba Open title

Playing before what was believed to be the largest crowd ever to watch a golf event in Manitoba, PGA tour regular Dave Barr of Richmond, B.C., warded off an Australian invasion to win the 1987 Manitoba Open golf championship.

An estimated 4,000 golf fans were on hand at the Southwood Golf and Country Club to see Barr take the honors with a 72-hole score of 266, 16 under par and

just one stroke ahead of a pair of golfers from Australia — amateur John Wade and pro Mike Ferguson.

The 19-year-old Wade, who had a six-under-par 64 in his final round (best of the day), easily captured the Hal Eidsvig Memorial Trophy as low amateur player. He actually held the tournament lead at one point in the final round.

Thirty-five-year-old Barr, who lives in

Richmond but plays out of the Kananaskis course in Alberta, made back-to-back birdies on the 16th and 17th holes to sew up his victory and claim the \$15,000 top money from the record \$75,000 purse.

Barr had rounds of 66-67-65-68 over the par-70 Southwood layout for his 266 total. Wade shot 70-66-67-64 for 267, a total matched by fellow Australian Ferguson, who posted rounds of 67-65-67-68. Ferguson won \$8,000.

Joe Lloyd of Highland Park, Ill., claimed third pro money of \$4,500 with 68-68-67-65 for 268, followed by David Tentsis of White Bear Lake, Minn., with 67-68-66-68 — 269 for \$3,500, and Billy Ray Brown of Sugarland, Tex., and Vic Wilk of Sepulveda, Cal., both with 270 for \$2,950 each. Brown shot 62-69-68-71 and Wilk carded 64-67-68-71.

Ron Wilson of Breezy Bend was the only other amateur golfer to qualify for the final two rounds as it took a par-matching score of 140 to survive the cut. Wilson shot 70-69 for 139 then added rounds of 76-69 for a 284 total.

He was also one of only two Manitoba players to make the cut. Ben Smirnov, head pro at the municipal John Blumberg course, was the other with 70-67 to qualify and finishing with 74-72 for 283, good for \$300.

Par took a beating throughout the tournament, which was expanded to a four-day 72-hole event for the first time.

Brown, a big rookie pro from Texas, led the first-day onslaught with an eight-under-par 62 (lowest individual round of the tournament). That was one better than Chuck Taylor of Richmond, Va.

A total of 55 players managed to break Southwood's par-70 in that opening round, with another 22 matching par figures.

Brown maintained a share of the lead after Day 2, but was joined by Wilk and Craig Parry, another Australian, with 36-hole scores of 131. Brown shot 69, while Wilk and Parry both had 67 in their second rounds.

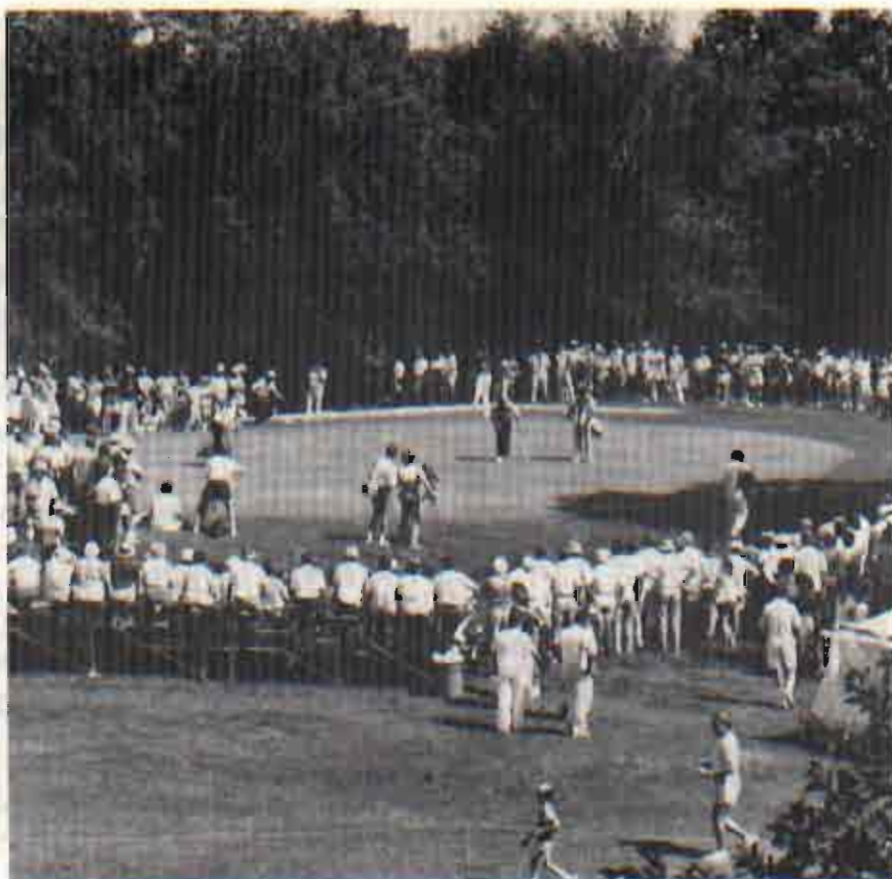

Long-hitting Kelly Murray of Vancouver, who set the Southwood course record with 60 in the 1986 Open, was the low individual shooter on the second day with 64. It went with a first-round 71 for 135, in a 10-way tie for 13th place at that point.

Ferguson was just a stroke off the pace with 132, tied with Taylor and Brian Hutton of Thunder Bay. Barr was in a group at 133.

The Kananaskis representative came through with the best score of Day 3, a five-under-par 65, to move into the lead with a 54-hole total of 198, 12 under par and one ahead of Ferguson. Brown and Wilk. Ferguson shot 67, while Brown and Wilk had 68.

Barr's 198 total for three rounds was six better than the 204 score posted by Windsor's Bob Panasuk to win the 54-hole championship in 1986.

Wade easily held the amateur lead with a three-under 67 for 203, which put him 12 ahead of Wilson, who wound up 76 after taking a whopping 10 on the 10th hole.

Wade's 64 was matched by Mike Hammond of Stafford, Tex., as the best score of the final round, but the day belonged to Barr, who fended off the others in an elite field of foreign and United States players.

Dan Halderson of Brandon, Manitoba's favorite son on the PGA tour and four-time Manitoba Open champion, finished with a 274 total to win \$1,087.50 and still had his share of the fans during the day.

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Garth Collings claims 1987 Amateur title

Putting together a string of birdies on the back nine of the final round on his home course, 29-year-old Garth Collings of Breezy Bend captured the 1987 Manitoba men's amateur golf championship.

A huge entry of 344 golfers entered the competition, with the field split for the first two rounds. The low handicappers opened at Rossmere and the higher handicappers at Breezy Bend. They switched courses for the second round, then the championship was concluded with the final two rounds at Breezy Bend.

The huge entry won't be repeated this year since the 1988 Amateur field will be limited to 288 players and the eligibility has been reduced to golfers with attested handicaps of nine or less, down from 12-and-under in previous years.

Collings had seven birdies during the final round, including four in a row on holes 11 through 14 to finish with a 72-hole score of 289, two ahead of 1984 champion Todd Fanning of Southwood.

Defending champion Glen Hnatiuk of Pine Ridge finished in third place with 292, followed by Bob Dunbar of St. Charles and junior Dave McMillan of Rossmere, both with 293; and Blair match play champ Glenn Collins of St. Charles, Dr. MacDonald McMurdo of St. Charles and Bruce North of Carman, all with 294.

Dan Scanlon of John Blumberg municipal course and Brian Clark of Brandon Wheat City both finished with 297 and Kevin Nicholson of Bel Acres and Lane Bickel of St. Charles completed the under-300 group with 299.

McMurdo stole the spotlight on the opening day at Rossmere. The native of Scotland was the only player to match Rossmere's par with 70.

Darcy Furber of Pine Ridge was next in line with 71, followed by Grant Coulter of Brandon, three-time champion Gary Kullman of Rossmere, Fanning and Collings, all with two-over-par 72. Hnatiuk and former champion (1975) Jim Doyle of Sandy Hook were among 11 players with 75s.

Among the higher-handicap players playing their first round at Breezy Bend, Glen Kolida of Rossmere was the leader with a par-matching 72, followed by another Rossmere swinger, Henry Dahl, at 73.

The courses were switched for the second round and Collings proved he liked his home layout as he carded a two-under-par 70 to take the 36-hole medal honors with 142, one better than McMurdo, who needed 73 strokes at Breezy Bend.

Next in line came Fanning and Charleswood's Doug Rainboth, both with 144 totals, followed by North, Furber, Dunbar and St. Boniface's Alan Briscoe, all at 145.

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Best individual score of the second day was a three-under-par 69 by Mike Walker of Charleswood, who had used 78 in his first round to sit at 147 at the halfway mark.

Sixty-three golfers with scores of 154 or better qualified for the second half of the championship competition, while 64 others with scores up to 160 moved into match play in four flights.

Scores went up a little in the third round, but Collings held on to a share of the lead despite taking 77 strokes. Fanning shot 75 to pull into a tie as both players had 54-hole totals of 219.

But, they were only one ahead of McMillan and McMurdo, who shot 71 and 77 respectively to sit at 220. Next came Clark and Rossmere's Carl Lechman at 221, followed by Hnatiuk and North at 222.

McMillan's one-under-par 71 was the best effort of round three, while Collins and Scanlon both matched par with 72.

In the final round, Collings pulled into the lead when Fanning had a bogey on the fifth hole, then built it to a two-stroke cushion with a birdie on the sixth.

After saving par with a 15-foot putt on the 10th, the champion went on a rampage with successive birdies on the 11th, 12th, 13th and 14th holes. Fanning matched the first two birdies, but had to settle for par on 13 and 14 to fall four shots behind.

A birdie for Fanning on the 16th hole narrowed the gap, but he missed a putt on the 17th to stay three down heading into the final hole.

Despite a double-bogey six on the final hole, Collings finished the day with a two-under-par 70 and a four-day total of 289, while Fanning had to settle for par 72 and a total of 291.

Joining Collings with 70s as the best scores of the final day were Hnatiuk, Collins and Dunbar.

Sixteen players with scores of 301 or better moved on to the final two rounds of the provincial Willingdon Cup team trials in soggy conditions at St. Charles.

Hnatiuk pulled into the lead after the Saturday round with a two-over-par 74 for a five-round total of 366, one ahead of Collins, who shot 73 for 367.

Collings skidded to 81 and Fanning needed a strong comeback on the back nine for 79 as they slipped to third place at 370, tied with McMurdo, who shot 76. North was next at 371.

In the final round, Hnatiuk birdied four of the final five holes for a four-under-par 68 to easily claim the No. 1 spot on the team with a six-round score of 434.

Collins matched par at 72 to claim second place with 439 and Collings settled into third with 74 for 444.

Fanning and McMurdo both shot 76 in their final round to finish in a fourth-place tie with 446 and it took a two-hole playoff before Fanning claimed the fourth spot on the provincial team.

At the national amateur championship at the Derrick Club in Edmonton, the Manitoba team placed fifth in the Willingdon Cup competition with a two-day total of 451 based on the three best scores each day.

British Columbia took the top spot with 430, followed by Ontario and Quebec, both with 435 and Alberta with 436.

Hnatiuk was best of the Manitobans with rounds of 74-73 for 147. Fanning contributed 76-73 for 149, while Collins and Collings both had 157. Hnatiuk and Fanning qualified for the final two rounds of the Canadian Amateur test.

Hnatiuk added scores of 73 and 71 to finish in a three-way tie for seventh, place with 291, eight shots behind Calgary's Brent Franklin, who claimed his third straight Canadian crown. Fanning slipped to 80 in his third round, then bounced back with 73 for a 72-hole total of 302.

The 1988 Canadian Amateur is scheduled for Aug. 17-20 at the Gallaghers Canyon course at Kelowna, B.C.

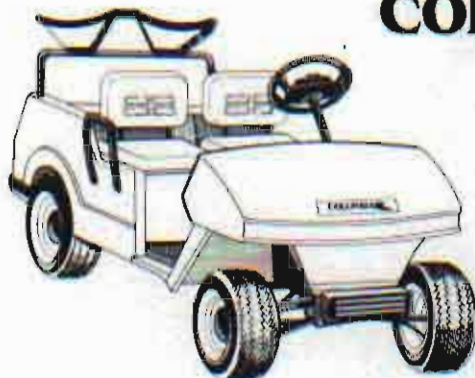


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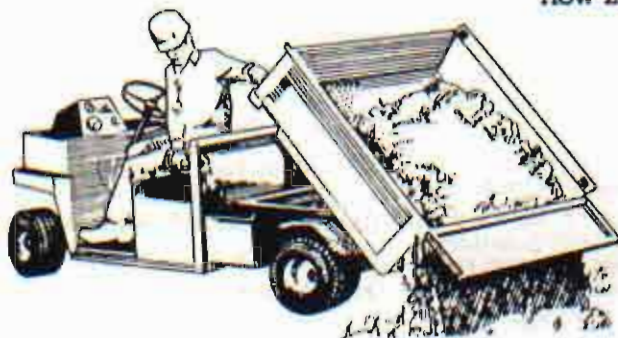
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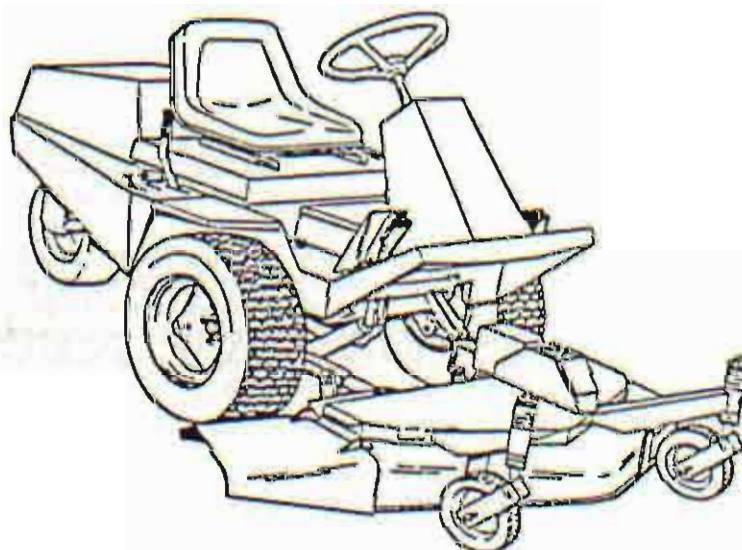


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Jeff Helper captures Junior crown in runaway

Despite slipping to a five-over-par 77 in his final round, Jeff Helper was an easy runaway winner of the 1987 Manitoba junior men's golf championship.

The 18-year-old Glendale golfer coasted to an 18-stroke victory in the 72-hole competition at Niakwa Country Club, a victory that was never in doubt after the second round.

His 289 total was only one over par for the four rounds as he missed the record provincial junior score by four strokes.

Despite soggy conditions, Helper matched Niakwa's par-72 in his first round, then fired two straight two-under-par 70s to take a commanding 16-stroke lead after 54 holes.

That big lead made it difficult to maintain concentration in the final round, though Helper admitted after it was over that the 72-hole record was in his mind at the start of the day. A 72 would have left him with 284, one better than the 285 record score posted in 1981 by Marc Chamberland of Breezy Bend at Transcona.

"But, the record wasn't that important to me," he said. "I just wanted to win."

And win he did, in fine style. The runner-up honors went to 15-year-old Neil Armstrong of St. Boniface, whose rounds of 73-75-80-79 gave him a 307

total, enough to easily win his 15-16 age group by eight strokes.

Gerald Morrissey of Rossmere was third at 309 with rounds of 78-75-80-76, followed by Colin Drewe of Southwood at 311 (80-76-75-80); Rob Sobkowich of Rossmere at 312 (85-74-75-78); Mike Derksen of Southwood at 313 (81-77-78-77); Dale Goehring of Breezy Bend at 315 (78-79-80-78); Jeff Lailey of Elmhurst at 316 (81-80-76-79), and Dave McMillan of Rossmere and Andy Nemiroff of Southwood at 317. McMillan was 85-74-83-75 and Nemiroff carded 83-77-78-79.

Morrissey took runner-up honors behind Helper in the 17-18 age division; Goehring was runner-up to Armstrong in the 15-16 group.

The younger age groups were decided over 36 holes and Lailey was an easy winner in the 13-14 division with 80-81 — 161, seven ahead of James Sichevski of Bel Acres, who had 85-83 — 168.

Twelve-year-old James Kadyuk of Southwood was a repeat winner in the 12-and-under category, with a six-stroke margin. He shot 92-86 for 178, while clubmate Ken Warkola had 89-95 for 184.

Armstrong, Goehring, Lailey and Nemiroff were named to the Manitoba team for the Western Canada Juvenile

Championship, which was played in August at Bel Acres.

The 1988 provincial junior championship will be played July 11-14 at Rossmere and Selkirk.

Junior Team Trials

Eighteen golfers qualified for the provincial junior team trials, carrying their 72-hole scores with them into two more rounds played at Glendale.

Helper shot what he described as "the worst round of my life" when he shot 83 over his home course, but rebounded with a two-over-par 72 in the second round to finish with a six-round total of 445 and claim the No. 1 spot on the Manitoba junior team.

Morrissey shot 78, then a leading 71 to move up to second place on the team with 458. Drewe scored 73-77 for a total of 462 and Sobkowich shot 76-76 for 464 to round out the four-man team.

Lailey finished fifth in the team trials with 467, one ahead of Goehring, whose final round was highlighted by a hole-in-one. McMillan and Wayne Sawchuk of Kenora both finished at 471 to tie for seventh place. These four and the provincial team members were chosen to represent the province in the annual Manitoba/Minnesota team matches in Minneapolis.

The 1988 team trials are scheduled for July 16-17 at Pine Ridge.

Canadian Junior

Helper played steady golf to finish in a three-way tie for eighth place in the Canadian junior championships at the Saguenay Golf Club at Jonquiere in August. He had rounds of 78-74-76-76 for a 304 total.

The Canadian title went to Jeff Kraemer of Vancouver who shot 73-71-72-73 for 289 and finished eight shots ahead of runner-up Dave Pashko of Unionville, Ont.

Drewe was next among the Manitobans, shooting 82-75-80-73 for 310, good for 23rd place. Goehring was 47th with 79-78-80-81 — 318 and Morrissey carded 84-77-72-79 — 322 in 61st place. Seventy-three golfers made the 36-hole cut.

In the inter-provincial team competition, Manitoba placed sixth with a two-day total of 470. The honors went to Ontario with 457, followed by Saskatchewan with 464, British Columbia with 466 and Quebec with 467.

The Canadian junior and juvenile championships for 1988 will be played at the Kelowna Golf and Country Club at Kelowna, B.C. Aug. 9-12.

Western Juvenile

British Columbia stole the spotlight in the Western Canada Juvenile championships played at Bel Acres in August,

claiming both the team and individual honors.

In the team test, B.C. came from behind on the final day of the three-day event to win the title, finishing with a total of 734 to lead Saskatchewan by six strokes. Alberta was third with 745 and Manitoba trailed with 760.

In the individual competition, Peter Hopley of B.C. also came from behind with 77 in his final round for a 235 total. He shot 81 and 77 in his earlier trips around Bel Acres.

Manitoba's Jeff Lailey, who was the second-day leader after rounds of 79-78 for 157, ballooned to 88 in his final round to finish at 245, in fourth place. Runner-up honors went to Saskatchewan's Luke Mongrain, who led the first round with 78, then shot 83 and 78 for 239, four behind Hopley.

The 1988 junior inter-club test is set for June 26 at Steinbach.

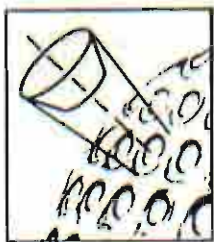

Gord Lenton wins second Senior crown

Consistency was the key as Gord Lenton of Pine Ridge captured his second Manitoba Senior Men's golf championship last August at the Pine Ridge Golf Club.

Lenton had three identical rounds of 38-36 — 74 over his home layout for a 54-hole total of 222 and a five-stroke victory over defending champion Don McNeill of Niakwa, who had won the 1986 crown in his rookie senior year.

Lenton had also been a rookie winner of the senior honors when he turned 55 in 1982. His second crown came at age 60.

McNeill matched Lenton's first-round 74 to share the lead, but needed 76 the second day and 77 on the third trip to fall behind to a 227 total, which was good for runner-up honors.

Next in line and joining Lenton and McNeill on the provincial senior team was Ron Castelane of Niakwa, who had rounds of 75-77-77 for 229.

A playoff was needed to decide the fourth team berth, which went to Ken Banfield of Pine Ridge, who made par on the first playoff hole to eliminate club-mate Bruce Hudson after both finished with 232 totals.

Banfield actually faltered after sharing third-place with Castelane after the second round. He needed 80 for his third round to slip to 232. Hudson got into the playoff with a 76 final round.

Just missing out on the playoff were Max Desaulniers of Elmhurst and former senior champion Smiley Meronek of St. Charles, who both finished at 233. Desaulniers three-putted the final green to miss his chance, while Meronek skidded to 42 on the back nine after making the turn one under par for a 78 to miss out by one stroke.

Frank Borowski of Elmhurst was one more stroke back at 234 and Jim Walker and Nick Mickoski, two more Elmhurst players, were next at 235.

The top senior honors, of course, went to Lenton and McNeill and there were also age-group prizes.

Castelane took the gross honors and Banfield was the net winner in the 55-59 division; Desaulniers was the gross winner and net honors went to Robert Castling of Niakwa in 60-64; Bill Brown of Assiniboine took low gross and Vic Palmer of St. Boniface had low net in 65-69; and Meronek took the gross honors and Dub Mundell of Brandon Wheat City had the low net score in the 70-and-over division.

In addition to the four team members, several other Manitobans made the trip to Regina in September to play in the Canadian senior men's championship at the Regina and Wascana clubs.

A former Manitoba golfer, Don Gardner of Vancouver, had the 36-hole lead in the national test, but had to settle for a tie in the runner-up position as Calgary's Bob Wylie claimed his third straight title. Wylie shot 74-70-73 for 217, while Gardner went 71-72-75 for 218 to tie with Bryson Crowell of Dartmouth, N.S., who had 70 in his final round.

The Canadian senior team honors went to Ontario with a two-day total (best three scores) of 447, while Manitoba placed seventh with 472.

Castelane paced the team on the first day with 75, followed by Lenton with 77, Banfield 82 and McNeill 84. On the second day, Lenton and Banfield shot 78, McNeill and Castelane both had 80.

Lenton was best of the Manitobans at the national event with rounds of 77-78-77 for 232, tied in 11th place.

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Glenn Collins wins Jack Blair match play honors

A pair of golfers from Pine Ridge led the qualifiers, but it was 20-year-old Glenn Collins of St. Charles Country Club who came through in the matches to win the 1987 Jack Blair Memorial match play championship.

It was the first major Manitoba tournament win for the young St. Charles player, a golf scholarship student at Midland College at Midland, Texas. He had played on three provincial junior teams and was twice runner-up in the Manitoba junior championships.

The Blair event is annually the kickoff tournament on the MGA calendar and Collins took advantage of having played golf through the winter months as he displayed good shooting and putting under pressure.

Collins won the title with a 4-and-3 victory over Rossmere's 22-year-old Rob Oliphant in the final at the St. Boniface Golf Club, where all matches were played.

The qualifying rounds for 1987 were played at Glendale and Wildewood and it was another pair of young college players who led the way — Glen Hnatiuk and Darcy Furber, both of Pine Ridge, finishing with 36-hole totals of 142. They both shot 71s at both courses to finish five strokes ahead of the pack.

The co-medalists played well in the match-play portion of the competition, too, but both were eliminated in the semifinal round as Hnatiuk bowed 2-and-1 to Oliphant and Furber was downed 3-and-2 by Collins.

Carl Lechman of Rossmere was next in the qualifying tests with 72-75 — 147, followed by Dave McMillan, also of Rossmere, and Dan Scanlon of John Blumberg, both with 148. McMillan shot 72-76 while Scanlon had the best score at Glendale with 70, but needed 78 strokes at Wildewood.

Collins and Southwood's Colin Drewe were next with 150, followed by David White of St. Charles with 151, Mick Palahniuk of Elmhurst and Ken Warwick of Niakwa with 152. Oliphant, Warren Scott of St. Boniface and Mike Derksen of Southwood with 153, Jeff Helper of Glendale, Tim Stone of Southwood and Kevin Nicholson of Bel Acres all shot 154, with Helper and Stone winning the playoff for the final two spots to round out the field of 16 for the matches.

MGA technical director Todd Teplitski of Pine Ridge, who won the Blair title in 1986, failed to qualify when he slipped to 80 at Wildewood after opening with 76 at Glendale.

In the first round of match play at St. Boniface, Hnatiuk defeated helper 3-and-2, Warwick went to the 19th hole to down White, McMillan bounced Derksen 5-and-4, Oliphant got by Scanlon 3-and-1, Furber defeated Stone 3-and-1, Palahniuk topped Drewe 4-and-3, Scott defeated Lechman 4-and-3 and Collins topped Parker 3-and-2.

The second round saw three of the four matches go to extra holes as only Collins was able win in regulation play, topping Scott 3-and-2. Hnatiuk went to the 22nd hole to defeat Warwick, Oliphant went to the 20th to eliminate McMillan and Furber had to go to the 21st to get by Palahniuk.

In the semifinals, the medalist jinx caught up to Hnatiuk and Furber and Oliphant and Collins charged into the final.

Oliphant took advantage of some shaky putting from Hnatiuk, the 1986 provincial Amateur champ, to come from behind and post his 2-and-1 win. Hnatiuk won the first two holes when Oliphant opened with two bogeys, but the Rossmere golfer took advantage of a three-putt slip by Hnatiuk on the fourth, then got even with a birdie on the seventh hole.

It was another three-putt on the 15th that allowed Oliphant to go one up in the close match, then it was closed out on the 17th hole when Hnatiuk again needed three putts for his par.

Collins was steady in his semifinal win over Furber, who found troubles by straying from the narrow St. Boniface back-nine fairways. The St. Charles golfer carried a one-up lead into the back nine, they halved five holes in a row, then Collins won the 15th and 16th with pars for his 3-and-2 win.

A string of six birdies over an eight-hole stretch told the story for Collins in the final match with Oliphant.

It appeared the Rossmere golfer might be off to an easy victory as he won the first two holes, but Collins won the fifth, then took command with three straight birdies on the sixth, seventh and eighth holes to go two up. Both played the ninth badly and Oliphant won it with a bogey.

But, tree trouble forced Oliphant to concede on the 10th and a long birdie putt on the 11th put Collins three up. Oliphant won the 12th, but the 13th and 14th were won by Collins and the match ended when they halved the 15th hole in pars.

The 1988 Jack Blair Memorial qualifying rounds were scheduled for May 28 at St. Charles and May 29 at Wildewood, with the matches to be played at Niakwa June 7, 9, 14 and 16.

Brandon's Grant Coulter wins Rural Amateur crown

Shooting the only sub-par round of the two-day tournament, Grant Coulter of the Wheat City club in Brandon claimed the 1987 Manitoba Rural Amateur golf championship.

Coulter carded a one-under-par 71 on the second day of the Aug. 9-10 event at the Hecla Island golf course to pull away for a four-shot victory over former rural champ Bruce North of Carman.

The Brandon golfer had birdies on the fifth and 12 holes and his only bogey came on the ninth for his nifty 71. It went with an opening-day 74 for a 145 total.

North, who had shared first-round honors with Kevin Bauer of Selkirk with 73s, slipped to 76 for a 149 total, while Bauer skidded to 84 for 157, tied in eighth place.

Tim Cromarty of Selkirk finished third with 73 in the final round for 150, while Brandon's Brian Clark shot 75 to finish at 151 in fourth place.

Bruce North of Carman was next with 77-76 — 153, followed by Brad Clement of Russell with 76-79 — 155 and defending rural champ Bob Genoway of Morden Minnewastota, who had 76-80 — 156.

Bauer shared eighth place at 157 with Dwight Kearns of Brandon Wheat City, who shot 77-80. Rounding out the leading group at 158 were Frank Clement of Russell, Bev Leadbeater of Swan River and Dave Regan of Shilo.

The two-day competition attracted a large entry of 194 players and MGA rural chairman Ted Chop of Northernia,

himself a former winner, stated it will be necessary because of time limitations to restrict the entry to about 150 in future years.

The 1988 Rural Amateur event is again scheduled at Hecla Island, Aug. 7-8.

Another Brandon Wheat City golfer, George Panagioutou, took the first flight honors with 78-75 — 153. The second flight was won by Ken Grove of Selkirk with 82-77 — 159, Mike Marten of Shilo was best in the third flight with 84-75 — 159, Herb Dick of Winkler led the fourth flight with 88-76 — 164, Murdock MacKenzie of Shilo won the fifth flight with 92-75 — 167 and Brian Busch of Shilo topped the sixth flight with 94-84 — 178.

For the seventh straight year, Barrie Sanders of Carman won the rural senior

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title with rounds of 81-80 for 161, while Merv Minish of Swan River topped the 65-and-over division with 82-87 — 169.

Rural Junior Championship

A new rural competition was introduced in 1987 when a field of 45 young golfers played in the first Rural Junior Championship June 30 at the Steinbach Fly-In Golf Club.

Michael Cybuliak of Selkirk fired a one-under-par 71 to become the first winner and claim the Royal Bank trophy. He was two shots better than Selkirk club-

mate Myles Zyblock in both the overall competition and the 17-18 age group.

Derek Ingram of Sandy Hook topped the 15-16 division with a two-over-par 74, ahead of Thompson's Brad Poleschuk, who had 77.

In the 13-14 division, Dean North of Carman led with 80, followed by Shane McCartney, also of Carman, with 81.

John Power of Pine Falls was best in the 11-12 division with 90, well ahead of Neepawa's Sanjeev Patel, who was runner-up with 107.

The second Rural Junior event is expected to attract a larger entry when

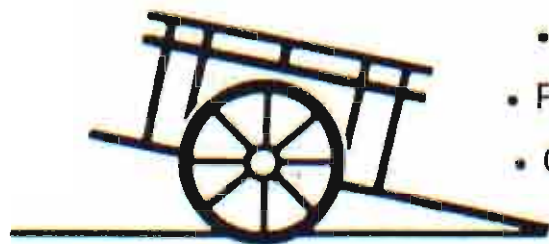
it is played Aug. 10 at the Teulon Golf and Country Club.

Pine Ridge tops city clubs, Sandy Hook leads rural teams

Glen Hnatiuk and Jim Doyle were the individual heroes as they led their respective teams to the MGA's 1987 Free Press Inter-Club golf championships July 3 at Elmhurst Country Club.

Hnatiuk, the 1986 provincial Amateur champ, carded a two-under-par 69 to lead his Pine Ridge No. 1 team to the city title with a six-stroke margin over the nearest competitors.

Doyle, a former provincial and Canadian amateur champ, finished with a one-under-par 70 to lead his Sandy Hook team to the rural crown by a two-stroke margin.

Doyle was the main story of the day, however, as he sizzled at a six-under-par pace for 15 holes, then faltered on the final three to finish with his 70.

Hnatiuk was joined by Darcy Furber, with 73, and John Racciatti, with 74, to give the No. 1 Pine Ridge team a total of 216 for the city championship.

That was six better than the 222 total for the No. 2 team from St. Charles, the club that had topped the competition for the previous four years. The St. Charles No. 1 team was third with 225.

Next in line among the city clubs came

Assiniboine and Elmhurst No. 2, both with 231, Rossmere No. 1 with 232, Pine Ridge No. 2 with 234 and St. Boniface No. 2 with 235.

Doyle was backed by his son Pat Doyle, also a former Manitoba amateur champ, with 77 and Mark Olson with 82 for a total of 229.

That was two ahead of the No. 1 team from Carman, the defending champions. Portage No. 1 settled in third place with 235, followed by Oakview with 239, Kenora No. 1 with 241, Wheat City No. 1 with 243 and Russell with 244.

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Glenn Collins, fresh from a victory in the Jack Blair Memorial match play event which opened the competitive season, and former three-time amateur champion Gary Kullman of Rossmore both equalled Elmhurst's par 71 to share third place in individual scoring.

Doyle figured he "just ran out of gas" down the stretch as he flirted with an Elmhurst competitive course record.

He carded five birdies and four pars for a five-under-par 31 on the front nine, gave up his first bogey on the 12th, then had two more birdies on the 13th and 14th to get to six-under. But, a triple-

bogey seven on the 16th and double-bogey six on the 17th left him at one-under.

Hnatiuk was steady for his 69. He had a bogey on the first hole and birdies on the ninth, 13th and 18th to go with 14 pars.

Collins had five birdies and Kullman had four in their par-matching efforts. Garth Collings of Breezy Bend registered six birdies as he was one of five with two-over-par 73.

The runner-up St. Charles No. 2 team had 73 from David White, 74 from Gavin

Speirs and 75 from Steve Bannatyne for 222, while the other St. Charles team had the 71 from Collins, along with a 76 from Bob Dunbar and 78 from Lane Bickel.

Carman's runner-up 231 in the rural competition had Bruce North with 74, Bill North with 78 and Barrie Sanders with 79. Third-place Portage had John Cartman with 76, Don Jackson with 78 and Glen Peterson with 81.

The 1988 MGA Free Press Inter-Club championships will be played June 24 at St. Charles Country Club.



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Tuxedo foursome captures Canadian Crown Life Honors

For the first time since it became a truly national competition, a Manitoba team captured the 1987 national Crown Life Pro-Am team championship in August at St. Catharines, Ont.

Professional John Isaac and his amateur partners Ernie Rehberg, Doug MacFarlane and Larry Kozier from the Tuxedo Golf Club claimed the title by a nine-point margin over Ontario.

It was actually the second Manitoba win in the nine years of national Crown Life competition, the first registered in 1979 by a Dauphin team led by pro Stan Homenuik when the event covered only Western Canada.

Ontario joined the following year and it subsequently spread across the country. Ontario won the title three times (1980-83-85) and it went once each to Saskatchewan in 1982, Newfoundland in 1984 and Quebec in 1986.

The Tuxedo foursome used a strong second-round performance to claim the 1987 honors, chalking up 149 points in the Stableford system to go with their opening-day 127 for a 276 total. The Manitobans stood fifth after the first round.

The runner-up Ontario team from the Horseshoe Valley Golf Club near Barrie, had 267 points with 137 of them coming in the second round. The team was led by pro Gar Hamilton, who earlier in the season won the Canadian club pro championship at the Niakwa Country Club in Winnipeg.

Newfoundland finished third with 263, followed by British Columbia with 256, Prince Edward Island 252, Saskatchewan 249, Alberta 248, New Brunswick 234, Quebec 232 and Nova Scotia 218.

Isaac and his Tuxedo mates won the Manitoba team title earlier in August when they compiled 132 points in competition at Elmhurst Golf and Country Club. That was three better than Laurie Pierce and his Elmhurst team.

assistant Gerry Dubanski, who carded a one-under-par 69 to finish three shots ahead of Stan Homenuik of Dauphin, Ben Smirnov of John Blumberg and Gary Curtis of Winnipeg Canoe Club. Jim Collins of St. Charles and Paul Villemare of Gilbert Plains both had 73, while Isaac and Dave Rhodes of Breezy Bend had 74s.

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G.C.S.A.M. Membership reaches 150

The Golf Course Superintendents' Association of Manitoba has come a long way since it was organized 38 years ago.

The first officers were elected at a meeting Oct. 25, 1950 at Glendale Country Club and there were 11 members were in attendance when the constitution was approved at a meeting on March 14, 1961. At that time, it was known as the Manitoba Greenskeepers Association.

When the GCSAM held its 1988 annual meeting this spring at Bel Acres Country Club, secretary Doug McEwen reported membership in the association was at an all-time high of 150.

The membership includes 25 in the A category, 45 in B, 16 assistants, 21 commercial, 31 associate, six honorary and two honorary life members.

The Manitoba group holds six or seven meetings during each golf season, set up as golfing days at various courses, followed by meetings. One meeting each season has the course superintendents bringing their club greens chairmen out as guests, another has them bring the club pro and/or tournament chairman.

A feature presentation each season is the GCSAM annual Turf Grass Research golf tournament, which this year will be held at the Bel Acres Country Club Aug. 19.

This event features four-man teams playing on the Texas Scramble format. The entry fee of \$160 (\$40 per player) includes lunch, green fees and dinner as well as a fine array of prizes.

Proceeds from this tournament go toward turf grass research and the Manitoba association has been the biggest single contributor to the Turf Research Foundation in Canada, averaging about \$3,500 per year. Last year's donation was \$2,000 when adverse weather reduced the entry.

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John Steel inducted into Golf Hall of Fame

John Steel, recognized as the dean of golf course superintendents (or greens-keepers, as they were known in his hey-day) was inducted into the Canadian Golf Hall of Fame at the annual meeting of the Royal Canadian Golf Association at Toronto in February.

Steel was one of the founding members of the Golf Course Superintendents' Association of Manitoba in 1950 and became the first president of the Canadian Golf Course Superintendents Association in 1966.

John Burns Steel was born in New Mills, Scotland, in 1906, and moved with his family to Winnipeg when he was three years old.

He started working at the St. Charles Country Club in 1932 and undertook the responsibilities of course superintendent in 1945. He served as St. Charles superintendent until 1977.

Until his retirement, he was also chairman of the Canadian Turfgrass Research

Foundation, which raises funds for turfgrass research and also awards scholarship grants.

The Golf Course Superintendents Association of America honored Steel in 1986 with the Distinguished Service Award and he was only the second Canadian to win that award, the first from Western Canada.

The award is the highest and most distinguished award bestowed by the GCSAA for outstanding achievement.

His record also includes serving three terms as president of the Manitoba association, member of the founding committee to establish test plots for research in Manitoba and a citizen member of the St. James-Assiniboia Parks Board from 1970 to 1974.

Steel is an honorary life member of the Canadian Golf Course Superintendents Association and the Manitoba association; a Quarter Century member (42 years) and the first from Manitoba)

of the Golf Course Superintendents Association of America; an AA Life Member of the GCSAA; Certified Golf Course Superintendent; and an honorary life member of St. Charles Country Club.

He is also a past president of the Assiniboine Memorial Curling Club.

Steel has attended more than 20 turfgrass conferences and shows in Canada and 27 GCSAA conferences and has been a speaker on the program of many conferences and seminars.

Two years ago, he was unable to attend the GCSAA conference in San Francisco and his son John Donald Steel received his Distinguished Service Award on his behalf. It was later presented to Steel at the Deer Lodge Centre.

This time, Steel was able to go to Toronto in February for his induction into the Canadian Hall of Fame and he was thrilled at the occasion.

"These things happen to people at the end of their careers, but it sure is nice to be recognized," he said.

Stew Cheyne honored

Stewart Cheyne of the Teulon Golf and Country Club was named Superintendent of the Year for 1987 at the annual meeting of the Golf Course Superintendents Association of Manitoba in April.

He becomes the fourth recipient of the coveted honor, which was first awarded to Southwood's Jack Davies in 1984. Helmut Kopp of St. Charles was the 1985 winner and Walter Perchaylo of Pine Ridge was the winner in 1986.

The award was established to recognize performance not for just the single year, but over an extended period.

Cheyne was one of the original founders of the Teulon club when it was

formed in 1960. The course was opened as a nine-hole layout in 1967. Additional property was purchased by the club in 1984 and the course was expanded to 18 holes in 1986.

From a club which took in about \$1,200 in 1967, it grew in popularity for an intake of some \$500,000 in 1987.

Cheyne has been involved in the operation of the club and has been the course superintendent through the expansion period. Teulon now boasts an 18-hole course of championship calibre and it will be the host for the Manitoba Golf Association's second Rural Junior tournament Aug. 22.

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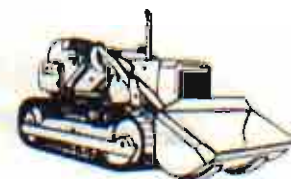
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When some 150 or more rural golfers converge on the Hecla golf course Aug. 7-8, it will mark the 12th year for the Manitoba rural amateur championship to be held at the picturesque provincial course.

"Hecla Island is really a sports enthusiasts's dream come true," said Lorne Aikens, the new general manager of the Gull Harbour Resort. "It's a great place to bring the whole family."

The upgrading of the resort has been a large part of the success of the entire park operation.

"The whole resort was renovated and expanded in 1985," Aikens said.

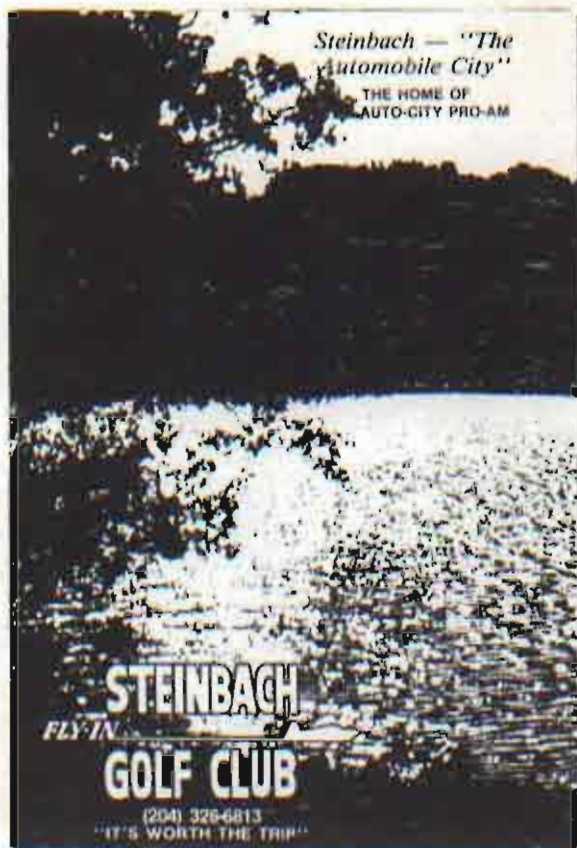
This season, the resort is offering several vacation packages, including a golf package for two which combines accommodation and golfing at special prices.

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Many changes on Manitoba golf scene

There have been some changes on the Manitoba golf scene over the last couple of seasons and more are on the horizon as additions and improvements are continually in progress.

New clubhouses are going into use this season at the Breezy Bend club in Winnipeg as well as at the Selkirk club and there will also be a different look at Teulon with an extensive expansion to the clubhouse.

Breezy Bend also features a new and larger pro shop for Sandy Paterson and his staff, and another new pro shop was to be opened early in the season for Dale Esopenko at Assiniboine, where the proshop was destroyed by fire in January. Some repair work was also required in the clubhouse.

At Morden, a new nine holes is under construction on the Minnewasta course and it is hoped to have an 18-hole layout in play early next year. The course will remain in play over nine holes this year. A new clubhouse is also in the offing at Morden, to be built near the highway.

Also on the rural Manitoba scene, recent changes have

seen the expansion of the Dauphin club to 18 holes; the expansion of the Sandy Hook layout to 18 holes, with cottage developments lining much of the course; the opening of a new nine-hole course, Scotswood Links, at Elm Creek; the opening of a nine-hole layout, South Interlake, at Warren; construction of a new nine-hole course, Deer Ridge, north of Brandon by Ray Reif; and installation of grass greens to replace the sand greens at Gladstone.

In Northwestern Ontario, the Kenora club has been expanded to 18 holes, with the new nine opened last year. The Manitoba Golf Association also welcomed back into the fold five other NW Ontario clubs at Fort Frances, Dryden, Atikokan, Sioux Lookout and Red Lake.

In and around the Winnipeg area, a major new course, Kingswood, is under construction at La Salle, with the first nine expected to be ready next year; several new holes have been completed and will be put into play this year at Pine Ridge; Rossmere has a new watering system nearing completion; and major reconstruction is being done at Glendale, with the new layout expected to be ready for play late next season or early in 1990.

It is obvious the folks who look after Manitoba's golfing needs aren't content to stand still. There is talk of several other new courses around the province and further developments will be seen in the near future.

Bel Acres Golf & Country Club marks 25th anniversary

Originally a shareholder organization and now a privately-owned operation, the Bel Acres Golf and Country Club this year marks its 25th anniversary.

The Bel Acres Club was started in 1962 with Harvey Lipkin serving as the first president of the organization. After bankruptcy in 1979, it was taken over by a group of five private owners.

This year, a two-way partnership of Wray Taylor and Debbie Morrison is in control of the club. Taylor serves as the president and golf course superintendent, while Morrison is the club manager. Taylor was one of the original five owners.

The golf course itself was designed by Jack McMahon, who also designed and built the original Breezy Bend course. The Bel Acres layout was constructed in 1963 and put into play in 1964.

There have been no major alterations to the course in the 25 years. It was shortened a little, there have been some new greens and tees built and trees have been planted.

Some alterations have also been made to the clubhouse, but it remains basically as it began.

Taylor rates a "true country club setting" as the major attraction at Bel Acres.

The course is located north of the Perimeter Highway and west of Highway 7 outside the city of Winnipeg.

"There are no gravel trucks, no airplanes to create a disturbance," he said. "It's a nice quiet place on a summer evening."

Pro Darrell McDonald, a former provincial junior champion, is in his second year in the Bel Acres pro shop. He and Taylor run all men's competitions at the club. The women's section has an executive which looks after the female competitions.

The Bel Acres layout features four par-fives, four par-threes and 10 par-fours and plays to par 36-36 — 72. Ladies' par is 36-37 — 73 with an extra par-five on the back nine.

The yardage from the men's white tees is 3280 on the front and 3343 on the back for a total of 6623. This can be extended to 3470 and 3633 for 7103 from the blue tees. The ladies' yardage is 2948 and 2995 for 5943.

Course ratings are 71 from the white tees and 72 from the blues for the men, 72 for the ladies.

Taylor expected the club would have an adult membership of more than 500 this year.

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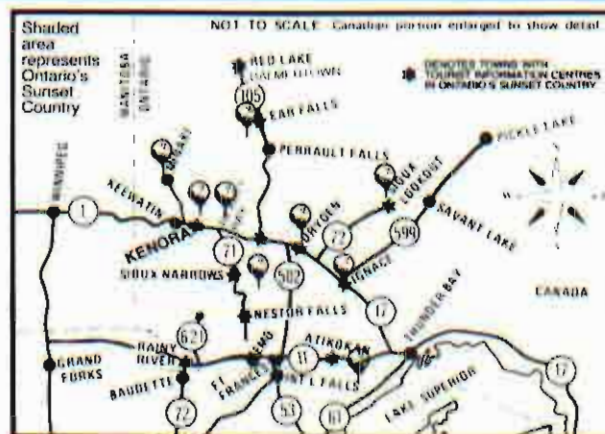

Netterfield a double winner in 1987 women's golf events

Merlene Netterfield of Elmhurst was a double winner and emerged as the outstanding female golfer on the Manitoba links in 1987.

Netterfield got her season off on the right foot with a victory in the Manitoba Ladies Golf Association's annual City and District tournament, then successfully defended her Manitoba senior women's championship and led the provincial team into the national senior competition.

Another Elmhurst performer, Lynda Palahniuk, captured the provincial women's amateur honors and the junior championship was again won by Aileen Robertson of St. Charles.

Though she missed out on the Manitoba competitions due to other commitments, Cathy Burton of Harbour View made a good impression in national and international competition and was a repeat finalist in voting for Manitoba's Athlete of the Year.

Burton, a former provincial champ and City and District winner, played on the Canadian team which captured Commonwealth honors in Australia in October and also on the team which represented Canada at the International women's championship event at Cali, Colombia, in the spring of 1987.

Former Winnipegger Gail Anderson, who now plays out of Kelowna, B.C., was also on both of those teams. She is also a former Manitoba champion and was Manitoba Golfer of the Year in 1983.

Late last year, Burton and Anderson both decided to turn professional and have been playing this spring on the Futures Tour in the United States.

Netterfield carded 81 at Pine Ridge, 83 at Southwood and 82 at Rossmore for a 54-hole score of 246 to win the City and District title, three shots ahead of Robertson and Netterfield's 22-year-old daughter Cheryl, who both finished with 249.

Palahniuk was a runaway winner of the provincial amateur crown with rounds of 78 at John Blumberg, 74 at Niakwa and 79 at Elmhurst for a 54-hole total of 231, 11 strokes ahead of the field. Barb Maslanko of Pine Ridge was runner-up with 242.

In the succeeding team trials, Palahniuk easily held the lead, finishing with a six-round total of 388. Janet Cochrane of St. Charles was next with 404, followed by Maslanko with 407. The other team berth had been awarded earlier to Burton, who was allowed to miss the amateur to play in the DuMaurier Classic LPGA tournament in Quebec.

Nancy Bagley of Southwood and Alison McKinna of St. Charles both finished with 416 and were named alternates for the national event.

In the senior women's test, Netterfield dominated the play.

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shooting 75-87-83 for 245 for a whopping 18-stroke margin over Elmhurst clubmate Willi Tait.

They also won the first two berths on the senior team as Netterfield completed the trials with a six-round total of 414 and Tait had 445. A three-way playoff was needed before Joy Knudson of Wildewood and June Bagley of Southwood captured the final two team berths, beating out Mary Snider of Niakwa.

In the junior championship, Robertson was also a big winner with 80-83-87 for 250, five ahead of Alissa Lauder of Thunder Bay, who had 80-89-86 for 255.

In the team trials, Robertson led the way with 422, Lauder was second with 432 and Sheri Poleschuk of Thompson claimed the third berth on the provincial junior team with 449. Shannon Bingham of Steinbach and Rhona Van Wynsberghe of Elmhurst were named alternates.

On the national scene, Manitoba's junior golf team placed third in gross scoring and captured the low net honors because winning Quebec and second-place Saskatchewan were ineligible for the net prize.

Robertson led the Manitobans with 81-81 for 162, Lauder had 86-82 for 168 and Poleschuk shot 95-93 for 188. The best two scores counted each day and Manitoba finished with 330 and a net score of 300. Quebec won with 317 followed by Saskatchewan with 325.

Robertson added an 83 in her third round for finish tied for third in the individual competition with 245. Lauder shot 86 for 254, good for 14th place.

In the national ratings, Robertson was listed sixth for the 1987 season.

Burton led the Manitoba team at the national amateur with rounds of 78-75 for 153, followed by Cochrane with 80-86 for 166, Palahniuk with 85-84 for 189 and Maslanko with 93-85 for 178. The Manitobans placed sixth.

In the individual play, Burton added 76-72 for a 72-hole total of 301 in 12th place. She was the only Manitoban to qualify for the final two rounds. Anderson had rounds of 75-76-77-71 for 299 in ninth place and was on the winning B.C. team.

Anderson was listed third in the national rankings, Burton was rated seventh.

In the senior women's national event, Netterfield paced Manitoba with 82-86 for 168, followed by Bagley with 87-90, Knudson with 90-87 and Tait with 88-90. The Manitoba total was 524 in fifth place.

Netterfield added an 82 in her final round for a 54-hole score of 250 in 27th place. Knudson added 87 for 264, Bagley shot 89 for 266 and Tait had 89 for 267.
