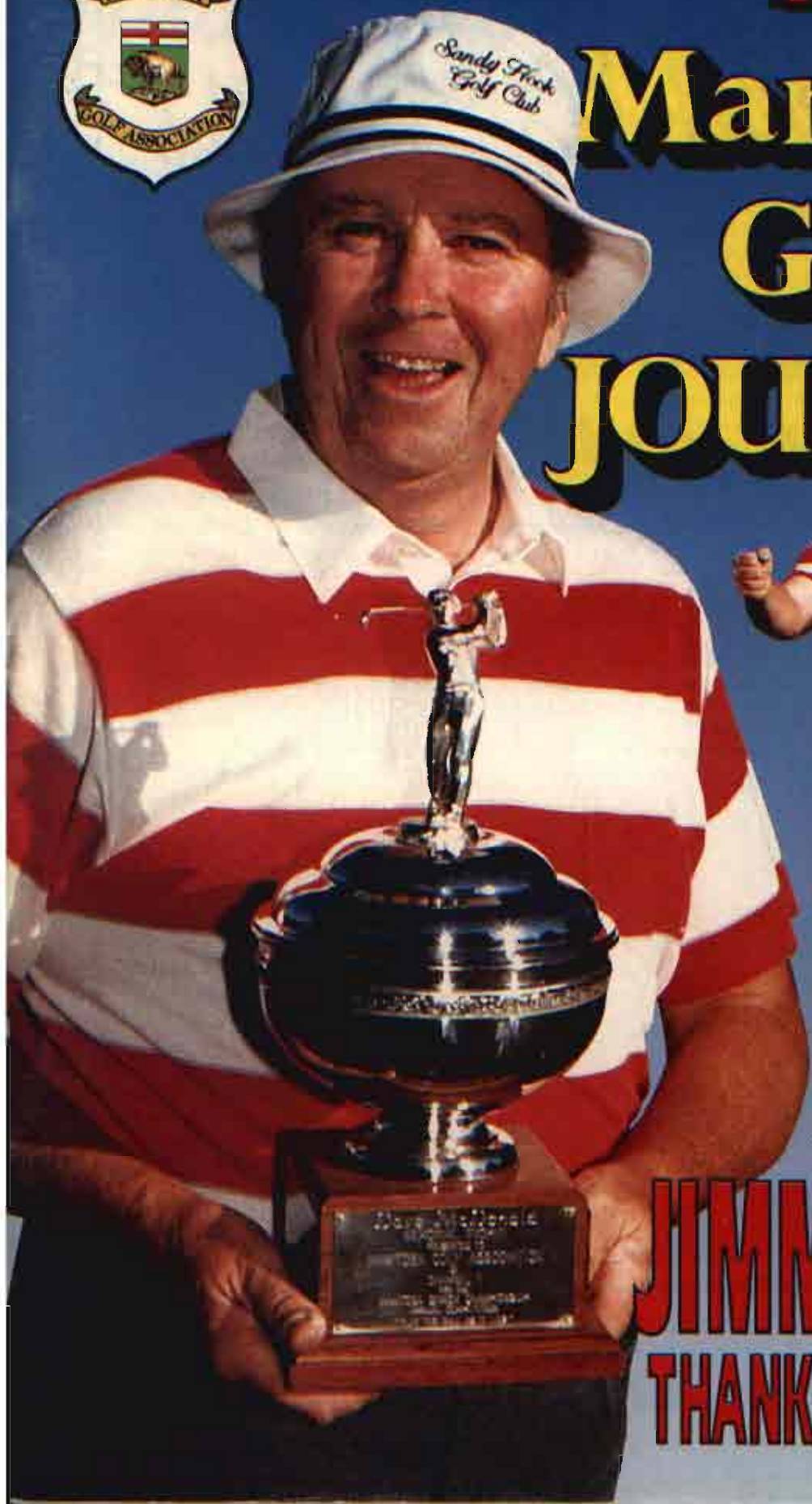

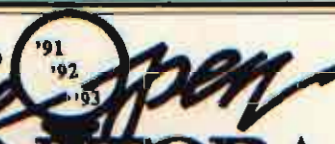
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Thanks for the memories

- 1951 - Manitoba junior golf champion.
- 1957 - Saskatchewan Open champion.
- 1958 - Thunder Bay Open champion.
- 1968 - Canadian amateur champion. (Also amateur medalist, first to parlay medal into amateur championship). Member of Canadian team at Eisenhower Cup matches in Australia, which finished third.
- 1970 - North Dakota State Open champion.
- 1976 - Manitoba amateur champion. (Made Willingdon Cup team 11 or 12 times. Manitoba amateur medalist three or four times.)
- 1988 - Runner-up Manitoba seniors, on provincial senior team, third in national seniors.
- 1989 - Manitoba seniors champion, tied for second in national seniors.
- 1990 - Manitoba seniors champion, third in nationals. Also: Grey Owl golf winner four times. Played head-to-head charity exhibition with Arnold Palmer in 1978 at Niakwa.

What is this? Better still, who is this? You're entitled to wonder.

An alien from another planet, perhaps, with a cross-handed grip? Some kind of golfing superman who looks down on mere mortals? Is there anything the guy hasn't won? Or Done?

Not much, now that the subject comes up, and if he missed anything it's too late now. The subject, naturally, is **Jimmy Doyle**, the One and Only, better known perhaps as Jumbo, and arguably the best golfer who ever lived here all his life.

That full and rewarding life came to an abrupt and shocking end on a splendid springtime Saturday in April, and Manitoba golf continues to mourn. It didn't seem possible that Jimmy could die at 58, he had so much more to live for and so much to

give the world and those who loved him.

Jimmy died where he would have wanted, given a choice, not that we ever get one. He was prowling his beautiful little Sandy Hook layout, getting ready to meet the masses shortly for another golf season, but now, when the masses come, Jumbo won't be there to greet them as only he could.

The smile, big as a sand trap. The handshake, like a vise. The breezy, infectious one-liners spawned through three or four decades as a raconteur, entertainer and all-round good guy.

There must be a million Jimmy Doyle stories, and he told them on himself at one time or another. They've been repeated ad infinitum, especially in the last few weeks when buddies and fans tried to recapture just a piece of Jumbo before letting him go to the Great Golf Course in the Sky.

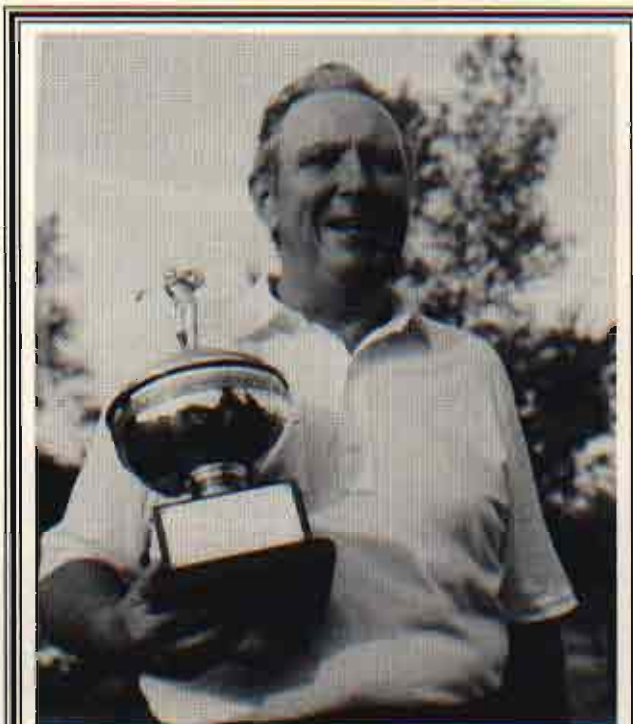
They'll always talk about his incredible sense of humor and how he lit up rooms, or even golf courses on dark days. They'll reminisce about his approach to the game, always with a smile, knowing it wasn't exactly brain surgery he was involved with out there. They'll continue to make fun of his short, choppy

swing, which obviously didn't come out of any teaching manual, but it got results, didn't it?

I knew Jumbo long before they started calling him that. About 40 years. It went back to junior basketball, when Jimmy was as good as any young shooter in town. He also pitched some ball, then he graduated into golf, then curling, then cards on the third floor of the Granite.

But golf wasn't just his business, as an owner and proprietor, it was his passion. Nobody else has won the Manitoba junior, amateur and senior, and it says right here that nobody ever will. It also says that nobody else will ask St. Peter what time the tee opens Up There.

Rest well, Jumbo, old friend, and good luck. You probably won't find anything to compare with The Hook and you'll have to give St. Pete strokes, you realize that. ☺

FROM THE MGA PRESIDENT

We commence the 1991 golf season on a sad note with the untimely passing of Jim Doyle, recognized as one of Manitoba's finest amateur golfers ever. Jim's presence at the various amateur events

around the province will be sadly missed.

Reports in from city and rural courses seem to indicate that the winter was not as harsh on the greens and general condition of courses as in 1990. Time, of course, will tell.

The 1991 tournament schedule has been expanded to include a mid-handicap event in August. Also, there are tentative plans to introduce a mini-tour to provide our better amateur players with a forum to improve their competitive skills. In addition, a competition with our neighbors to the south, namely, North Dakota, will begin this year involving eight of our best amateur

golfers. It is the feeling of the MGA that providing increased competition can only enhance our performance in national events.

Our golf course rating committee, after extensive training, will be very busy throughout the province and Northwestern Ontario re-rating golf courses to the SLOPE system of handicapping. This process will be done over a two-year period with all courses being simultaneously converted to the new method at that time.

The Manitoba Open has now moved to Breezy Bend and the Open committee is very optimistic that the event will experience its continued popularity as one of the premier stops on the Canadian Tour.

A sincere thank you goes out to all the corporate sponsors who support our activities, to the media for their excellent coverage of our tournaments and to the host golf clubs and their members for the generous use of their facilities.

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MGA SERVES GOLFERS IN MANY WAYS

The golfing fraternity first organized itself through the establishment of the Royal Canadian Golf Association (RCGA) in 1896. Provincial associations were also organized in their respective areas with the Manitoba Golf Association (MGA) acting as the governing authority in the province of Manitoba. All MGA member clubs also enjoy membership in the RCGA.

Through club affiliation, approximately 12,000 golfers in Manitoba have a voice in the governing of the MGA. Unpaid officers in this democratic, non-profit organization give generously of their time and talents by attending regular meetings and by serving on committees.

Eligible clubs and fees

Any organized golf club in the jurisdiction which has regularly appointed officers is eligible for membership in the association.

Member clubs pay yearly dues to the MGA for each male member 19 years of age and older. One half of all membership dues received by the association is forwarded to the RCGA. The MGA provides affiliated clubs with membership and handicap cards for their members.

Competitions

Competitive events involving all player brackets have long been a prominent function of the MGA. From the executive viewpoint they offer an opportunity to display skill at the game, encourage proficiency and provide exchange visits which do much to improve general playing standards.

Course rating and handicaps

The rating of players by the awarding of handicaps is the balancing factor which allows every golfer to participate on an equal basis. In no other sport have equalizing methods been so successful. The awarding of handicaps has been an important factor in bringing enjoyment to both casual and expert players in competition.

The MGA provides full particulars on the national handicapping system through handicap booklets and charts. All golf courses are similarly rated through the national course rating system. The MGA provides all member clubs with the official course rating booklet and is responsible for rating golf courses in Manitoba. As a result, all courses and players are rated in relation to a uniform standard throughout Canada.

Rules and etiquette

The present rules of golf represent the accumulated experience of two centuries

and were developed out of the play of the game. Golf can only thrive if all players become familiar with the letter of these laws as well as the spirit of the rules code. The MGA provides authoritative and alert administration of all phases of golf, a uniform code of Rules of Golf, rules interpretation and distribution of Rules of Golf booklets.

Junior development

A large portion of the MGA's budget is allotted to junior development programs. Through competition, the MGA selects a four man junior team, and with the assistance of the RCGA sponsors them annually in the Canadian Junior Championship. Numerous other competitions at the junior level are also organized by the MGA. Group instruction programs are supported and similar programs carried on at the club level are enthusiastically endorsed by our association.

Publicity

The news media is supplied with information on all MGA organized competitions and other events of interest to the golfing fraternity. Posters and entry forms are circulated to all member clubs well in advance of scheduled competitions. The MGA also produces an annual *Manitoba Golf Journal* as well as quarterly newsletters.

Technical assistance

The MGA has a Development Co-ordinator who is responsible for many of the association's programs.

One of the main objectives of the Development Co-ordinator is to promote the game as well as plan and co-ordinate basic fundamental and rules clinics in rural Manitoba where instruction is not readily available. Available to both juniors and adults, these clinics are arranged through member clubs and regional recreation associations. Clubs which are not members of the MGA receive an initial clinic but are not eligible for further clinics unless they become members of the MGA.

The Development Co-ordinator is also involved in organizing junior camps which include an Elite Camp, City Camp

and Rural Camp all aimed at helping to develop Manitoba's junior golfers.

To coincide with junior development, the MGA is also planning, designing and co-ordinating programs to provide golf exposure in the school systems (elementary, junior high, high school and university).

Another function of the Development Co-ordinator is that of organizing special seminars such as Junior Chairman, Rules, etc.

As well, the MGA is involved in administering a Video Library consisting of a variety of instructional tapes which may be borrowed at any time.

Finally, the MGA's Development Co-ordinator offers resource material in areas ranging from food and beverage management to turf grass information.

Manitoba Sports Federation/Provincial Sport Directorate

The MGA receives financial assistance from the Manitoba Sports Federation through the Manitoba Lotteries. These funds partially cover administration costs and services including office accommodation and related office services in the Administration Centre, as well as a substantial share of the Executive Director and office secretary salaries. The Technical Director's position and programs are made possible by the Manitoba Sports Federation.

The association also receives an annual grant from the Provincial Sport Directorate to assist in a wide variety of sport programming. The association reports to the department at the end of the season on the grant expenditures.

Manitoba Golf Association Foundation Inc.

The Manitoba Golf Association Foundation Inc. is an official charity established to provide periodic scholarships to young male or female golfers who reside in Manitoba.

Turf consultation service

In co-operation with the Golf Course Superintendents Association of Manitoba, a consulting service is available to clubs which may not have a full time superintendent.

MGA REPORT

NEW INITIATIVES TO HIGHLIGHT 1991

The 1991 golf season will see the Manitoba Golf Association (MGA) undertaking several new initiatives designed to improve the level of services and programs offered to the MGA membership. Four new competitive events will be added to the MGA tournament schedule for 1991. Developmentally, an additional Rural Junior Golf Camp will be conducted in 1991.

Finally, the MGA and the Royal Canadian Golf Association (RCGA) combined efforts to conduct a "Roadshow" at different locations throughout Manitoba in early May.

Mid Handicap Championship

An exciting new addition to the MGA's 1991 tournament schedule is the Mid Handicap Championship. The 1991 Mid Handicap will be held August 27 and 28 at Transcona Golf and Country Club.

This event will give players not eligible for the Manitoba Amateur a chance to compete for a provincial

championship. The Mid Handicap will be structured similarly to the Rural Amateur Championship with flighting based on handicaps.

The upper limit for handicap in this competition will be 18 with the lower handicap limit depending on the field of the Manitoba Amateur Championship. That is, those players in the eight to nine handicap range who are not accepted into the Manitoba Amateur will be eligible for the Mid Handicap Championship. Entries will be accepted on the basis of having approximately 12-14 players of each handicap in the accepted range.

Amateur Golf Tour

Manitoba's top calibre golfers will be happy to hear that their competitive schedule will be enhanced for 1991. While the details have not been finalized regarding the "tour", this concept will add three to four 36-hole events to the tournament schedule.

The players involved in these events will be those who made the 36-hole cut in the 1990 Manitoba Amateur Championship and those who make the

cut in the 1991 Amateur.

While dates and locations for the event are not set at this point, at least one of the amateur tour's stops will be held in September. The events comprising the tour will be held on weekends with tee times most likely to be in the afternoons.

From the players' perspective, this series of events will be quite interesting. Each stop on the tour will be worth points to the top 10-15 finishes. Therefore, besides having a winner at each stop, an overall champion will be declared based on the total points of the players.

This new series of events will hopefully help Manitoba's elite amateur players stay sharp throughout the entire golf season. As well, more competitive events involving the province's best players can only help Manitoba's players prepare for national events such as the Canadian Amateur Championship and the Willingdon Cup Team Championship.

Manitoba High School Golf Championship

Beginning in September of 1991, the MGA will conduct an annual High School Golf Championship. This event will be conducted in association with the Manitoba High School Athletics Association and the Manitoba Ladies Golf Association.

The 1991 Championship will be held on Saturday, September 28 at Carman Golf and Country Club. The Manitoba High School Golf Championship will feature the winners of the 17 zone qualification tournaments. Therefore, each school zone will be eligible to send one male and one female team to the provincial final. Each team will consist of four players and the scoring will be based on the best three of four scores on each team.

This tournament will provide students who excel at a sport other than the traditional school sports such as volleyball, basketball, track, etc. the opportunity to represent their school at a provincial championship.

Scholarships awarded

Manitoba - North Dakota matches

For the first time in 1991, Manitoba's top amateur players will compete against the best amateur players from the state of North Dakota. The top eight players from the 1990 Willingdon Cup Team Trials will comprise the 1991 team which will face the eight players from North Dakota.

This year's matches, to be held in North Dakota, will be contested similarly to the Manitoba-Minnesota junior matches. One day of competition will feature singles match play competition with the second day featuring four-ball (best ball) competition. The location of the matches will alternate between Manitoba and North Dakota golf courses.

Again, this new event will provide the province's elite amateur players another competitive experience which will hopefully increase performance levels at national events.

Rural junior golf camps

Also for the first time in 1991, the MGA will be conducting two golf camps for juniors in rural

Manitoba. Both camps are aimed at those young players who are 16 and under with a handicap above 10. These are the players that can make a good jump in their skill level with some formal instruction.

One camp will be held in Minnedosa on July 16 and 17 with the second rural junior camp being held in Steinbach on July 22 and 23. Having the two camps in diverse locations will allow for more young golfers to participate from across the entire province and Northwest Ontario.

MGA/RCGA Roadshow

During the week of May 13-17, 1991, the MGA and the RCGA combined efforts to conduct a series of informal presentations in different regions of Manitoba.

Golf clubs in five different regions of the province acted as host of each stop. Other golf clubs in the host's respective region were invited to send representatives of their club (eg. President, Club Captain, Greens Chairman, Golf Course Superintendent, etc.) to enjoy a day of golf with representatives of the MGA and RCGA, an informal dinner and a presentation by the MGA and RCGA on the programs that each have to offer. ○



Rare ace for Teplitski

Pine Ridge's Carl Teplitski had good reason to smile on June 17, 1990 (Father's Day) when he scored an extremely rare hole-in-one on the Ridge's 9th hole. Since the course was opened in 1912, unofficial records indicate that Carl's ace was only the second ever scored on this true golf test. The hole's only other conqueror was Bill Ezinicki in the late 1940s.

The hole is 234 yards straight uphill with golfers usually playing into a strong headwind. "It plays more like 260 yards," says Carl. "I've seen many pros have trouble reaching it with a driver."

The big stick is exactly what Carl used for his feat which made 1990 a very special year, particularly since he also aced Pine Ridge's 14th hole two months later. Congratulations Carl. ○

Dallis Beck was recognized by his peers as a professional in his chosen career as a sports writer and editor.



I like to think of Dallis as a professional in another way as well - He was a professional friend.

The dictionary describes a friend as one who has kindly feeling towards another, a close companion. Dallis Beck surely fits that definition.

To know him was something special. He was an individual who thoroughly loved life, one who truly enjoyed the little things. And, he was quick to share his joys with others.

I'm sure everyone can recall happy memories involving Dallis. And, the memories will all be joyful because Dallis Beck lived life to the fullest and always enjoyed a story-telling session. Usually his stories were about himself and he was the butt of them.

He loved his association with the Grey Owl golf tournament, his involvement with the Golden Falcon and the International tournaments and, going back a little further, the trips to Brandon for the Western Open, or to Kenora for the Labor Day weekends.

He enjoyed curling in the Sportsmen's League and he attended nearly all of the 34 Newsmen's bonspiels held. He loved his role on the stage when the Press Club presented The Front Page.

He was a past president of the sportswriters association and one of his proudest moments came when he was inducted into the Media Roll of Honor. How he treasured that plaque.

Through it all, Dallis was a true professional, one of the best sportswriters and copy editors you could hope to meet. He covered his beats thoroughly and he made friends at every turn.

But, he never took it too seriously. Dallis knew we weren't involved in earth-shattering news; we weren't dealing with rocket scientists. We toiled in the toy department. It was only a game, he would say.

Life was a game for Dallis. He played it to the fullest. He played it hard and he enjoyed it all the way. He brought pleasure to all who knew him. ○

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NEW SLOPE SYSTEM ENHANCES FAIRNESS AND ACCURACY OF HANDICAPS

Golfers have been hearing for the past few years about a new method of course rating, called SLOPE, but what does it all mean and how does it affect golf as we know it today?

The SLOPE system adjusts a golfer's handicap to the course he is playing, thereby eliminating what is commonly known as the "portability problem." For example, if a 5-handicapper from Pine Ridge invites a 20-handicapper from Kildonan to play a match at the 'Ridge, little good can come from the arrangement. The length and difficulty of Pine Ridge would destroy the man from Kildonan, who will be a burden on his host and an embarrassment to himself. He's more like a 28 handicapper when playing at Pine Ridge.

In the reverse situation, there would be an embarrassment of another kind, the 5-handicapper from the 'Ridge would be like letting a fox into the chicken coop.

THE SLOPE SYSTEM ADJUSTS A GOLFER'S HANDICAP TO THE COURSE HE IS PLAYING.

The United States Golf Association (USGA) has derived a national average "SLOPE Rating" of 113. Don't be concerned about where this number comes from, just recognize the fact that courses above average in difficulty will have a rating higher than 113, while easier courses will have a rating under 113. Kildonan, for example, may have a rating of 95, while Pine Ridge may be 123.

When the system goes into effect during the next few years, each golfer will receive a new handicap which will be expressed in tenths of a stroke. Instead of being a 10, a golfer may be a

10.2 or a 9.7. This will be known as the RCGA (USGA) Handicap Index. A Handicap Index is converted to a "Course Handicap" by means of a Course Handicap Table. Each course will have its own conversion table which will be based on the SLOPE Rating of the course being played. The table will provide a different rating for each set of tees on the same course.

Under the RCGA (USGA) Handicap System, golfers will still be required to calculate their best 10 scores of the last 20 games. This handicap differential is then multiplied by 113, divided by the SLOPE Rating for the course and rounded off to the nearest tenth.

When our 10.2 handicapper plays from the blue tees at his own course, he may be a 12, however when he plays from the white tees he will likely be a 10. Now, when this player goes to play a course with above average difficulty, he may be an 11, 12, or a 13. Conversely, when he plays an easier course, he may be a 7, 8, or 9. The handicap range between courses (or tees) is based upon the SLOPE Rating of that particular course. Golfers merely refer to the SLOPE Rating chart to see what handicap they are to play with on a given day.

The Manitoba Golf Association (MGA) is now charged with the responsibility of re-rating all member golf courses throughout the province during the next two years utilizing strict rating guidelines. Previous course ratings left a lot to be desired because they were based primarily on length. Under the new system, the criteria include width of fairway, thickness of rough, topography, water hazards, out-of-bounds, trees, bunkers, greens (size, contour, and speed) and psychological considerations. The MGA rating teams will now be required to arrive at two numbers for each obstacle for each hole, one for scratch golfers and one for the average or bogey golfer.

When the rating team evaluates and weights the obstacles (to show the

relative contribution each obstacle makes to the playing of a hole), the total figure is converted to show the effect it will have on the golfer in terms of strokes. Yardage is then factored in to produce the final course rating.

The system takes the difference between the scratch and the bogey ratings for a course and applies a special formula to convert that difference into a SLOPE.

Now to recap, after your course has been re-rated and assigned a SLOPE number, you will receive a RCGA Handicap Index which will be expressed in decimals. This is not your playing handicap, either at your home course or away. Before you play, you will refer to a Course Handicap Table which will be posted for each set of tees. The table will convert your Handicap Index to the number of strokes you will receive that day.

Doubtless, all of this seems pretty murky now, but after you've been through the routine once, you'll wonder why it took so long to come up with the idea. ☺

WHO'S MINDING THE SCORE? GAVIN MCFADZEAN THAT'S WHO!

There is an exhausting amount of preparatory work to be done for each Manitoba Golf Association event. But, for volunteer extraordinaire **Gavin McFadzean**, it's all a labour of love.

Gavin handles starter's duties for all of the MGA's Winnipeg-based events including the preparation of draws and score sheets, arranging for supplies, directing golfers at the tee and the proper recording of event results.

"Your biggest duties run from June to the end of August and you're going pretty steady," he says. "Sometimes, you're finishing up a tournament on a Sunday but you've got to get another one started on Monday."

It's a big job, all right, but one that enabled Gavin to play an active role in the Manitoba golf community.

"I've been involved in golf since I was a caddy back in 1929 at St. Charles Country Club," he says. "During the Depression years, I started to work in the country. I didn't golf much until 1955 and then I became a member of Elmhurst in 1956."

Gavin made quite an impression at Elmhurst during his long-time association with the Club where he often volunteered his time and even his electrical expertise. His contribution was such that he was awarded an Honorary Life Membership to Elmhurst.

Gavin switched his focus to MGA events once he volunteered to assist then-starter Bob Brown.

"Bob lived two streets over and he was told by Bud Foster that I would be interested in being an assistant. He came over and asked me if I would like to volunteer and I said 'yes'," recalls Gavin. "The first tournament I was at was at Niakwa in 1979. The following year, Bob didn't want to do the draws for the

tournaments, so I took over."

Draw preparation is an awesome organizational task, especially at larger events like the 1990 Manitoba Amateur which featured more than 300 golfers. But the experienced McFadzean speaks of his duties as though they were a mere stroll on the fairway.

"You try to get all the names of the golfers, their handicaps and what clubs they're at," he says. "Don't try to have three people from the same club together. You like to have one member from each

all the golf clubs in Winnipeg while affording him the opportunity to indulge his love of meeting people.

"I was a businessman all my life and I was interested in meeting different people," he says. "That's why I've worked all these tournaments and I've met all these 'strangers' from other provinces. In the Manitoba Open, I've met people from all over the States and Canada."

Gavin spent most of his life working with people as one of the principals in a successful electrical contracting business.

Two heart attacks convinced him that he ought to retire in 1973. Though "retired", he continued to assist his business partners until 1976.

"It was either be the richest man in the cemetery or the poorest man alive and I wanted to be the poorest," he laughs.

Coming from hearty Scottish stock, health problems haven't hindered Gavin's dedication to the game. Despite several major operations and troublesome arthritis, his irrepressible spirit keeps him going.

"When you get involved in volunteer work, you've got to take an interest in it. If you don't take an interest, there's no sense in volunteering," he says. "It's the same thing whether you belong to

a church, club or any organization. If you're going to belong to an organization, give your full attention to it. This is what I did with the MGA because I love golf."

At its 1988 annual awards dinner, MGA made a special presentation to Gavin in recognition of his dedication and long-standing contribution to Manitoba golf; a gesture the personable volunteer found very satisfying.

"I don't care if they pay me a nickel or buy me a coffee," he says. "I just like to go out there and help. As long as they're willing to ask me, I'm willing to help them." ☺



club all the way down the list. It takes a bit of time but it's not hard at all."

Perhaps not hard, but time-consuming; a factor that has had other implications for Gavin's hobby.

"I found out that being involved with volunteer work, my own golf started to falter," he laughs. "I was only getting in about nine games of golf which quickly became about six because you're involved every week of the summer. When you get really involved in golf, you're willing to give up your own golf."

It's an even trade, though, as his volunteer endeavours enable him to visit

WINNING BECOMES A FAMILY AFFAIR

The McMillans of Manitoba golf seem to be turning into the same sort of sports phenomenon as the Sutters of the National Hockey League.

Rob McMillan followed his brother Dave into the Manitoba golf limelight with his selection as Labatt's 1990 Manitoba Golfer of the Year. With brother Dave claiming the honour in 1989, Rob's selection marked the first time brothers have been awarded the coveted honour in consecutive years.

"It was a great honour because I was nominated with two very good golfers," says McMillan of his co-nominees Sandy Hook's Jim Doyle and Elmhurst's Carl Lechman. "To be there with them is an honour in itself."

Rob got a taste of golf at a youthful age and now, at 15, his appetite for the game seems insatiable.

He won the 13-14 age group at the Manitoba Junior and finished fifth at the Canadian Junior while claiming low individual honours in the latter. Rob was triumphant in the Canadian juvenile men's golf championship and led Manitoba to its second straight Western Canadian juvenile team title.

"When I first started playing at age five, it was a lot of fun and my Dad taught me a few things," Rob recalls. "Ever since, I've just loved it. There hasn't ever been a decision to do something else. I've always wanted to play golf. There's never been a day when I didn't really want to play."

Now, McMillan is impressing observers wherever he goes but he stresses that he wants to be known as a good golfer and not necessarily a good *young* golfer.

All the attention he's received in the past year was inspired by his remarkable season; the result of talent, hard work and goal-setting.

"This year, I had high hopes," he says. "I had set myself some goals that I knew I'd have to work for and I did. But it's just a matter of it all falling into place at the right time. I wanted to compete in and win the Westerns, come in the top four in the Junior and make the Junior team. Winning wasn't the big thing at the Canadians. Sure, it's great, but I just wanted to give it a good shot. Before the 4th round, I said to myself 'you've come here and you've done what you wanted to do already so just go out there and do the best you can. What happens, happens.' Luckily, it went my way."

The McMillans — father Jim, mother Cheryl, brothers Dave and Darren — are members of Pine Ridge and golf together as frequently as their schedules will allow. Their dedication to the

game and mutual support has paid off in spades. Dave and Darren both attend U.S. colleges on golf scholarships, a path Rob hopes to follow once he graduates from Mennonite Brethren Collegiate Institute where he is currently in the ninth grade.

While other people his age are out enjoying the lazy days of summer, Rob can be found honing his craft on the local golf course in pursuit of his dream of turning pro.

"My friends always say 'we'll never see you this summer.' But, for what I want to do, it's not like I'm out there working so hard. It's not work to me; it's more like I'm out there because I'm having fun, no matter if I'm practicing or playing."

McMillan has received some coaching tips from pro Randy Brekke over the past three seasons, admires the play of professional Curtis Strange and his family continues to be a major influence on his attitude and his golf game.

"My brothers help each other out a lot," says Rob. "When

you're at home, you're brothers but when you step on the course, they're just like any other player."

So what does the Boy Wonder do for an encore?

"For this season, I have basically the same goals as last year," he says. "I want to come close to winning the Junior. It would be great for our Western team to repeat again—that would be four in a row for Manitoba. I'd like to see the Canadian Junior team do well as they haven't won that in a while. I want to play down in the States a couple of times to see the competition down there and to see how far I'll have to go from the way I am now to being good enough to play in their tournaments. The jump from the amateurs to the pros is a sizeable one but not an impossible task."

It's McMillan's undeniable talent, positive outlook and work ethic that will propel him in the direction he seeks. He knows what it

takes to be a champion and he seems prepared to make the sacrifices that go along with achieving that distinction.

"No matter what sport you play, it's a lot of hard work," he says. "The thing I've learned to tell myself is 'never say never' because if you believe you can do it, that's all that matters. I've learned to shut out what others might be saying and do what you know is right. That's what my family's been teaching me. I know if I do that—do what's right—I'm going to go right somewhere."

Somewhere, indeed. ☉



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FANNING CAPTURES AMATEUR

Competition was especially keen but Southwood's **Todd Fanning** showed the stuff that's made him a champion and a fan favourite as he held off a determined **Dale Goehring** enroute to his second Manitoba Amateur Golf Championship played July 10-13 at St. Boniface.

Qualifying round play

Seventy-two golfers advanced to the Manitoba Amateur championship at St. Boniface paced by a 48-year-old retired RCMP sergeant during qualifying round action at Niakwa.

Bob Bingham of Selkirk shot an even-par 72 to lead the field of 142 vying for the remaining 72 spots in the championship event.

Bingham carded four birdies and four bogeys enroute to his first place finish. One stroke back was 1967 amateur champion **Terry More** of Elmhurst.

Following the leaders were Transcona's **Gilbert Verrier** (74), **Jim Shirley** of St. Boniface (75), **Derek Ingram** of Sandy Hook (75) and Elmhurst's **Rob MacDonald** (75).

A score of 83 or better was necessary to qualify and the 72 spots were filled without the necessity of a playoff.

After capturing the 1990 provincial junior title a week previous, many observers might

have wondered what **Dale Goehring** would do for an encore.

Goehring was the toast of first round action, opening a four-stroke lead after his five-under-par 67; the only golfer in the field to finish below par 72.

But Goehring's lightning round wasn't the only excitement on day one. **Bryant Robert** highlighted his opening

round 74 with a hole-in-one on the 18th hole at St. Boniface.

Meanwhile, six golfers made par — **Gil Chartier** of St. Boniface, **Rob Doucette** of Dauphin, Pine Ridge's **Darcy Furber**, **Grant Foster** of Niakwa, **Bruce Norman** of Carman and former champion **Billy Parker**.

Joining former champ **Todd Fanning**

at six strokes back were **Carl Lechman** and **Dave Lupyrypa** of Elmhurst, **Todd Teplitski** of Pine Ridge, **Michael MacKay** of Breezy Bend, **Derek Toth** of Rossmere, St. Boniface's **Dave McLeod** and **Ron Castelane** of Niakwa.

Unpredictable performances inspired by brisk winds helped tighten the field after second round play.

First round leader Goehring shot a two-over-par 74 for a 36-hole total of 141. Hot on his heels were Niakwa's **Grant Foster** (142), Pine Ridge's **Todd Teplitski** (143) and Breezy Bend's **Michael MacKay** (143).

Former Amateur and junior champion **Todd Fanning** of Southwood tied with **Dave McLeod** of St. Boniface with a two-round total of 145.

A former Manitoba Athlete of the Year, **Todd Fanning** led the pack after three rounds of play with a 54-hole total of 214.

Fanning demonstrated remarkable accuracy enroute to his third round 69, three-under-par. He had birdies on the fourth, fifth, 10th and 11th holes along with several near-misses.

"I was getting my shots in close all the way," the former Canadian junior champ told reporters. "I could have been a lot lower if some of the putts had dropped. I'm just concentrating on keeping it in play, hitting mostly a one-iron or three-iron off the tees."

Breezy Bend's Dale Goehring, who led through the first two rounds, was four shots behind Fanning with his second place 218. Todd Teplitski of Pine Ridge and Breezy Bend's Michael MacKay followed at 219.

Final round action was a fight to the finish between Fanning and Goehring who were separated by four strokes going into the final round.

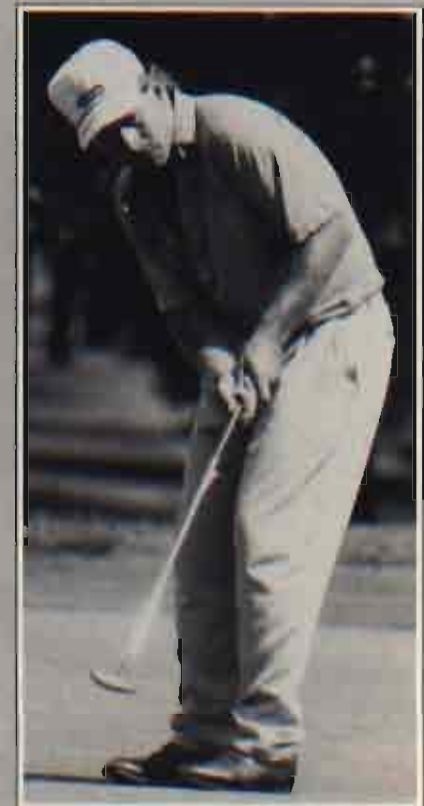
Goehring pulled even at the 10th hole but wasn't able to oust Fanning who finished with a five-over-par 77 for a 72-hole total of 291. Goehring shot a 75 to finish at 293. No one else really came close as the dynamic duo fought it out on the back nine for the Amateur crown.

Todd Teplitski of Pine Ridge and Michael MacKay of Breezy Bend each shot 78 for 297 leaving them in a three-way tie for third place overall with Glendale's Jeff Helper who shot a final round 76.

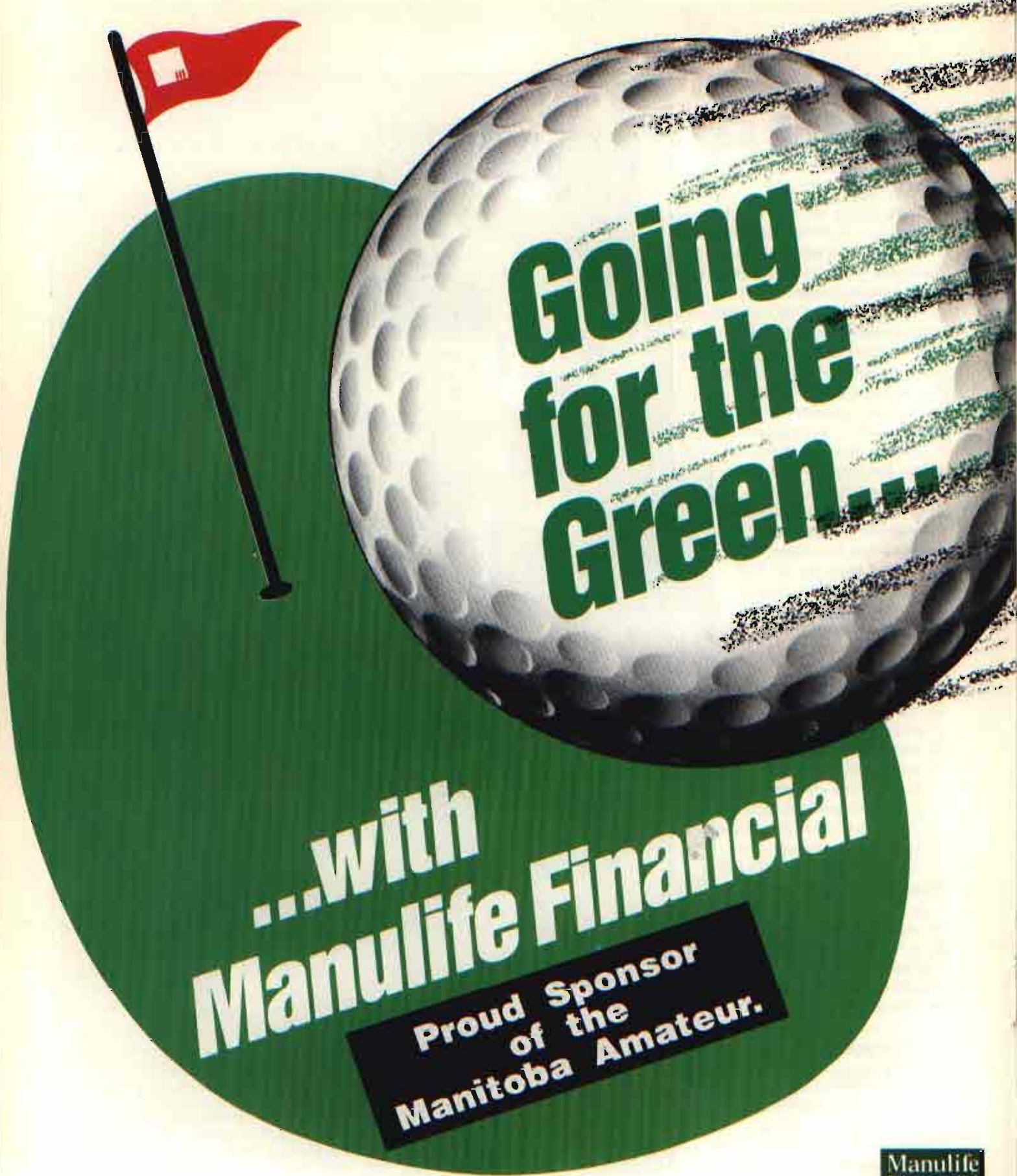
A closing one-over-par 73 moved defending Amateur champ Dave McMillan of Elmhurst into another three-way tie at 298 along with Ken Warwick of Niakwa and Warren Scott of St. Boniface.

Willingdon Cup trials

A new MGA rule disallowing junior age players on the Willingdon Cup team made Goehring ineligible so 27 golfers moved on to two more rounds at

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Bel Acres to determine who would be on the four-man team that would represent Manitoba at the nationals. Business commitments forced Glendale's **David Wolch** to withdraw, leaving 26 golfers in contention.

Todd Fanning maintained a comfortable lead after the first round of play, posting a 76 for a five-round total of 367 and a five-shot lead over 1989 Amateur champ Dave McMillan of Rossmore who stood at 372.

Eight strokes back of the leader was Glendale's Jeff Helper at 378 and Todd Teplitski of Pine Ridge was another shot

back but close enough for the fourth team spot going into final round play.

Fanning captured the number one spot with a closing 76 for a six-round total of 443.

1989's Labatt Golfer of the Year Dave McMillan of Elmhurst shot an even-par 72 in the last round to finish just one stroke back of Fanning. Todd Teplitski of Pine Ridge nabbed the third spot with a final round 74 and a six-round total of 450.

Bel Acres's Michael MacKay started slowly but finished big, drilling a sensational five-wood shot to within

three feet of the cup on the 18th hole. His resulting eagle three vaulted him into the fourth and final position on the province's Willingdon Cup team.

Onto the nationals

In Willingdon Cup play at the 6,689 yard, par-72 Weston Golf and Country Club in Toronto, Manitoba finished third behind first place Ontario and second place Alberta.

Under a scoring system where the best three scores count, Manitoba team members finished play 21 strokes back of the leaders. Todd Fanning shot 78-75 for 153; Michael McKay carded 73-72 for 145; Dave McMillan recorded 72-76 for 148 and Todd Teplitski scored 78-79 for 157. Manitoba also maintained third place after first round action.

Dave McMillan shot the best round among individual golfers- 72 -in the first round of play. One stroke back was Michael MacKay. ○

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BLOOM BLOSSOMS INTO CHAMPION

Neither rain nor wind nor lightning nor broken clubs could keep these couriers from their appointed rounds. But when all was said and done, San Diego's **Jeff Bloom** emerged victorious at the 1990 Manitoba Open.

Despite a late afternoon rain delay, the 26-year-old fourth-year pro carded a final round 64 enroute to the \$18,000 first prize; Bloom's biggest pay day ever.

His final day 64 gave him a tournament total of 264; 16-under-par and a new Manitoba Open record. Another record was set by spectators who turned out in unprecedented numbers to witness final day action.

Two strokes back of Bloom was local favourite **Glen Hnatiuk**, a former Pine Ridge member now of Pointe Clear, Alberta, and international veteran **Jerry Anderson**. Another shot back was Mexico's **Carlos Espinosa**, while third round leader **John Morse** finished fifth at 269.

They say it's lonely at the top but not so on this day. At one point, six players

shared the lead at 11-under-par and several others were within striking range.

Bloom began the fourth and final round three back of Morse but a four-under 31 on the front nine boosted him into the lead. His back nine 33 was enough for the win.

The low key Bloom birdied the par 5 17th hole and when informed on the 18th he was two up, chose the safe route, playing for the win with a six-iron, wedge and two putts.

Selkirk native Glen Hnatiuk recorded his third 65 but his 40 on the front nine in third-round play proved costly.

"That cost me the tournament," Hnatiuk said in retrospect. "But I'm happy. I came in wanting to get into contention and things moved pretty quickly when I shot those two 65s."

Winner of the 1979 Open, Anderson shot a final round 64 highlighted by eagles on the par-four 10th and 17th.

Joe Lloyd of Illinois had the distinction of recording the best round of the tournament with a 62 in final round action.

As has become the norm for the Manitoba Open, spectators turned out in record numbers.

Top Manitoban was **Pat Kemball** of Carman who finished tied for 18th, earning \$462.50 for a 72-hole total of 284.

It seems Mother Nature wasn't the only one creating havoc for golfers on this outing as some were creating it themselves.

Florida's **Rocky Walcher** broke his putter while "tossing" it into his bag after a particularly frustrating double bogey. Clubs damaged under such circumstances can't be replaced until after the round so Walcher improvised, finishing out play putting with his driver. And he made it work for him, recording a birdie and an eagle.

Forever flamboyant **Kelly Murray** of Vancouver ripped a 328-yard drive on the 11th hole during second-round action which sailed dangerously close to the head of amateur **Dave Komora** who was in the process of putting.

Qualifying rounds

A total of 22 golfers from a field of 41 earned berths in the Open through qualifying round action held July 16 at Pine Ridge. The number of available berths was higher than usual as the Canadian Tour didn't require its full quota since some players decided to forego the Manitoba event.

Former Manitoban **Terry Hashimoto** led the way with a three-under-par 69, one stroke ahead of Brandon's **Tom Relf** and two in front of Elmhurst assistant pro **Brian Clark**.

Qualifying spots were claimed by six amateurs and 16 pros. Another six players (including three amateurs) played their way on to the alternate list.

Four more golfers were added to the list of qualifiers after being granted exemptions by the Southwood committee

including 1990 Amateur champ **Todd Fanning** and U.S. pros **Lee Porter**, **Doug Martin** and **Rob Sullivan**.

Leading professional qualifiers were St. Boniface assistant pro **Barry Gibson**, **Drew Hartt** of Calgary and Thunder Bay's **Michael Hutcheon** who recorded

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matching two-over-par 74s. Elmhurst head pro **Laurie Pierce** shot a 75 to earn his place in the Open.

Rounding out the professional qualifiers were **Dan Scanlon** of John Blumberg (77); **Tom Humniski** of Bel Acres (78); **Eric Paquet** of Vimy, Quebec (78); **John Isaac** of Tuxedo (79); **Mike Fenske** of Steinbach (79); **Garth Goodbrandson** of The Pas (79); another of the Golden Jet's talented sons, **Blake Hull** of Orlando, Florida (79); and **Jeff Hotchkiss** of Calgary (80).

Hotchkiss, who turned pro in December '89, scored a birdie on the first playoff hole (Pine Ridge's 17th) to land the final spot after five players tied with 80.

Low amateur honours were shared by **Darcy Furber** of Pine Ridge, **Rob Loewen** of Rossmere and **Jim Lazarko** of Pine Falls, each with 76.

Rounding out the list of qualifiers were Rossmere's **Andrew Taylor** at 77; Manitoba Junior champ **Dale Goehring** of Breezy Bend (78); **Jason Duncan** of Blumberg (78); and Swift Current's **Jeff Gross** with 79.

Shoot-out showdown

A unique feature of the 1990 Open was a seven-man, six-hole shoot-out event held July 18 at Southwood. One golfer was eliminated from play on each hole and it came down to a one-hole showdown

between defending Manitoba Open champion **Stuart Hendley** and former Manitoba champ **Jerry Anderson** of Scarborough, Ontario.

Hendley won the challenge and the \$1000 first prize with a birdie on the final hole. Anderson received \$550 as runner-up.

Pro-Am play

Wind was a nuisance this day as the Pro-Am Tournament got underway but it didn't take away from the excitement as not one, but two aces were scored.

Amateur **Gord Neis**, 32, scored a hole-in-one on the 152-yard ninth hole. The former Southwood member now living in Regina won a 1991 Ford Explorer 4X4 for his feat making his first-ever ace especially satisfying. With the truck's value estimated at \$28,000, Neis also became the Open's biggest winner.

When reminded he would lose his amateur status if he accepted the truck, Neis promptly replied: "Who cares?"

Earlier in the day, Quebec pro **Jean-Louis Lamarre** used his wedge to record his third career hole-in-one, winning an E-Z-Go golf cart for his efforts.

Pros **Dave DeLong** of Portland and South African **Ashley Chinner** who plays out of Scarborough, Ontario led the individual scorers with six-under-par 64s. One stroke back were **Mickey Yokoi** of Los Angeles and **Tom Jackson** of Toronto.

Kelly Murray of Vancouver took top honours for the longest drive with a 343-yarder on the 17th hole.

Vancouver's Kelly Murray and Bob Swinnerton of Cupertino, California led their team of Jeff Rouse, Dean Abrassart and Paul Andrews to a third place finish with 198 points.

The Big One begins

July 19 saw the beginning of the grand finale — the Manitoba Open.

After first round play, two former Manitoba Amateur champions now playing professionally were among the leaders, to the delight of the hometown audience.

Mexico's Carlos Espinosa and John Morse of Casselberry, Florida shared the first round lead with six-under-par 64s. Meanwhile, former Manitobans Glen Hnatiuk and Kevin Baker recorded scores of 65 and 67, respectively.

At the halfway point, hometown favourite Hnatiuk was the leader with a 10-under-par, two-day total of 130. One

stroke behind the leader was Carlos Espinosa (64-67=131) and John Morse (64-69=133).

After three rounds of play, Morse was out in front at 197, 13-under-par and one

stroke ahead of Espinosa.

Two strokes back at 10-under was Seattle's Jeff Bloom, the eventual winner. At 9-under with a third-round 71 was Glen Hnatiuk.

The conclusion of the 1990 Open was sentimental for many as the premiere event officially bade farewell to Southwood, its home since 1984.

Southwood's Director of Golf, Barry McWha also said 'so long' but for different reasons. The popular pro is moving to Qualicum Beach, British Columbia.

In its association with Southwood, the Manitoba Open has grown from a \$12,000, 54-hole local event to a \$100,000, 72-hole nationally-recognized tournament deemed by many players to be "the best stop on the Canadian Tour."

As the action moves over to the Breezy Bend Country Club for the next three years, the formidable task of Open organization falls to Breezy Bend's Terry Patton and the Manitoba Golf Association's Don Craig. ○

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GOEHRING TRIUMPHS WITH LAST DAY HEROICS

Breezy Bend's **Dale Goehring** managed to overcome **Rob McMillan's** five-stroke lead going into the final round to win the 1990 Manitoba Junior Men's Golf Championship held July 3-6 at Elmhurst and Transcona.

Goehring carded a one-over-par 72 for a 72-hole total of 300; two strokes ahead of McMillan whose closing round 79 left him at 302.

Competition was keen in final round action and, at one point, there was a four-way tie for first place.

Swinging in the rain

Heavy rains rolled in during the day but many, including Goehring, seemed undeterred.

"It didn't really bother me," Goehring said later. "I've had a lot of experience in bad weather and I have a good cover on my bag. My grips didn't get wet at all."

Southwood's **Jeff Ciecko** repeated as winner in the 15-16 age group with a closing 76 for 305; good for third place overall. Elmhurst's **Derron Magda** was runner-up in the 15-16 age grouping with a 314.

For the second year in a row, Rob McMillan of Pine Ridge topped the 13-14 age class with runner-up honours going to Assiniboine's **Jamie Wilkie**.

The 12-and-under title went to **Daniel Chartrand** of Southwood with runner-up honours going to **David Francis** of Kenora.

For Dale Goehring, the victory represented a sweep for the Breezy Bend member. Goehring's name now appears on each of the 13-14, 15-16 and 17-18 age divisional and overall trophies. He also won the 1988 Canadian juvenile title which prompted his selection as Manitoba Golfer of the Year.

Remembering round one

Seventeen-year-old **Tyler Rice** led the way with a two-under-par 69 after first round play at Transcona. A half-hour rain delay didn't stop Rice from recording 4 birdies on the day.

Rice was two strokes up on Rob McMillan of Pine Ridge and three up on Assiniboine's Jamie Wilkie, Carman's **Shane McCartney** and Rob Doucette of Dauphin.

The second time around

After second round play, the lead switched to Rob McMillan. Despite brisk winds, 14-year-old McMillan shot a two-over-par 73 at Elmhurst for a 36 hole total of 144.

His performance gave him a three-shot lead in the quest for the overall junior championship and top honours in the 13-14 age group by a comfortable nine-stroke margin.

Though McMillan seemed undaunted by the brisk breezes, some of his competitors didn't fare quite as well.



After losing the 1989 title on the third extra hole, Breezy Bend's Dale Goehring was not to be denied in '90 coming from five strokes behind on the final day to win the Championship.

Sixty-five golfers with two-day scores of 169 or better qualified for the final two rounds. First round leader Tyler Rice soared to 91 after a 69 a day earlier.

Other golfers in contention were Niakwa's **Scott Stephenson** (74-73 — 147), Southwood's **Andy Nemiroff** (78-73 — 151), Southwood's **Travis Tetrault** and Dauphin's **Rob Doucette**, each sitting at 152.

Fourteen-year-old Jamie Wilkie of Assiniboine had a two-day total of 153, good for second place in the 13-14 age group. Also at 153 were Marc Cadieux of St. Charles and Breezy Bend's **Tom Pratt**.

Pre-tournament favourite Dale Goehring sat alone in ninth place with a 36-hole total of 154.

Onto the third round

Breezy Bend's Tom Pratt carded a one-over-par 72 on Day Three — the best of the day — to move into contention going into the final round.

Pine Ridge's Rob McMillan maintained a two-shot lead over Pratt and Niakwa's Scott Stephenson who were tied at 225.

Rob Doucette of Dauphin, Breezy Bend's Dale Goehring and Jeff Ciecko of Southwood moved into closer contention.

McMillan's third round 73 seemed to put him into a solid lead heading into the final round but it was not to be.

Junior team trials

Seventeen golfers with a four-round total of 316 or better qualified for team trials held July 14 at Bel Acres.

Junior champ Dale Goehring of Breezy Bend earned the right to represent Manitoba after leading the way in junior team trials.

Goehring finished the trials with a six-round total of 452, while Juvenile champion Jeff Ciecko overcame some brisk breezes to post the final round's best score — one-over-par 73 — two shots behind Goehring.

The last two team berths were awarded to Dauphin's Rob Doucette and Tom Pratt of Breezy Bend. Doucette recorded a final round 83 for a total of 466 and Pratt shot an 80 for a total of 470.

Elmhurst's Jeff Lailey, a former team member, nailed down fifth place and the alternate designation should any of the four team members have been unable to go to the national championship August 28-31 in Saskatoon.

Onto the nationals

It was a great day for Manitobans at the Canadian Junior Men's Golf Championship at Saskatoon's Riverside Golf and Country Club.

Rob McMillan led all Manitoba golfers, coming from behind to capture the national juvenile championship for golfers aged 16 and under. His 75 in strong winds gave him a 72-hole total of 299, one stroke ahead of Ontario's Jeremy Julie who shot a final round 79.

The talented young McMillan also finished in fifth place in the overall standings, six strokes behind champion Gregg Trammell of British Columbia.

Keith Whitecotton of Alberta shot a

final round 73 to claim runner-up honours at 296. With Andrew Smith of B.C. and Brad Dexter of Ontario sharing third place at 298.

Meanwhile, Manitoba junior champ Dale Goehring carded the best score of the final round with an even-par 72 to finish at 310.

Manitoba juvenile champion Jeff Ciecko finished with a 78 for 308, Derron Magda of Elmhurst shot an 80 for 309, Pratt closed at 310, Mike Ciecko at 311, Jeff Lailey of Elmhurst at 317 and Rob Doucette of Dauphin at 323.

Western Canadian Juvenile Championships

The top four low juveniles in the junior team trials earned the right to represent Manitoba at the Western Canada Juvenile Championships at Lloydminster, Saskatchewan.

Top juveniles were Rob McMillan of Pine Ridge, Jeff and Mike Ciecko of Southwood and Elmhurst's Derron Magda.

As Jeff Ciecko cracked the junior team, his brother Mike along with McMillan, Magda and Southwood's **Jaymes Kadynuik** were named to Manitoba's juvenile squad.

The foursome also qualified for the eight-member team for the annual Manitoba-Minnesota team matches held August 14-16 at Hecla Island. Rounding out the team were Elmhurst's Jeff Lailey, **Dean North** of Carman, **Marc Cadioux** of St. Charles and **Kurt Gerecke** of Breezy Bend.

Since Ciecko was scheduled to play in a junior tournament at the same time, his place was taken by Magda who finished ninth in the trials. Kadynuik was named alternate after defeating fellow Southwood member Andy Nemiroff in a one-hole playoff.

In Lloydminster, Manitoba was the toast of the tournament as Rob McMillan fired a final round three-over-par 75 to grab low individual honours, pacing his teammates to the Western Canada Juvenile Team Golf Championship.

McMillan's closing 75 went with his

earlier rounds of 77 and 73 for a 54-hole total of 225. He was five up on teammate Jeff Ciecko who led through the first two rounds but slipped to 86 in the third for a closing total of 230.

Mike Ciecko finished with 240 and Derron Magda had a 54-hole total of 244.

Manitoba was tops in team scoring with 692, based on the best three of four scores each day. In second place was Alberta with 703, followed by British Columbia at 713 and Saskatchewan with 718.

Manitoba-Minnesota matches

Manitoba swept all four doubles matches at the 10th Annual Manitoba-Minnesota Junior Men's Team Golf Championship played August 14-16 at Hecla Island.

Their 13-3 triumph marked the sixth time Manitoba has tasted success in the event. Minnesota has won three times while the teams split on one occasion.

Manitoba started with a bang, opening

the competition with victories in four of the eight singles matches, splits in two others and just two losses to earn a 5-3 lead.

The afternoon sweep in doubles events added eight more points to the Manitoba cause for the final 13-3 margin of victory.

Provincial junior champ Dale Goehring was held even by Minnesota's Aaron Jacobson and Rob Doucette split with Chris Nigbur.

Manitoba was boosted by a 3-2 win by Tom Pratt over Kevin Overgaard, 4-and-3 victories by Dean North over Mike McDonald and Kurt Gerecke over Chad Hess and a 2-and-1 win by Marc Cadioux over Scott Larson. ○

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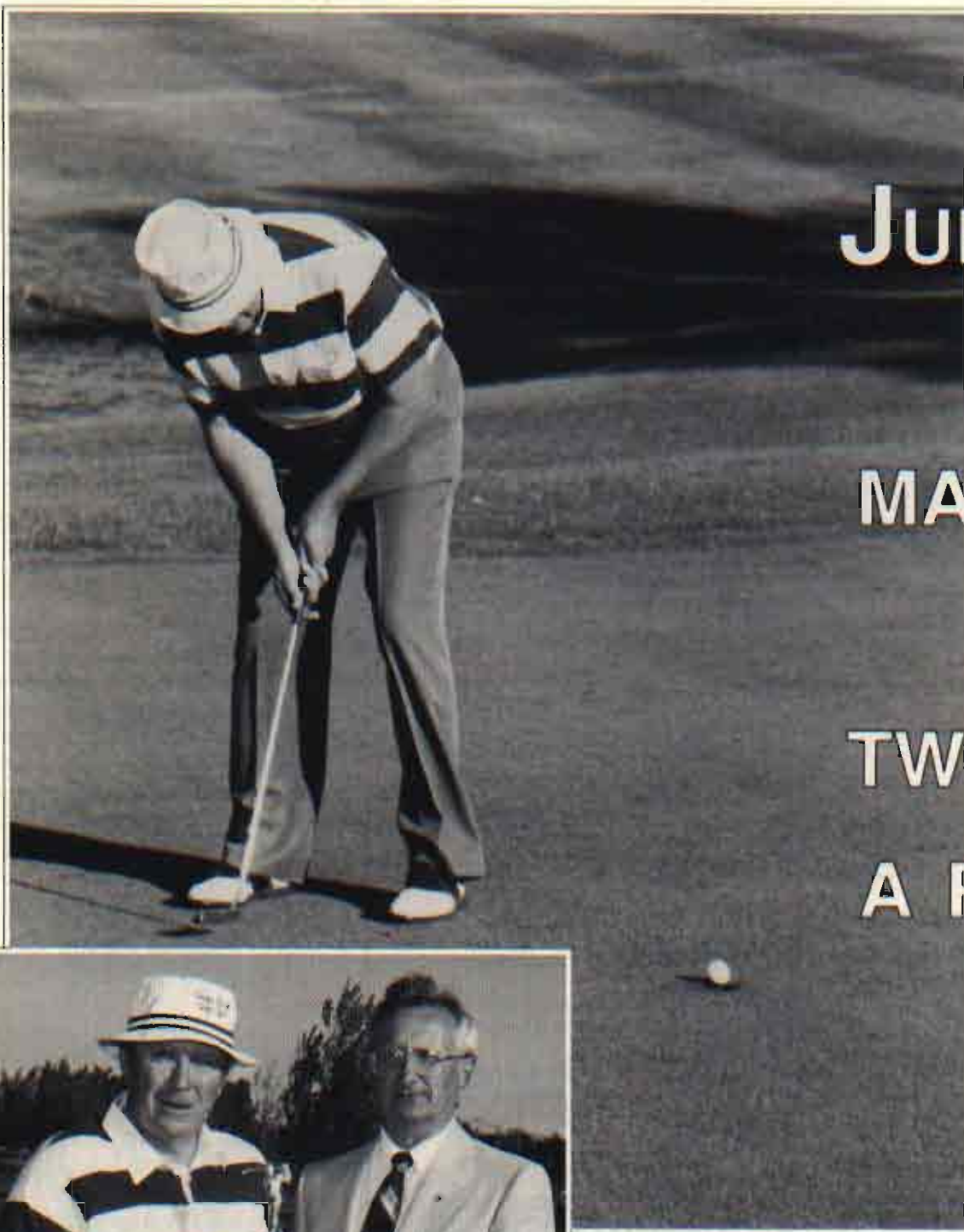

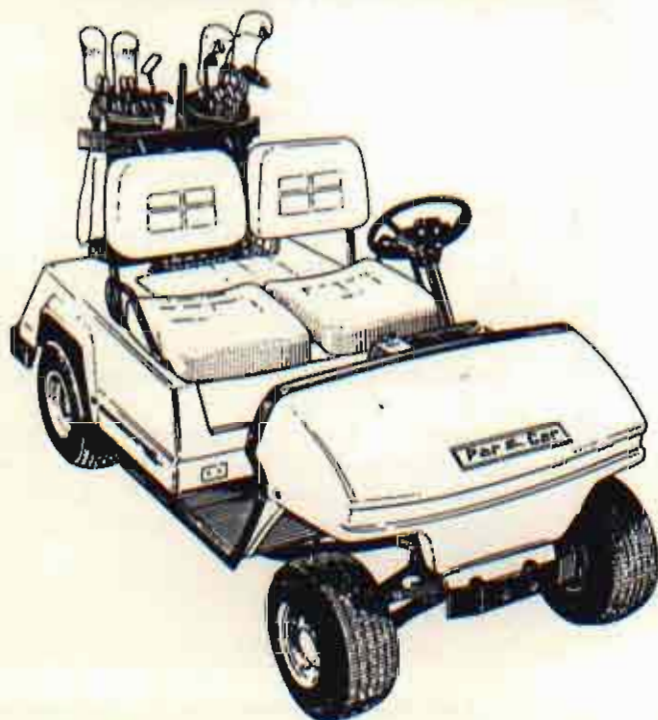

The host Breezy Bend team led by pro **Sandy Paterson** shared runner-up honours with **Lundar** and **Pinawa**; each at 125.

The event attracted a record entry of 1492 competitors who contributed \$14,920 in entry fees to the Society for Manitobans with Disabilities (\$8,952) and the Manitoba Golf Association's junior development program.
