President presses for co-operation and participation

The key words that come up in a conversation with **Don MacDonald** about golf are co-operation and participation.

Donald James MacDonald has taken over the reins as president of Golf Manitoba, the sport's governing body in this province, and he plans to use those two words a lot in his quest to keep the organization on a steady course.

The new Golf Manitoba president is a lawyer by profession, a vice-president and counsel in charge of the legal department with Investors Group.

A member of Rossmere Country Club, he joined the Manitoba Golf Association

council as that club's representative in 1993. He has been on the board of Golf Manitoba (formerly MGA) since 1996, becoming a vice-president in 1999, serving as president-elect in 2002-03, then moving into the president's chair at the annual general meeting last November.

He's 44 years of age and single and he has been a Winnipegger since 1967, when his family moved here from Minneapolis. Though his parents are Canadians, he was born in California and spent his first seven years living in the U.S. He has dual citizenship.

His first involvement with golf was at the age of eight and he has been associated with golf clubs for 30 years. This is his 25th season at Rossmere and he played at Teulon for five years before joining the East Kildonan club. He served a term as club president in 1997-98.

He was involved with the amalgamation of the MGA and MLGA and is pleased with the co-operation between the two groups.

"We have been holding strategic planning sessions to identify the role of Golf Manitoba in our clinic and development programs," he said. "The amalgamation process has been working well."

He was also pleased with co-operation shown in the partnership of Golf Manitoba with the other segments of golf, the golf pros and course superintendents, in the Manitoba Golf Hall of Fame and the Manitoba Golf Scholarship Fund and with the assistance from Sport Manitoba and others in the golf business in the province.

When it comes to tournament activity, MacDonald puts the emphasis on participation rather than competition, though he fully recognizes the importance of good competitive action.

"The schedule of golf events has grown over the years and we are looking for more and more participants," he said. "We want to increase the participation in all of our events, whether the players are of championship calibre or not."

MacDonald also noted the association was thankful for the province's golf clubs that make their facilities available for the many events on the golf schedule.

"We're hoping to establish a three-year cycle for our events so clubs can participate in the scheduling and know they won't be asked every year to give up membership time," he said.

He noted the increase of the honorarium paid to the clubs for Golf Manitoba tournaments had been raised this year to \$15 per player per round (from \$7 per player) to help offset any inconveniences.

While it is obvious the new Golf Manitoba president knows his way around a board room, it should be noted that he also knows his way around a golf course.

He maintains a handicap of seven and he can boast a best-ever single round score of 69 at Rossmere.

"I try to play most Saturdays and Sundays and maybe one other game each week," he said. "I probably play about 70 games in a season, with about 50 of them at Rossmere."

Again, he stresses participation more than competition, but he won't back down from the competitive angle, noting that he has played in the Manitoba Amateur and he even made the cut one year.

First inductions celebrated for Manitoba Golf Hall of Fame

One day there will be a place of honour for the legends of Manitoba golf, a shrine to do justice to those whose outstanding achievements or examples of leadership and commitment should be lasting memories.

The first step in that direction came last September, when the Manitoba Golf Hall of Fame and Museum became a reality in ceremonies at the Club Regent Casino. The inaugural induction of eight individuals, six in the athlete category and two as builders, marked the long-awaited start of recognition and tribute for golf notables in the province.

In the charter class of 2003 were Allan Boes, Jimmy Doyle, Dan Halldorson, George Knudson, Bobby Reith and Anne Tachan as athletes, plus Peggy Colonello and John Steel elected as the first two builders.

Reith and Boes dominated the local golf scene in the 1930s and 1940s. Reith won five Manitoba Amateur Championships and four Manitoba Open titles. Boes captured both the provincial Amateur and Open crowns in the same year four times, from 1941 to 1948.

Doyle won the Canadian Amateur Championship in 1968, and was the first male golfer to capture Manitoba titles in three age brackets — junior, amateur, and senior. Another competitive distinction for "Jumbo" was his membership on 11 Manitoba Willingdon Cup teams.

Knudson and Halldorson were Manitoba gifts to professional golf. After winning two Manitoba and one Canadian Junior Championships, Knudson went on to a sparkling pro career, winning eight PGA events, five Canadian PGA titles, and two World Cup honours. Halldorson also had two World Cup victories, won two PGA events, the

Canadian PGA title once, plus four Manitoba Open crowns and two others in Saskatchewan and Quebec.

Tachan represented the province a remarkable 25 times, on 11 amateur and 14 senior teams. She was a member of Manitoba's only national women's amateur championship team in 1962, and captured 10 provincial senior women's titles, including five in a row from 1971 to 1975.

Colonello's primary contribution to golf was in excellent administrative leadership, as president of the MLGA and CLGA, and as a team manager, diplomat, captain and international referee while serving on the CLGA executive.

Steel was a founding member of the Manitoba Golf Course Superintendents Association, and later was instrumental in the formation of the national association and served as the first president of the CGCSA in 1967. His dedication and expertise elevated his profession, and prompted "greenskeepers" to be more accurately termed "course superintendents".

Halldorson, Tachan, and Colonello attended the ceremony in person last September, while the other inductions were made posthumously.

Joyce Collier, the new Hall of Fame's president and the driving force in its creation, was delighted by the inaugural pro-

Heritage Club seeks donations

The Heritage Club will solicit donations from individuals and corporations, with future recognition for support listed on a Leader Board plaque in diamond, platinum, gold, silver and bronze categories.

Ken Mould, Cathy Macatavish, Mitch Zalnasky, Todd Fanning and Jason Duncan will serve on the initial organizing committee of the Heritage Club.

One of the early fund raising ventures proposed is a pro-am golf tournament, to be held in September, timed to coincide as closely as possible to the annual Hall of Fame induction ceremonies.

gram. "It surpassed all our hopes, and was a reflection of the proud heritage of golf in Manitoba. It is our intention to make it a first class show every year," she vowed.

The Manitoba Lotteries Corporation sponsored the opening reception, and is committed to funding for the second induction reception in September this year, with a possible switch in venue to the McPhillips Street Station Casino.

The future deadline to submit nominations to the selection committee will be April 30th each year, and forms are available on the Golf Manitoba website: www.golfmanitoba.mb.ca.

As the patron sponsor, the RCGA provided a base funding grant of \$5,000, to aid the start-up fund shared by the three Hall of Fame partners, Golf Manitoba, the CPGA of Manitoba and the Manitoba Golf Superintendents Association.

Golfer of the Year award caps great season for Collings

2 National titles for Breezy Bend star

"You know, it all started in the Grey Owl at Clear Lake, and I didn't have big expectations when I went up there," said **Garth Collings**, whose performance jump-started him to one of the most outstanding seasons in the history of amateur golf in Manitoba.

"In my last three rounds prior to the Grey Owl I shot mediocre scores. I think I was about 78 to 80 at Breezy Bend," reflected Collings. "Then I arrived at Clear Lake and shot seven-under-par 85 in the first round, one of my best ever 18-hole rounds in competition."

Collings had seven birdies and an eagle that day, and said it was like a launching pad for him last year. It propelled the now 46-year-old veteran toward his second Labatt Manitoba Amateur Golfer of the Year award. He won previously in 1999, and it was the ninth time he qualified as a finalist.

After winning his fourth Grey Owl title, Collings and Breezy Bend clubmate **Shelley Muir** won the Manitoba Mixed Team Championship; he shot four rounds in the 60s in Montreal to win the RCGA Canadian Club Champions crown, then captured the Saskatchewan Mid-Amateur title; he was low amateur (the only one to make the cut) in the MTS Classic at Pine Ridge, finished third in the Manitoba Amateur and made his 10th Willingdon Cup team; he won his third Manitoba Mid-Amateur crown, and capped his tremendous season by winning the Canadian Mid-Amateur Championship at Royal Regina.

Collings said his game was at a peak of consistency during the Canadian Club Champions event in Montreal, but winning the Canadian Mid-Am in Regina really put the "icing on the cake". It was his sixth try in that event, and he nailed it down with a 1-up victory over

Frank Van Dornick of Camrose, AB, in the match play final. After giving up a two-hole lead to drop into a tie after 16 holes, Collings birdied the par-five 17th to move back in front, and matched his opponent's par on the 18th.

"I now have a favorite golf shirt which I hope doesn't wear out," laughed Collings. "I was four for four wearing it on the final day of my victories in 2003."

More seriously, he credited his coach **Garth Goodbrandson**, Golf Manitoba's director of player development, with the guidance that put him on track last season. "Garth improved my set-up routine, and he was able to put my focus where it needs to be. He taught me to keep thinking positively, and I never lost my confidence," said Collings.

He recalled a particular point during the very windy fourth round of the Saskatchewan Mid-Amateur, when he ballooned to a "nine" on one hole. He could have collapsed, but he took stock, re-grouped, and bounced back to close it out successfully.

Rather remarkably, he won the Canadian

Mid-Am with new clubs. He switched to Titleist woods and irons about a week before going to Regina. "My game actually improved with the change. I gained some yardage, maybe at the expense of a little accuracy," he said. "But I kept my old wedges, and holed out a couple of times with them in the match play."

His 2003 season was longer than normal. Collings was selected by the RCGA to team with **Lindsay Bernakevitch**, 23, a promising young shotmaker from Regina, as the Canadian representatives in the Juan Carlos Tailhade Cup in Buenos Aires, Argentina, December 11-15. It is an international amateur 72-hole team event, and the Canadian twosome finished fourth behind winning England in a field composed of 20 countries.

"I was disappointed in my last two rounds in Argentina," he said. "The greens were difficult, very fast, with lots of undulation. And I guess I'm not used to playing very much in the month of December."

Collings also travelled to Houston for an off-season golf trip, and played seven rounds in about four days. Otherwise, except for some hockey to try to stay in shape and a few practice efforts at the Golf Dome, he didn't do much to prepare for 2004.

"I know I have an awfully tough act to follow. I had a dream season. All I can do is

go out and try to follow the same course as last year, and hope to come close to what I achieved," he suggested. He intends to defend most of his 2003 titles, starting with the Grey Owl, and Shelley Muir will join him again for the Mixed Team Championship at the Links at the Lake. He will have to choose between entering the Saskatchewan Mid-Amateur and the MTS Classic, which are in conflict this season.

Collings will have the advantage of defending his Canadian Mid-Amateur Championship at his home course, Breezy Bend, from August 23-29. "That will help me for local knowledge," he agreed. "But I also think it will add some stress. I'll be a pre-tournament favorite, and expected to do well. I'll have to try that much harder, and I hope my game will be ready for it."

The other finalists in the selection of the '03 Golfer of the Year were **Judi Lidstone** of Elmhurst and the 2002 recipient, **Mike Keast** of Niakwa.

Lidstone won four local women's titles, the provincial Match Play, the Manitoba Senior Championship, the City and District, and the Club Champions crown. Keast repeated as Manitoba Junior men's champion, won the Manitoba Junior Optimists' tournament, and was a member of the Canadian team that finished fourth in the Toyota Junior World Cup in Japan.

Receiving honourable mention were **Stacey Bieber** of St. Charles, the Manitoba Junior women's champion; **Matt Johnston** of St. Charles, the Manitoba men's Match Play champion; and **Jill Hardy** of Niakwa, the low individual in the women's division of the Canadian University Championship.

Two national tournaments in Manitoba this season

Breezy Bend and Steinbach will occupy the local golf spotlight this season in playing host to national tournaments. The RCGA's men's Canadian Mid-Amateur Championship is slated for Breezy Bend Country Club Aug. 23-29, followed immediately by the CLGA's women's National Senior Championship Aug. 30-Sept. 2 at Steinbach's Fly-in Golf Club.

Earlier in the golf year, the second of six RCGA Future Links junior tournaments will be held at Hecla Island May 27-30, while one of the BMO Financial Group pro tour qualifiers leading to the Canadian Women's Open will be featured June 6-8 at Elmhurst.

The curtain goes up on the Manitoba golf calendar on the May 22-23 weekend,

when **Judi Lidstone** and **Matt Johnston** begin defence of their provincial Match Play titles in the 2004 qualifying rounds at Winkler and La Verendrye. The match play rounds in both men's and women's events will be held at Niakwa this season.

"I hope the entries increase for the women's match play," said Lidstone. "We don't play enough match play. It's a special challenge."

Lidstone intends to defend all four Manitoba titles she won last year — the match play, senior, city and district and the club champions events. "I worked out all winter with my coach **Peter Ewert** at his indoor facility at Larters, and I think my swing is coming around," she suggested.

Her goals for '04 are to make both Manitoba amateur and senior teams (as she did in 2002), and particularly to play well

in the Canadian Senior in Steinbach at the end of August. "I want to be mentally ready for Steinbach," she said. "I really like the course. I plan to get in as many practice rounds as I can out there before the national tournament."

Golf Manitoba has two new tournaments on its fixture card for 2004. The Junior Bantam Championship for boys and girls 14 and under will be held June 12-13 at Transcona, replacing the Sunday Junior inter-club events of former years.

Also to be introduced is a 36-hole Best Ball Championship for adult men Aug. 30-31 at the Bridges Golf Club, with two-man teams flighted according to combined handicap factors.

The honorariums paid to host clubs for Golf Manitoba events have been increased from \$7 to \$15 per player per round, with a resulting rise in entry fees. The provincial portion of membership dues now is consistent, \$9 for men/women, and \$7 for juniors. The national assessment now is \$10 for women, \$6 for men and junior women, and no charge for junior men.

Power carts now will be permitted, although not for juniors, the men's/women's amateur, or men's mid-amateur tournaments. Handicap limits have been removed for most events and, like the senior men's, there now will be no 36-hole cut in the men's mid-amateur event.

The Golf Manitoba website (www.golfmanitoba.mb.ca) now can be used with credit cards to submit tournament entries and, as a consequence, it will be mandatory for club membership cards to be displayed at the first tee registration.

The RCGA rule book has undergone its quadrennial update, and there are 42 changes, mostly minor in nature. After a one-year grace period, clubhead size shall not exceed 470 cc., and except for putters, club length must not be more than 48 inches.

Another adjustment for 2004 is in the maximum prize value allowed to maintain amateur status, up from \$700 to \$1,000 Canadian. That conforms with increases for the R & A of St. Andrews from 300 to 500 pounds, and by the USGA from \$500 to \$750 U.S.

ELECTRONIC AGE FOR TOURNAMENTS

And don't forget your membership card at the tee!

Golf Manitoba is taking a giant step into the electronic age with tournaments this year.

With the use of the Blue Golf Tournament Administration program, the association will be able to provide on-line registrations for tournament entries, including the ability to pay the entry fees by credit card.

"This service will be very convenient for golfers entering our tournaments and will also be a time-saving operation for our office staff," said executive director **Dave Morison** as he explained the operation.

He said the association hopes to receive up to 60 per cent of this year's tournament entries through the program, which will free up the time spent handling paper entry forms and cheques or cash with the entries.

Access to the Blue Golf Tournament Administration will be through the regular Golf Manitoba website (www.golfmanitoba.mb.ca) and golfers will have access to much more than entry convenience through the operation.

There will be increased communication so players will be able to receive tee times and results via e-mail. The system will be able to provide hole-by-hole scoring and scoring statistics, with the potential for live scoring in the future. There can be interactive player profiles through the program.

Electronic tournament programs have been coming and Golf Manitoba has taken advantage of the opportunity to get in the action this year. Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are also heading into the program this year.

Morison points out that tournament entry fees cover about 85 per cent of the costs and overhead of the tournament operations, so the electronic operation should mean big savings in time spent handling the paper work.

While the new program will be convenient for the golfers and also for those wanting to look up information on the tournaments, Morison warns it also provides a potential problem for the participants.

"Because we can accept entries on-line and also take credit card payments, it won't be possible to check handicap information that way," he noted. "For that reason, we have to insist that ALL players show their RCGA or CLGA membership and handicap cards at the first tee."

And, here's a warning to all golfers entering Golf Manitoba tournaments this summer – Double check and make sure you have your membership and handicap cards or you will not get to play!

"There will be STRICT ENFORCEMENT of this rule because there is no other way to determine if players are paid-up members of their club and if their handicaps are up to date," Morison said.

Keast, Bieber top Optimist Junior event

Mike Keast of Niakwa and **Stacey Bieber** of St. Charles were the top winners as more than 140 junior golfers competed in the 2003 Manitoba Optimist Junior Open golf championship at the Larters at St. Andrews and St. Boniface golf courses last July.

Keast and Bieber, who went on to win both the provincial junior and junior tour honours for the season, led the way in the two-day Optimist 36-hole competition in the 16-18 years divisions to qualify to advance to the Optimist International golf championship later in July at the PGA National Resort and Spa at Palm Beach, Florida.

Keast led the boys' division with a 36-hole score of 142, four strokes ahead of runner-up **Terry Reilly**, also of Niakwa. Bieber's 154 total was four ahead of runner-up **Sarah Stebeleski** of Rossmere.

Reilly and Stebeleski were among six golfers who were awarded trophies along with trips to the Canadian Optimist Junior Golf National Championship in August at Ingersoll, ON which attracts more than 250 golfers from across Canada and parts of the northern United States.

The others were 14-15 years winners **Jesse Skelton** of Bel Acres (148) and **Kaitlin Troop** of Wheat City (161) and the runners-up in that age category, **Joey McInnes** of Red Lake (150) and **Brittany Piche** of Wheat City (173).

In the 12-13 years age group, Spalding gift certificates were awarded to the winner and runner-up, **Derek East** of St. Charles and **Luke Wazney** of Elmhurst, who both posted scores of 164. East won the playoff.

Development programs for adults, too

POPULAR RURAL CLINICS CONTINUE TO ATTRACT MALE AND FEMALE GOLFERS

The amalgamated Golf Manitoba board has established a committee to bring together all player development activities.

Previously, most player development efforts went toward junior age players in both men's and women's associations. In the past two years, programs have been started that will bring the opportunity of game improvement programs to the adult amateur golfer as well.

The player development committee will maintain its emphasis on development of junior, juvenile and pre-juvenile players by offering a total of nine spring development camps for various skill and age groupings.

The camps will be delivered under the direction of **Garth Goodbrandson**, director of player development, along with Golf Central head pro **Derek Ingram**, both RCGA national coaches and experienced CPGA professionals.

The development focus includes the BMO Financial Group Future Links, which is Canada's national junior golf development program to "Ensure The Future of Golf". Conducted by the Royal Canadian Golf Association in partnership with the Canadian Professional Golfers' Association and the provincial golf associations, the program consists of multi-level instruction and rewards, clinics, camps, support materials and special programs to raise awareness of junior golf and address the issues of accessibility and affordability.

One of the many ways Golf Manitoba is providing exposure to the game of golf is through the Rural Clinic Program. The program is open to male and female golfers. Approximately 50 clinics at 25 to 30 sites, with 650 participants, are planned annually. All clinics are conducted by qualified CPGA professionals.

In the first 5-1/2 years of its existence, this program has provided golf instruction to more than 5,300 school children. The long-term goal of this program is to have golf as part of the curriculum in the provincial school physical education system.

Golf Manitoba continues to provide seminars to enhance the capabilities of Physical Education Teachers.

The goal of the association's junior camps program is to provide development opportunities in all aspects of the game to junior golfers with an objective of providing high quality camps and competitions.

Golf Manitoba views its role as one of preparing athletes to be as successful as possible in competition. All girls and boys who participated in the previous year's Manitoba Junior Championships will receive an invitation to the junior camps.

Golf Manitoba's junior Mundie Putter team, a team that competes weekly against some of the member clubs, will be selected according to results in the previous year's Manitoba Junior Championship and the Wilson Junior Tour. The team will consist of four to six 18-year-olds, four to six 17-year-olds and a minimum of six players 16 years old and under.

ADULT DEVELOPMENT

On the adult side, one of the many ways Golf Manitoba is providing exposure to the game is through a rural clinic program, which provides skill development and grass-roots instruction to novice and intermediate golfers in rural Manitoba and Northwest Ontario.

Golf Manitoba has partnered with the CPGA of Manitoba to conduct the program. Golfers attending the clinics can expect a fun and relaxed environment with a variety of clinics to choose from.

Applications are mailed to clubs each spring and clinics are booked on a first received basis. The responsibility for technical training (swing mechanics) is with the individual athlete and his/her CPGA Professional, while Golf Manitoba views its role as one of preparing athletes to be as successful as possible in competition.

WOMEN'S CAMP CRITERIA – The High Performance Camp is open to the top 25 in the Manitoba Women's Amateur Championship, the top 10 in the Manitoba Women's Senior Championship, top 5 in the Women's City & District and Top 5 in the Girls Junior Championship who are no longer eligible to compete as a junior. Two additional camps will be available to all players who participated in Golf Manitoba's major women's events.

MEN'S CAMP CRITERIA – Camps will be offered to all male golfers who participated in the previous years the Manitoba Amateur and to players who attempted to qualify for the Manitoba Amateur. Applications will be received on a first come basis, as camps are limited.

Manitoba Golf Scholarship Fund honours five young golfers

Three females and two males have been announced as the 2003 recipients of \$1,000 scholarships from the Manitoba Golf Scholarship Fund.

The scholarships were awarded to **Stacey Bieber** of St. Charles, **Jill Hardy** of Niakwa, **Christin Thomson** of Kitchen Creek, **Robert Hardy** of Niakwa and **Ryan Rawluk** of Breezy Bend.

The Foundation also advised that a Glen Hnatiuk Scholarship award has been implemented, with this year's recipient being **Jordan Krantz** of Eagle Landing.

The Fund is a registered charity, the object of which is to provide financial assistance to young golfers entering or continuing in a Post-Secondary Educational Institution.

The undertaking of the Fund is restricted to: "The provision of periodic scholarships to younger golfers of either gender, resident in Manitoba, for the advancement and furtherance of such person's education ... and the receipt, accumulation and disbursement of funds for this purpose."

Since its inception, the Fund has been accumulating a Capital Fund and has awarded 90 scholarships to worthy recipients who have participated in the Manitoba golf community and who have demonstrated scholastic excellence. In the last number of years,

scholarships have been in the amount of \$1,000. It is the board's hope that the Capital Fund can be steadily augmented so that both the number of scholarships and the amount of each can be increased.

There are no expenses incurred by the Fund as administrative support is provided through Golf Manitoba. The earnings of the Fund are used exclusively for the granting of scholarships. The Fund has been assisted in building its Capital Fund through Golf Manitoba, various golf clubs and other organizations and individuals.

The scholarship fund is managed by a volunteer board of directors, consisting of **Rudy Boivin** and **Dorelle Matthews** of Southwood, **Bob Forcand** and **Maretta Emery** of Breezy Bend, **Bob Goodwin** of Niakwa, **Jim Scollan** of Elmhurst and Golf Manitoba executive director **Dave Morison**.

The Fund looks for assistance in building up the scholarship fund and encourages individuals to include the Golf Scholarship Fund among gift-giving considerations. A direct contribution will yield a tax-deductible receipt. To honour someone or make a memorial donation, the board asks for consideration to the Fund as a charity of choice, with appropriate acknowledgement passed to the individual or family concerned.

Golf clubs or other groups can also assist. Some clubs have made direct contributions to the scholarship fund. Others have included the fund in yearly assessments or as part of specific tournaments.

Princess Royal Pan Am scholarship to Jill Hardy

Golfer **Jill Hardy** of Niakwa Country Club has been selected as one of this year's recipients of the Princess Royal Pan Am Scholarships. The other scholarship went to archer **Kevin Tataryn** of Stonewall.

Hardy won the 2003 CIS Canadian University Championship and has represented Canada at the World University Golf Championships twice. She is currently ranked 12th in women's golf in Canada and is 46th in the U.S. Women's Amateur rankings. The 22-year-old Hardy is also working toward her degree in Pharmacy at the University of Manitoba.

The Princess Royal Pan Am Scholarship Endowment Fund provides two annual scholarships of \$3000 each to a male and female high performance athlete enrolled in a post secondary institution in Manitoba. Selection is based on an athlete's sport and academic standings.

The Princess Royal Pan Am Scholarship was established as a legacy of the 1999 Pan American Games to provide financial support for Manitoba's high performance athletes while commemorating the Manitoba visit of Her Royal Highness the Princess Royal in 1999. The scholarship is administered by Sport Manitoba.

CLGA Girls Club presents challenge for Macatavish

Cathy Macatavish is the latest Manitoba golf executive to be elevated to the Canadian Ladies Golf Association, and very quickly she became involved in three new national grass roots initiatives.

She was elected to the CLGA board last November, and was appointed National Director of Programs and Player Development. Her responsibilities include the formation of the CLGA Girls Club, the Golf Strides for Women mobile clinic program, and the Scramble for the Cure fund-raising partnership with the Canadian Breast Cancer Foundation.

The CLGA Girls Club will be a community-driven golf program for girls aged 7 to 18, intended to introduce them to the game, teaching basic skills, rules and etiquette, while building self-confidence and self-esteem in focussed activities with their peers.

"The whole idea is to develop interest for girls in playing golf for life," said Macatavish. "Hopefully the program will overcome the early intimidation that many girls have about approaching the game."

The Girls Club is modelled after an LPGA venture started 20 years ago in the United States, and now being conducted in Australia and New Zealand. Former Southwood and St. Charles professional **Cathy Burton**, now the CLGA National Junior Coach, has written the guidance manual for the Canadian program.

Macatavish will be working through provincial associations to secure a volunteer administrative team at different sites, using a networking process to identify prospects. A link to the Girl Guides of Canada also has been made to help the membership drive across the country.

Equipment will be supplied by Nancy Lopez Golf, in the form of starter sets for youngsters new to the game. Girls will receive passports charting their progress as they move in two-year increments from beginner classes to intermediate and up to the advanced levels.

The CLGA will provide basic funding for the Girls Club, but the individual cost to enroll is expected to be in the range of \$50-\$75, including \$15 for a CLGA membership kit. Likely the program will start with one site this year in Manitoba, and up to 50 girls will be accepted.

The Golf Strides for Women mobile clinic program will start in Vancouver in May, moving across Canada with teams of teaching professionals in the east and west. It will provide analysis and swing development for interested golfers in each province.

The Scramble for the Cure tie-in to the Canadian Breast Cancer Foundation is a charitable fund-raising venture, in which business women will organize corporate scrambles to aid the cause. The CLGA will sponsor a scramble championship event in September at an Ontario site.

Macatavish also has primary input on Canadian selections for the biennial World Amateur Team Championship in Puerto Rico in October. The eight mem-

bers of the Canadian women's amateur team will play in Winnipeg June 6-8 in the BMO Financial Group Women's tour stop at Elmhurst, and will travel to the Ladies' British Open Amateur Championship later in June.

What's new on the Manitoba golf scene

It seems like there's always something new happening on the Manitoba golf scene and as we head into another new season there are many "newsy" items to catch the eye.

The *Journal's* 2004 What's New story features such things as a great new clubhouse at one club, a smaller-scale clubhouse at another, a new dome and other improvements at the biggest indoor facility, and new pro shops open or under construction at a couple of others.

There's a new Winnipeg area course set to open its first nine and another western Manitoba course ready to open a second nine holes this year. There's a new 18-hole layout heading into its first season in Northwestern Ontario and a good sprinkling of other improvements to golf courses and facilities.

All in all, 2004 is shaping up as a typical Manitoba golf season

with new things to perk the interest of all and continuing success for the business of golf in this province.

ST. BONIFACE GOLF CLUB

Grabbing a big share of the spotlight this year is the St. Boniface Golf Club, where an attractive brand new clubhouse is the feature. The old clubhouse was torn down at the close of the 2003 season and the new one has been under construction through the winter. Early June was set as the projected date for the new structure to be put into service.

It's a two-storey building and members will be particularly pleased that there are no longer any basement locker rooms. In fact, there is no basement, so member services will be on the main level. Food and beverage services will be featured on the second floor, including new banquet and meeting facilities capable of handling large tournament events as well as private functions.

The new clubhouse, on the same Youville Street site occupied by the old structure for many years, also features a deck overlooking the 18th hole and a new barbecue and outdoor patio area. There will be ample parking and a covered driveway providing access to the front door.

Jason Ludke, director of golf for the club, has had a busy winter keeping an eye on the construction and trying to keep up with the club's business working partly from the pro shop, partly from the maintenance building and finally getting some area to work inside the new facility as the completion date neared.

Members have satisfied their own curiosity by dropping by during the winter to check on the progress and they're anxious to see the finished product. It will be an excellent addition to the list of fine golf facilities available to the golfers of Manitoba.

LINKS AT THE LAKE

A more modest 2,000-square-foot clubhouse by the first tee is the construction project for the Links at the Lake course at Gimli, which has been taken over by Lakeland Golf Properties Inc., a subsidiary of Lakeland Golf Management.

Harry Brothie, the principal owner, looks forward to the completion of the clubhouse, which will feature a 40-seat restaurant, 40-seat patio, pro shop and locker room for members and the golfing public. It is expected the building will be ready for use in July. Business will be handled from a trailer until the new building is ready. **Glen Mitchell** is the clubhouse manager.

Work has also been done on some course improvements as well, including improved cart paths and some drainage in low areas. **Scott Chudley** from the Harbour View pro shop, will be on hand part-time to handle some instructing and be available for lessons.

THE GOLF DOME

Another major construction project that captured a lot of attention was the deflating and re-assembly of a new "bubble" at The Golf Dome, the big indoor facility on Wilkes Avenue just east of Kenaston Boulevard.

It happened during a six-week period last September and October and the facility was back in full operation heading into the busy fall and winter periods.

Curtis Gray is justly proud of the revamped indoor facility and notes the new dome features an improved covering, better lighting, additional ceiling fans for better air circulation and a new furnace to improve the heating (and cut the cost of same).

"We also have a new turf outfield that has improved the way the golf balls react as well as providing an excellent surface for activities other than golf," he said. "We get action in workouts and games for baseball, football, rugby and Frisbee and we also have facilities for large dinners and meetings."

The other activities are important, but golf is still the main purpose of the building and Gray points out the 56 hitting stations on three levels provide more action than any other facility. There are also three virtual golf stations, improved putting area and a revamped 18-hole mini-golf course is a popular attraction for young and old. A fully-stocked pro shop is another feature and the Dome offers a variety of membership packages.

Gray took over the Dome operation in November, 2001, and serves as president and CEO of the operation. **Heather Gray** is a director, **Janet Robertson** is vice-president of finance and **Mace Mazur** handles corporate sales. Further improvements in services are planned in the future.

PINE RIDGE GOLF CLUB

The new clubhouse at Pine Ridge has been in service for a few years now, but manager **Jeff Scott** notes that the club also saw another major project in the off-season with the construction of an enlarged pro shop. The new building triples the size of the pro shop, which is operated by pro **Gord Workum**. It provides more room for merchandise and club storage for the members.

Scott said the pro shop building is about 8,000 square feet and it also allows for the club to keep all of its fleet of 84 golf carts indoors.

CLEAR LAKE GOLF COURSE

Another pro shop project is the feature at the Clear Lake layout, this one located on part of the parking lot and providing a view of the ninth hole and the lake. Manager **Ian Sarna** reports the new shop will provide about 3,700 square feet of space for pro **Tom Betz** and staff and will be similar in appearance to the clubhouse to maintain the Riding Mountain National Park appearance.

Sarna also reports some course changes are being planned at Clear Lake, notably to lengthen the first and the 16th holes, which are very short as par-fours but too long to be par-threes. Work may begin later this year on some of the proposed changes. A relocation of the putting green near the pro shop would also be included.

MINNEDOSA GOLF CLUB

They're anxious to get onto the new back nine that jumps the Minnedosa Golf Club into the 18-hole class, but pro **Chris Worley** says they won't rush into it before it's ready.

"It's coming fine, but we don't want to open until we're sure it's ready," he said. "We were originally hoping to start the new season with 18 holes, but it will likely be into July and maybe even August before we can allow play on the new back nine."

The new nine holes, designed by **Dave Grant** of Grant Golf, are located to the south of the original nine holes and observers were quick to notice a map of the complete layout had a resemblance to the shape of the province of Manitoba.

"I think we'll be able to call it 'Manitoba's golf course' because of the shape," Worley said. "It is attracting some attention that way anyway."

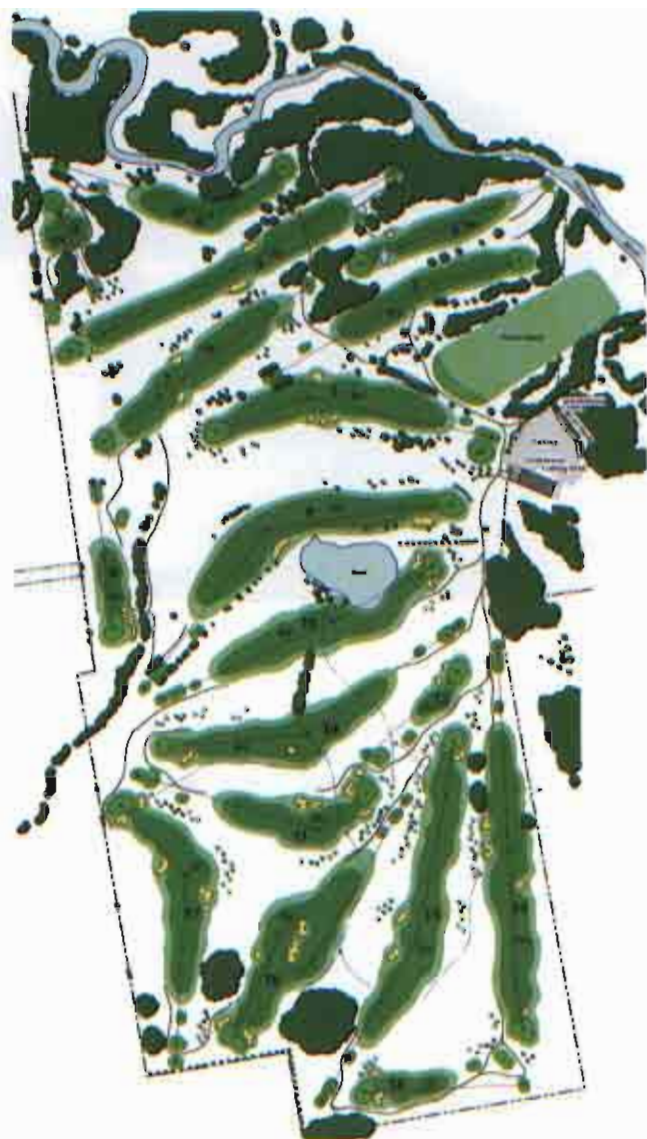
Apart from shape of the map, golfers in that area of the province are certainly anxious to get into action playing 18 holes at Minnedosa, joining the neighboring town of Neepawa in that category. Neepawa's second nine was opened two years ago, another Grant design.

THE MEADOWS AT EAST ST. PAUL GOLF CLUB

The newest 18-hole public course in the Winnipeg area, another Grant project, The Meadows, is located just outside the northern Perimeter Highway east of Lagimodiere Blvd. (Highway 59). Construction is moving along and it is planned to open nine holes in June or July this year, with the other nine possibly getting into play by the fall.

The Meadows is tied in with the Larters at St. Andrews course near Lockport and head pro **Peter Ewert** reports members of that club will be able to play at the new course as well this season.

The Meadows is a par-72 layout designed to achieve the look and feel of a "Prairie Links" style of golf course, with multiple tee boxes to provide a course varying from 5,400 to 6,900 yards.

HERON LANDING GOLF CLUB

Another new 18-hole golf course is the Heron Landing Golf Club at Fort Frances, designed by Toronto architect **Kevin Holmes** for the Couchiching First Nation. The new layout overlooks Rainy Lake near Fort Frances and is scheduled for full play by June of this year.

The course was partially in play late last season and reports indicate it wintered well and was ready for play early this season. Project manager **Shane Jourdain** said the course will play from 5,200 to 7,200 yards from the various tees. He said the club plans to become affiliated with Golf Manitoba once it is in operation.

MORE CHANGES ON THE WAY

In addition to the aforementioned major projects, a number of other clubs in the Manitoba region have reported upcoming or ongoing projects to improve their facilities for the local golfers.

Lake of the Sandhills Golf Course, gaining in popularity in the southeast corner of Manitoba, is providing a new 120-yard hole to an island green for the enjoyment of golfers, though it won't be a part of the course. There has also been some work completed

on lakeshore protection on the 18th fairway, where there had been some loss through flooding.

LaVerendrye Golf at LaBroquerie, has undergone a \$30,000 irrigation program to provide better watering for the course. The system is completely computerized. Work has also started to provide a fourth set of tees for the 18-hole layout.

Kingswood Golf and Country Club at LaSalle has expanded the water ponds on the third and fourth holes and tree-planting improvements have been continued on the back nine of the course.

Transcona Golf Club has reported some lengthening of holes to add 200 yards to the course, with work also completed on six new tee boxes. Additional drainage work is scheduled this fall.

Steinbach Fly-In Golf Club has opened new greens on the third, fourth and sixth holes and the practice green has been re-configured and re-sodded for this season. Work was completed last year on improving the fairways and installing new ponds and bridges on the 14th, 15th and 16th holes.

Fantasy Lake Golf Course, the 18-hole par-three course on the Trans-Canada Highway east of Deacon's Corner, has started on a project to lengthen tees and provide added yardage on some holes. The course also has committed to joining Golf Manitoba and is looking forward to receiving an official course rating.

Kenora Golf and Country Club, plans to have a new par-five 16th hole in play early in June and a new par-three 15th hole is scheduled for completion by this fall. Both holes were formerly par-fours so the par will remain at 72 for the popular Kenora course. Clubhouse improvements were made last year on the upper level and it is hoped to start work on improvements in the lower level this fall.

Winnipeg Municipal Courses have seen a change in the food and beverage services at Kildonan, Windsor, Crescent Drive and Harbour View, while the John Blumberg operation has been taken over by pro **Ben Smirnov**. On the courses, there have been drainage improvements and upgrading of tees at Kildonan and Windsor.

RCGA & CLGA TAKE STEP TOWARD AMALGAMATION

Oakville, Ont. – The Royal Canadian Golf Association (RCGA) and Canadian Ladies' Golf Association (CLGA) laid the foundations of a merger that would see one unified body governing golf in Canada when the respective Boards voted to accept a letter of intent.

The letter of intent outlines a commitment to proceed in principle with exploring the key elements involved with a merger. It was approved by the CLGA board of directors and by the RCGA board of governors.

"Our board of director's approval is the first of many steps in creating a successful merger," said **Carole Mix**, CLGA president. "The merger allows us to create new opportunities to grow women's golf from the grassroots to high performance golf and more importantly develops new synergies that will help shape the future of golf in Canada."

"Our respective boards have now given us a clear mandate to move forward and create one unified governing body," said **David Shaw**, RCGA president. "By sharing our resources and expertise, we will be able to better serve our members and further our mutual goal of protecting and growing the game of golf in Canada."

"This is an exciting new direction that gives us the potential to grow the game of golf, particularly the women's demographic. The next few months will involve significant consultations with our board and membership to determine how we will combine our skills, talents, and resources to create a unified approach to serving golfers in Canada," said **Jeff Thompson**, CLGA Executive Director.

"Merging two organizations with such long and respected traditions is a complex task," commented **Stephen Ross**, RCGA Executive Director. "We must now begin the work of determining what this new association will look like and how it should function under the direction of our respective boards and with input from our members."

The CLGA has been the governing body of women's amateur golf in Canada since 1913. Founded in 1895, the RCGA has traditionally been considered the governing body of men's amateur golf, although core services such as handicapping, the rules of golf, amateur status, turfgrass and environmental research are used in both the men's and women's games.

Further developments toward amalgamation of the national organizations will be announced during the season.

RCGA TO CREATE \$500,000 PROVINCIAL GOLF FUND

Oakville, Ont. – The Royal Canadian Golf Association (RCGA) has announced a plan to donate \$500,000 toward the creation of the RCGA Provincial Golf Fund. The initiative will mark the celebration of the 100th playing of the Canadian Amateur Championship, set for August 7-14 at Beaconsfield Golf Club in Pointe Claire, Que.

The RCGA Provincial Golf fund will be disbursed over a six-year term and separated into two major funds. The first fund will go toward the development and funding of an RCGA golf intern program in every province for a total of 10 interns across the country. Beginning in May, 2004, this portion of the fund is intended to promote Canada-wide initiatives such as the RCGA Future Links program and to develop future golf industry employees and experts.

The second fund is administered under the granting guidelines and procedures of the RCGA Grant Advisory Committee and

was to begin in April, 2004. The disbursed funds will go toward special projects or programs that grow the game of golf in Canada. Projects must be initiated by provincial golf associations and will be granted on an application basis.

"We are delighted to establish a fund that will both help grow the game of golf in Canada and celebrate the centennial playing of our most prestigious national amateur golf championship," said **Stephen Ross**, Executive Director of the RCGA. "The RCGA is committed to the continued growth of the game and this fund allows us to make a meaningful and demonstrable contribution to our partners at the Provincial Golf Associations."

The RCGA also donated \$75,000 to the Canadian Turfgrass Research Foundation (CTRF). The cheque was presented during the RCGA's annual general meeting in Saint John, New Brunswick in January. Over the last 11 years the RCGA has donated a total of \$810,000 to the CTRF.

Al Scott takes reins as CPGA president

Al Scott looks upon his election to the position of president of the Canadian Professional Golfers' Association as an opportunity to give something back to the sport that has been a major part of his life.

"The CPGA is in good shape," he remarked. "The golf industry has changed a lot over the years and our association has kept up with the times. Though we have nine zones with diverse interests and issues, our common goal in all parts of the country is to help the game grow and prosper."

Scott, head professional at the Grand Pines Golf Course near Grand and Victoria Beaches, was named president of the national body at the annual general meeting in April and he becomes the third Manitoba pro to serve as the head man.

The last Manitoban in that position was Harry Brochie of Lakeland Golf Management in 1994. Ironically, Grand Pines is among the Lakeland courses under Brochie's wing. Barry McWha, head pro at Southwood at the time, was national president in 1983-84.

"The health of the game is the main concern of our executive," Scott said. "We all need support from national to provide access to the tools we need to be successful in our operations. If we succeed individually, it makes the entire team stronger and we can help the game to grow."

Born June 8, 1963, in England, Scott

grew up in Brandon, where he graduated from Neelin High School in 1981. He later received a certificate in management from the University of Manitoba in 1997.

His association with the game of golf started at the age of 13 when he worked for Richard Bull, head professional at the Wheat City Golf Course in Brandon, shagging balls for group lessons. He continued with Bull for five years, learning club repair and assembly for his Taurus club-fitting business and in full-time work in the pro shop.

Scott began his CPGA apprenticeship at the age of 18 under head pro Laurie Pierce at the Elmhurst Golf and Country Club, becoming an associate pro in 1987. In 1989, he became the head professional at the Selkirk Golf and Country Club, a position he held until the middle of the 1997 season, when he moved to his current position as the Grand Pines development was established. He is responsible for the day-to-day operation of the course, with the superintendent and food/beverage manager reporting to him.

He has been active with the Manitoba Division of the CPGA for many years, serving on the provincial board from 1990-98, including a term as president in 1995-96. He served on many of the committees during that time.

Scott became a member of the CPGA board in 1994 as the Manitoba representative and served on a number of committees, including chairman of the membership services committee in 2001; secretary, chairman of membership and educa-

tion committee and master professional selection committee in 2002. He served in 2003 as vice-president and chairman or member of several committees. He also has served on the CPGA's Future Links advisory committee since 1998.

He was named Manitoba Club Pro of the Year in 1992 and 1993, won Player of the Year honours in 1995 and had many top-10 finishes in the player of the year competition. He was a member of the Manitoba zone's Titleist Cup team on several occasions and has served as a non-playing captain.

During his playing career, Scott won several local pro-am tournaments. His lowest career round was an eight-under-par 64 to win the Jim Collins Invitational Pro-Am tournament in 1994 at St. Charles Country Club.

Apart from golf, Scott enjoys playing old-timers hockey in the winter, some fishing and volleyball when time permits in the summer, and spending time with his family – wife Dorothy and daughters Alana, 16, and Alexandria (Alex), 13.

A double double for Ingram

Manitoba golf professionals are always proud to be recognized by their peers for their achievements and **Derek Ingram** of Golf Central hit the honours jackpot in the 2003 season.

Not only was he chosen as the Teacher of the Year and Junior Leader of the Year in Manitoba, but he also captured the same two awards on the national scene — believed to be the first to win the two national awards in the same year.

Ingram became the third Manitoba pro in five years to be recognized nationally as the Junior Leader of the Year. That honour also went in 1999 to **Garth Goodbrandson**, the director of player development for Golf Manitoba, and in 2001 to **Brock Balog**, executive director of the Manitoba Division of the Canadian Professional Golfers' Association.

But, Ingram earned double bragging rights when the national body also selected him for the Teacher of the Year award. In the junior leader category he was recognized for his efforts in developing coaching programs for juniors, his work as a co-coach and co-founder (with Goodbrandson) of the University of Manitoba golf teams, conducting Future Links programs and generally promoting junior golf development. He was the winner of the new CPGA Jack McLaughlin Future Links award.

As a teacher, Ingram was selected for his overall performance in teaching, which included Future Links programs at Golf Central, more than 1,000 one-hour lessons at the facility, co-coach for Golf Manitoba's player development program and the University of Manitoba, national junior team coach and regional coaching for both RCGA and CLGA teams.

Ingram was proud to be chosen for the two provincial awards and amazed to also be recognized for the two national awards in the same year. He had also been the Manitoba Division's Teacher of the Year in 2000 and was the Player of the Year in 2001.

The other provincial pro awards for 2003 went to **Brock Balog** as Club Professional of the Year and to **Jim Steep** of Glendale Golf and Country Club as Merchandiser of the Year.

Player of the Year honours went to **Mac McLeod** of Southwood, who topped the Coca-Cola points list and also won the Manitoba PGA championship in 2003. He has left the association this year to pursue a career as a playing pro on the Canadian Tour.

It marked the third straight year for Balog to be recognized by the Manitoba Division. He was named Teacher of the Year and Junior Leader of the Year in 2001 (also national junior leader) and was the Teacher of the Year again in 2002.

vices, serving as the project manager.

The Golf Trails program is part of the department's "Manitoba Getaways" tourism marketing campaign.

Brock Balog, executive director of the Manitoba division of the Canadian Professional Golfers Association and national representative **Wayne Meek** are on hand for the golf pros.

The hotels involved are the Super 8 establishments at Dauphin, Morden and Beausejour and the Lakeview Resort at Gimli.

Putting it all together are representatives from three local travel agencies – **Bruce Gerbrandt** of International Golf Vacations; **Don Finkbeiner** of Heartland International Travel & Tours; and **Carol Badiou** of Continental Travel Group.

Golfers will be able to set up their Manitoba Golf Trails outings in groups for special bus travel or as individuals or small groups on self-drive packages.

The four packages established for this initial year all start out from Winnipeg. Other starting points may be considered in the future. The offerings for 2004 are:

Westward Bound – Featuring the western area of the province, this package includes rounds of golf at Neepawa Golf and Country Club, Gilbert Plains Country Club and Clear Lake Golf Course and two nights of lodging at Dauphin.

Inland Seas – This outing features the Interlake region, with golf at Sandy Hook Golf Club, Hecla Golf Course and the Links at the Lake at Gimli, with two overnight stays at Gimli.

Big Sky Country – The southwestern part of the province is the feature with golf at Killarney Lakeside Golf Club, the Min-

newasta Golf and Country Club at Morden and the Carman Golf Club and the overnight stays at Morden.

Eastern Magic – The Links at Quarry Oaks Golf Course near Steinbach is the starting point for this eastern trip. The Pinawa Golf Club and the Grand Pines Golf Course near Victoria Beach are the other golf sites with the overnight stays at Beausejour.

The three-day packages include accommodation for two nights, three rounds of golf at the listed courses and power carts for all three rounds. Continental breakfasts are also included at the three Super 8 locations. All packages are on a per-person rate and are based on double occupancy.

The self-drive packages start at \$199 and range up to \$259, with extra \$10 charges on weekends. Bus packages on selected dates range from \$319 to \$379.

Big Sky Country, Aug. 4-6 for Westward Bound and Sept. 13-15 for Eastern Magic.

"I think everyone will benefit from this program," Clarke said. "It's great for the golfers because they can set up a package with one call and the prices are lower than if they had to arrange it themselves. It's great for the courses and it's good business for the travel agencies."

He said the Manitoba Golf Trails program was established with four packages for the first year, but anticipates there may be more clubs and different starting places in the future.

Travel Manitoba also is a sponsor of the MTS Classic at Pine Ridge, the Manitoba stop on the Canadian Professional Golf Tour, and plans are being made to include Manitoba Golf Trail packages as some of the prizes for fans of that event.

All three of the travel agencies have Winnipeg telephone numbers as well as toll-free numbers for calls from outside the city. Craig steps down after 50 years of golf service

While he won't be there in an official capacity, don't be surprised if **Don Craig** shows up for some of the Golf Manitoba tournaments this season.

You see, he has officially retired from his position as the tournament director for the association, but he might just forget about that and automatically head for the course. After all, he was involved with golf in Manitoba for more than 50 of his 66 years and old habits might be hard to break.

Craig decided to "hang up his spikes" at the conclusion of the 2003 season after seven years as the tournament director. Prior to that, he had spent six years as the executive director of the Manitoba Golf Association and many years before that in a variety of positions, most them related the sport of golf.

"I just felt like it was time to spend more time on my own golf game instead of being tied up with tournament activities," he said. "I only hope I'll see some improvements over the next year or two."

He will spending more time on the links both in Manitoba and in the winter months in Texas with his wife Barbara, who has shared his life for 42 years. They have one son David, who lives in Calgary.

His business and golf history are definitely closely related.

Donald Robert Craig was born March 11, 1938, in Winnipeg. He was just a teenager when his first summer employment was from 1953 to 1959 at the Kildonan Park and Windsor Park municipal golf courses. He held clerical positions with the City of Winnipeg from 1960 to 1963, then became the golf course supervisor from 1963 to 1973 for the Metropolitan Corporation of Greater Winnipeg.

From 1974 to 1980, Craig was the golf course supervisor, superintendent of regional recreational facilities and manager of regional recreation services for the city, then became director of recreation and community parks from 1981 to 1989.

During his city years, 1963-89, he was

involved with the development of Crescent Drive golf course in 1963, John Blumberg golf course in 1969, the Harbour View golf course and recreation complex in 1984 and the acquisition of Tuxedo golf course in 1987.

After his retirement from the city, he served from 1989-91 as executive director of Winnipeg World '91, the organizing committee for the 1991 Canada Safeway world curling championships. He maintained his connections with golf through that period, then got back into golf on a full-time basis as executive director of the MGA from 1991 to 1996. He stepped down from that position to become the tournament director from 1997 to 2003.

If that doesn't sound like a hectic career, check out his impressive history of volunteer involvement:

1963-65, member of Manitoba Golf Superintendents Association; 1965-85, member of Canadian Golf Superintendents Association; 1965 to present, mem-

ber of Manitoba Golf Association council (president in 1977); 1981-91, member of Board of Governors, Royal Canadian Golf Association; 1985-89, member of Canadian Turfgrass Research Foundation (chairman in 1988); 1985 to present, honorary director of Canadian Professional Golfers Association; 1987 to present, member of board of directors of Rossbrook House Inc.; 1991-96, member of Manitoba Golf Scholarship Foundation; 2001 to present, chairman of selection committee of Manitoba Golf Hall of Fame and Museum.

During his tenure with the RCGA, at various times Craig served as chairman of committees for junior development, green section, sub-committee on starting and scoring (a sub-committee of the Rules of Golf committee) and the Canadian Junior golf championship. He was involved in the organizing and conducting of more than 30 national golf championships, including eight Canadian Open championships and four Canadian senior professional championships.

One could truthfully say Don Craig is taking a well-deserved break from his 50+ years of service to the sport he dearly loves. Now he will be playing more, but the betting is that he'll still be out there watching as well.

Home or away, there's winter activity for Manitoba golfers

The fall breezes start to blow, the leaves are disappearing from the trees and soon there will be snow falling on the ground.

Time to put away the old golf clubs? Well, maybe not. There are things golfers can do to prolong the season — some a little pricey, but many also quite affordable.

There are two obvious options — go away to some warmer climes to escape the winter cold and continue to play golf, or stay home and take advantage of many opportunities to keep the game in shape during the off-season.

If your budget allows it and you have the necessary time, the winter travel idea is a popular one. If you're not sure where to go or what to arrange, you can leave it to the experts to work things out for you.

There are the so-called Snowbirds, who fly south for three or four months (some even more) and never stop playing. Many others are content to spend a month or just a couple of weeks in the south as spring approaches, just to get a head start on the season.

Most of the Manitoba travel agencies have the experience and the know-how to help you fulfill your winter golfing dreams.

Arranging such travel is a specialty for some, like **Bruce Gerbrandt** of International Golf Vacations, **Dale Esopenko** of Dale Esopenko Golf Holidays and several others. Areas of California, Colorado, Texas and Florida have attracted Manitobans for golfing holidays for many years.

While getting away for long periods of time might not be practical for working folks, there are many who try to get some break from the harsh winter and spend at least a week or two in sunny climes so they can play a little golf.

On the other hand, you could stay through the winter, like most of us, and stay in golfing shape with sessions at The Golf Dome, Golf Central, Hackers and Smackers or any of the several winter golf schools and facilities operated by local golf pros during the winter months.

Curtis Gray at The Golf Dome has a lot of faith in the growth of that part of the golf business, proven by the major up-grading at his Wilkes Avenue location in the past year. The huge dome structure was taken down and replaced in the early fall of 2003 and some other improvements have also been made.

Derek Ingram and **Dave McMillan** at

Golf Central on Plessis Road in Transcona also have faith in the winter end of the business, providing heated bays to allow golfer to practice outdoors and see the full flight of the ball through the cold months. Similar bays are available at Hackers and Smackers on Elmhurst Road in Charleswood.

In addition, there are several local golf professionals who conduct winter golf schools at their clubs or at other locations each winter and all have reported capacity or near-capacity attendance for their programs.

The Golf Dome has undergone the biggest improvements in the past year. Last September they let the air out of the old acrylic bubble and replaced it with a new state-of-the-art Tedlar covering with full weather protection.

The new dome is slightly higher and it features additional lighting and ceiling fans for better air circulation. A new high-efficiency furnace was installed and Gray reports the Dome's heating costs were down by about 40 per cent last winter, despite the colder weather and higher gas prices.

A new turf outfield was also put in place, which makes the structure more suitable

for activities other than golf, such as baseball, football, rugby, frisbee workouts and games.

There are 56 hitting stations on three levels at the Dome, as well as three virtual golf systems, improved putting green and a popular 18-hole mini-golf layout.

Corporate events are being encouraged for the Dome, with licensed premises and space for groups of 200 and more. School business has also been growing.

The Golf Dome is the official name and Gray, who is the major stockholder and president and CEO of the business, likes to point that "golf is our middle name" as he promotes the structure.

Improvements have also been featured at Golf Central, where the winter operations will remain centred on the heated hitting bays, but more attention will be paid to the short game training with pitching, putting and sand bunker facilities for use during the regular golf season.

So, there are several attractions to work on your golf swing without travel, but for many Manitobans, it's nice to get away for a winter holiday and the travel folks can help you make your choices and also set up your entire travel agenda.

Escorted golf tours are growing in popularity and the various travel agencies can help you to choose the trip that's right for you. Choose a destination and choose your dates and they can look after the details.

If you prefer to do it on your own, the travel folks can also assist with some of your accommodations and bookings at golf courses.

"A lot of people don't want to spend time arranging for rooms and golf times and

prefer to leave the arrangements to us," says Gerbrandt. "We're in the business so it is a lot easier for us to do the planning. We certainly encourage golfers to take advantage of the escorted tours because we can offer some extra services that way."

Esopenko has also been big on escorted tours and his travel business based from

his pro shop at Assiniboine Golf Club has been doing just that for nearly 30 years.

Travel or stay at home, there's no need to put the clubs away when the snow flies. One way or another the ardent golfer will keep at it throughout the year. Many do both — indoor through most of the winter, then south for a short break just before spring breaks.

Manitoba golfers cross the line for "southern" hospitality

While Manitoba golfers enjoy a feast of good golf courses within the provincial boundaries, they also have a thirst for the offerings in other places.

Couple that with a desire to occasionally travel to the United States and it's easy to understand the appeal of just a short drive to visit some of the excellent golf courses in North Dakota and Minnesota.

The folks who operate these "southern" courses also hang out the welcome sign and generally go out of their way to make it a pleasant outing for their Canadian visitors.

There are several favorite destinations for the Manitoba golfers across the line and many destinations provide a number of challenging layouts so one can play on several courses from one location. Some also decide to move about day by day to get to their favorite locations.

Grand Rapids, Minnesota, offers a popular selection of four championship courses billed as Minnesota's Grand Slam of Golf. Area hotels team up with the four golf locations to provide golf packages and, as an added attraction, there are green fees available at par with Canadian dollars.

The Grand Slam courses are all close to Grand Rapids. The package takes in Pokegama, on the western side; Wendigo on the south side; Sugarbrooke, five miles south of the city; and Eagle Ridge, six miles east at Colerain.

I have had the pleasure of playing all four of the Grand Slam layouts and found all of them to be challenging, scenic and enjoyable. It's worth the trip to take them all in and take advantage of the package rates for your accommodation.

Another favorite golf destination in Minnesota is the Brainerd Golf Trail, with 18 golf courses and 20 lodging groups all within a 45-minute drive from town.

The Legacy courses at Cragun's Resort, the Classic course at Madden's on Gull Lake and The Pines layout at Grand View Lodge were played on our visit to the area, but there are so many others you might have to extend your visit just to try to work in some of them.

Again, the golf layouts are challenging and scenic and folks at the resorts and the courses rate high on the hospitality charts.

Get into the northeast corner of Minnesota and there's another group of courses under the banner of Wild North Golf which features six premier courses and a further 21 courses in the surrounding area.

The premier list includes The Legend and The Quarry at Giants Ridge, the Wilderness at Fortune Bay, Wolfridge at Angora,

Our trip provided an opportunity to play both courses as well as a side trip to the nine-hole layout at Wolfridge which has the unique attraction of playing par 34 in one direction and par 36 in the reverse direction, played on alternate days.

The Wilderness at Fortune Bay is the newest of the courses in this grouping, scheduled to go into play at the start of this season.

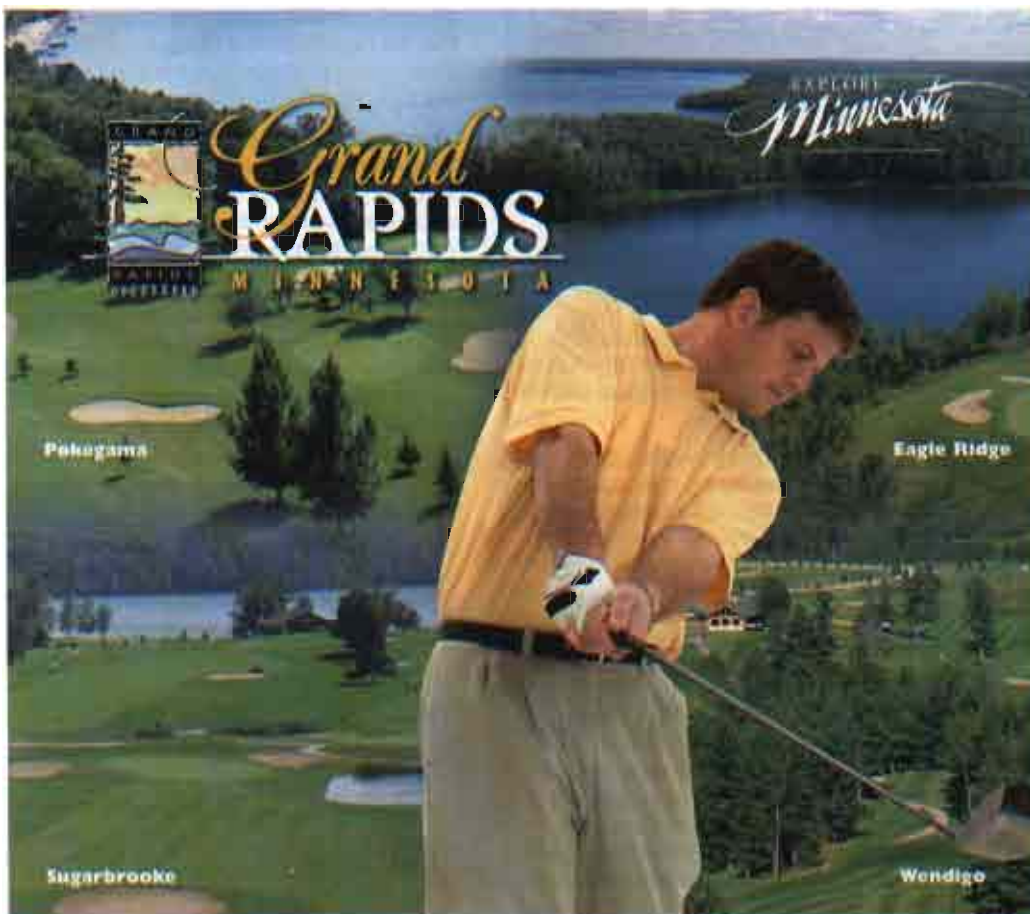
Back to the western side of the state, the Detroit Lakes and Park Rapids areas provide another hotbed of golf activity, with a number of enjoyable courses closely grouped, Wildflower, Thumper Pond, Perham, Blueberry Pines, Headwaters and Tianna are

Heading north again, there are several courses in Minnesota and North Dakota in the areas around Fargo and Grand Forks, popular shopping/holiday stops for Manitoba travellers.

While these two cities have provided interesting golf visits for many years, there has been a new attraction in the past couple of seasons. Kings Walk, an Arnold Palmer Signature course, located just one mile south of the Columbia Mall in Grand Forks, has been a popular spot for Manitoba golfers, particularly on Mondays when the green fees and carts are available at par for Canadian cash. We've touched on only a few of the numerous golf courses, resorts and packages available, but suffice to say Manitobans looking for something a little different don't have to travel far.

The Manitoba Golf Superintendents Association Scholarship Fund supports MGSA member students attending

educational programs as a means of enhancing their knowledge and skills for the turfgrass profession.

The Scholarship Fund provides support to MGSA members pursuing their educational endeavors. This assistance is meant to assist members in becoming better qualified for their current employment or for other opportunities within the turfgrass profession.

This assistance is available to all MGSA members and will be administered by the MGSA Board of Directors. Funding is available to those currently enrolled in at least the second year of a recognized turfgrass program of two (2) years duration (or longer). Selection is based on academic standings, financial need, and the content of the application, which demonstrates the applicant's interest in the field of turfgrass as a career.

An MGSA Success Story

(Editor's note: This article has been reproduced on the Canadian government website, giving national attention to the initiatives undertaken by the Manitoba Golf Superintendents Association.)

The Manitoba Golf Superintendents Association has successfully implemented an Environment, Health and Safety Program at 47 golf courses across the province.

The MGSA was established to advance the knowledge and guide practices including safety, health and environmental issues within Manitoba's golf sector.

The main components of the program include the development of a golf course Environmental Management System (EMS) that was comprised of pesticide reduction initiatives, habitat and wildlife inventories, education/outreach events and site assessments at participating courses using the MGSA Self Assessment Checklist.

The checklist is a tool created to assist MGSA members in the development of the environment program. It allows users to perform a self-assessment and implement best management practices onto the golf course, resulting in a healthier environment for employees, golfers and the community.

In accordance with Integrated Pest Management (IPM) guidelines, safer and minimized use of pesticides was adopted and "environmentally friendly" products were incorporated into daily operational practices. Energy and water savings were also targeted and realized through building retrofits and through the identification of water priority areas on the course.

Critical wildlife habitat/mapping activities were performed allowing for increase habitat restoration and conservation.

Environmental Pesticide use has been reduced by 15 to 20 per cent by adopting less-toxic substitutes for Malathion, 2,4-D and Quinzozone. Water consumption was reduced through the use of drought tolerant turf grass and various conservation devices and methods. Water quality was also maintained as demonstrated in preliminary results of water quality studies on participating courses.



The watering system is an important part of golf course maintenance and a major tool in the arsenal of the golf course superintendents in their constant vigil to protect the environment.

Wildlife habitat has also been greatly enhanced as a result of sound environmental management practices such as no spray zones, naturalized areas and through the use of environmentally friendly products.

The reduction in pesticide, water and energy will result in a cost reduction on each of the participating courses. The increased water quality may also account

for a cost savings for the local municipal water treatment plants.

The environment around the golf courses has been greatly improved with less hazardous products used, safe and efficient disposal methods and certified and trained employees. The surrounding community was encouraged to become involved in maintaining the environment on the golf course in their community through environmental awareness events.

Superintendents on the move

Several members of the Manitoba Golf Superintendents Association have changed locations in the past year.

Cory Froehlich left his position as superintendent at the Southside Golf Course to take a sales position at Guertin Implement.

Greg Mitchell took over the reins at Southside, moving from a similar post at the Northernmaire Golf and Country Club.

Martin Bailey, who served as superintendent at the Riverview Golf and Country Club at Morris for several years, has moved to take over duties at the Pinawa Golf Club, formerly held by **Aaron Goertzen**, who has moved to the Granite Hills course.

After several years at the Teulon Golf and Country Club, **Craig MacLeod** has moved to the Glendale Country Club in Winnipeg. **Tom Kowalchuk** also left Teulon to work with MacLeod at Glendale, while the Teulon duties have been taken over by **Kito Nishibata**, returning to

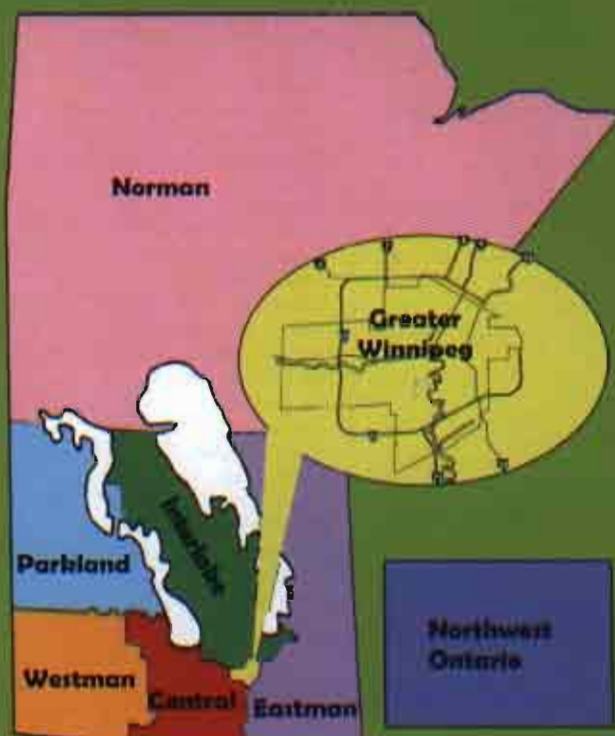
